## WRONG WAY

It is again being proposed that any future federal income tax reductions be accomplished by raising the amount of the personal exemption—by \$100 or some such sum. One effect of this would be to drop large numbers of taxpayers from the tax rolls altogether. That might buy some votes, but it is morally and ethically wrong. It is still a fact that the people must support the government—and that the government cannot support the people, save by taking the money away from them to begin with. Every person who receives income should pay some taxes, no matter how small. The fairest and most constructive form of tax reduction would be percentage cuts—for all the income brackets, and for businesses as well.

## HINTS ON COMMUNITY IMPROVEMENT OFFERED

Scores of rural Texas communities during recent years have literally had their faces lifted because their citizens believed changes for the better were in order. These changes, according to Regan Brown, extension rural sociologist, came about because rural people realized that their communities were going backward. They had lost something which had meant a great deal to them in former years. Modes and patterns of life had changed because of fewer farms and farm families. The widespread use of proper equipment had changed the production picture but community activities hadn't kept pace. It was the social side of rural living which needed a shot in-the-arm, says Brown and the community improvement program was the answer. Experience has shown, he says, that progress can be made in any community where there exists a spirit of cooperation and a will to do and share with neighbors. A community organization is a must. There must be overall leadership and someone must be in charge of each activity. Plans must be made, says the specialist, which fill the needs of the community and the plans must come from the folks who will carry them to completion. Don't try to do all the work in one year, says Brown. Developing a community program takes time and patience for it involves changes in the attitudes of people as well as physical changes within the community. He says give as many people as possible a job to do for their participation will be in proportion to their effort and accomplishment. Include recreation as well as work in the program and let others know what your community is going through publicity and working with other groups. Use public agencies and facilities for information and service but don't, says Brown, rely on outside people to do all the work. The big jobs must be done in the community.

## From Congressman WALTER ROGERS

### THE HEALTH PROGRAMS

The health programs in the several Scandinavian countries and Holland vary in many respects, and I understand they all differ from the health program in England. However, all are definitely in the field of socialized medicine. Some have certain methods of permitting you to choose your own doctor and the State bearing the expense or a part thereof. Other plans provide for selfselection of family doctors, but not for specialists in hospitals. Hospital expenses are taken care of by different methods. Most of the plans are highly complicated, but none seem to me to even begin to provide the effectiveness of the doctor-patient relationship that has always existed in the United States.

All of the countries are vitally interested in the polio vaccine program. In fact, Denmark has great strides in carrying out its program, perhaps the greatest in Europe. It is manufacturing vaccine. Norway is not manufacturing vaccine and has not been able to get its program underway. How-

ever, present plans are moving along and the health authorities assured us that they would appreciate all possible co-operation from the United States. Their country has been hard hit for several years.

**NEWS FOR THE GI VETERANS**

Q - I am the widow of a World War I veteran, and I have a 16 year old daughter. I applied for death pension payments, and I was told I need evidence of the birth of my daughter. I am unable to obtain a copy of her birth certificate. The only evidence I have is our family Bible which lists the date of her birth. Would that be acceptable to VA?

A - Yes. A copy of the family Bible record, certified to by a notary public, would be satisfactory. The notary public should

state in what year the Bible was printed, whether the record bears any erasures, and whether he believes the entry actually was written at the time of your daughter's birth.

Q - I am in the Reserves and I also am drawing disability compensation payments from VA. Will my disability pay continue for the periods during which I am on Reserve training duty?

A - No. Your compensation payments must be waived during your training duty. But they may be resumed the day following your release from such duty.

Q - I am buying a house with a

GI loan. The builder has given me an estimate when the house will be completed. Based on this estimate, would it be wise for me to give notice to the apartment where I now am living?

A - Generally it is better to wait until you have a firm settlement date before giving notice that you are going to move. Many unpredictable factors, such as inclement weather, can serve to delay completion beyond the date estimated by the builder.

Q - A friend of mine, on VA's pension rolls, is entitled to an additional amount of money because he is so helpless that he requires constant aid and attention. Will he receive his additional allowance even though his mother provides this aid?

A - Yes. He may receive the additional allowance even though a member of his family provides the necessary services. It is not necessary for him to hire an attendant in order to qualify for the payments.

Q - I understand that if a veteran breaks two appointments for VA outpatient medical treatment, he will not be entitled to further treatment. I broke two appointments, but each time I gave VA at least two days' notice. Will I be barred from further treatment?

A - Since you gave VA at least 24 hours' advance notice, you will not be barred from further treatment. The bar applies only without good reason for doing so.

Q - I am going to school less than half time under the Korean War Bill. At what rate am I using up my GI training entitlement?

