RALPH W. YARBOROUGH ANNOUNCED CANDIDACY FOR GOVERNOR

Ralph W. Yarborough of Austin, pledging to build a structure of morality in state government, has announced his candidacy for the Democratic nomination for governor of Texas.

Yarborough announced a platform "of progress including water conservation, drought relief, higher old age pensions, improved schools with adequate teacher pay and adequate retirement pay, adequate classroom space, a youth development program, a juvenile delinquency program" based on "broad general humanitarian principles." He said he would take his campaign in person "to the people in every corner of this great commonwealth."

Yarborough made his announcement simply, to the press, in contrast to the statewide radio and television broadcasts of other gubernatorial contenders.

"Humbly I accept," Yarborough said, "the commission of duty you have given me in terms of thousands of messages... to lead the fight for the good name of Texas."

"The people of Texas want a new state government, free of entangling alliances and partnerships with the outgoing administration. Texas wants a state government free of the policies of the past and capable of independent action."

Yarborough added, I pledge the people of Texas the restoration of honor, integrity and dignity in their state government.

"To every one of the 5,833,132 Texans who voted and worked with us in the hard campaign of 1954, I extend my thanks and gratitude. I urge each of you, and all Texans who believe in the triumph of honesty and morality, to join us in this crusade for a new administration in Texas."

### Capital Investment vs Total Receipts

The ratio of capital investment to value of production in egg poultry flocks influences the earnings of poultrymen, says Don Wormell, extension poultry husbandman.

This subject has been studied by Cornell University for several years. More than a thousand poultry farms were divided according to the number of years it took for total receipts to equal capital investment. A low group required one and a half years, and had a labor income of \$2300. The middle group required two and four-tenths years, and had a labor income of \$1100, while the third group required four years and had a labor income of only \$200. There seems to be a direct relation between the way a man uses his money and the way he uses his time, says Wormell. Warmer climates in southern states offer advantages of lower building investment which is the largest part of total capital investment.

Texas figures are not available but an estimate that would serve as a basis for probable investment on a poultry farm are: land, 5 percent of the total, real-estate (houses), 45 percent, poultry stock; 35 percent, equipment, 10 percent and feed and supplies, 5 percent.

If investment is larger than one and a half times the year's receipts, the poultryman should find out in what area he over invested. On the other hand, if the investment ratio is low, the poultryman may be overlooking some labor saving investments that could increase labor income.

Wormell adds, as in every business, the poultryman too, must give the dollars involved in his business the skillful management needed to bring about satisfactory earnings.

### CONTRACT LET FOR BRIDGE IMPROVEMENTS ON 70 & 256

A contract for replacing timber bridges on State Highway 256 and 70 in Hall County has been awarded to a Lubbock firm, it was announced in Austin this week by the State Highway Commission.

## News Letters

### From Congressman WALTER ROGERS

TO THE PEOPLE OF THE 18th DISTRICT

At these companies have  
in their contracts ag-  
ing to relocate these facili-  
without cost to the public.  
The utility companies claim that  
the taxpayers are not required  
to pay for relocation costs, then  
they (the utility companies) will  
simply pass on the cost of this  
relocation to their customer. You  
can see that there is plenty of  
fuel here for a good sized bon-  
fire.

Like the school aid bill and  
other pieces of legislation here,  
you can expect many attempts to  
ride type legislation on the  
highway bill. This is one means of  
slipping the trend towards total  
centralization of government and  
regimentation of individuals. Have  
you ever thought how fast cen-  
tralization and regimentation are  
being accomplished? When most  
of you my age were boys and girls  
you didn't have to have a license  
for every turn of your daily life.  
About the only licenses we knew  
of at that time were dog licenses  
and these only applied to city  
dogs. Country dogs didn't need  
them as long as they came to  
town for strictly social purposes.  
I guess it can properly be said  
that we are now leading a dog's  
life, at least in so far as licensing  
is concerned.

#### VISITORS

Visitors in Washington this  
last week included Colonel Joe  
Mason, formerly of the Amarillo  
Air Force Base and now at Wright  
Patterson. Incidentally, Joe kept  
his home in Amarillo and expects  
to return there. The Honorable  
Bill Heatly, Member of the Texas  
Legislature and attorney of Pa-  
ducab, was in town for a couple  
of days and we enjoyed visiting  
with him. Mr and Mrs Robert  
Wheatley, of Amarillo, were in  
town. Mr Wheatley represents  
the Brotherhood of Railway and  
Steamship Clerks, Freight Hand-  
lers, Express and Station Em-  
ployees. They were able to sit in  
on some of the hearings on railroad  
retirement legislation which is be-  
fore one of the subcommittees on  
which I serve. It was certainly  
good to have all of these folks  
in the Capital City and we hope  
more of you can come.

