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## Large Crowd On Hand For Bank Anniversary Celebration

More than 300 customers, friends and other well-wishers called at the First National Bank here Tuesday afternoon to pay their respects and to visit with old friends from all over the area who were also here for the 40th birthday celebration of that institution.

Bank officials were pleased at the number who called in person and for those who sent greetings in other ways.

In addition to the customers and friends who were here from a wide area around Quitaque, representatives from 2 Amarillo banks, and Clarendon, Memphis and Silverton bankers were on hand to pay their respects. Other banks sent best wishes in the form of flowers.

Callers at the Bank during the hours of Open House were treated to refreshments of punch, coffee and cookies and candy for the youngsters. Those who signed the guest book were given key chains with a bright and shiny new penny, encased in plastic, attached to it.

In addition to the refreshments and favors other prizes were given during the course of the Open House.

A \$25.00 Savings Bond was presented to Bill Woods whose name was drawn from the list of those who registered.

N. V. Hamilton was given a \$25.00 Savings Bond for being the first person registering who made a deposit on the opening day of the Bank in 1920.

Mrs. J. H. Simmons was presented with a \$25.00 Savings Bond for being the oldest customer of the Bank present at the Open House. Mrs. Simmons is 85 years young. Other old-timers were Mr. A. B. Ramsey, 84 and Mr. J. G. Govin, 83.

Miss Mary Ellen McCracken received the \$10.00 Cash Award

for bringing in the oldest document issued by the bank. It was a deposit slip dated October 8, 1921, and it was made out to L. A. McCracken and P. O. Woods. Other old documents, such as statements, deposit slips, letters, etc., were brought in by Mrs. M. L. Welch, John Rogers, H. O. Dyer and Mrs. J. R. Nall and were dated from 1922 to 1930.

There was no one to claim the \$25.00 Savings Bond for having been born August 2, 1920 but two showed up with August 2 birthdays and received 2.50 each. They were a daughter of Bill Murphey of Tulsa and Mrs. Ray Martin of Roaring Springs.

There were many lovely flowers presented to the Bank and officials of the bank paid tribute to the Quitaque Flower Shop and Mary Pittman who did most of the flower arranging for the occasion.

Merchants here in Quitaque presented 40 roses to the bank in honor of its birthday and in appreciation of the services rendered to the town and community during the past forty uninterrupted years.

### Elmer Berryhill To Receive Teacher Award

Elmer Berryhill, Jr., teacher of Vocational agriculture in the Quitaque High School, will attend the state conference of vocational agriculture teachers to be held in Corpus Christi August 9-12, 1960. The annual conference is designed to help teachers keep pace with the fast-changing agriculture of the state. Workshops, lectures and panels will discuss subjects of wide variation but each designed to equip participants for improved instruction in 1960-61.

In addition to educational features of the four-day conference, teachers will participate in several meetings of the Vocational Agriculture Teachers Association. Activities of the group will include an evening of entertainment on August 9, an Awards Breakfast on August 10, and an annual membership meeting following the breakfast. New officers will be elected and newly elected members of the board of directors will be installed.

Dr. Scotty Young of General Motors will be principal speaker for the first general session Tuesday, according to George Hurt of Texas Education Agency, who is in charge of educational features of the four day program. Many additional meetings will be held in smaller groups divided by districts, areas and subject matter preference.

Tom Anderson, dynamic publisher of Farm and Ranch Magazine, will be the main speaker at the business session of the Association on Wednesday.

More than eleven hundred teachers and friends are expected at the meeting.

Mr. Berryhill will be given a ten year Teacher's Award from Vocational Agricultural Association of Texas.

**IT PAYS TO WATER BARLEY**

Irrigation on barley increased returns \$29.56 per acre over dryland barley at the High Plains Research Foundation in the 1953-60 test. Colorado barley was used in the test which compared yield and returns between dryland barley and that of irrigated, fertilized barley.

**They Were Headed For The Right Place**

Mrs. Nook Bedwell and Mrs. Scott Bolton drove over to Matador Tuesday for medical attention and as they drove in to town they stopped at a stop signal as all good drivers do only to have their car jammed in the rear by another driver who failed to stop—or rather his brakes failed to stop him.