A - VA considers that you are using your GI training entitlement at quarter time rate. For example, if your course lasts for a year, you will have used up one-quarter of a year's entitlement, or three months.

Q - I applied for disability compensation a couple of years ago. VA asked me to report for a physical examination, but I never showed up. I let the entire matter drop. Now I would like to follow through. What should I do?

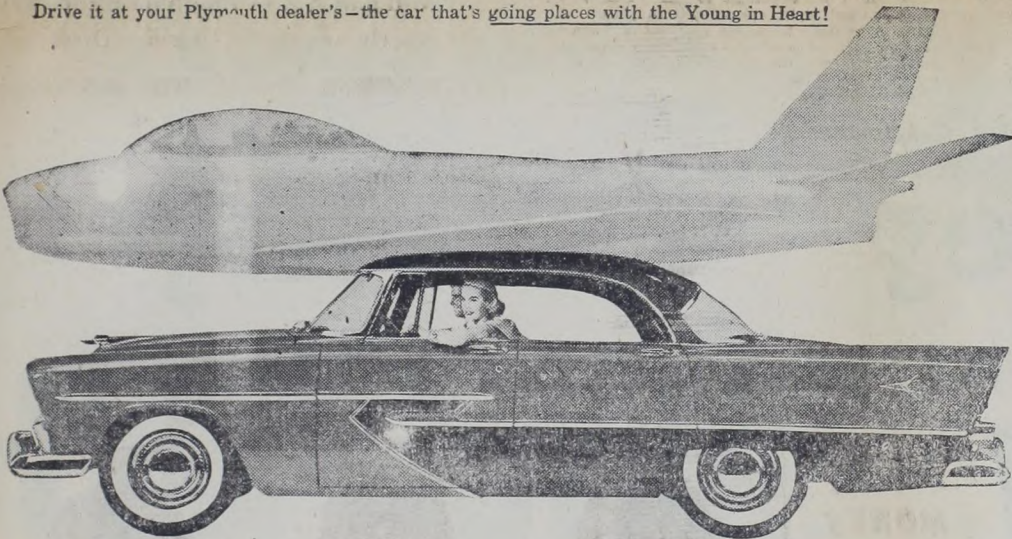

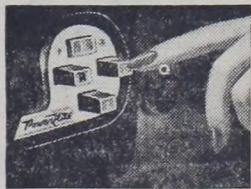

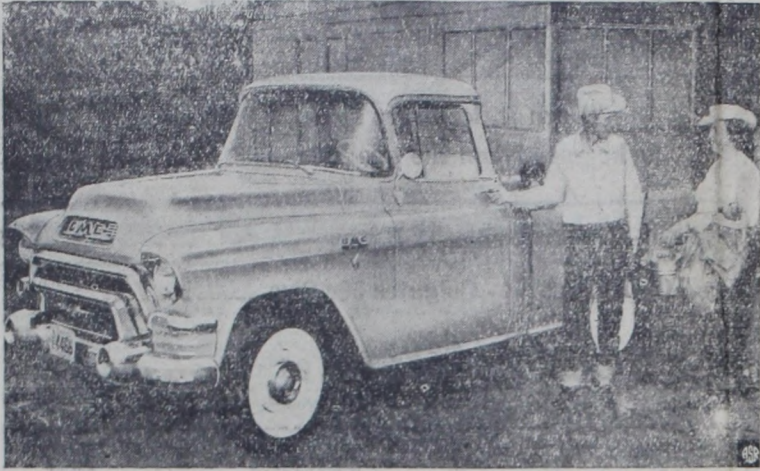

The Hardisons sold their passenger car so they would have a truck as well as a car in one streamlined package.

stimulating hormone production. Light picked up through the hen's eye stimulates a gland to produce and secrete the hormone. It is this hormone production which determines the amount and length exposure needed for top egg production, he explained.

Clean 60-watt light bulbs located six feet above the floor and

14 feet apart should produce enough light. A clean 12-inch shallow dome reflector used with each bulb will give good light distribution. The lights should be used over the entire house so that all hens will be exposed during the time the lights are on.

Wormell says most poultrymen find it convenient to use auto-

matic timing switches for turning the lights on early enough each morning so the combined artificial and sunlight equals 13 hours before normal sunset. Gradual changes must be made in the setting of the time switch to take care of the decrease or increase in the number of daylight hours. Abrupt changes in the daily length of artificial lighting may upset hens enough to cause them to molt and lay fewer eggs.

The poultryman advises keeping the lights on all day when the weather is cloudy or rainy. Many egg producers have seen their hens drop in egg production about a week after a several days period of cloudy weather. And finally, Wormell cautions the

poultryman not only to check the length of daylight but also the intensity of light during the 13 hour period.

