More Than 6,000 Expected To Attend Baptist Convention At San Antonio

Pastor and Mrs. Roy Davidson will join former pastor and Mrs. Bob Beck of Paducah to attend the annual meeting of the state Baptist Convention next week.

The Annual Baptist General Convention of Texas gets underway Tuesday, Nov. 12 with more than 6,000 Baptists from throughout the state expected to attend the 78th annual sessions.

Plans for a state-wide evangelistic crusade among the Latin American people of Texas will be launched during the convention, meeting Nov. 12-14 at San Antonio's Municipal Auditorium.

The Crusade, called the Latin American Baptist New Life Crusade (Cruzada Beautista Nueva Vida), will be held Aug. 30-Oct. 11, 1964, in an effort to reach more than 2 million Latin Americans in Texas with the Gospel message.

Wednesday night sessions during the convention will spotlight plans for the crusade. Dr. T. A. Patterson, Texas Baptist executive secretary, and the Rev. Rudy Hernandez, convention staff evangelist, will speak on crusade plans.

The convention program, carrying out the theme "Everywhere Preaching the Word," will also feature inspirational messages by Dr. J. Keith Parks, Southern Baptist Missionary to Indonesia; Dr. W. M. Shamburger, pastor of First Baptist Church, Tyler; and Dr. K. Owen White, pastor of First Baptist Church, Houston.

In convention business actions, the Baptists are expected to adopt a record \$12 million world missions budget; elect a new convention president to succeed Dr. White of Houston, the only man ever to serve simultaneously as president of both the Texas and Southern Baptist Conventions; and name 300 trustees for Baptist institutions.

The convention will also consider two proposals that would outline in detail plans for future development of Baptist education efforts, and propose sweeping changes in the state Baptist district missions program.

One Killed In Collision Near Silverton Monday

A two-car headon collision about three miles east of Silverton killed a 35-year old Snyder, Okla. woman and injured four others, the accident occurring near 6 o'clock Monday evening.

The dead woman was identified as Mrs. Lois King of Snyder, Oklahoma and she was reported to have been driving the car in which she was riding.

Driver of the other car and receiving serious injuries was Henry Ivory, 53, of Quitaque and his daughter Catherine, 19, also of Quitaque. At last report here, Ivory's condition was listed as fair. He is in Swisher Co. Hospital at Tulia, where he and his daughter were taken following the accident. Catherine was treated and released from the hospital.

Others injured in the mishap were Mrs. King's 14-year-old son, Linsey Hutchinson, and

Peggy Adams, 57, also of Snyder, passengers in the car driven by Mrs. King.

The Hutchinson boy and the Adams woman were reported "seriously injured" Monday night at Plainview Hospital and Clinic where both underwent surgery.

Ambulances from Quitaque, Silverton and Turkey were rushed to scene of the accident and the King woman was reported to have died soon after being placed in the ambulance.

The accident, which occurred at the intersection of State Hwy. 86 and 256, was investigated by patrolman Don Black of Tulia and Briscoe County Sheriff Johnny Lanham. Black said the car driven by Mrs. King turned west of State 256 onto 86, made a wide sweep and smashed into the Ivory car in the east bound lane.

Ivory, who does farm work in the Silverton area and his daughter, who works at the 66 Cafe in Silverton, were enroute home at the time of the accident.

SILVERTON LIONS SPONSORING FINE BASKETBALL ATTRACTION

The sports spotlight will be focused on Silverton next week when the Hutchinson Flying Queens of Wayland Baptist College in Plainview meet the Peru National All-Stars under the sponsorship of the Silverton Lions Club Monday, November 11.

The first game of a double header is set for 7:00 P. M. in the Silverton school gym. This game will match the Wayland College Queen Bees (freshman team) against the Owlettes of Silverton High School.

The tour of the Peru National All-Stars is being sponsored by the United States Amateur Athletic Union in the interest of world athletics.

"Basketball is extremely popular in South America," says Flying Queen Coach Harley J. Redin, a native of Silverton. "We found this out in last year's Pan American games, and it should be a fine attraction for this area."

Peru's team is made up of all-stars from all over that South American country, and will be in Silverton for one game as a part of a tour which includes Mexico, the United States and Canada. They are making the tour to gain experience for the Women's World Basketball Tournament which will be played in Lima, Peru, in March, 1964.

The game will be one of a three-game series between the South American team and the Flying Queens. The two square off November 12 for the second game in Plainview. The final game will be in Gallup, New Mexico, November 15.

Tickets for the game may be purchased through any member of the Silverton Lions Club or at the door. Price of admission is \$1.25 for adults and 50 cents for children.

Quitaque's basketball teams only managed an even split in games played last Friday night and on Tuesday night of this week. The Panthers smarting from a lacing administered by McAdoo last week, bounced back to trim the Samnorwood Eagles Friday night there and also eased by the Hedley Owls Tuesday night at Hedley.

The Pantherettes were not so fortunate, taking a strapping in both outings.

Last Friday night the Pantherettes, who battled the Norwood lasses tooth and toenail in the season opener before going down 57-64, found the Eagles tough on their home floor and lost 39-59.

