Stroud of the Bureau's permanent regional field office at Dallas. The Dallas re-gion covers the States of fArkansas, Louisiana, Oklahoma, and

A dairy cow is a highly complex production unit which, unfortunately, breaks down occasionally. Many of the problems causing cows to break down can be traced to the constant efforts to boost production. Among the most important problems of these valuable, high-producing animals are milk fever, ketosis and mastitis.



Cows stricken by milk fever car e saved if treated promptly

Milk fever, which often occurs
12 to 72 hours after calving,
causes the heaviest death losses.
First symptoms of milk fever include staggering and weaving.
Later, the cow becomes prostrate
with head and neck drawn sharply
to one side. If a veterinarian can
get to the stricken cow promptly,
he can often save her. But time
is an important element and the
veterinarian should be called immediately if signs of milk fever
are noticed.

Ketosis results when there is not a proper nutritive intake or utilization. When this occurs, the cow's body begins to tear itself down by converting fat into sugar

down by converting fat into sugar and leaving "ketones" free to circulate in the cow's system.

Symptoms of this disease include loss of appetite, decrease in milk production, excitement, staggering, swaying, biting or drooling. Ketosis also can be treated and the animal often saved if the veterinarian is called in soon enough.

Mastitis is the most costly of all diseases of dairy cows. It can be caused by several different types of infective organisms which get into the delicate udder. To treat the disease successfully one must know which type of organism is causing the problem, and the source and measures for invasion. That takes careful diagnosis and then specialized treatment, plus close follow-up.

Mastitis is no disease to be "tinkered" with, and the farmer should be on guard against sureshot, easy treatments. It takes long, careful, thorough work to clean mastitis out of a herd. But the rewards in profits can be large, once the disease has been whipped.


