## Seale Ranch Leased For Drilling

John D. Kynaston independent operator of Abilene and Miami, Fla., has purchased leases totaling 1,446 acres on the Ellamore Seale ranch six miles south of Baird and secured option on a 1,296-acre tract of the Marguerite Seale Puchanan ranch, adjoining to the north.

Kynaston for many years an operator in the mid-continent area, plans to drill as many as three wells to test the shallow Cisco series from the Moutray to the Hope sands, and may carry one of the three to 3,000 feet. No test has been drilled on the Seale ranches, although the Moutray and Hatchett pools lie immediately to the north and east of the block. Part of the acreage was held at one time by a major company.

Geological work on the ranches was done by J. F. (Al) Schlueter of Brownwood and Fort Worth, Kynaston has recently drilled several tests in the south part of the district, Coleman and Brown counties.

Leases have also been obtained recently by another operator on the Hatchett and Windham lands to the north and east, which carry a drilling contract for a 2,700 foot test.

The nearby Moutray shallow production to the east has long been considered the best field in Callahan county.

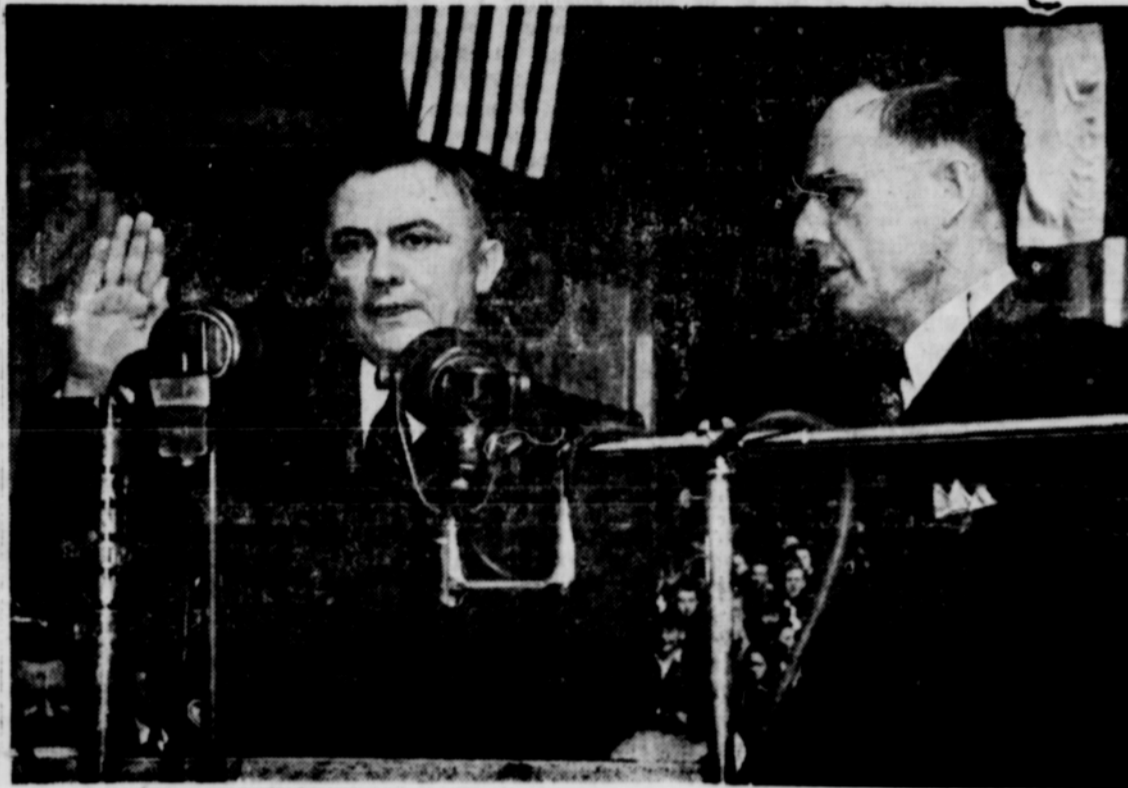

## Jan. 31 Deadline For Paying 1940 Taxes Without Penalty

January 31, 1941 is the last day that the 1940 taxes can be paid without penalty and interest. After that date penalty and interest will increase rapidly each month on all unpaid taxes.

