## Heart Attack Fatal To Bob Wolf, Big Spring

Mrs. H. S. Foster was called Saturday morning July 26, to Big Spring by the sudden death of her brother R. L. (Bob) Wolf. She was accompanied by her daughter Shirley, who returned home Wednesday, leaving Mrs. Foster to remain until Friday with her aged father H. C. Wolf, who is ill.

Robert Lee (Bob) Wolf, 58, former sheriff of Howard County, died Friday night at 10 p. m., at his home when he was stricken with a heart attack.

Funeral rites were conducted Sunday afternoon at the First Baptist Church with Dr. P. D. O'Brien, pastor officiating. Interment was in the New Mount Olive Cemetery. Nephews served as pall bearers.

Born January 18, 1894 in Coryell county, he moved to Big Spring from Quitaque in 1920 and was married to Miss Annie Brown on June 6, 1925. He lived in Vincent and Coahoma for some time. He served as deputy sheriff for a number of years and won his first term as sheriff in 1944 and served through 1951. Since that time he had been engaged in the real estate business.

Wolf was a veteran of World War I, stationed overseas with the U. S. Marines. He was a Knight of Pythias and a member of the IOOF Lodge. He numbered his friends by his acquaintances.

He is survived by his wife, his father H. C. Wolf of Coahoma; two brothers John Wolf of Lamesa and W. F. Wolf of Clovis; six sisters, Mrs. C. M. Bell, Woodlake, Calif., Mrs. A. W. Irby of St. Helena, Ore., Mrs. C. S. Keeter, Lockney, Mrs. H. S. Foster, Quitaque, Mrs. W. J. Wade, Somerton, Ariz., Mrs. S. F. Buchanan, Big Spring, and a host of nieces and nephews.

## SUIT FILED TO CANCEL LICENSE OF OSTEOPATH

A suit to revoke and cancel the Texas medical license granted Dr. Alan Fields DeVore, an osteopath, was filed in 67th District Court Tuesday by Assistant District Attorney Truman Power.

Power filed the petition at the request of the Texas State Board of Medical Examiners.

Revocation of the license granted in 1950 was asked in the petition because Dr. DeVore pleaded guilty in U. S. District Court in Detroit, Mich., last year to a charge of violating the narcotics act and was placed on two years' probation.

Dr. DeVore, 34, formerly lived in Quitaque. At the time the petition was drawn he was living in Port Huron, Mich., but is now in Lookout, Ky. He is a native of Kansas City, Mo., and was graduated from the Kansas City College of Osteopathy.

## Lions' Meeting Is Held At City Park

A good turnout of Quitaque Lions were on hand at the regular meeting Monday night at the City Park, in which the group was fed some of Boss Lion Hamilton's and Taitwister Hawkins' homemade ice cream and cookies.

It was voted to meet once more at the park, thus extending our appreciation for the fine meals served by the Methodist women throughout the year by giving them a well deserved rest.

The money which would ordinarily have gone for these meals will be sent to the Lion's Crippled Childrens Camp in Kerrville which is currently under construction. A report was given on the progress of this camp by the Boss Lion and it was explained that any crippled children from our community are eligible for use of this Lion's Camp after its completion. Facilities will include a large swimming pool, several dormitories, a mess hall, dispensary and lots of other conveniences designed especially for children who are crippled. There will be no expense to the children or their parents other than transportation to and from the camp, and at present there is no camp in Texas exclusively for crippled children. The Quitaque Lions Club is currently raising money among its members in order to have a hand in this \$300,000 program, which is expected to be completed sometime this fall.

The question was again raised as to the possibility of buying a sprayer for the city in order to combat flies and other insects. The Lions Club voted to furnish half the money for this if the city decides to purchase a sprayer.

The next meeting will be on Tuesday, Aug. 19, instead of Monday at the City Park. In charge of food for this meeting are Lions C. E. Anderson, Jr., Jake Merrell and Frank Dakil.

A Lion sweetheart will be elected and plans for reorganization of the Boy Scouts here are on the program, so all Lions are urged to attend. — Reporter

## PCA Directors And Secretaries Attend Meet

On Monday and Tuesday, July 28 and 29, the directors and secretary-treasurer of the Memphis Production Credit Association met at Fort Worth with the directors and secretary-treasurer of the Canadian Valley, Amarillo, Plainview, Lubbock, and Stamford Production Credit Associations, according to an announcement today by Otis Wilson, Director. This was one of a series of seven regional conferences of directors and secretary-treasurers of production credit associations being held over the state this summer.

According to Mr. Wilson, these conferences are in the nature of round-table discussions for the exchange of ideas. Each association selected one subject and conducted the discussion. Mr. J. C. Emmert of Wellington, director of the Memphis Production Credit Association, led the discussion on their part of the program. Other directors of the association are Mr. J. C. Franks of Flomot, Mr. Otis Wilson of Quitaque, Mr. L. J. Naiford of Estelline, and Mr. L. M. Bartlett of Childress. Some of the subjects discussed at this meeting were "Credit," "Improving Public Relations," "Serving the Territory," and "Should PCAs Advertise?"

The Memphis Association, like the other 35 in Texas, is entirely owned and operated by its farmer-rancher members. It was organized in 1934 to make crop, livestock, and all sorts of agricultural production loans in Collingsworth, Childress, Hardeman, Foard, Cottle, Motley, Briscoe, Hall and Donley counties.

Also attending the meeting were Virgil P. Lee, President, Sam N. Hardy, Vice-President and Thomas V. Merrell, Secretary-Treasurer of the Production Credit Corporation of Houston; W. J. McAnelly, President of the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of Houston, and E. J. Kyle of Bryan and J. B. Humphrey of Old Glory, directors on the Farm Credit Board of Houston.

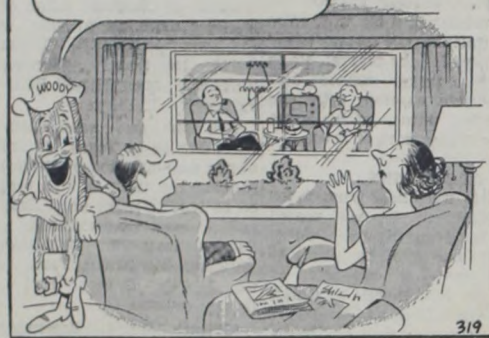

**HOUSE JOINT**

**RESOLUTION NO. 38**

providing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by the addition of a new Section to be known as Section 50a, providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Board and a State Medical Scholarship Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine; providing that such students shall agree to practice in rural areas of this State; providing certain restrictions and limitations; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 50a which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 50a. The Legislature shall create a State Medical Education Board to be composed of not more than six (6) members whose qualifications, duties and terms of office shall be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall also establish a State Medical Education Fund and make adequate appropriations therefor to be used by the State Medical Education Board to provide grants, loans or scholarships to students desiring to study medicine and agreeing to practice in the rural areas of this State, upon such terms and conditions as shall be prescribed by law. The term 'rural areas' as used

in this Section shall be defined by law."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1952, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the machines shall provide for) the following:

"For the Constitutional Amendment providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine."

"Against the Constitutional Amendment providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such amendment shall be paid out of proper appropriation made by law.
