Watershed Program To Be Expanded

Monday, August 8th, marked another important milestone in the development of the Kent Creek Watershed program, at Quitaque. Following a recent survey by a preliminary planning team from Temple, it was determined that the Kent Creek Water Control and Improvement District would have to be expanded to include a portion of Hall County, along Kent Creek to its juncture with Turkey Creek south of Turkey.

This was accomplished Monday, when a group representing the Kent Creek W. C. I. D. met with the Hall County Commissioners Court at Memphis and secured their cooperation in this matter. The Hall County Commissioners are to be commended on their public spirited endorsement of this beneficial community project. Their action clears the last principal obstacle to this project and sets the stage for the next important phase. An engineering planning party

from the State Office of the Soil Conservation Service will set up headquarters in Quitaque in the near future, possibly in September. This team of men will be responsible for selecting sites for the proposed flood control structures and their design and layout. They will determine what channel improvements are necessary and lay the ground work prior to the start of construction.

This project will not only be a "First" for Briscoe County, but a first for the Panhandle area of Texas as well. The Directors of the Kent Creek W. C. I. D., along with many other community leaders at Quitaque, have put in many months of dedicated effort towards realizing this goal. They are due a hearty "Thanks" for a job well done, and the Supervisors of the Cap Rock Soil Conservation District take this opportunity to express this sentiment.

ED VAUGHAN BURIED AT SILVERTON WED.

Funeral services for Ed Vaughan, 79, long-time Silvertown resident, were held at the First Methodist Church in Silvertown, Wednesday at 3:30. He passed away Tuesday afternoon, August 9, 1960 at 2:45 at the Plainview Hospital & Clinic, where he had been a patient most of the time since the latter part of June. He had undergone surgery there two weeks ago and last Saturday had been allowed to return to Silvertown. Early Tuesday morning his condition became worse and he was returned by ambulance to Plainview, where he passed a few hours later.

Uncle Ed, as he was fondly called by so many, was one of the real old-timers of the Silvertown area, having lived on the same farm 6 miles southwest of Silvertown for 50 years.

Edward Vaughan was born at Bosqueville, Texas, November 28, 1880. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. M. Vaughan. He was married to Addie Lee Anthony at Mangum, Oklahoma, May 28, 1906. Mr. and Mrs. Vaughan came to Silvertown in 1910 and settled on land that is now a part of the present farm. Mrs. Vaughan passed away July 12, 1923.

He made a profession of faith at the age of nine years and attended the First Methodist Church at Silvertown until failing health prevented it.

Officiating at the service were Rev. Frank Story, pastor of the First Methodist Church, Rev. G. A. Elrod, pastor of the First Baptist Church, and Travis McMinn, pastor of Downtown Baptist Church in Wichita Falls. Rev. McMinn is a grandson of Mr. Vaughan.

Survivors are two sons, Eural and Ewing, both of Silvertown; two daughters, Mrs. Bud McMinn, of Silvertown; and Mrs. Gaston Owens, of Quitaque; one brother, C. R. Vaughan, of Ventura, California; and Mrs. W. A. Stephens of Silvertown; 6 grandchildren and 7 great-grandchildren and a host of other relatives and friends.

Pall bearers, all nephews, were Conrad Henderson, George Seaney, Willie Vaughan, Cephus Flowers, Bud Vaughan, Mike Thompson, and Elbert Stephens.

Honorary pallbearers were members of the Sunday School Class that Mr. Vaughan attended. They were: T. J. Hodges, M. J. Oneal, Will Smithee, Joe Smith, and Dr. W. A. Sedgwick. Only three of these were able to attend the service. Mr. Hodges, Dr. Sedgwick, and Mr. Smithee.

Burial was in Silvertown Cemetery under the direction of Roberts Funeral home.

AREA RECEIVES MORE SLOW, SOAKING RAIN

Quitaque and surrounding territory was blessed once again in the form of gentle, soaking rains Wednesday morning.

The official rain gauge at the City Hall caught 1.40. The rains started falling around six o'clock Wednesday morning and continued until past noon. Although the rain was general the amounts varied. Some farmers reported as much as three inches and from all reports coming in at measurements were at least as much as those registered here in town.

This fine rain will almost assure the territory of good crops, barring complications. Of course, another rain in two or three weeks would make prospect even brighter for a very fine harvest here in our area.

TRAGEDY AT BURSON LAKE

Death by drowning brought to a tragic end a pleasant Sunday outing for a Plainview family and friends last Sunday.

