More Funds Available For Veteran Loans

President Truman recently signed a bill which becomes Public Law 325 making available an additional \$125 million for direct loans to veterans where private investment capital is not available.

This law adds to the original \$150 million direct loan fund which has been exhausted. Also adds \$25 million each 3 months until June 1953, less amounts paid into fund by veteran borrowers and less amount of outstanding mortgages sold to private investors by the Veterans Administration. This loan program does not cost the tax payer any money as it only authorizes the use of money for loans which draw 4% interest. These loans are available in Briscoe County. They are available only for homes, either in town or on a farm. The maximum loan is \$10,000.00. —Paul Miller, Veterans Co. Service Officer

Last Rites Held For J. T. Phelps

J. T. Phelps passed away Sunday, April 27, at Amarillo following an illness of several weeks. He was 65 years and 11 months of age. Funeral services were conducted Tuesday afternoon at the Methodist church in Quitaque with the pastor, Rev. J. B. Baker, officiating assisted by Rev. Alvin F. Hamm, Baptist pastor.

Interment was in the Quitaque cemetery under direction of Daniel Funeral Home. Pallbearers were Odis Honea, Willie Woods, Dellis Hooks, M. L. Roberson, George Hulsey, J. T. Bradley, Lester Monk, Edgar Morrison and Claude Cantrell. George Owens was in charge of music for the service.

James Thomas Phelps was born May 27, 1886 at Beeville, Texas. He married Miss Rhoda Mae Miller on December 25, 1904. They resided for a time in South Texas and in Oklahoma, coming to Quitaque in 1933 from Willis Point, Texas. They had made their home here since that time.

Survivors are the wife and eight children, 3 daughters, Mrs. Nora Lee Hefner of Quitaque, Mrs. O. L. Truelock of Amarillo and Mrs. O. L. Harrison of Paducah; and five sons, Basil of Dallas, William of Altus, Okla., Namon of Amarillo, Delbert and Charles of Quitaque.

He is also survived by six sisters: Mrs. Ann Clark of Marktree, Ark., Mrs. Ellen Ezzell of Quitaque, Mrs. Sally Castleberry of Chickasha, Okla., Mrs. Julia Graham of Shawnee, Okla., Mrs. Lexie Mill and Mrs. Jennie Beeman of Dallas; and three brothers, Ed Phelps of Cash, Texas, Hardin Phelps of Centerpoint, Ark., and Allen Phelps of Dallas. There are also 25 grandchildren and 8 great grandchildren.

Mr. Phelps had been a member of the Methodist church for many years. He was a gentle, kindly man and left a host of friends to mourn his passing.

GLENN LEWIS ENTERS RACE FOR ASSO. JUSTICE OFFICE

Austin, April 28—Associate Justice John H. Sharp, senior member of the Texas Supreme Court, "reluctantly" dropped his campaign for re-election Monday because of aggravation of an old automobile accident injury.

The judge's decision left Alfred M. Scott of Austin as an announced candidate for the place. Shortly afterward Glenn L. Lewis, San Angelo lawyer, issued a statement that he would make the race.

Lewis, native of Limestone County, served three terms as district attorney at San Angelo, beginning in 1931, and three years as assistant attorney general under Gerald C. Mann. He is a Navy veteran of World War II, attaining rank of lieutenant commander. He is married and has three children and is a Methodist.

Later Monday, Judge Royce A. Stout of Waxahachie announced he would be a candidate for the post.

It was reported that Robert B. Keenan of Gladewater, who ran for the court in 1950, is planning another try. And there was talk that Ralph Yarborough of Austin, who has been rumored as a candidate for attorney general, might switch to the court campaign.

(Lewis is a son of Mrs. Nora Lewis, formerly of Quitaque. He came here with his parents when a very small child, and grew up at Quitaque. He studied law at the state university and upon admittance to the bar, entered practice at San Angelo.)

Edwards Arrested At His Home In Plainview

PLAINVIEW, April 26—A man under indictment on three burglary counts was arrested here this morning by city police.

Officers identified the suspect as Cecil Edwards, about 38 years old, Plainview. He was arrested at his home. Officers found him hiding in a closet.

Edwards was taken to Memphis by Hall County Sheriff E. S. Morrison. Bond was set at \$2,000 on each count. Edwards remained in Hall County jail in lieu of bond. Sheriff Morrison said Edwards is charged with burglarizing a Phillips 66 service station and the Three Brothers service station in Turkey last December.

Morrison said a cash register and some small change was taken from the Phillips 66 station. It was found in a cistern about 2 miles from Turkey a few days after the burglary. Morrison reported.

The sheriff said a shotgun was stolen from the Three Brothers service station.

Dimmitt officers found the shotgun in a car after the vehicle had been involved in an accident near Dimmitt, Morrison related.

Edwards also is under indictment in Briscoe county on a felony theft charge filed by Doyle Poole concerning a piece of garage machinery taken from his place and later recovered in Turkey.

Sheriff Raymond Grewe has requested custody of Edwards from Sheriff Morrison as soon as Hall county gets through with him, or if he makes bond in Hall county, Grewe stated Monday.