Janice Dudley, who had a 40 point scoring average for the new season going in to this game didn't quite have the touch and fell to 21 points in this contest. Devorah McKay canned 10

points, Jennifer Whittington 4, and Jill Johnson 4 to round out the scoring for the Pantherettes.

Tuesday night at Hedley the Quitaque girls took on what may be the class of the Pantherettes' girls B teams in the Owlettes and just couldn't stay with them. The Pantherettes' shorty guards had the task of guarding three very fine forwards and were unable to hold down the scoring. Meanwhile, the Quitaque forwards were having trouble finding the range again. Jennifer Whittington, playing one of the better all around games of her career, tossed in 13 points to share scoring honors for Quitaque with Jan Dudley. Devorah McKay had 11 points for the night and Jill Johnson 2 points.

Delores Sanders, who is a very fine performer, tossed in

21 points for the Owlettes before Hedley's Coach Webster pulled his starters. The Owlettes led 48-14 at half-time.

On the other side of the ledger, the Panthers had an easier time of it with the Eagles of Samnorwood. In their first meeting here in the season opener, the Eagles pushed the Panthers before going down 48-54. Last Friday night the Panthers took an easy 69-43 win and Coach used all of his squad before the game was over. Jack Johnson took scoring honors in this one with 21 close, followed by Jim Saul with 20; Terry Woods scored 11, Bobo Morrison 9 and Robin Brown 8. Jimmy Martindale of the Eagles dropped in 13 points to spark the Norwood lads.

At Hedley Tuesday night the Panthers had to battle right down to the final buzzer before winning 58-53.

The Panthers, who played almost all of the game without tall Jack Johnson who has an injured ankle, trailed the Owls 11-15 at the end of the first period and 25-30 at half time.

The game was tied at 32-32 early in the third quarter and Quitaque went ahead at that point and increased their lead to 48-39 at the end of three periods of play. The Owls rallied and pulled to within two points midway of the fourth quarter of play and stayed there until the game's end. Jim Saul hit a field goal at the final buzzer to make the final margin of five points. Coach Webster has a fine team this time and the chances look pretty good right now that the two teams might once again battle it out for bi-district honors. Coach Webster was at Briscoe High two years ago when Quitaque and Briscoe

battled it out in the finals for the regional championship at Canyon.

Season records for the two Quitaque High School teams is 1 win and 4 losses for the Pantherettes and 4 wins and 1 loss for the Panthers.

The local teams take a two week rest from competition, the next game being against the Paducah High teams here on Tuesday, November 19.

The next games played will be on the new glass backboards, barring unforeseen difficulties, which arrived here Tuesday.

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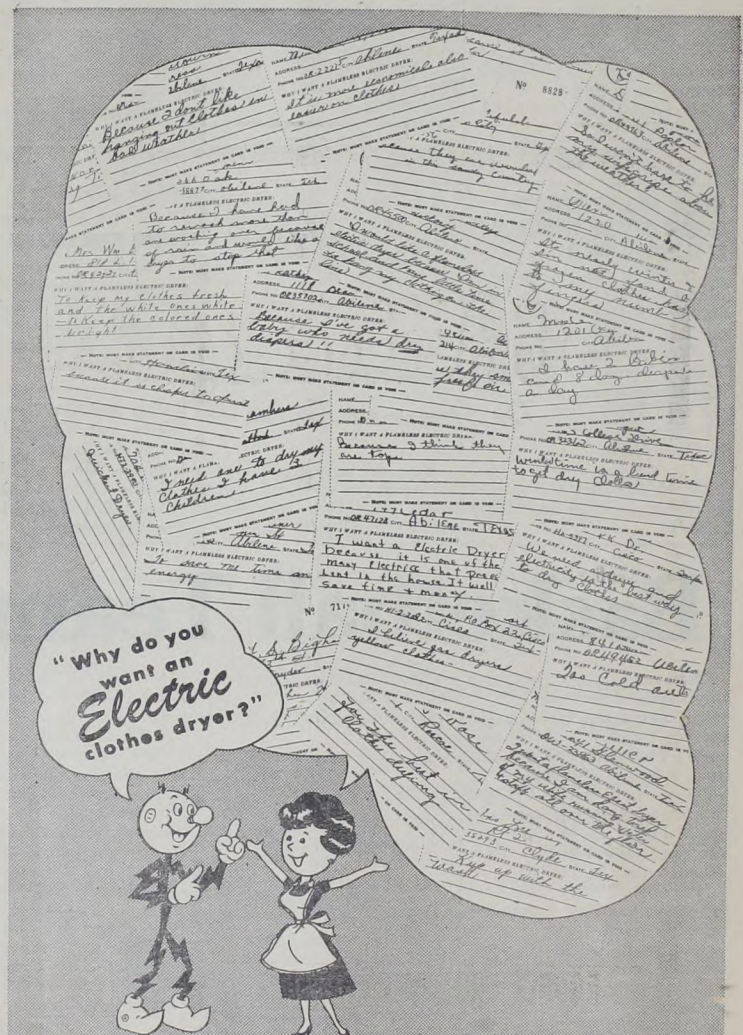

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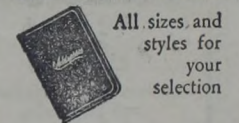
