### MRS. C. P. RICHMOND'S BROTHER DIES OF BURNS IN ACCIDENT

Mrs. C. P. Richmond received word on December 19 that her brother, Marvin Carter of Dallas had been severely burned in an accident. He had been cleaning his hands with a cleaning fluid and had backed up to a stove to warm himself and the cleaning fluid on his hands and clothing exploded, burning 75 percent of his body. Mr. Carter was rushed to the hospital there in Dallas, where he remained 19 days, until his death last Tuesday, January 7. He was responding to treatment until developing pneumonia on Sunday, January 5.

He is survived by his wife; one son, Dwayne Carter of Arizona; two daughters, Joyce and Helen of Dallas; four sisters, Mrs. C. P. Richmond of Quitaque, Mrs. Lorene Rogers of Dallas, Mrs. B. T. Harris of Amarillo, and Mrs. R. L. Blagg, Wichita Falls; three brothers, E. C. Carter, Dallas, Jack Carter, Amarillo, and Edward Carter of Dallas. A number of nieces and nephews and a host of friends also survive.

Burial was in Dallas January 9. Mrs. Richmond has been ill in her home and was unable to attend the funeral service.

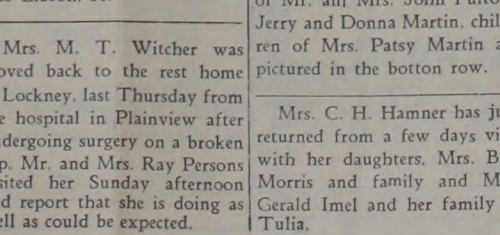

## BAPTISTS TO MEET AT LUBBOCK NEXT THURSDAY AND FRIDAY

Lubbock (Spl.) — Baptist pastors and laymen from all throughout West Texas are expected to gather in the First Baptist Church here January 23-24 for a regional evangelism conference.

The meeting is one of five slated across the state this year to replace the Texas Baptist Evangelistic Conference which has been staged annually in Dallas or Fort Worth since its beginning.

Although last year's conference in Dallas drew about 20,000 people, evangelism leaders feel that "carrying the meeting to the people" will enable many people to attend who could not travel so far. The conferences are geared to the theme "Revival Now."

The slate of evangelistic speakers at the Lubbock meeting represents several states. One of the main addresses at the opening session Thursday night will be brought by Dr. Landrum Leavell, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Wichita Falls. The conference opens at 6:45 P. M. with music by the Austin Baptist Association choir.

Other key speakers at the first session will include Dr. Charles B. Howard of North Carolina, professor emeritus of the department of Bible at Campbell College; Dr. O Byron Richardson of Dallas, associate in the Tex-

as Baptist Evangelism Division; and Lenard A. Hartley, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Hamlin.

Friday's evangelistic sessions, which begin at 9 A. M., will close Friday evening with a message by Dr. Robert G. Lee, Southern Baptist evangelist and pastor emeritus of the Bellevue Baptist Church of Memphis, Tenn.

Other speakers Friday will include Dr. Howard, Dr. T. A. Patterson, Texas Baptists' executive secretary; Dr. John S. Rasco, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Odessa; Dr. Robert E. Naylor, president of Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, Fort Worth; and Dr. John P. Newport, professor at Southwestern Seminary.

The First Baptist Church of Quitaque intends to attend the conference in significant numbers. Seats are to be reserved for at least 50 people on Thursday evening from the local congregation. It is the intention of the church to take a caravan of 10 or more cars. The deacons of the church stand committed to attend barring sickness or extreme circumstances.

There is no way to assess the value of such a conference in the work of the local church. There remains an open invitation to all to attend.

### HIGH SCHOOL ATTENDANCE

Attendance figures for the third six weeks of the current school year were released this week by HS Prin. George Ray Colvin. The figures are for high school attendance only.

The seniors had 15 1/2 days of absences, 1 tardy and a daily average attendance of 97.43; the Junior Class had only 3 absences during the 6 weeks period, only one tardy and a daily average attendance of 99.31; the sophomores had a daily average attendance of 98.07, had no tardies and 6 1/2 days of absences; the Freshman Class had the poorest average attendance in high school with a 95.45 record. The class had 1 tardy and 31 absences. Prin. Colvin said that two students accounted for most of the 31 days absences.

## DEADLINE NEARING FOR VEHICLE INSPECTION

Austin — The director of the  
Texas Department of Public  
Safety, Col. Homer Garrison,  
Jr., today reminded Texas ve-  
hicle owners that the 1964 ve-  
hicle inspection deadline will  
soon be upon them.

He reported that some 60 per  
cent of the allotted inspection  
period has elapsed and only 20  
per cent of the vehicles have  
been inspected.

"If this trend continues, ve-  
hicle owners can expect to have  
to wait in line in order to get  
their vehicles inspected by the  
April 15 deadline," he said.

Garrison pointed out that  
Texas experienced its worst traf-  
fic fatality record in 1963 and  
vehicle defects were involved in  
some of these fatal accidents.  
He urged all Texans to begin  
the new year with safe vehicles  
and keep them safe throughout  
the year. He added that vehicles  
involved in traffic accidents  
should be re-inspected after re-  
pairs have been made.

"Some 5,000 official inspec-  
tion stations over the state are  
waiting to inspect the four mil-  
lion vehicles which will have  
to be inspected by April 15,"  
the DPS director said. "There  
can be no extension of time, and  
after the deadline date of April  
15, vehicles which come under  
the provisions of the Inspection  
Act which do not display the  
1964 inspection sticker will be  
operating in violation of the  
law."

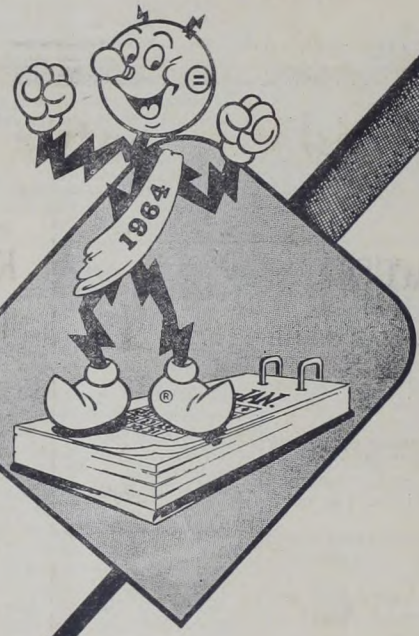
