## Edna Hawkins Appointed To Serve As Commissioner Until November Election

Mrs. Edna Hawkins has been appointed to fill the vacancy created by the death of her husband, Mr. Mort Hawkins, who was County Commissioner of Precinct No. 2, according to Briscoe County Judge M. G. Moreland.

Mrs. Hawkins will serve until the General Election on November 3. Judge Moreland stated that the appointment was made by him in accordance with Art. 2341.

Mrs. Hawkins has stated that she will not be a candidate for the office.

Judge Moreland said that prospective candidates for the office of Commissioner of Precinct No. 2, Briscoe County, have until Tuesday, April 7, to get their name on the ballot.

## MORT HAWKINS DIES FROM HEART ATTACK

Mort Hawkins died about 1:30 P. M. last Friday while driving his pickup at the east end of Main Street, a victim of a heart attack, as ruled by Justice of the Peace J. W. Ewing. His pickup collided with another pickup parked at the curb in front of the Blacksmith and Welding Shop, just west of Blankenship Grocery. Witnesses to the accident reported, however, that Mr. Hawkins was stricken before the collision because they saw him slump over the steering wheel just before his own vehicle veered in toward the other pickup.

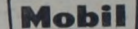

Waterways are natural or man-made water courses that are protected from washing by a grass cover. They are used as safe outlets for diversions and terraces and to carry outside water through farms.  
The best location for a waterway is a natural drain. Usually

If a waterway can not be located in a natural drain, it is best to put it along a field boundary. This is usually more expensive because of the cost of shaping.

A waterway should be wide enough to carry runoff from the largest rain expected once every ten years. It should be

shaped to spread water out and prevent it from running too deep at any one place.

A waterway should be worked into a good seedbed to control weeds and prepare the soil for grass planting. A dead litter crop should be sown to provide temporary protection from erosion and to protect grass seedlings. If the dead litter crop begins to mature seed, it should be mowed to a height of 6 to 10 inches. Hay could be harvested. It is best not to graze a cover crop.

When a waterway is shaped too late to plant a dead litter crop, cotton burs or other mulch material can be used. At least three tons of burs per acre should be applied. Two and one-half tons of fine stem hay would provide adequate cover. Barnyard manure mixed with hay or straw could be used. Mulch material should be applied just before planting.

It is best to use native grasses when seeding a waterway. Weeds should be shredded or sprayed to protect young grasses. Native grasses are usually seeded at this time of the year. Abuse and neglect are the most common causes of failures in establishing waterways. It

takes little care to keep a waterway functioning properly. Waterways pay by preventing erosion.

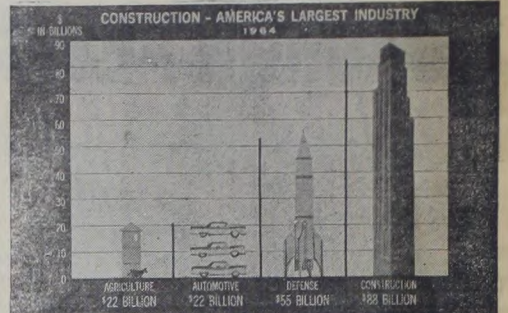

Agriculture will contribute \$22 billion to the gross national product — total value of all goods and services — produced in 1964. That will equal all the GNP money generated by the automotive industry which is also estimated at \$22 billion in 1964, as shown by the above chart.

National defense will account for \$55 billion GNP dollars in 1964, according to an early analysis of the construction market by Johns-Manville Corporation, world-wide manufacturer and distributor of building products. Construction, now America's largest industry, will put a whopping \$88 billion into circulation — an amount equal to one seventh of the \$615 billion gross national product forecast for the same period and very close to equalling in GNP dollar value the combined output of all three next largest industries — national defense, the automotive industry and agriculture, the J-M market analysis shows.

Farmers will spend some \$1.225 billion on farm construction of all kinds, the J-M market analysis estimates, with another \$6.7 billion going for new highways, many of which will improve road nets over which farmers get their produce to market.
