School Repair Work Begins Monday

AUTO-TRUCK CRASH TAKES LIVES OF TWO SILVERTON YOUNG PEOPLE

Larry Dwaine Wallace, 18, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles E. (Dock) Wallace of Silvertown, died at 1:45 P. M. Wednesday in a Plainview hospital of injuries suffered in a car-truck collision which took the life of a 14-year-old Silvertown girl Tuesday.

Lola Holt, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Stewart of Silvertown, was killed when the car in which she was riding collided with a truck at the intersection of two farm roads at the northeast edge of Lockney.

Wallace was in the car with Lola Holt and her sister, Alice Holt, 12. Alice Holt suffered minor injuries. Olen Leon Williams, 34, of Graham, driver of the loaded grain truck was not injured.

Wallace was born Nov. 28, 1941, in Briscoe County.

Survivors include his parents and a sister, Gloria, of Silvertown, and a brother, Charles Don of Lubbock.

His body has been taken to Roberts Funeral Home in Silvertown where funeral arrangements will be announced.

Larry was a cousin of Mrs. Jimmy Pointer.

Funeral services for Lola Juvenile Holt will be conducted at 4 P. M. today in the Baptist Church at Channing. The Rev. W. C. Stockett will officiate.

She was born Oct. 22, 1945, in Nebraska.

She is survived by her father, Richard R. Holt of Oneida, N. Y.; her stepfather and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Ralph L. Stewart of Silvertown; three sisters, Alice, Alta and Theda Holt, all of Silvertown, and two brothers, Jim Holt and Ralph Glenn Stewart, both of Silvertown, and the grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Lowrey of Hartley, Mrs. Alta Holt of Chadron, Neb., and Mrs. Roy Lawrence of Amarillo.

Burial will be in the Channing Cemetery with services under the direction of Blackburn-Shaw Funeral Home of Amarillo.

July Report From Highway Patrol

The Highway Patrol investigated 2 rural traffic accidents in Briscoe County during the month of July, according to Sergeant D. R. Dowdy, Patrol supervisor of this area.

These wrecks have accounted for 1 person killed, 3 injured, and a property damage of \$1,775.00.

This brings the total for the year in this county to 1 person killed, 10 injured, and a property damage of \$7,905.00.

Prior to the first of this month there had been a total of 929 fatal accidents in Texas. These tragedies resulted in 1,134 persons losing their lives.

Neighbors said the animal belongs to a Mexican family who have been working in Hereford and who left the dog at their home here.

Briscoe County Sheriff Johnny Lanham took the injured child to Swisher County Hospital in Tulla and she was transferred to St. Anthony's Hospital in Amarillo later this afternoon. Her condition was listed as serious.

U.S.D.A. PLANS NEW RESEARCH ON SCREW-WORMS

While some scientists are trying to send a rocket to the moon, others are trying to rid the Southwest of one of its worst livestock pests... the screwworm.

The USDA has announced that new research on means of eradicating the screwworm will begin soon at Kerrville. This is the same USDA station that was responsible for much of the basic research that led to the sterile-fly technique used successfully against the screwworm in the Southeast.

One of the main projects of the USDA's entomologists will be to develop better methods of rearing screwworms, and also to find ways to produce strains of the insect better suited to sterilization by radiation. Another important aim of the Kerrville research is to learn more about the nutritional requirements of screwworms larvae so that an improved, inexpensive rearing medium may be developed. Project scientists will also seek new methods by which flies can be irradiated with minimum effect on their life processes.

In announcing the new project,

CONGRESSMAN WALTER ROGERS' NEWSLETTER -

JOHN J. PERSHING
The Congress on June 1 approved a joint resolution calling for the celebration of John J. Pershing Centennial Day, the 100th anniversary of the great World War I General's birth. A Presidential proclamation has established September 13 as the day to honor this distinguished war hero.

As the man who led the United States into freedom's first worldwide military conflict with the forces of totalitarianism and dictatorship, General Pershing was leader of the two million man force which helped bring victory for the Allied cause. He holds honors from 15 different foreign nations, and during a 66-year military career he became one of America's greatest advocates of democracy all over the world.

