What are Executive orders ometimes referred to as 'Presidential Directives." these orders initate actions by government departments and agencies. Virtually every American is affected by them. I've often been asked about them by folks in the Panhandle. Here's a report:

George Washington issued the first Executive Order on June 8, 1889, when he asked heads of Executive Departments heads of Executive Departments to submit "a clear account" of affairs connected with their departments. From Constitutional powers is implied the authority exercised by presidents through history to issue Executive Orders. Under the Constitution. ders. Under the Constitution. the President is vested with the executive power; the power to preserve, protect and defend the Constitution; and the power to see that the laws are faithfully executed. Presidents have based the authority for Executive Orders on all these grounds, most often the latter.

There has been a tendency in this century for Presidents to guide Executive Branch policies by using Executive Orders. Most have been routine in nature. One order, for example-provided for the appointment of a charwoman in a local post office. Here are the total numbers of Executive Orders issued by Presidents in this century: bers of Executive Orders issued by Presidents in this century: Theodore Roosevelt, 1,011: Wm. H. Taft, 699: Woodrow Wilson, 1,770: Warren G. Har-ding, 484: Calvin Coolidge, 1,248: Herbert Hoover, 1,004: Fanklan D. Roosevelt, 3,722: Harry S. Truman, 903: Dwight D. Eisenhower, 481: John F. Kennedy (through July 4, 19-63), 212.

Executive Orders are supposed to be based on authority granted directly to the President by the Constitution or by specific Acts of Congress. In many instances Presidents have issued

stitutional or Congressional authority and therefore could not stand. In this case, Youngstown nedy cited Section 10 of the Court — and the Court held that the power President Truman sought to exercise was a law-making power which the Constitution vests in the Congress alone.



DOCK

Docking a boat is easier than parking a car because you can make the forces of nature help you, say Mercury outboard experts. Try to approach against the force applying most pressure on your boat, be it wind or current. If this force flows parallel to the dock, come in against it, bow angled toward the dock slightly. Shift to reverse to stop and secure the bow line. Your stern will swing toward the dock, and you can tie up aft. With an off-the-dock wind, approach head on, stopping a few feet from the dock. Secure the bow line, then power the stern into place. When the wind's astern, come close and parallel to the dock, then drift into place. If you must approach with the wind, drive parallel to the dock and secure the stern line first. The wind will push your bow into place.
