Excitement is High When Gas Truck Blazes

Excitement was at the highest pitch in Quitauque about 7 o'clock Wednesday evening when the rear tires on a loaded gasoline truck, parked in front of the Carpenter service station on East Main street burst into flames.

Attendants at the station who had been working on the tires, made a hurried get-away, and began moving cars and other movable items out of the way. Nearby business houses were locking their doors and taking off, but the volunteer fire boys answered the call of the siren, and courageously attacked the flames and had them extinguished in short order.

Both rear tires on the dual-wheel trailer blew out just as the truck was coming into Quitauque from the east, and the driver brought the carrier on to the station for service, coming in on the flats. The tires were smoking hot from friction and when the station attendants jacked them up and the air struck them they burst into flames. The truck driver (a man from Tulla) tried to put out the fire with his chemical equipment but to no avail.

The truck was loaded with 25,000 gallons of gasoline, and filled to the brim, some of the gas had overflowed and was running down the side of the tank. Everyone in the vicinity, realizing the extreme danger, scattered pronto. Charlie Carpenter turned in the alarm and the fire truck made record time, answering the call. The boys deserve commendation for their prompt and unhesitating response to a very serious situation.

SERVICE CONTINUES WHILE GAS MAIN IS REPAIRED

Gas pressure was lowered last Thursday afternoon at Turkey from a normal 300 lbs. to 170 pounds. Cause of the trouble was a burst main.

While building terraces on the Morris farm between Quitauque and Turkey last Thursday afternoon, Reg Cushenberry and Mort Hawkins who were operating the grader struck the 6-inch main which runs through the farm, and knocked a hole in the pipe.

The men hurried in to Quitauque and notified C. H. Rush, manager of the local West Texas Gas Co., who applied an emergency clamp, cutting the pressure down to below the danger point.

Authorities at Lubbock and Floydada were notified and the main line foreman came down from Lubbock and checked on the situation. The main line maintenance crew, who were busy on a job at Lamesa arrived Friday morning and repaired the pipe.

The men did the welding without turning off the pressure.

Ft. Worth & Denver Offers Prize Contest

Fort Worth—An essay contest, with a 10 day all-expense, escorted, Colorado vacation trip as the prize to each five winners, has been announced by Fort Worth and Denver City Railway and its subsidiary, The Wichita Valley Railway, as a part of the observance of the 75 anniversary of the chartering of Fort Worth and Denver City Railway Company by the Texas Legislature on May 26, 1873.

The subject of the essays submitted in this contest is to be "The History of Fort Worth and Denver City Railway (or The Wichita Valley Railway) in My Home County."

It is pointed out by the railroad's headquarters in Fort Worth that a wealth of material on the early day history of Fort Worth, West Texas, and the Panhandle is tied closely to the history of the railroad itself, and that all historical data is acceptable for the essays submitted such as county records, stories or incidents recalled and related by old settlers, old newspaper articles, matter from history books, biographies, etc., supported by early day photographs of the railroad's construction or operation, if desired by contestants.

A comprehensive Colorado vacation trip is offered as the prize for the best essay in each district. The party of winners, with an expert railroad passenger escort in attendance, will leave on the Texas Zephyr the afternoon of Sunday, June 6th.

Return home will be on the Texas Zephyr, leaving Colorado Springs the afternoon of Monday, June 14th, placing all of the winners back in their home towns on Tuesday, the 15th.

GET AFTER BINDWEED NOW

Every farmer who has bindweed on his place should be doing some serious thinking and some effective eradication work, says Leo White, Briscoe County Agent. Most people in this county are not acquainted with this noxious weed and many people are mistaking some other plant for field bindweed.

According to a statement from Mr. White early this week, bindweed is not well established in Briscoe County but it is definitely present and should be killed immediately.

