DEADLINE NEARING FOR VEHICLE INSPECTION

- The director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., today reminded Texas vehicle owners that the 1964 vehicle inspection deadline will oon be upon them.

He reported that some 60 per cent of the allotted inspection period has elapsed and only 20 per cent of the vehicles have been inspected.

"If this trend continues, ve hicle owners can expect to have to wait in line in order to get their vehicles inspected by the April 15 deadline," he said.

Garrison pointed out that Texas experienced its worst traf-fic fatility record in 1963 and fic fatility record in 1963 and vehicle defects were involved in some of these fatal accidents. He urged all Texans to begin the new year with safe vehicles and keep them safe throughout the year. He added that vehicles involved in traffic accidents should be re-inspected after repairs have been made. "Some 5.000 official inspect.
