## Youth Caravan To Be Here Next Week

The Methodist Youth Caravan will arrive in Quitaque Saturday afternoon, to work with the Quitaque and Turkey young people—and adults who wish to attend the sessions.

The group is composed of five young men and women, from Illinois, Mississippi, Louisiana, Virginia and Texas, all college students, and trained especially in the Caravan work. They will be in Turkey Sunday, Monday and Tuesday to conduct and direct the work, but Quitaque young people are welcome to attend the courses. On Wednesday they will return to Quitaque to work and Turkey young people are welcome to attend these.

The afternoon sessions will begin at 4:00 p.m. with workshop training. At 6:00 p.m. there will be a fellowship supper (each one attending to bring a dish, or something to eat), and this will be followed by classes from 7 until 8, and the evening will end with directed recreation.

All young people of both Turkey and Quitaque communities are invited to participate in this work, regardless of denomination. Members of the Caravan are young enthusiastic, full of pep, and have interesting new ideas which will make the courses they are offering highly entertaining as well as educational.

## QUITAQUE RURAL MAIL ROUTE CHANGE EFFECTIVE JULY 16

Postmaster Bogan advises this week of a change in the routing of Quitaque rural route 1, which becomes effective Friday, July 16. This change was made necessary, the postmaster stated, by the fact that some roads through the sandy country southeast of Gasoline had to be eliminated.

The new line will leave the present line of travel at the S.H. Kimbell corner and travel east to the Flomot road, turn north to the Bradshaw corner, thence east to the Brummett corner, where the present line of travel will again be picked up, and thence north, east, north, west, south, west and south on the present road to the Gasoline road, and west through Gasoline to the Wise-corner, where the present road is again followed in to the postoffice.

Anyone desiring service over this route may erect boxes between now and the 16th of July.

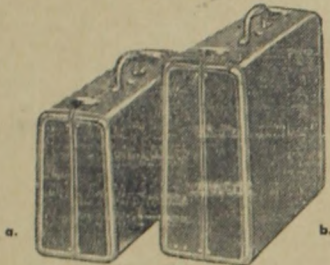

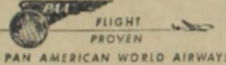

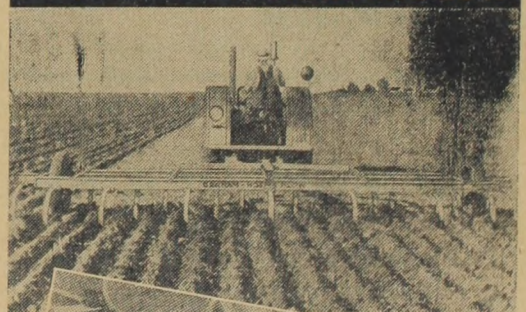
