P-TA HAS FIRST MEETING OF YEAR; NEW OFFICERS WERE INSTALLED

The Quitaque Parent-Teacher Association held its first meeting of the school year, Monday night in the school auditorium at 7:30.

Supt. Johnny Mason presided at the opening of the meeting. The invocation was led by Elmer Berryhill, Jimmy Davidson led in the salute to the flag and Gaston Owens led a congregational song, accompanied by Peggy Stevens at the piano.

The Rev. Al Jennings presented the address and installed the new officers. They are L. B. Monk, President; Mrs. J. T. Rogers, Vice-President; Jimmie Lee Gibson, Secretary; Jimmy Davidson, Treasurer; Doyle Ramsey, Reporter.

The classes of the school entered a contest the last of the school term last year to enlist new members for the P-TA and Prin. Wilburn Leeper presented the following report on that contest: The senior class enlisted the most numbers, percentage-wise, closely followed by the fourth grade. A total of 164 members have been enrolled to date in the P-TA and this should reflect a greater interest in the work of the parents and teachers and more things this year working together for the good of the schools.

The Executive Committee voted to give a Stereo or Hi-Fi album as a door prize to boost attendance this year. Mrs. James Woods name was drawn at Monday night's meeting.

Mr. Mason read a letter from J. W. Edgar, Commissioner of Education for Texas, stating that his agency had checked on the present publishers of the "Weekly Reader," a paper that our younger children receive through the mail, and it was found that the publishers are listed on the U. S. Attorney General's group of subversive front organizations. Needless to say, that paper will not be received here anymore. A copy of that letter is shown below along with a letter written by Mr. Mason to the Amarillo Globe-News, thanking the editor for alerting this area to the fact that the "Weekly Reader" had been bought by a Communist front organization. The letters are as follows:

We have checked the United States Attorney General's list of subversive Communist front or-

ganizations, and we do find this organization listed.

The letter to the Globe-News Editor was as follows:
Dear Sir:

It was reported to me that your paper mentioned that the WEEKLY READER, a paper read by most all young school children, was recently purchased by a Communist front publication.

We discussed this in our opening faculty meeting and it was decided that I should look into this matter prior to renewing our subscriptions.

I wrote to the legal department of the Texas Education Agency, Austin, Texas, (and) Mr. J. W. Edgar, Commissioner of Education sent us notice that the American Publications, Inc. prints the Weekly Reader and that they ARE listed on the Attorney General's list of subversive Communist front organizations.

I have also written to our Senators in Washington to get their views on this important matter.

I feel that we should alert the entire area of this subtle attempt to reach every student in our schools. If this allowed to go unchecked, the Communists in America will have access to millions of unsuspecting children's minds. It will have a far-reaching effect which causes me to shudder every time I think of it.

I truly appreciate your efforts in letting us know about this diabolical attempt to use a heretofore good school publication for use in undermining our youngster's minds.

EARL MORRISON IS VICTIM OF HEART ATTACK

Funeral services for Earl E. Morrison, 51, were held at 3 o'clock Monday afternoon, September 13 at the First Baptist Church. Earle died at 2:10 p. m. Saturday at Lockney General Hospital where he was rushed by ambulance following a heart attack about 1:15.

The Rev. Al Jennings, pastor of the Methodist Church here officiated. He was assisted by Rev. E. G. Johnson of Estelline. Interment was in Rest Haven Cemetery under the direction of Quitaque Funeral Home.

Earl was a member of the Baptist Church at Gasoline.

He was an employee of the Briscoe County SCS at Silverton.

Earl Edgar Morrison was born at Gasoline on March 13, 1914 and lived in this community all of his life with the exception of the time spent in the Armed Forces during World War II.

He was inducted into the Army at Fort Sill, Okla., Mar. 26, 1943. He served 5 1/2 months overseas as an aerial gunner, taking part in the Northern France Campaign and Rhineland Campaign and received the Aerial Gunner Badge, EAME Campaign Ribbon with two bronze stars, Air Medal with five Oak Leaf Clusters and the Good Conduct Medal. He was separated from the service October 24, 1945 after serving 2 years 6 months and 28 days.

YOUNG PEOPLE OFF TO COLLEGE

CONGRESSMAN ROGERS TO VISIT IN PANHANDLE THIS WEEKEND

Washington, D. C. (Sp1)—Congressman Walter Rogers will arrive in the Panhandle Saturday to attend three events—the Pre-Harvest Festival late Saturday at the Easter Community in Deaf Smith County. The Hall County 75th Anniversary celebration Sunday in Memphis, and the annual Tri-State Fair Parade and opening ceremonies Monday in Amarillo. Congressman and Mrs. Rogers will travel by air to Amarillo, arriving Saturday, and will return to the Capital late Monday.

"Full legislative schedules may be expected from now until adjournment as the House and Senate attempt to wind up the session's unfinished business," Congressman Rogers said.