The dryland barley yielded 9 bushels per acre compared to 67.5 bushels per acre from the irrigated barley.

The car, of rather the station wagon, was from Dallas, and was loaded with Boy Scouts, equipment, a canoe on top and was pulling a trailer. They had been to Colorado attending the Boy Scout jamboree and were returning home to Dallas.

The irrigated barley received two four-inch applications of water along with 200 pounds of 10-20-0 fertilizer per acre.

The Station wagon was damaged quite extensively and the owner, it was reported had to call Dallas for more transportation.

At 75 cents per bushel, income from the dryland acreage was \$6.72 per acre. Irrigation cost was \$6.00 per acre and the fertilizer cost totaled \$7.72 per acre. Deducting these costs from the \$50.00 received, the net income from the irrigated, fertilized test was \$36.28 per acre. James Valliant, water engineer at the Foundation, conducted the tests.

### FORMER QUITAQUE PASTOR HAS BUGGY BUSINESS

(Borrowed from The Plainview Daily Herald)

The little 'lady' with the polka dotted dress has proved especially beneficial to the pocket book of W. M. Draper, 1207 Oakland, retired Baptist minister.

Mr. Draper's only interest in the ladybug beetle about nine years ago was strictly a hobby, but since that time this interest has grown up to a \$40,000.00 seasonal business some years.

His mate of 52 years is almost as interested in the little bugs as he and they share the conviction that the work is interesting and enjoyable and at the same time they feel it is a service to farmers in the area.

The beneficial use of ladybugs to assist in eliminating injurious insects in crops is a controversial subject among farmers, entomologists and agricultural men—be that as it may—the ladybug beetle has an interesting life cycle and background.

Draper has a cold storage house on the back of his lot where he can

keep as many as 1,500 gallons of bugs, however about 800 gallons is the most he keeps at one time ordinarily. The house is best stocked at the peak of July 15 to August 10. He has sold as much as 600 gallons of bugs a day—135,000 bugs to the gallon—during the spring and summer seasons, depending on the insect infestation.

Through the years the Drapers have experimented with the bugs in different types of cartons, storage practices and shipping methods. He has kept the bugs in his cold storage for five months with a mortality rate of two percent.

The main thing in keeping the bugs well and in good condition for the customer is the proper ventilation, circulation, temperature and amount of moisture. Draper has found that between 34 and 40 degrees is the best temperature to keep them in the dormant stage.

When it is possible Draper likes to keep the bugs in a dormant stage for 30 to 60 days before selling them. He says experience tends to show that the bugs build up more eggs this way. Many times during are at their worst some farmers the season when detrimental bugs

are almost waiting at the station when they come in Mr. Draper says. He does not like to sell the ladybugs this way because a bag of bugs is worth twice as much to the farmer if they can be put back in cold storage and become dormant again before putting them in the field.

#### Ladybugs Nervous

Mrs. Draper remarked that the ladybug is a very nervous insect and after two or three days travel they often get sick due to the changes in temperature or ventilation in transit. They have an illness similar to diarrhea and putting them back in the dormant stage is the only thing that will stop it, she said.

On the average four to five gallons of bugs are used on 100 acres, depending on the size of the plant, of infestation. Mr. Draper says one of the secrets of the success in using the bugs to kill detrimental insects is to not put too many in the field at one time. He says another point in successful use of the ladybug is to put them in the crop late in the evening, this way they will not fly away from the field and by morning they will have found food before it is light enough to fly. They will not fly in the dark or when the temperature is below 70 degrees, he said.

Sometimes a group of farmers in a given area will go together and get their ladybugs. In this way they will not be as likely to lose any of their bugs.

Draper has been using ladybugs on his own farm near Happy Union for the past nine years, in fact that is how it all started. After using them on his own crops he started to experiment with them and sold them on a commission basis, later putting his own cold storage as business demanded. According to him it costs only \$1.50 per acre per season to take care of his crops now since most of the insects are the beneficial kind. The ladybug will eat most any kind of

soft insect and eggs of harmful insects. They will not control the boll weevil, Mexican weevil or the squash bug, Draper said.

Although the 'Hippodamia Convergens' is called the Ladybird beetle, there are also male of the species. The little insects hibernate in mountainous country until March or April when they begin to fly and lay eggs for two or three weeks. There are usually three hatches per summer.

