Questions And Answers Concerning School Bond Election Saturday

(Q) If the bond issue passes, will there be a huge increase in my taxes?

(Ans.) No. If you are now paying \$75.00 per year in taxes the new rate would only be about \$22.00 a year more for the added benefits of a new school.

(Q) Why is it that we are not tearing down the old building and constructing an entirely new plant?

(Ans.) For two reasons. Our present tax structure would not stand a larger bond issue without raising the present valuations of properties, and there is some doubt that even this would be enough to warrant a bond issue large enough for a new building and auditorium. Also architects information indicated it would be extremely costly to tear down the solid concrete walls on the grade school building.

(Q) Why not just remodel the present grade school building?

(Ans.) The architect's estimates

of remodeling alone was almost \$90,000.00. In the school board's opinion it would be better to spend some additional money and have something everyone would be proud of. The bottom floor will be completely remodeled, but in addition, eight new modern classrooms will be constructed for our children.

(Q) Have other schools done similar building in our area?

(Ans.) Yes. Lorenzo, up near Lubbock, did the same thing not long ago. They remodeled the bottom floor of the grade school and built an attractive new building adjacent to the other building.

(Q) Will the old building be changed and be something to be proud of?

(Ans.) Yes. It will be modernized inside and out, and architects tell us that newcomers would find it hard to distinguish from a new building.

CHAPEL CHOIR GOES TO GLORIETA, NEW MEXICO

The Chapel Choir of the First Baptist Church will leave for the Baptist Assembly at Glorieta, New Mexico, June 16. Everyone is to be packed and ready to go at the dreary hour of 4:00 a. m., but when the choir boards the TNMO bus with its air-conditioning, reclining chairs, etc., everyone will either be wide awake or sleeping comfortably and will have forgotten the dreary, early hour.

The choir's stay will consist of one week. During that time there will be much activity. A devotion will be brought before breakfast each morning, and then afterwards there will be lectures on different subjects, and one can choose whichever he wishes to attend. In the afternoons, counseling, choir practices, recreation, etc. will take the spotlight by the choir. After supper there will be campfire services—each night consisting of something different—singing, devotions, testimonies, missionaires, etc.

FILOMOT BAPTIST ACTIVITIES

Flomot Baptists have just completed one of the busiest weeks in their history, according to Pastor Ed. Spivey. He explained that this year's Vacation Bible School was the main feature of the week, with a near-record enrollment of 78 and attendance was 64 in spite of heavy rains which made some roads impassable. Plans are already underway, he said, for a bigger, better, and longer School next year.

Featured in the School were stories, creative activities, learning of hymns and anthems, memory work, and co-operative projects. Children from each denomination in the community attended, and certificates of recognition were awarded

to those who had satisfactorily completed the attendance and progress requirements. Sixty of these certificates were awarded at commencement services last Friday evening, as many parents and friends gathered to see some of the results of the week in the program presented.

Another feature of the busy week was the "Work Days" the church has set aside for any day "It is too wet to plow." Three days in the last week were devoted to improving the church building and extensive repairs to the church's summer cabin at Plains Baptist Assembly in Blanco Canyon. In church conference Sunday morning, the church also approved plans for cooling of the educational wing, and other improvements.

While the church points with pride to these improvements, Pastor Spivey emphasized that the main stress has been on the Scriptural principals that churches are built upon. He pointed out that additions to the church of late indicate that "God is at work among us." This realization should prompt church members to even greater faithfulness, he said. The church has had two additions by letter, one by confession of faith, and another by statement in the past month. Numerous visitors each Sunday have helped boost Sunday School and church attendance to an average of sixty-one in May, and a total last Sunday of sixty-eight.

Plans for the future at the Flomot church include the Combined Worship Service at Flomot Home coming, July 3; encampments for boys and girls during July, and a summer revival, August 7-14. Next spring's revival, led by Rev. Wayne Williams of Colorado, has been set for April 2-9, 1961. Everyone in the community is invited to participate in regular services as well as these special activities, Bro. Spivey stated.