The example which General Pershing set is perhaps more instructive today than it was a generation ago. Once again the free world seeks men of his determination and dedication to principle, and once again the free world seeks leadership sufficiently dynamic to overcome all the forces of evil which run rampant.

General Pershing was born in the state of Missouri just after the guns at Fort Sumpter announced the beginning of Civil War. He graduated from the United States Military Academy in 1886 and was assigned to three different Army posts in New Mexico where he participated in campaigns against the Sioux Indians until the early 1890's.

Then he returned to West Point for a brief tour as Assistant Instructor of Tactics and in 1898 Gen. Pershing began a long series of military assignments which took him to many of the spots which are troublesome even today; Cuba, Japan, and Eastern Europe. Altogether, he saw duty in virtually every corner of the globe.

But his greatest hour came with the American Expeditionary Force which began to sail for France in

1917 to "make the world safe for democracy." President Wilson told him to "keep always in mind 'the underlying idea' that his forces in France 'are a separate and distinct component of the combined forces, the identity of which must be preserved.'" The remark made by him upon landing in France has become famous. "Lafayette, we are here," was uttered in grateful remembrance of the French Commander's vallant service to the struggling American colonists in the Revolutionary war.

Throughout the long and difficult months of warfare in France, General Pershing worked closely with the chief commander, French Marshall Foch, and when the victory was won over the Kaiser's generals in the famous railway car in Compiegne, the American soldiers and their commander had as much a part of the victory as any other.

A grateful nation showered him with honor after honor. Universities from Oxford in England to Arizona in the United States awarded him degrees. The Congress passed a resolution thanking him "for his highly distinguished services as commander-in-chief... and... for devotion and heroic valor throughout the war."

After the war, General Pershing continued to serve the nation. He took charge of many commissions, and was President Roosevelt's representative to the 1937 coronation of King George VI. He died on July 15, 1948 in special quarters where he had lived some years in the Walter Reed Hospital. His body lay in state at the Capitol for 24 hours and was finally laid to rest in the Arlington National Cemetery.

The legacy handed to all of us by General Pershing is a great one, and as the nation honors him next month we will do well to recall and attempt to duplicate his loyalty and support of the nation. The General's 100th birthday on September 13 will be still another demonstration that the need for his characteristics does not fade with the years.

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**WAGE-HOUR OFFICIAL
REMINDS FARMERS ABOUT
FEDERAL CHILD-LABOR LAW**

Dallas—Farmers who hire workers for harvesting fall crops were reminded today that the Federal Fair Labor Standards Act sets a 16-year age minimum for the employment of children in agriculture during school hours.

The reminder came from Regional Director William J. Rogers of the U. S. Department of Labor's Wage and Hour and Public Contracts Divisions here, the agency which administers this law.

"Today and in the foreseeable future, the need for youngsters to meet even higher educational standards is beyond question," he said. "The child's chance for success in later years depend on whether he enrolls in school this fall."

Mr. Rogers pointed out that children may lawfully work on farms before and after school hours or on weekends, but that their place is in the classroom when school is in session in the school district where the child is currently living.

"The law protects the children of migratory workers as well as local children," he said. "The only exception to the law is the child

working exclusively for his parents or guardian."

An age certificate showing that the youngster is at least 16 is the best protection the farmer can have against inadvertent violation. In Texas, these certificates are available, as a public service, from local Texas Employment Commission offices.

He added that the Federal child-labor law applies to farmers who engage in interstate commerce or ship their products in interstate commerce, either directly or to firms who ship them across State lines in their original form or as an ingredient of another product.

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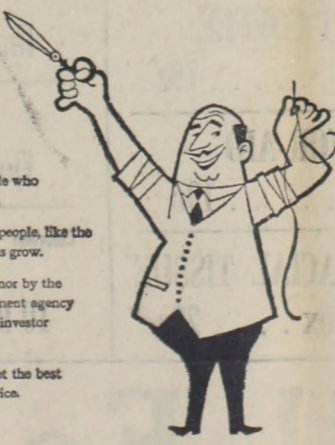