Dead is Melvin Barbee, 18, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Barbee of Anton. The youth drowned about 6 o'clock in 40-foot deep water of Burson Lake northeast of Silvertown.

Young Barbee, a junior at Anton High School where he was a member of the football team, accompanied Mr. and Mrs. Bob Perry, their two sons, Dwight 16, Van 13, and the Perry's daughters, Jean 15, and Sandra Stark 15, on the picnic supper and swimming outing.

Barbee had made his home here this summer with a sister, Mr. and Mrs. Don Posten, residents across the street from the Perrys, while he was employed at the South Plains Commodities, Inc., elevator.

Mrs. Perry and other members of the family said Barbee mentioned that he was tired after a swim an hour or so after the group had eaten their picnic supper. A number of swimmers, at one time during the afternoon, 45 or 50, were swimming around a floating raft anchored 50 or 60 feet from the shore of the lake west and north of the dam.

Mrs. Perry said Melvin and Van were sitting on the shore after swimming from the raft. Young Barbee mentioned that he was tired. Van suggested that they rest a while before starting to swim back to the raft. Melvin, however, expressed confidence that he could "make it" and the two youths plunged in.

A few yards short of the raft Melvin said to Van, "I can't make it." The Perry youth said the manner in which Barbee spoke warned him that his companion was in trouble. Barbee went down. Van cried for help.

Dwight Perry, a good swimmer, was at Barbee's side within seconds. Barbee came to the surface struggling desperately and Dwight was unable to hold onto him. The youth disappeared under the surface of the water and did not rise.

An unidentified man from Amarillo who had an aqualung in his car nearby quickly put on the lung, dived into the water and brought the body to the surface. Barbee then had been under possibly fifteen minutes.

The elder Perry and Dwight applied mouth to mouth respiration. There being no telephone at the lake, a car sped to Silvertown for aid. The Perrys applied mouth to mouth respiration for about 40 minutes and after an ambulance arrived a resuscitator was used in a vain attempt to revive the youth. Mrs. Perry said she was unable to detect a pulse at any time during the feverish efforts at revival.

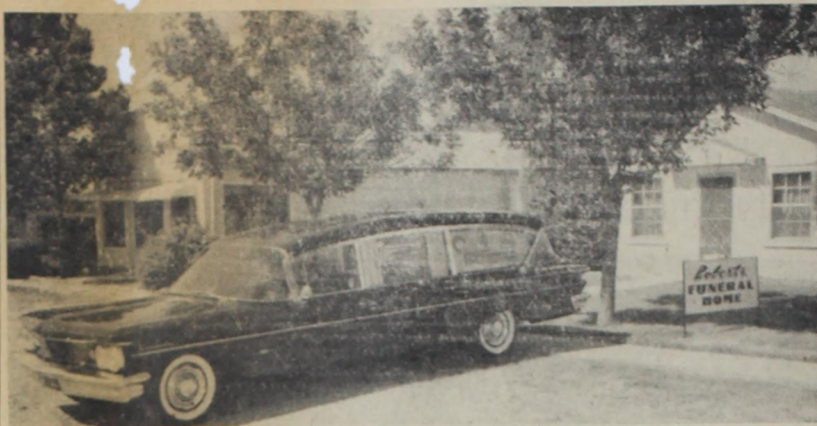

Diamond-Jubilee Year For State Fair Of Texas

Dallas—What's cooking at the State Fair this year?

The 1960 Diamond Jubilee Exposition, celebrating the Fair's 55th anniversary year, will offer a number of "Jubilee specials" yet to be revealed, but in the meantime, here is a thumbnail listing of some of the major shows and other attractions for this year.

The entertainment calendar will be topped by the Rodgers and Hammerstein musical, "Flower Drum Song," and by the 20th birthday edition of the always-popular "Los Capales." The Mobil Sky Revue

will present the serial acts of the million-dollar Midway, featuring a number of brand new thrill rides.

In addition, the State Fair "Shower of Stars" will present some of the nation's best known entertainers in its free shows. The stars who will appear will be announced at an early date.

A record total of \$120,770 in premiums will be offered in the various livestock, horse and poultry show events of the 1960 Fair. The Pan-American Livestock Exposition will be held Oct. 8-16 and the Junior show will follow during the second week of the Fair. The State Fair Horse Show will be staged all during the Fair in the new Livestock Coliseum.

The third annual Texas International Trade Fair will have exhibits from all over the world. The Automobile Show will introduce many of the new 1961 models. The Agriculture Show will feature the importance of chemistry to modern farming and ranching.

