The theme of the program was Race Relations and Alpha McFall made a talk on the subject at the evening session.

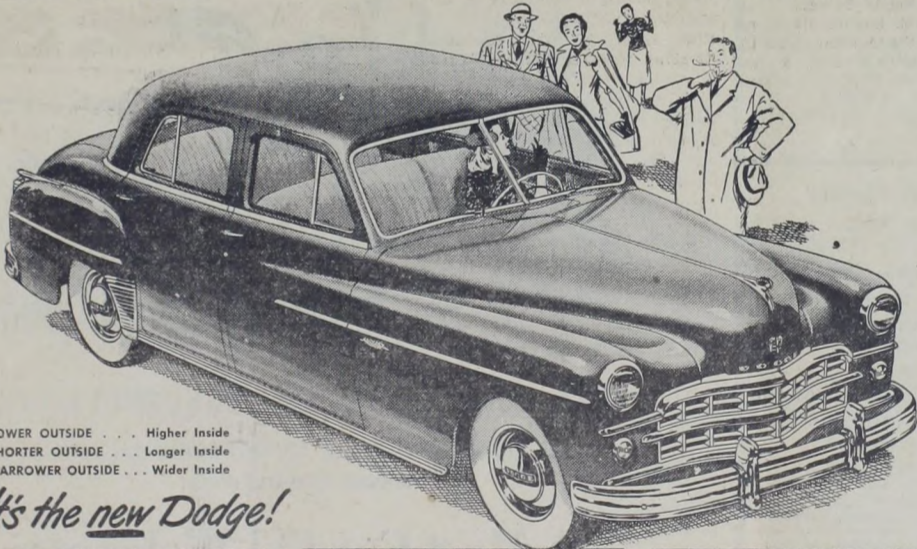

Motley County ACA

The following items are from the Motley County ACA, the secretary Mr. R. H. Alexander was kind enough to furnish us these interesting agriculture notes. Mr. Alexander says he understands (and he is correct) that we have a number of subscribers in the Flomot com-

munity who are Motley county producers, therefore interested in news from their ACA office.

Deep Plowing Sandy Cropland

Thousands of acres of unprofitable or abandoned sandy farm land in Motley County may be returned to production through the county approved practice of Deep

Plowing if farmers in Motley County will pledge 1,000 acres to the practice. It will be necessary for us to pledge the above acreage to get a contractor to move the heavy equipment to this county. Contact this office if you are interested in 18 to 24 inch deep plowing. The payment for this practice is \$3.00 per acre. We now have 150.0 acres pledged for this practice.

Ben Edwards Says

Mr. Edwards of the Flomot community plans to deep plow 100.0 acres on his farm. Mr. Edwards says the practice is a good practice and will stop the land from blowing and by this, increase the yield.

J. K. Campbell, of Roaring Springs, says "Strip cropping saved my farm this fall and winter." Mr. Campbell plans to carry out this practice again in 1949.

A Reminder

February 28, 1949, is the final date to receive a loan on grain sorghum. Producers who plan to store their grain on the farm should notify this office in time to get the grain sampled and graded before that date. Warehouse receipts should be brought in for warehouse stored grain.

Marion Bailey, Roaring Springs community, requested approval for 20.0 acres of deep plowing this week. Mr. Bailey says if the practice is as good as he's heard, next year he will deep plow his entire acreage. Mr. Bailey plans to get equipment and do the work himself.

Representatives from AAA, SCS, FHA, Extension Service, Chamber of Commerce, Memphis Democrat and local businessmen attended a meeting recently and planned to have a complete farm rebuilding demonstration in Hall County. This will be the first demonstration of this kind ever held in the Panhandle and it will require extensive team work and the full cooperation of every one to make it a success. W. B. Hooser, County Agent, Hall County, was elected Chairman; Bob Land, FHA Supervisor, Secretary, with committees from Memphis Chamber of Commerce, implement dealers, and Hall County's lending agencies to help carry out the program.

The above interest and team work is an example of what is needed to make a conservation program a success in any county. More information will be published on the above project when available.

The Terrace Program in Motley County is on the "boom". Approximately 8 miles of lines have been run this week by the County Agent and his assistant.

Due to the limited amount of equipment available, it will be necessary for some producers to get terrace lines surveyed and leave a place for the terrace when the land is listed. We think we will be able to get all of the terraces built before seeding time if the producers will do this.

See your local county agent or SCS to get your terrace lines surveyed.

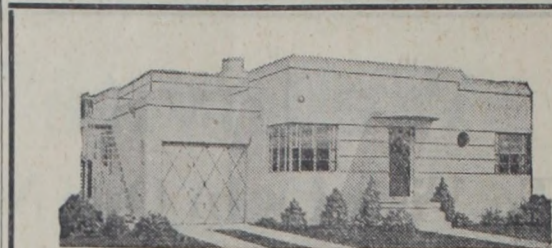
