Mrs. T. E. McCutchen, mother of Lt. McCutchen, was living at Qui-taque when she was notified on Sept. 5, 1944 that her son was mis-sing in action since August 24, from his base in England. He was a bombardier on a B-29 Liberator, and his plane failed to report back and his plane tailed to report back to the base from a flight over Ger-many. The family was notified sometime before Christmas of 1949, that his body had been located, it was reported to The Post. Lt. McCutchen was 23 years old when he was killed. He graduated from the Outgoing schools and

from the Quitaque schools, and volunteered for military service in 1939


He went overseas in October, 1943, first to Italy and then to England.
