LaMaster Is Candidate For Congressional Post

The Post has been authorized to announce the candidacy of LeRoy (Pete) LaMaster of Perryton for the office of Congressman from the 18th District of Texas, subject to the Democratic primaries.

In making his announcement as a candidate for Congressman Mr. LaMaster declared "I would like all the people in your area to know that I have come out with the platform 'Honest Representation For All The People,' and will assure them that I am sincere in this desire.

"If elected, I intend to serve the entire district as honestly as possible and to the best of my ability in all matters. I have spent considerable time during the past few years trying to keep abreast of the problems in this district, also national and international problems.

"While I am not a fanatic on church work, I do sincerely believe that there is a definite need for spiritual guidance and assistance in the duties of this office, as there is in any person's personal life, and if I am elected, I intend to ask for such guidance."

J. D. McCutchen To Be Reburied At Silverton

Re-interment services will be held Sunday afternoon at Silverton for Lt. J. D. McCutchen, who was killed in action on August 24, 1944, while serving with the U. S. Air Corps in England.

The body will arrive in Tulia at 11:20 Sunday morning, April 2. Services will be conducted at the Baptist Church in Silverton with interment in the Silverton cemetery, under direction of the Douglas-Daniel Funeral Home. Rev. G. A. Elrod, Baptist pastor, will officiate.

Mrs. T. E. McCutchen, mother of Lt. McCutchen, was living at Quitaque when she was notified on Sept. 5, 1944 that her son was missing in action since August 24, from his base in England. He was a bombardier on a B-29 Liberator, and his plane failed to report back to the base from a flight over Germany. The family was notified sometime before Christmas of 1949, that his body had been located, it was reported to The Post.

Lt. McCutchen was 23 years old when he was killed. He graduated from the Quitaque schools, and volunteered for military service in 1939.

He went overseas in October, 1943, first to Italy and then to England.

Survivors are his wife and two children a son, Terry David and daughter Karen Dee, who was born on D-Day, June 6, 1944; his mother Mrs. T. E. McCutchen and sister Mrs. H. B. McClendon of Lubbock and a brother A. T. (Slats) McCutchen of Plainview.

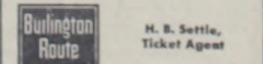

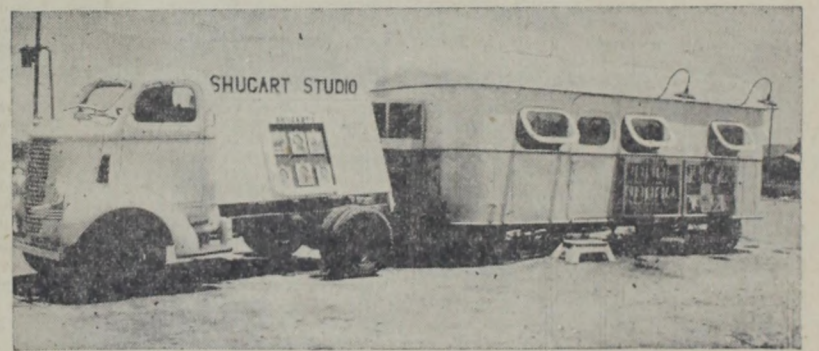