HENS NEED 13 HOURS OF LIGHT DAILY FOR TOP EGG PRODUCTION

COLLEGE STATION, -- The use of artificial lights to keep hens on the job for 13 hours each

day during the short days of fall and winter is a management practice which pays dividends.

The extra hours of light are needed, says Ben Wormell, extension poultry husbandman, for

Jonathan is a red apple with green and yellow undertone. It is tart in flavor, is good for eating fresh, for stewing, making pies, or other desserts.  
McIntosh is a light to deep red apple with a mild flavor and sweet aroma. Use it in salads, applesauce and for eating fresh.  
Grimes Golden is a clear yellow apple with russet dots. It is excellent for baking, for pies and for eating fresh.  
Stayman, a dull red apple which often has gray dots, is fine for all purposes

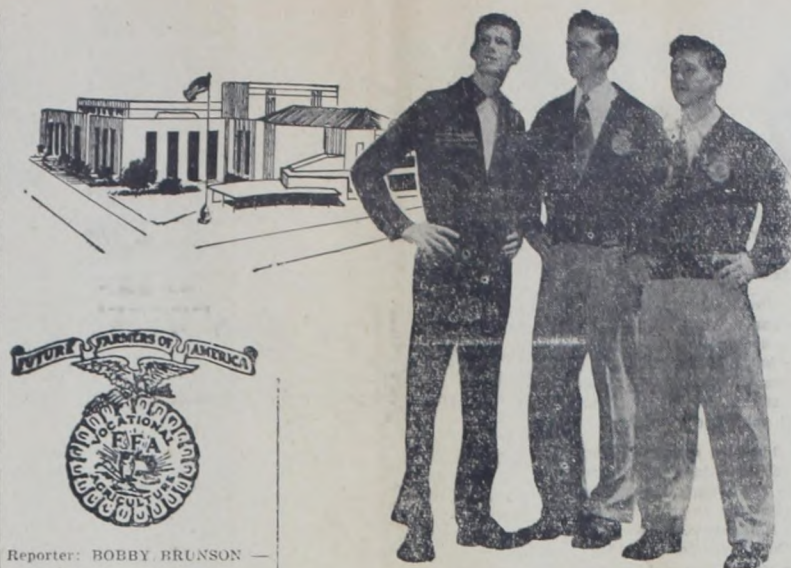
Winesap is usually a small apple, bright red to purplish in color and with a tart flavor. A late-season fruit, it is excellent

The Ag II boys are still studying feeds and feeding. Last week we figured some hog rations and most of us found it pretty interesting even though it is sort of hard right now.

We started our records in our new record books this last week. We have two record books we keep now. One of them is supposed to be kept at home to put in any entry that we have such as feed we buy, animals we buy and the amount of time we spend tending to our project. Each month we bring them to school

and Mr Peacock checks them to see if they are right or not and after they are checked we enter them into our record book at school in ink so that when we go up for the State Farmer Degree our record book will be up to date.

The Ag I boys have finished their building and now have it on the school farm. They have been studying about beef cattle along with a little work on the building. Most of it has consisted of the equipment needed, breeding cycle, type of cattle,

selecting livestock and general information.

We are working on our snap shot page for the School Annual and we need some more pictures of the boys and their projects.

From the Ford Almanac— Spend a Dime and make two dollars.

Here's how you can trade 10¢ worth of electricity for two dollars worth of fall eggs. Put hens on a 14 hour day with extra light, which cost 10¢ a month for 100 hens. By "working" longer they lay an extra 20 dozen eggs. With

fall eggs selling for about 10¢ the spring you can figure the per dozen more than those in dime pays off with \$2.00.

## —You Can— Make Hens Lay Golden Eggs



It's not luck, but good management that is needed if a poultryman wants to be a real money maker in this business of egg production.

To help poultrymen determine costs, Cornell University devised a formula against which the farmer can determine his efficiency. They figured the cost of feed per dozen eggs is about 33¢, labor about 8¢. Feed comes to about 75% of the total! All the more reason why it is necessary to invest this feed money in a well-balanced, palatable ration that contains just so much—no more and no less—of the necessary vitamins, minerals and proteins needed.

In general, the more layers eat the more they will lay. Unbalanced feeds—too much of one element or another—is just so much waste. Insufficient diet elements mean lower egg production and, probably, sickly hens.

For many years, feed manufacturers, in cooperation with federal and state agencies, have developed scientific diets for all classes of livestock and poultry. A good feed has all of the elements in just

the right proportions for maximum egg production at the lowest cost.

You can't make it too emphatic that rule of thumb procedures and unscientific diets don't pay off. The records of poultry and livestock producers have proven it many times over. Keep your own records and you will confirm the fact to yourself.