Monday, the full House of Representatives will begin consideration of one of the year's heaviest weekly agendas. Late daily sessions are expected. Monday's schedule is expected to include at least seven bills affecting the District of Columbia and Congressman Rogers said he expected the session to be heated.

"The House Committee on the District of Columbia has reported a bill to annex most residential and business sections of Washington to the State of Maryland, preserving Federal areas as the Federal city. While this bill as offered as a substitute solution to the District of Columbia home rule controversy, parliamentary maneuvering may prevent its consideration," Congressman Rogers said.

The two committees on which Congressman Rogers serves as a ranking member, Interstate and Foreign Commerce and Interior and Insular Affairs, have meetings this week.

Monday, Congressman Rogers will preside as his Subcommittee on Irrigation and Reclamation discusses the proposed Southern Nevada water development project. Tuesday's meeting of the Subcommittee on Mines and Mining will be followed by a session Wednesday of the full Interior Committee to consider bills referred by subcommittees.

The Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce will meet Tuesday and Wednesday to further consider legislation amending the Railway Labor Act and a bill authorizing grants to build and develop medical library facilities. The Communications and Power Subcommittee, of which Congressman Rogers is chairman, will meet for further consideration of a bill concerning jurisdiction of the Federal Power Commission.

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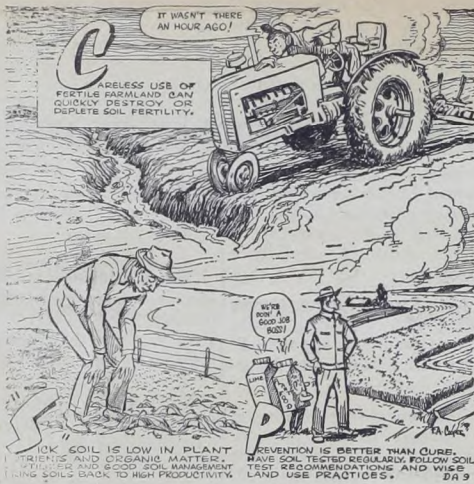

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WANTED BY THE FBI



ALSON THOMAS WAHRlich

Wahrlich, one of the FBI's "Ten Most Wanted Fugitives," is wanted for unlawful interstate flight to avoid prosecution for the crime of kidnaping. He allegedly abducted a 6-year-old Arizona girl in Tucson, Arizona, on April 16, 1964, and brutally beat, choked, and sexually molested her before leaving her abandoned in the same city. A Federal warrant was issued at Tucson on April 28, 1964, charging Wahrlich with unlawful interstate flight to avoid prosecution for this offense.

A white American, Wahrlich was born in Rensselaer County, New York, on February 4, 1936. He is 5' 2" tall, weighs 135 to 140 pounds, wears glasses, has blue eyes, brown hair, a medium build and a medium complexion. He has a scar on his left shoulder, a vaccination scar on his left arm, a scar on each side of his abdomen, and a tattoo of a heart and the name "Cindy" on his left arm.

Wahrlich has worked as a truck driver, ranch worker, dishwasher, house trailer repairman, hospital orderly, insurance salesman, and ice cream truck vendor. He is very interested in guns and strongly prefers traveling by personally owned car. Wahrlich reportedly has mental blackouts, has been previously imprisoned for aggravated assault, child molesting, and a crime against nature. FARMERS HOME ADMINISTRATION ACTIVITIES IN TEXAS FOR FISCAL YEAR 1965

Over 39,766 families of farmers, ranchers and rural residents in Texas benefitted from Farmers Home Administration loan services during 1965. This is an all-time high according to L. J. Cappleman, State Director for this agency.

Loans made or insured by the Farmers Home Administration in Texas during the fiscal year ended June 30 totaled a record \$88,289,230. Of this amount, \$960,070 was loaned by Swisher and Briscoe Counties.

In Motley County a total of \$359,740 was loaned through the Matador FHA office to 56 Motley County Farmers. Of this amount \$224,390 was for farm operating expenses, \$104,540 for the purchase and improvement of land, \$16,850 for construction of new dwellings, \$8250 for development and conservation of water and land, and \$5710 for economic opportunity loans to low income families.

State Director Cappleman said that the Farmers Home Administration preserved its long-standing record for keeping its various lending programs in a sound position during fiscal 1965. Repayments of principal and interest by borrowers totaled the largest volume collected in the agency's 30-year history.

"This good credit record signifies the initiative and integrity displayed by the people of rural Texas in their vast self-help effort which these loans represent," Cappleman stated.

Included in the number of rural people benefitting from these programs are the members of 28,245 families forming rural groups that use Farmers Home Administration credit. Most of these groups borrowed funds to develop rural community water systems.

State Director Cappleman emphasized that loans to strengthen family farms and build new rural homes continued as the agency's largest programs in fiscal 1965.

In the Swisher and Briscoe unit office, \$11,000 was loaned under the Economic Opportunity program to rural residents to establish 5 small business in

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order to raise their level of living.

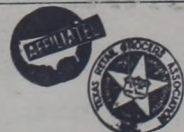