#### THE PUBLIC DEBT

It is very strange how little  
has been said in the last few years  
about the size of the public debt.  
Only a few years ago, the public  
debt was the number one issue  
of the day. At that time, it stood  
at between 265 and 270 billions  
of dollars, and the United States  
was carrying in cash deposits a  
daily balance of approximately  
7 to 11 billion dollars. Since that  
time, the public debt has contin-  
ued to increase, while the aver-  
age daily cash balance began to  
decrease. The result was that a-  
bout three years ago the Admin-  
istration asked the Congress to  
increase the debt ceiling from 275  
billion to 290 billion dollars. The  
Congress refused to do this, and  
it subsequently developed that  
such increase was not necessary.  
Had it been granted, the Ameri-  
can taxpayer would have been  
charged an additional interest of  
between one-half to one million  
dollars a day. The debt, however,  
did continue to increase and the  
Congress was again requested to  
increase the debt ceiling. On April  
28, 1954, the Congress did agree  
to increase the debt ceiling to 281  
billion dollars on a temporary  
basis to June 30, 1955. As that  
date approached, the Adminis-  
tration said that they could not  
reduce the debt below the ceiling,  
so the Congress again extended  
this temporary increase until  
June 30, 1956. I voted against  
both of these increases.

As we look at the public debt  
today, we find that on the first  
day of March, it was 280 billion  
dollars, plus collection of in-  
come taxes during March has en-  
abled this to be cut down to a  
present gross debt of 276 billion  
dollars. This will decrease some  
more due to tax collections, but  
will immediately shoot upward  
when the tax collecting period is  
over. Cash deposits on the first  
of the month were less than 5  
billion, but have increased by  
about two billion due to tax col-  
lections. The point is that we are,  
conservatively speaking, about 15  
billion dollars worse off financial-  
ly today than we were only a few

years ago. Yet, there is a cam-  
paign underway at the present  
time to require the taxpayers of  
this country to cough up another  
5 billion dollars for foreign aid  
and to commit these same tax-  
payers to continue to cough up ad-  
ditional sums for a period of 10  
years.





### HORIZONTAL SILOS

Horizontal silos have proven their practicality as replacement for trench silos in some locations. These silos are constructed on top of the ground with self supporting walls. They are designed on the principle of the trench silo, and run horizontal. Horizontal silos, which are increasing in numbers, must be economical, conveniently located, properly designed, and constructed for long service. Many trench silos could not be located for adequate drainage and good feeding arrangements, and so did not meet these qualifications. The above ground silos have been somewhat of a problem, since self-supporting walls are necessary. Some of the work has been concerned with this problem.

blem Tilt-up concrete wall panels and durable wire, should els, 6 feet high, 10 feet wide and 4 inches thick were used. These were precast or poured on the floor of the silo and later raised into position. For support of the walls, concrete pilasters were poured and spaced at ten foot intervals. Tests with the experimental silo proved that the 4 inch concrete wall panels, showed no sign of weakening. Agricultural Engineers gave an approximate cost of this type silo. A silo twenty feet wide and six feet deep will cost about \$4.90 per ton of silage storage space of materials. Potatoes, pork, beef, grapefruit and cabbage top the plentiful food list for February. A good fence, using treated

B-519, "Irrigated Pastures for South Texas" may be obtained from the local county agent or the Agricultural Information Office, College Station. The plants discussed are mostly adapted to South Texas but practices dealing with management will apply to irrigate pastures in any section of the state.

The brooder house should be cleaned and put in good repair several days prior to the arrival of the chicks. Operate the brooding equipment also to be sure it is in proper operating condition. The first few days of the chick's life are very important. Give them the start they need.

Texas vegetable growers and other concerned with processing and shipping are cautioned by Extension Entomologist to follow closely recommendations covering the use of pesticides on food crops. Crops showing excessive poisonous residues are illegal in intrastate commerce and when seized represent a complete loss.

The failure of retail food prices as a whole to reflect the decline in farm food products during the past year is recognized by the Department as a real obstacle to a solution of the farm surplus, said Sec. of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson.

Infrared brooders are proving on many farms for brooding chicks, pigs, lambs and even calves. They may also be used for thawing frozen pipes or as a heat lamp in the home.

### HOME GARDENS WITH BOTH RURAL AND URBAN DWELLING TEXANS

Farm and urban families grew an estimated 567,000 home gardens last year. These gardens, according to the extension horticulturists, not only provided top quality vegetables for the family table but also materially cut the cost of feeding the family.

The specialists report that slightly more than half the home gardens were grown in towns and cities and that county extension agents provided the home gardeners with information on subjects ranging from production to preservation of vegetables. Production from the better than half million gardens was valued at more than \$39,000,000.

Blufford Hancock and G. R. Williams, the extension specialists, also report that commercial vegetables harvested in Texas last year had a value of more than \$70 million. The acreage of vegetables for processing and the fresh market was estimated at 121,400. The five most important crops from the standpoint of money income were cantaloupes,

onions, lettuce, tomatoes and sweet potatoes.

The 1955 Texas peach, plum, apple and pear crops were almost totally destroyed by the late March freeze and the commercial blackberry crop approximated only 50 percent of normal. It was the second consecutive year for most of the peach growers to lose a crop.

The same late freeze seriously cut the peach crop in the northern half of the state. Despite the freeze and rather severe infestations of the pecan nut casebearer in other locations in the state, pecan production was about two-thirds of a normal crop. Prices received for the estimated 22,500,000 pounds of pecans were favorable and growers who harvested a crop made good returns.

During the year the specialists conducted demonstrations

and training meetings for county extension workers and interested producers. They worked with many organized groups in furthering programs in marketing and grading of vegetables and assisted county agents in carrying out field tests on new vegetable varieties and insect control programs.