Bindweed can be killed by plowing provided the plant is cut off and kept below the surface for several growing seasons. No farmer plows his land that often and the spots are so small that he can't afford to plow just in the areas that are infested. The 2-4-D spray materials will burn the plant down but it does not keep it from coming back.

The sure and economical way to get rid of this rapidly spreading weed is to sterilize the soil where the plants are growing with sodium chlorate or calcium chlorate. These chemicals will sterilize the soil and nothing will grow there for two or three years. The chlorates are in powder form and may be applied as a spray or as a dust. Dusting the material into the soil is very satisfactory and eliminates the use of spraying equipment.

When applying a dust, use ten pounds of Chlorate to each square rod of surface area. Put on five pounds per square rod in the spring and the remaining five pounds later in the summer. Of course, the land will be useless for two or three years but it wouldn't produce anything with bindweeds on it and they would be spreading to clean land.

When the bindweed patches are few and the materials are available is the time to eradicate them, concluded White. A few years from now may be too late. He advises all farmers to know how to recognize this plant and kill it as soon as possible.

METHODIST WSCS

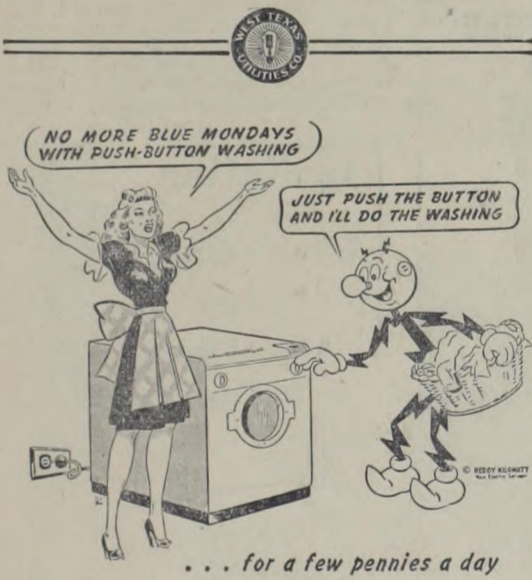
Mrs. Victor Hall was hostess Tuesday night at her home to the Methodist WSCS. The devotional was led by Mrs. Mort Hawkins.

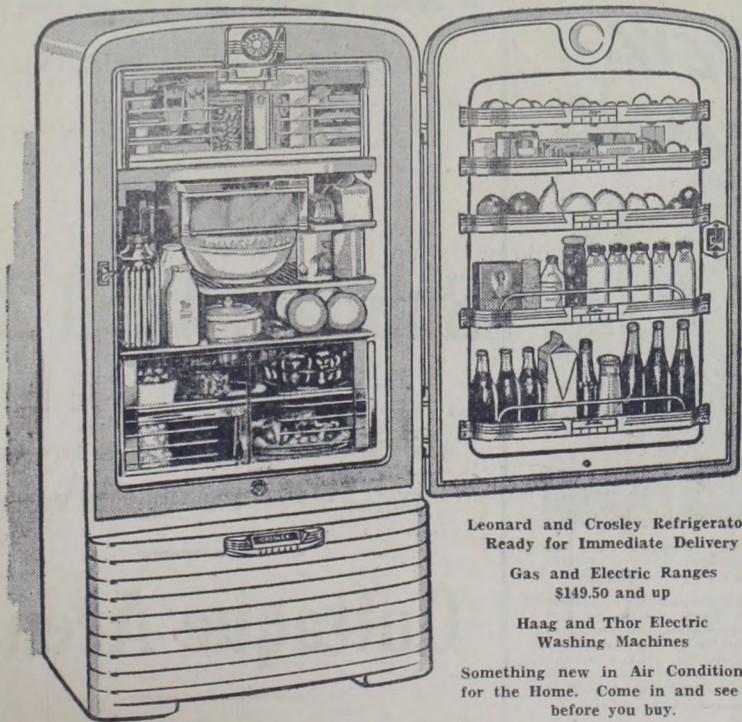