Other exhibits will include those in the Electric Show and Natural Gas Show, Playtime USA, farm implements and machinery, antique autos, the Home and Family Show and special features of all the fairground museums.

Free daily fashion shows will be a highlight in the Women's Building, along with the traditional exhibits of home-making skills.

College and professional football will be played in the Cotton Bowl, with the Fairtime schedule being topped by the Texas-Oklahoma classic, and including also SMU vs. Rice, Dallas Texans vs. Oakland Raiders and Dallas Cowboys vs. Cleveland Browns.

Dates of the 1960 State Fair are Oct. 8-23.

ARTHUR GODFREY TO BE AT STATE FAIR OF TEXAS

Dallas—Television and radio star Arthur Godfrey will make personal appearances on the first three days of the 1960 State Fair of Texas Horse Show.

The Old Redhead will appear with his famous Palomino, "Goldie," at the night performances of the Horse Show Oct. 7 and 8 and at the matinee performance Oct. 9 in the State Fair Livestock Coliseum.

The Horse Show gets under way on the Friday evening before the State Fair officially opens Saturday, Oct. 8.

Godfrey has been a horse lover for more than 25 years. At his

farm, Beacon Hill in Loudoun County, Va., he keeps horses of several different breeds. The most famous is his Palomino stallion, Catactin Gold, known as "Goldie" to the millions who have seen him on the Godfrey TV shows or in personal appearances he has made from coast to coast.

Godfrey and "Goldie" will appear at the State Fair Horse Show in an exhibition of "dressage" riding, in which the horse is sent through intricate maneuvers without discernible instruction from the rider.

Godfrey has appeared with "Goldie" at a number of major horse shows in recent years, including the National Horse Show in New York and the International Horse Show in Chicago.

The State Fair's Series I Horse Show which opens Friday night, Oct. 7, will present five and three-gaited saddle horses, five harness and walking horses, roadster and parade horses and hunters and jumpers. The Series I show runs through Oct. 11.

The opening series will be followed by cutting horses and quarter horses competing in Series II, Oct. 12-16, and by final series, Oct. 18-23, which will feature Shetland ponies, Palominos and Arabian horses.



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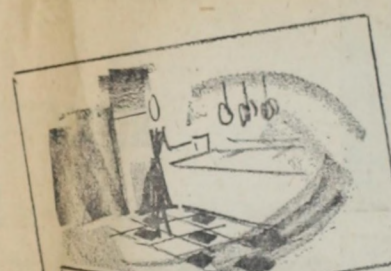
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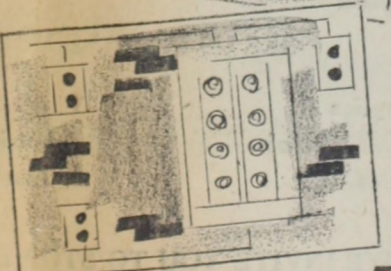

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BIRTH CERTIFICATE REQUESTS FLOOD STATE OFFICE

Attend parents: It's later than you think.

This comes from W. D. Carroll, state registrar, whose vital statistics staff at the Texas State Department of Health is responsible for handling the flood of requests for birth certificates for children entering school for the first time this September.

Carroll's problem is this: There is a tendency among parents to put off requesting copies of their youngster's birth records until the last moment. When too many parents delay in this manner, the results are obvious: a work overload.

The condition does not result from any lack of effort on the part of Carroll's staff. "Our limited Vital Statistics Division staff—despite long hours of night and week-end work—can process just so many requests before school begins," he explains.

More than 262,000 children are expected to enter elementary schools of Texas for the first time this fall. The estimate is based on calculations made by the Texas Education Agency.

A good many parents—some of whom may have waited too long in past years—have already requested and received birth records on this year's new scholars, but tens of thousands of additional records will have to be processed

between now and the time that first school bell rings in September.

More than one youngster has been forced to postpone his first days at school simply because his parents couldn't produce proof of his age when it came time to register him.

Carroll's advice to parents: "Send in your request today to the local registrar, county clerk, or the State Department of Health."

All you have to do is give the child's name, date and place of birth, the mother's maiden name, and the name of the father. This information, with the legal fee of one dollar, should be addressed to your local registrar, the county clerk, or to the State Department of Health, Section on Records and Statistics, 410 East 5th Street, Austin, Texas.

Something else: Be prepared to show school officials a record of "shots" your youngster has had. Depending on local school regulations, proof of immunizations against smallpox, whooping cough, diphtheria, and other diseases may be required.

LONG SEASON FOR DOVE HUNTERS

Hunters seem to be well pleased at the bonus dove shooting they will get during the 1960 season, according to the executive secretary of the Game and Fish Commission.

