Washington, Jan. 13—The Treasury announced Tuesday that the automobile use tax stamps will be put on sale Thursday (today) at post offices and offices of internal revenue collectors throughout the United States.

The tax which aggregates \$2.09 for the balance of the fiscal year ending July 1, must be purchased not later than Feb. 1.

The tax for a full year is \$5.00.
