- To the pioneering families who came and settled the wild country known as Quitauque, and to their descendants from whom most of this information came, I dedicate this theme.

**QUITAUQUE AND QUITAUQUE VALLEY**

The next expedition to pass through Quitauque was the Texas Santa Fe Expedition of 1849. These were the first white men in the territory. When the expedition reached the Quitauque Country, (the country in approximately a fifteen mile radius of the present town of Quitauque was called Quitauque), they had trouble finding a way to the plains. They made camp on the Quitauque River, and sent out small forces to find a way out of the valley. George Kendall was with the force that found the way out via the Quitauque Pass. The record from his diary states: "Around noon we found ourselves at the summit of the trail. Here we were again gratified by finding spread out before us a perfectly level prairie, extending as far as the eye could reach and without a tree to break its complete monotony. We halted a few minutes to rest our horses, and occupied the time in surveying the calm and beautiful valley lying hundreds of feet below us". (16) It was a lovely scene, beheld from the point where we stood, and I could hardly believe that but a few hours previous a horrible tragedy had been enacted upon its fair surface. The silver water of the Quintufue, now reduced apparently to a mere thread, were occasionally brought to view as some turn of the stream threw them in line with us, and again they were lost to the sight under the rich foliage of the banks. (17) The tragedy Mr. Kendall was writing about was the massacre by Indians of one of the forces trying to find a way out of the valley. The Quintufue is the Quitauque River. This expedition, after many hardships, finally reached the plains.

The MacKenzie Expedition of 1871-1875 brought the next white men into the Quitauque Country. They were in an unknown country of which there were no maps no roads no bridges and where there were no supplies except buffalo meat, for the men and

buffalo grass for the horses upon which neither could live exclusively and accomplish the highest work (18). We passed by a place of marshes, springs and small springs & small running streams called Quitauque, and finally ascended the steep bluffs of the Staked Plains and marched to the West. (19) They too, had trouble reaching the summit of the plains. "Mac Kenzie and his men wearily worked their way to the rim and on October 12, 1871, followed the scouts out upon what appeared to be a vast, almost limitless expanse of prairie. As far as the eye could reach, not a bush or tree, a twig or stone, not an object of any kind or a living thing was in sight! Before them was nothing but a sea of grass. (20) In general the MacKenzie Trail went just East of the Quitauque Peaks, veered to the northwest, (21) crossed the Quitauque and Linguish Rivers, and ascended the Staked Plains escarpment south of where the present Highway 86 tops the caprock, at Quitauque Pass. (22)

"The Quitauque Pass is located approximately four miles west of Quitauque at Cotton Wood Springs. Along in the late '70's or early '80's Billy the Kid came through the Quitauque Valley on his way to New Mexico. (24) At that time he was a leader of a gang of rustlers that terrorized Texas and New Mexico ranchers. (25)

The Quitauque Ranch was located in Briscoe, Hall, Floyd, and Motley counties "with the headquarters in 1884 just south of the Quitauque River and just west of where the Linguish River empties into the Quitauque, eight miles south of Quitauque. (26)

In the Silverton Cemetery is a marker on the original site of the headquarters of the Quitauque Ranch, established by the Baker Brothers in 1877. It was bought in 1880 by Charles Goodnight for Mrs. Cornelia Adair. (27)

At the time Goodnight bought the Quitauque for Mrs. Adair, O. J. Wiren was the manager and two Wisconsin lumbermen, Kellogg and McCoy, were partners in ownership of the Quitauque. They

branded the Lazy F, the Square-Topped Hat, and the Wyper. (28) Goodnight bought some thirty-five square miles or approximately "one hundred and forty thousand acres at twenty-two cents an acre of the Adair Ranches. The ranch was actually almost twice this size as alternate sections belonged to the state. (29) The Quitauque Ranch extended from Lockney, Texas and the Tule Ranch to the Shoe-Bar and Mill Tron Ranches and from the Mator Ranch to the J. A. Ranches. (30) Goodnight fenced the Ranch in 1883. (31) In 1886 Goodnight took the Quitauque Ranch and twenty thousand head of cattle for his beforehand-agreed, one-third interest of the Adair Ranches. Mrs. Adair had possession of the Palo Duro and Tule Ranches (32). Goodnight regretted not taking the Palo Duro Ranch because farmers began to come in to the country and settle on the State's alternate sections. He sold the ranch to L. R. Moore (33)

The first headquarters of the F. Ranch was about three hundred yards southwest of the Edgin (grey Mule) graveyard. The remains of the three dugouts are still visible and easily located. West of this headquarters was a large wire corral and rock furnace. This corral was used for branding cattle, and the furnace, which was similar to our present-day fireplace, was used






