James G. Valliant, recently pro moted from Assistant to Associate Water Engineer, stated that the tests were designed to determine the combination or irrigation meth od and fertilizer treatment which return and the highest irrigation stages of growth, first bloom or

efficiency in the production of cotton. Four irrigation methods com bined with 4 fertilizer treatments and three varieties of cotton were (1) First bloom only, (2) First bloom plus mid-bloom, (3) First bloom, mid-bloom and September 5 compared with (4) dryland cotton. Full Details of the test are in the complete High Plains Research Foundation Report No. 45, issued in April, 1962

Gregg, representing early matur-ing; Lockett 88-A, representing mid-maturing, and Paymaster 88-90, representing late maturing as well as the open-boll type cotton Mr. Valliant concluded from these tests that, "Results from the 1931 cotton irrigation test indicated that in early and mid-maturing cotton, response to the fertilizer is directly related to the rate of irrigation water, while the response to fertilizer in late maturing cot ton could be due to the period of time the plant demands nutriants.'
