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## GOSPEL MEETING AT CHURCH OF CHRIST



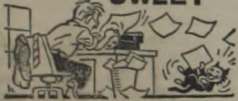

## AUTO CRASH KILLS ONE INJURES TWO NEAR SILVERTON

A 22-year-old former resident of Groom was killed and her husband injured in a two-car collision about 2 miles southeast of Silvertown about 7 P. M., Friday.

Mrs. George Thompson, Jr., was dead on arrival at Swisher County Hospital in Tulia, where she was taken by an ambulance from Roberts Funeral Home of Silvertown.

Her husband, 23, was treated for cuts and bruises at the same hospital. Attendants said they didn't believe his condition was serious. He is a student at Texas Tech in Lubbock and a resident of Clarendon.

A third person injured in the accident was Amel Zamora, 23, of Silvertown. He was treated and released from the Tulia hospital.

Investigating officers said they believed the Thompsons were traveling to Clarendon from Lubbock to visit Thompson's parents, Mr. and Mrs. George Thompson, Sr. His father owns a hardware store in Clarendon.

The accident occurred at an intersection when the vision was obscured by tall grass, investigators said.

Both cars were heavily damaged. Burial was in the cemetery at Groom.

### FLOMOT PIONEER PASSES AWAY LAST WEEK

Sam W. Jones (Uncle Sam to his many friends) was born in 1876 and departed this life July 16, at 7:30 P. M. at Trawee Hospital, Matador, Texas. Burial was in Flomot Memorial Park under the direction of Eudy-Seale Funeral Home.

He had made his home in the Flomot Community 46 years. He had farmed, operated a cafe, and had resided for a number of years on Flomot's main street. Mr. Jones did his own house work and was able to be up and about until on Friday evening before his passing on Sunday evening. He was an active member of the Flomot Church of Christ and was faithful to his church. 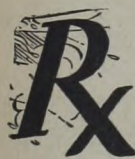

**THE RIGHT SLANT ON WASHINGTON**

(By Congressman Jim Wright)

FOR THE THIRD TIME, the problem of a divided Berlin situated in the heart of the Soviet East German satellite state is posing a crisis and giving the world a bad case of the jitters.

Khrushchev calls West Berlin a "bone in his throat", and well he might. West Berlin is freedom's best showcase. In its windows glitter the bright lights of a vigorous economy and a productive citizenry, sending their beckoning beacons into the surrounding darkness of drab despair.

It must be a serious embarrassment to the Communist cause that the mass migration of Soviet zone Germans through Berlin into the western zone continues after 14 years, and at a quickened pace. For this is powerful and continuing proof that people with a chance to compare and a chance to choose will elect to live in freedom.

DENIED THE RIGHT to ballot on their own fate, more than 5,000 East Germans every week are "voting with their feet", escaping to the West. Some observers estimate that as many as 10 million of the thriving 53 million West German population are refugees from the East.

This leaves Soviet East Germany with a scant 17 million living in an economy of scarcity and an atmosphere of repression. Here is convincing and to the Marxists

humiliating evidence that, in spite of their utopian boasts, they have not been able in 14 years to build even to hold its own people.

And here is evidence also of the great vitality of the revived West German economy. The absorption of so many refugees in so short a time, providing not only temporary haven but productive livelihood, is unquestionably without precedent. It would be equal to the successful immigration and economic absorption of 45 million people into the U. S. in a like period.

SO IT IS NOT hard to see why the men in the Kremlin are so intent on changing the status quo. It is a constant irritation to them. It deeply embarrasses them in the eyes of the whole world.

In the late 1940's, they closed the highways and railroads leading into this citadel 110 miles deep in communist territory, seeking thus to choke West Berlin by economic strangulation, since the city is not an economically self-sufficient unit and must have trade with the West to live. This was countered by the Berlin Airlift, one of the most daringly conceived and brilliantly executed stratagems of modern times. The Russian purpose was thwarted, and the blockade finally abandoned.

Frustrated in this abortive attempt to destroy West Berlin and all that it symbolized, the Russian leaders have bluffed and blustered, but to no avail. Now they seem determined to carry out a bold maneuver. They have set August 1st as the deadline.

ON THAT DATE, if the Kremlin follows through on its announced plan, the puppet state of East Germany will begin requiring all allied aircraft entering Berlin to "register" with the satellite government. This immediately confronts us with a dilemma, since we do not recognize that government as valid.

If we fail to register, or even if we should comply with this demand, the stage is set for further harassment. The puppet government could close the corridors through which commerce enters the beleaguered city. They could establish a ground blockade at the West German borders, halt and disrupt traffic.

Or they could establish an air blockade, effectively stopping all civilian and commercial flights, challenging military air traffic, or even sabotaging the landing in West Berlin. If these things were done in the name of the East German government which was not a signatory to the existing treaties, or if simply done by gangs of "volunteers", the Kremlin could piously claim it was not involved. Let's not dodge the fact that it could result in armed conflict. It all depends on how far they are prepared to go.

IF WE WERE simply intent on avoiding the possibility of a clash, we could abandon our position and agree to Russia's terms. We could appease Khrushchev, evacuate West Berlin and let it be gobbled up, its lamps of freedom snuffed out, and its proud and free citizenry "assimilated" in the Soviet pattern. But if we did, we would wretch on our solemn commitment. We would banish every vestige of respect we have enjoyed... and our self-respect as well.

Almost a generation ago, Neville Chamberlain boasted that he had purchased peace for his time at the cost of another nation's freedom. He lived to learn that it couldn't be done. Nor can it be done today.

The people of West Berlin want to remain free, and all the world knows it. If we were to delude ourselves by whatever logic of expediency into abandoning them, the U. S. would be through. We might as well quit, for nobody would believe us again.

Happily, the Western leaders, and apparently the public as well, are solidly united on the issue. British, French and West German spokesmen have left no doubt that they will stick it in a showdown comes. We must leave no room for doubt as to the firmness of our intentions. A miscalculation that could lead to war in this risky game of international diplomacy is far less likely when Russia knows exactly where we stand.

**SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS**



**OUR SOIL ★ OUR STRENGTH**

Last year in the late summer, Mr. R. L. Brunson of Quitaque overseeded about thirty acres of cotton to a rye cover crop. The crop was seeded with a Cyclone Seeder owned by the Caprock SCD. He obtained an excellent stand and the result appears to be very good at this time. Cotton was

planted again this spring following the cover crop as well as on an adjacent area not treated with a cover crop. Cotton following the rye is bigger and has a better color at this time. All of the cotton was fertilized, but the rye added organic matter to the soil and is giving a better response.

Brunson likes this practice well enough that he plans to seed about thirty five more acres on his home place this year. He will also seed about seventy acres on a farm from Paul Hamilton.

The seeder owned by the District broadcasts the seed before the last cultivation or at the last cultivation on the cotton. The cultivator then covers the seed and then they come up when moisture is available.

Of course, the primary purpose of a cover crop is to prevent wind erosion, but they are a good soil improving crop also. Brunson's cotton has already proved the soil improving qualities of rye.

The broadcast seeder is available to anyone interested in establishing a cover crop on cotton land.