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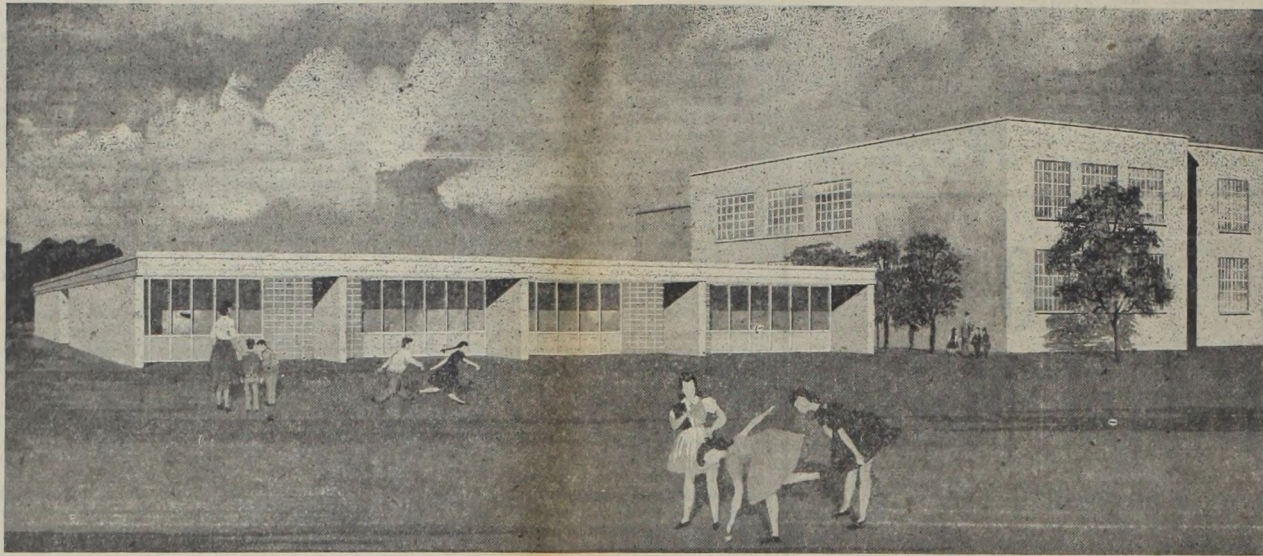

Proposed Addition to the Quitaque Elementary School —



At a called meeting of the school board on May 23, 1960 a resolution was passed calling for an election to be held on June 18, 1960 for the purpose of voting on a proposal to issue \$150,000.00 in bonds to make the following repairs on the school buildings: Cutting off the top square with the lowest point and putting on a new roof. Lowering the ceiling of the auditorium and putting in new acoustical sound, putting a new floor on the entire ground floor of the present Elementary building; putting in 350 new seats in the Auditorium and redecorating the walls. Blocking off the stairways and using the top of the building for storage; repairing the lunchroom and putting in new equipment as needed; taking out the wall between the present bookroom and dining area. Taking out the partition between the kitchen and dining room and remodeling it. Redecorate the present office; Taking the present first grade room and making a bookroom out of it. Taking the present Second grade room and remodeling it and making a multi-purpose room out of it. Remodeling the present rest-rooms; Redashing the entire outside of the building; then, due west of the present elementary building adding eight new classrooms with individual restrooms in each room.

Upon being presented with a petition with the above mentioned date the Board called the election for June 18, 1960. It is estimated that the improvements will

cost approximately \$130,000.00. New furniture will have to be purchased and some money expended on the Gym and the colored school.

In order for this school district to be eligible to pass this amount of bonds it is necessary for the district to adopt Senate Bill 116, which, in effect, states that a school district can use a dollar and a half for maintenance purposes. In other words the maintenance tax would be in addition to the bond tax. This school is now operating on a dollar and a half tax rate for both maintenance and bond. If Senate Bill 116 were adopted the school could use whatever amount, up to a dollar and a half, it needed to maintain the school. It must be understood that the bond issue would be null and void without the acceptance of Senate Bill 116.

The acceptance of the bond issue and Senate Bill 116 would result in an approximately 25 per cent increase in taxes. It is assumed that the tax rate would have the following change: whereas now a person is paying a \$1.50 tax-rate per \$100.00 valuation, his new tax-rate would be \$1.95 per \$100.00 valuation.

In order for a person to be eligible to vote on the proposed bond issue he must have a poll tax or be exempt and be a tax paying citizen of the school district.
