SAVINGS BOND SALES REPORT FOR BRISCOE COUNTY

Savings Bond sales for the first three months of 1962 in Briscoe county totaled \$70,894.00. Of this amount \$2,738.00 were purchased in March according to a report released by Perry Whittemore, chairman of the Briscoe County Savings Bond Committee.

Texans purchased \$41,512,602 E & H Bonds during the first quarter of the year and March sales were \$17,031,657.

It is designed to remind every citizen of an opportunity for patriotic service through the Savings Bonds program - to ask him to invest his dollars in his country, for the strengthening of our economic defenses against the danger we face. 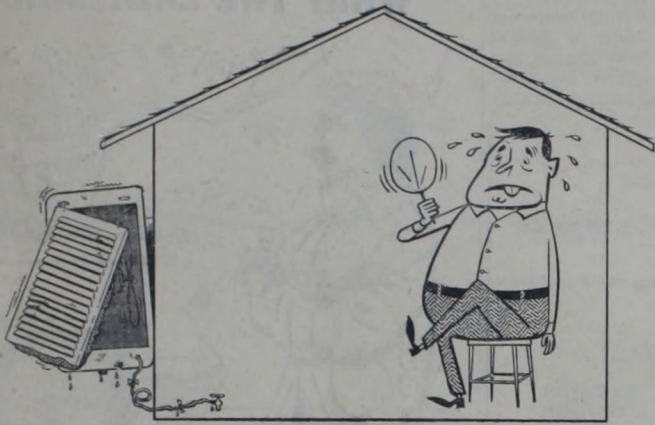

WHEREAS, heavy increases in traffic endanger these advances in highway safety, since the state's population has increased by one-fourth since 1950, the state now has more than five million registered motor vehicles, and the miles traveled by these vehicles now totals 43 billion miles a year; and

WHEREAS, due to this flood of traffic some 22,000 miles of the state's 25,000-mile system of U. S. and State-numbered highways are already obsolete for the heavy loads of traffic they carry;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED as the Nation at large observes National Highway Week during the period May 20-26, 1962, that the Texas Highway Department be commended for its achievements in building today's fine highway system in the face of mounting traffic problems; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the citizens of Texas be urged to view with concern the adverse effects and the cost in human lives

that will result if highway traffic overwhelms the capacity of our roads, and to support a sustained program of highway improvement and modernization to keep Texas growing.

FARMER'S HOME ADMINISTRATION HELP TO SMALL COMMUNITIES

The Farmers Home Administration closed a Rural Housing Loan last week for Mr. and Mrs. Wayne White. Their new house is located on their farm one mile north of Quitaque, Texas. The Whites have 4 children and have been in need of a larger house for several years. The Rural Housing Loan enabled them to build a house which meets their needs.

The Housing Act was revised in 1961, enlarging the eligibility requirements for Rural Housing loans, making it possible for owners of non-farm tracts in small rural communities such as Quitaque and Silverton to obtain loans through the Farmers Home Administration. These loans may be used for new homes, home improvements, or construction or improvements of farm buildings.

Loans may be made only if the applicant cannot obtain credit through any other lending agency. The house should be adequate to meet the family's needs, but must be modest in design and size. Hi-Plains Hi-Lights

NEWS from the High Plains Research Foundation

Tests using flame cultivation on cotton by the staff at the High Plains Research Foundation were conducted in 1961. The tests included three varieties of cotton, different tractor speeds, pressures, burner sizes and settings. Also the size of the cotton at first flaming was varied.

Gregg and Lockett 88-A were used in the test as representative of early and late maturing storm-proof cottons. The open boll variety selected was Paymaster 88-90. To obtain the desired seed bed, the test was cultivated twice with sweeps resulting in a bed that was raised 2 - 3 inches above the

middle. It was stressed in the report that a more efficient job of flame cultivation can be accomplished with a wide flat bed.

The five treatments used in the test are as follows: (1) check (no flaming), (2) midget and cross flaming, (3) parallel flaming, (4) cross flaming, and (5) no weed control. The results from all three cotton varieties were similar. The maximum increase in yield over the check block was 112 pounds per acre of lint cotton. The grades of cotton varied from low middling to strict low middling. Additional data in report No. 47, published last week at the High Plains Research Foundation indicates there was no measurable effect on fiber quality from flaming. The flame cultivation program will be conducted again in 1962 at the Foundation.