After ladybugs are gathered they are put in bags and shipped in wooden crates for commercial purposes and at the point of destination are put into cold storage until ready for use in the field.

#### Eggs In Clusters

The ladybug lays five to 25 eggs per day in clusters of three to five where aphids are, so that the young will have feed when they hatch. It takes about five weeks for the larva to emerge into adult ladybugs. Upon hatching, the insects immediately begin to eat and they grow until about a half inch in length and look similar to a small alligator. They are dark gray in color and have some orange spots. Many times farmers find these in their fields and do not know what they are. This is the larvae of the ladybird beetle which is as helpful as the adult ladybird.

According to Draper the ladybug feeds on aphids, thrip, red spider, the nymph and eggs of leafhopper and fleahopper, the eggs and small larvae of the corn earworm, cotton boll worm, pink boll worm, leaf worm and greenbugs. They also feed on the eggs and nymph of many hard-shelled insects, he said.

Historical information is that the ladybird beetle in some countries is held almost in religious veneration because of their never-ending warfare against aphids and larvae. The many names by which it is called, ladybird, ladyfly, ladycock and ladybug seem to date from the past and its dedication to

the Virgin Mary. In France they are spoken of by the peasants as the cows of the Lord, in Sweden they sometimes are called the Virgin Mary golden hens. They are associated with plentiful crops in Central Europe. In northern Europe they have even been associated with aiding young women to find husbands. But in the United States their only significance still remains to be their carnivorous diet of agricultural pests.

Another interesting fact about the ladybug is that it exudes a disagreeable fluid, making it undesirable for food for other insects. Its marking of brightly colored dots warn its enemies and protects it. The little bugs feign death if bothered.

Mr. and Mrs. Draper grew up together in Haskell County and married 52 years ago. He served as pastor of First Baptist Churches over this area for 33 years, retiring in 1951. Draper's last pastorate was at Anton. For about 18 months after leaving Anton he and his wife helped with mission work at Spur, fulfilling a desire of many years. They moved to Plainview nine years ago from Spur and built their present home.

One of the most rewarding aspects of this business is his realization of the honesty of people with which he deals. Through the years the large number of orders he has filled both in Texas and Oklahoma by telephone, shipping them direct to complete strangers. "I have never failed to receive my money," Draper said.

The Drapers have an apple, plum and apricot tree on their lot which is usually loaded with fruit in season. Most of the time the bug customers also get enough fruit for a pit or for just good eating. This is one of the most enjoyable things about their business—visiting and sharing with their customers.

Nevertheless, these amendments should be carefully studied by every voter, because each involves matters of finance even though the specific subject matter of the amendments is unrelated. The amendments will be headed as follows:

"PROPOSED CONSTITUTION AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1960."

Amendment No. 1 would authorize the Legislature to create a Hospital District including Lamar and Hidalgo Counties, and County Commissioners' Precinct No. 4 of Comanche County.

Amendment No. 2 would increase to three and one-half percent the maximum permissible interest rate on bonds hereafter issued by the Veteran's Land Board.

Amendment No. 3 would allow an annual salary for Members of the Legislature of not to exceed \$4800 per year, and a per diem allowance of not more than \$12.00 per day for the first 120 days only of each Regular Session, and for 30 days of each Special Session of the Legislature. The Regular Ses-

sion would be limited to 140 days.

Amendment No. 4 would give the Legislature authority to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate lenders, define interest and fix maximum rates of interest.

Voters should study these amendments carefully, and watch their newspapers for further discussions of these amendments. Above all, plan now to vote!

## West Texas Utilities Announce Personnel Changes

He came to Abilene in 1920 as an engineer for the companies that were to become the West Texas Utilities. In 1930, Campbell was named President of the company and held that position until 1955, when he reached the mandatory retirement age of 65 and was named Chairman of the Board.

His election as Honorary Chairman today came as a result of his attaining the mandatory retirement age for the Board Chairman. As Honorary Chairman, Campbell will be relieved of his administrative duties but will continue as an active director of the company and will maintain an office in the First National-Ely Building.

Widely known for his work in the development of West Texas, Campbell has been interested in numerous civic and area development programs.