Motor vehicle license plates for 1941 may be purchased on and after February 1st but may not be used prior to March 1st. All motor vehicles should have 1941 license plates attached before midnight April 1 1941.

There has been a late change relative to obtaining exemption certificates. All persons residing in Callahan County who have become twenty-one years of age since January 1, 1940, or who will be twenty-one years of age before elections to be held during the year 1941 must obtain certificates of exemption before February 1, 1941, if they desire to vote.

## 31,575 Service Establishments In Texas

Texas had 31,575 service establishments in operation in 1939, the Census Bureau, Department of Commerce, reported today. These establishments did a volume of business amounting to \$137,198,000.

Service establishments in Texas in 1939 reported employment of 61,595 persons, of which 45,713 were full-time employees and 15,882, part-time employees. In addition, 32,346 proprietors were reported who devoted the major portion of their time to the operation of their business.

The total pay roll, exclusive of proprietors' compensation (amounted to \$41,473,000. Full time employees received \$37,242,000 and parttime employees, \$4,231,000.

Power laundries, accounting for over one-eighth of the total receipts of all service establishments in the State, was the most important business from the standpoint of volume of business

It was decided by the committee that the county debate contests would be held March 13th at one p. m. in Cross Plains and that rotating trophies for winning teams in both boys and girls contests would be awarded. Senior Choral singing, omitted from the league work last year, was revived by the committee with Mrs. Ada Wilkins of Clyde as director. Contests in both junior and senior choral singing will be held March 16 at 2 p. m. in Baird at the High School auditorium. Trophies will be given.

**Notice To Wheat Producers**  
The following information has been received in connection with the 1941 wheat performance and is of importance to every wheat producer.

(1) In 1941 producers who have overplanted their wheat allotment by more than 3 acres or 3 percent, whichever is larger, will not be permitted to seed other grain with the wheat after performance is checked and thus change the classification to a mixture and place the farm in compliance nor will it be possible for you to effect complete compliance by removing this excess acreage. Regardless of the use or disposition made of this excess wheat acreage, a deduction will be made for the over-seeding.

If you have reason to believe that you have overseeded your

1941 wheat acreage allotment by which includes such rented land. The amount to be withheld or refunded will be the net amount of the deduction which would be computed if the person were entitled to receive all the crops produced on the rented land.

## From Small Town Schools

The University of Texas is rapidly becoming a "small-town" school as far as the student body is concerned.

An increasing proportion of each year's freshmen class comes from the small town and rural areas, according to registrar's report reveals.

In the last five years, first-year students from small-town

and country homes have increased 21.6 per cent, until they constitute almost half the freshman class, the report indicates.

During the same period, freshmen from metropolitan areas—cities of more than 1,000 population have increased only 7.4 per cent.

Last year, out of 1,615 freshmen who entered the University from the state's high schools, 777 or 48.1 per cent, claimed small towns and villages as home

Leading Texas divines have joined up with outstanding religionists of the county in calling for an observance of the day in every church throughout the nation. Dr. Daniel A. Poling, president of International Society of Christian Endeavor, well known in almost every city and town in Texas, is a leader in the movement to bring about unanimous observances by all faiths.

In issuing the call for observance of the day Dr. Poling said: "No cause more deeply moves the heart of America than the national campaign for the assistance of victims of infantile paralysis. Christian Endeavors throughout America will give their eager general support to this program."

The call for Texas churches to join in the celebration is issued by William L. Clyaton, Houston, chairman of the Texas Committee for the Celebration of the Presidents' Birthday. On the night of January 30, when President Roosevelt will be 59, all sorts of entertainments will be given in thousands of Texas cities and communities to raise funds to fight paralysis.