Try different brands of formulas, if you like. But when you find one that seems to give the best results—and if you keep production records as well as cost and income you will soon know—stay with that brand.

If it is packed in multiwall paper bags such as those made by Union Bag & Paper Corp., you will have the added assurance that the feed will also be clean and fresh. For feeds packed in paper bags keep their flavor, color and aroma.

## Farm Tests Reveal— Well-Fed Soil Means Bigger Crops



Are your soils suffering from indigestion? They may be if the micro-organisms in soils are starving.

If your plow turns up rotted plant residues, micro-organisms aren't getting food enough to work for you as hard as they should.

When animal and plant organisms can't digest crop residues, these residues lose their value as natural soil additives.

Micro-organisms in soils can digest crop residues faster when they're fed liberally with commercial fertilizer. If ample amounts of nutrients are not available in the soil medium, organisms will compete with growing plants for nitrogen, phosphates, and other nutrients. Competition will result in smaller crop growth, lower yields.

Keeping soil micro-organisms well fed has other far-reaching influences. For instance, in the digestion process, micro-organisms secrete sticky substances which glue soil particles into popcorn-like clusters. These clusters open up soil pores allowing more air and water to enter. Thus the soil's water holding capacity is increased. Rains are soaked up and held by the soil instead of running

off or puddling on top.

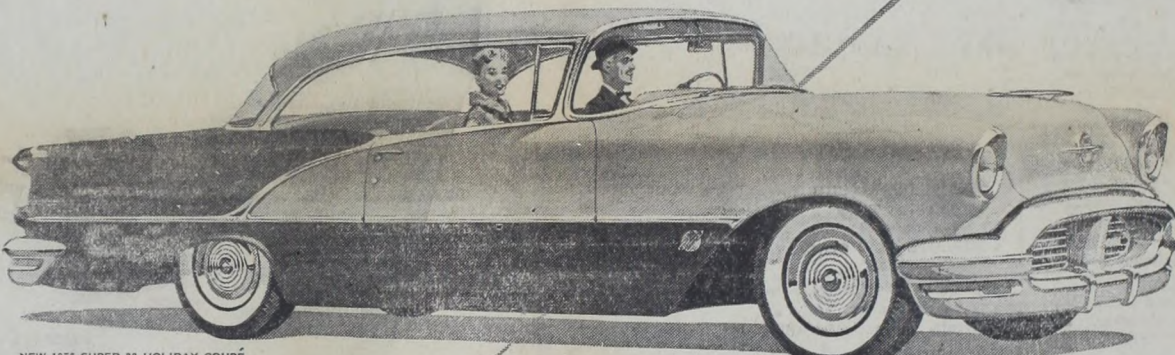
Crop tests in West Virginia show that increased fertilizer applications increase organic matter content of soils. Specialists say that one ton of fertilizer, wisely used on land that needs it, may add up to two tons of organic matter to the soil—even when crops are harvested and hauled away.

A northeastern experiment station reports evidence that soils low in organic matter are more dense. Therefore they're harder to work, will pack harder and will puddle or wash out easier.

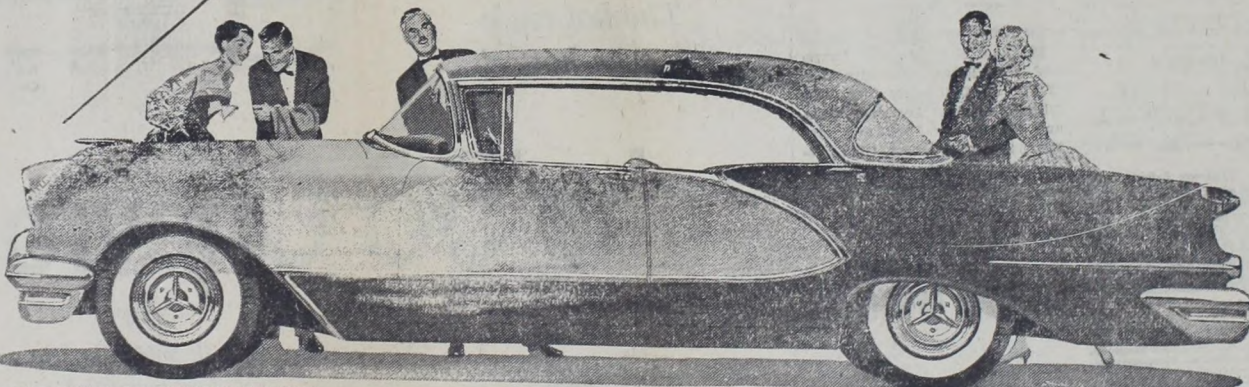