The North Zone season this year will start at 12 noon, Sept. 1, and close at sunset October 30. The South Zone will open October 7 and close December 5, except in the counties where white-winged dove shooting will be permitted three days earlier.

The white-winged dove season will be for three days, September 9, 10, and 11. This season will be from 2 P. M. until sunset.

There also will be an increase in bag limit on mourning doves for the upcoming season. The shooter will be permitted to take 15 per day and have 30 in possession.

Whitewing shooters, who may also kill mourning doves at the same time, will be permitted to have 10 whitewings and 5 mourners for the first day of hunting. They may have 20 mourning doves and 10 whitewings in possession after the second day.

Generally, the Texas quail season will begin December 1, under the general laws. The Commission will set the quail season in regulatory authority counties at its meeting October 7. At that time, biologists will know more about the supply of birds.

Another drastic change in the hunting laws will be legalizing spike bucks in counties under regulatory authority.

BLUECAT BEING STUDIED

Biologists of the Game and Fish Commission have been attempting to learn the ecological requirements of Rio Grande blue catfish by introducing this species into man-made impoundments having various desirable environmental characteristics. According to the director of inland fisheries, 13 large blue catfish were caught in the mouth of the Pecos River and transferred to Lake Colorado City.

The catfish ranged in weight from 8 to 12 pounds. Several of the fish were tattooed with an electrical tattooing machine before their release in the lake.

In addition to the adult fish, 5,500 very small blue catfish were taken from the Sheldon Hatchery near Houston, and released. Some 4,500 were placed in Lake J. B. Thomas, while the remaining fish went into Lake Nasworthy.

The smaller ones and the so-called "Rio Grande" blues are known

by the same scientific name, *Ictalurus Furcatus*, but differ somewhat in appearance. Spots of pigmentation on a light greyish-blue, are nearly uniformly distributed over the backs and sides of the Rio Grande strain.

According to the director, it's possible the two types of cats may have slightly different characteristics of adaptation and that the Rio Grande fish might have a better chance for survival in other west Texas waters. This will be better known when some of the released fish have been recaptured.

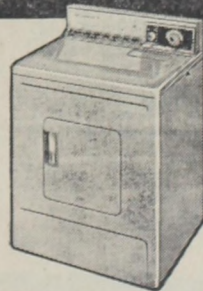

DOG DAYS

Beware of the dog days, is the warning of the director of law enforcement of the Game and Fish Commission. The hottest part of August, the so-called dog days, is on now.

"If you go into the woods or where snakes are likely to be found, be very careful," the director warned. "During these dog days snakes will strike at most anything without warning. Also be careful in handling animals, as there probably will be an increase in the rabies incidence."

Although wardens over the State report catching to be fairly good, few good catches of bass are reported. Most of the good fish taken are from deep water, where they move to escape the dog day heat. There also has been a heavy draw-down on most of the lakes, particularly where water is released for irrigation purposes along the coast.

"We need a good rain to fill all the lakes again," the director said. "There have been some fair rains on the range but the run-off hasn't been sufficient to keep lakes and streams filled."

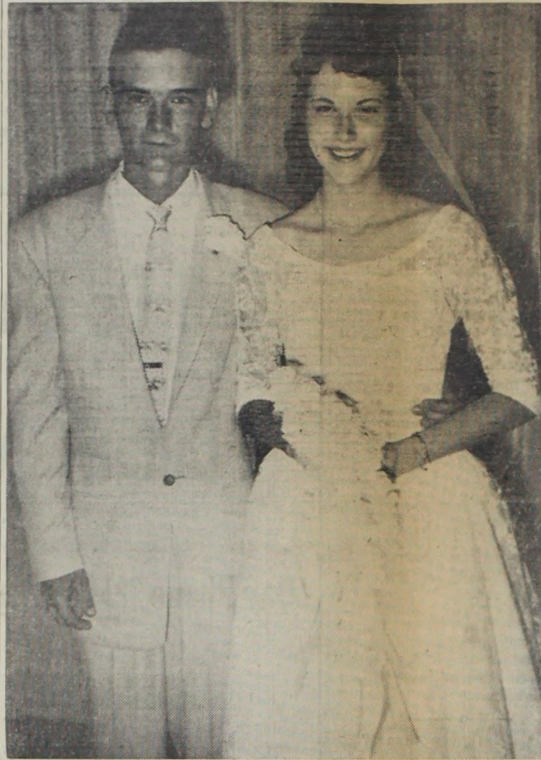
