Panthers vs Kress Last Home Conf. Game

Led by Buddy Holcomb, who broke loose for a five touchdown splurge, the Quitaque Panthers rolled over Matador here last Friday night 46-0.

Matador has yet to win a game this year and beating them is no trick but the apparent ease with which the Panthers did it, and the fact that Coach Mitchell used every available man on the bench was cheering to fans of the Panthers.

Quitaque kicked off to the Matadors to start festivities, held for hours and then the parade started. Gordon Riley scored first, going over from five yards out. Then Buddy Holcomb took over the scoring department and scored five straight TD's, two of them on short plunges and the other three on pass plays with Riley doing the tossing. Late in the third period Lynn Rhoderick hit Richard Eddleman for 20 yards and a score. Just about everyone got into the scoring act with Riley getting 6 points, Bud 30, Eddleman 6, Rhoderick 2, Garner 1 and Davidson 1. One of the biggest disappointments of the evening came when Jerry King, pocket-size Panther end, fielded a Rhoderick pass for a score only to have it called back because of a Panther offense.

The Panthers turned in their best effort of the current season in turning back Matador. A great deal of improvement was shown in every department. More spirit was shown by the squad, blocking and tackling was better, play selection and execution of the plays was smoother than at any other time this year. The passing attack, which had been rather impotent, blossomed Friday night and the fact that the Panthers have three men who can and will pass the ball will make the offense more deceptive.

Friday night, here on Panther Field, the locals will do battle with dangerous Kress. The Kangaroos will enter the game sporting an undefeated record in conference play and will be out to keep their slate clean. Although the Kangaroo squad is admittedly weaker than last years team, which won the Region I crown, they have a good team and the Panthers will have their hands full in this their final home conference game of this season.

Quitaque will have to win this one to stay in the running for championship honors since they already have one conference loss on their record.

However, we think that the Panthers can win it if they will play the same fine game which they played last Friday night, and then play just a little harder.

Fans will be assured of probably the top game to be played here this season and are urged to turn out in full force.

Born in Foard County in 1903, Hal was left an orphan at an early age, and his sister, now Mrs. Barney Martin cared for him and his other two sisters until he and the younger sister, now Mrs. Bill Casey were placed in the Odd Fellows orphans home at Corsicana. He remained in the home until he was 17 years old, then returned to Foard county, to make his living, on his own.

On June 2, 1922, he and Miss Lela Anderson of Crowell were married at Crowell, and they had two daughters. Survivors are the wife and daughters, Mrs. Ima Jo Welkerson of Tulsa, and Mrs. Mildred McKinley of Pampa, and one grandchild. HARVEST IS SLOW

Grain is coming in to the Elevators fairly steady, and is testing well, George Setliff of Quitaque Elevator and the Setliff Elevator at Turkey, stated this week. For some strange reason, (the weather here varies, even just over the fence) the grain in the Turkey area is ripening earlier than that a few miles west, and Turkey Elevator had received 22 cars the first of the week, while at Quitaque only about 5 cars had been received.

About fifty percent of the grain is dry enough for government storage and is being placed in storage. The Elevator also is buying grain. Mr. Setliff said most of the grain is testing good heavy weight.

He said it was difficult to estimate the yield this year, due to the unusually late harvest and the uncertainty of the weather.

Mr. Setliff said he had plenty of bonded storage space at the elevator.

Cotton is opening very slowly, and not many farmers have hands in their fields yet. Some of the cotton still looks very good and if frost is late enough, will mature. Cotton is grading better than expected, but is spotted.

Farmer's Gin at Quitaque had received about 85 bales up to Wednesday afternoon, and the first bale was run through the new Paymaster Gin Monday of this week. This modern, up-to-the-minute gin is brand spanking new and farmers are invited to visit and look over the plant.

F. F. Hefner Passes After Short Illness

Services for Frederick F. Hefner, 73 years old, were held at the Quitaque school building Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Hubert Setliff of Plainview, officiated, assisted by Odell Purdy of Turkey, and Baldo Meacham of Turkey was in charge of the singing.

Interment was in the Quitaque cemetery under direction of McDonald Funeral Home. Pallbearers were Preston Wood, Odie Honea, Homer Gregg, Walter Kelly, Knox Farley and Ralph Carter.

Mr. Hefner was taken to the Stanley hospital at Matador about two weeks ago, suffering with virus pneumonia. He passed away Saturday night, Oct. 14, at 10:00 o'clock.

Born in Hunt County, near Lone Oak, on July 4, 1877, he moved with his parents when a small boy to Jack County. From there he went in a covered wagon to the Indian Territory. He was married at Lynn, to Miss Tommie Lenore Cates, before Oklahoma was admitted to the Union and entered statehood. They were the parents of eight children, two of them dying in infancy.

In 1928 the family moved to West Texas, and Mr. Hefner farmed in the Flomot vicinity before they moved to Quitaque. He was an active, energetic man and took great pride in his work. He was caretaker at the cemetery for several years, and worked and beautified the grounds until his last illness. His advanced years did not slow him down in any way—mentally and physically he was alert and actively interested in his home and family, his work and his community.

His first wife died October 23, 1932 and was buried at Quitaque. On January 28, 1939 he married Miss Nora Lee Phelps of Quitaque. He is survived by his wife and six children, who are twin sons, Claude of Durant, Okla., and Clyde of Amarillo; three daughters Mrs. Annabelle Matthews and Mrs. Aubrey Kelly of Amarillo, and Mrs. Vernie Taylor of Quitaque, and another son Gradus of Palestine. All were present for the last rites except Gradus. There are 14 grandchildren and 2 great grandchildren. Also surviving are two brothers Ad Hefner of Phoenix, Ariz., and Olin Hefner of Jernyn, Texas, the latter coming for the last rites; and two sisters Mrs. Zula White of Fort Worth and Mrs. Buelah Hawkins of Plainview.

BROTHER-IN-LAW DIES

Albert Webb, pioneer settler of Berger died October 17, at Plainview. Mr. Webb, 76 years old, had made his home in Amarillo with a son since the passing of his wife about three years ago. He was a brother-in-law of F. F. Hefner of Quitaque who passed away on Oct. 14.

Passenger Service Ends Saturday, Oct. 22nd

Passenger train service over the South Plains line of Fort Worth and Denver City Railway between Childress and Plainview-Lubbock, Texas, and intermediate towns will be discontinued effective Sunday, October 22nd.

Authority for this action is contained in a Railroad Commission of Texas order dated October 6th, in its Docket No. 1088-RO.

The last passenger runs will be operated westward from Childress to Lubbock and eastward from Lubbock to Childress on Saturday October 21st.

The commission authorized Denver City railway to abandon trains 101 and 102, which were said to be "not profitable" to the company.

A public hearing on the application was held in Lubbock on Sept. 7 and in Plainview on Sept. 8.

Commissioner Olin Cuberson concurred in the authorization but said he did not agree with the supreme court decision which made it possible.

The high court has ruled that a train may be discontinued if it is shown to be not profitable. Cuberson said he did not think that "public convenience" was considered by the court.

There will be no interruption in mail service, stated Post master Sid Bogan. A representative of the Railway mail service, Benny Barker of Fort Worth, was in Quitaque Tuesday and told the postmaster that arrangements had been made for the Mistletoe Truck line (which delivers films to the theatres through this area) to be the temporary carriers for the mail, running from Childress to Plainview. As soon as possible, bids will be asked and contract let for truck delivery of the mail over this route.

The mail will be dispatched on the same schedule as now in effect, and the postoffice will continue to operate the same hours. There is a possibility, the postmaster said, that we may now get Sunday mail delivery.

Last rites were held Sunday at 2:30 p. m. at the Flomot Methodist church for Omer Washington, 48 years old, who died Friday, October 13, in the Tulsa hospital.

Rev. Bob Jameson, pioneer Methodist pastor, conducted the rites, assisted by Rev. Baker, pastor of the Flomot Methodist church, and Rev. J. E. Lee, Baptist pastor of Flomot. Interment was in Flomot cemetery under direction of Douglas Funeral Home.

Pallbearers were Alfred Martin, Baldo Martin, Tom Bynum and John Morriss of Flomot, Jess Birchfield of Dimmitt, Cecil Davis of Muleshoe, Vernon Loftin of Tulsa, and Leslie Watson of Springlake.

Mr. Washington was born August 15, 1902 at Flomot, and grew to manhood in that community. He married Miss May Wingo of Flomot in 1922 and they had eight children.

Survivors are the wife and children, Mrs. Farris Martin of Silverton, James Washington of Quitaque, Arnold Washington and Mrs. Billy Watson of Springlake, and Omer J., George, Peggy Sue and Earl, who make their home with their mother at Tulsa. There are five grandchildren, two brothers, Gordie of Flomot and Dick of Portales, and one sister, Mrs. Abe Martin of Flomot.

About ten years ago the family moved to the Plains, first to Muleshoe in 1940, then to Springlake, and about three years ago they moved to Tulsa. Mr. Washington was a farmer and their home when he died was a farm near Tulsa. He had been in failing health for several years.

BROKEN LEG

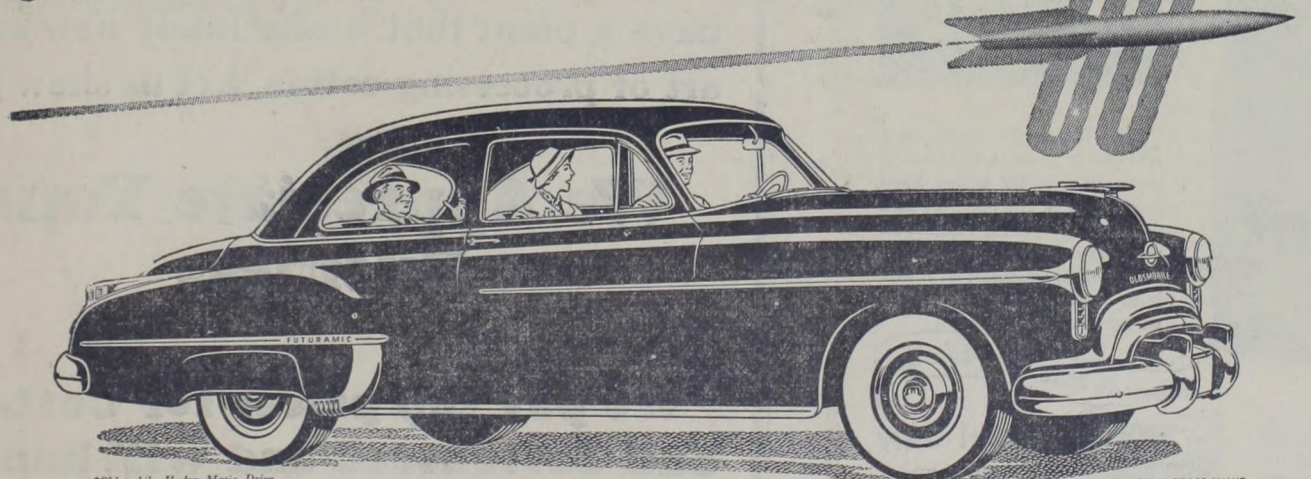

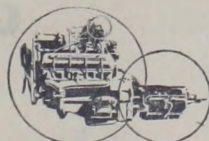
