Leaf Spot on rampage In Briscoe County

Cotton insects have done little damage to cotton this year, especially late season insects such as the bollworm and leafworm. This is all good news to the cotton farmer, but another cotton adversary has been on the rampage in Briscoe County this year. This is a disease of cotton known as Bacterial Blight or Angular Leaf Spot. Leaf Spot or blight whichever you prefer to call it, is a bacterial disease that is little control for. It has increased at a very fast rate the past three years. It caused a large part of the cotton to be a spotted grade last year and is going to do the same this year. Hardly a field in the county is free of the disease. It causes small bolls and squares to fall off and stains the lint on the larger bolls. Leaf Spot is easily identified by the small purple colored spots on the

Quitaque Watershed Program Now Underway

A few days ago a new watershed bill was signed which throws the Quitaque Watershed Program wide open. Last year, after the Kent Creek portion of our watershed was given top priority and declared among the top 16 in Texas, Secretary Benson practically killed the whole program by declaring that local groups had to pay 60 to 90 percent of the construction costs. The new bill just passed does

away with all this and could be of great benefit to this area.

Under the new bill the Federal Government pays the entire costs of structures and other works needed to complete the watershed. The farmers and ranchers furnish the sites and may irrigate from the dams if desired.

The dams may be larger than before; in fact, single structures may go as high as 25,000 ac-

res. This is larger than is needed to place a dam across Quitaque Creek, but Federal payments are available only on structures up to five-thousand acre feet. If larger dams are desired for irrigation they may be built larger and the Government will lend the necessary money over a 50-year repayment period.

The work on the watersheds will be done by local contractors and engineers, and work can begin just as soon as the watershed plan is okayed.

In a phone call Wednesday by the First National Bank to the State Soil Conservation Board in Temple, they were advised to submit the application on the Kent Creek portion of the watershed and the board felt reasonably sure it would pass again without any trouble. They will be informed in a few days concerning the Cottonwood Creek Watershed and will be given further instructions as to how to proceed.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1956.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 23, proposing an amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, so as to change the membership of the Veterans' Land Board, so that the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board shall be increased to Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000), providing for the issuance of such bonds or obligations on the conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund, providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows:

"Section 49-b. There is hereby created a Board to be known as the Veterans' Land Board, which shall be composed of the Commissioner of the General Land Office, and two citizens of the State who shall be appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate. The Governor shall biennially appoint one such member to serve for a term of four years, with the initial appointments to the Board under this section to be for terms of two and four years, respectively, and all subsequent appointments to be according to provisions of this section. One such appointive member shall be well versed in veterans' affairs and the other such appointive member shall be well versed in financial affairs. The Commissioner of the General Land Office shall act as Chairman of the Board and shall be the administrator of the Veterans' Land Program under such terms and restrictions as may be now or hereafter provided by law. The compensation for said appointive members shall be as fixed by the Legislature, and each shall make bond in such amount as may be determined by the Legislature. The Veterans' Land Board may issue not to exceed Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veterans' Land Fund. Such bonds shall be executed by said Board as an obligation of the State of Texas, in such form, denominations, and upon the terms as are now provided by law, or as may hereafter be provided by law. It is provided, however, that the rate of interest on such bonds shall be a rate of interest not to exceed three per cent (3%) per annum, and that the same shall be sold for not less than par value and accrued interest.

"In the sale of any such bonds, a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various Teacher Retirement Funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent School Funds; such bonds to be issued as needed, in the opinion of the Veterans' Land Board. The Veterans' Land Fund shall be used by the Board for the sole purpose of purchasing lands suitable for the purpose hereinafter stated, situated in this State, (a) owned by the United States, or any governmental agency thereof; (b) owned by the Texas Prison System, or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas; or (c) owned by any person, firm, or corporation.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1956.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 24, proposing an amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, so as to provide that the Commissioner of the General Land Office in each county may levy whatever sums may be necessary for general fund purposes, road and bridge purposes and jury purposes so long as the total of these tax rates does not exceed Eighty Cents (80c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year, and providing for the necessary election and form of ballot; and providing for the necessary election and form of ballot; and providing for the necessary election and form of ballot.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 4. The State tax on property, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall not exceed Eighty Cents (80c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation, and no county, city or town shall levy a tax in excess of Eighty Cents (80c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year for general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund purposes.

"FOR the Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas to change the membership of the Veterans' Land Board; increasing the Veterans' Land Fund by \$100,000,000; said fund to be used for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans of World War II and to Texas veterans of service in the Armed Forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945, such funds shall be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law; and

"AGAINST the Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas to change the membership of the Veterans' Land Board; increasing the Veterans' Land Fund by \$100,000,000; said fund to be used for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans of World War II and to Texas veterans of service in the Armed Forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945. Such funds shall be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law.

"If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the voters cast were in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective from the date set forth in said amendment, and the Governor shall issue a proclamation in keeping therewith.

"Sec. 3. Should the Legislature pass legislation with regard to this amendment prior to its adoption, it shall not be valid because of its anticipatory nature.

"Sec. 4. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue a proclamation in keeping therewith for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

"Sec. 3. Should the Legislature pass legislation with regard to this amendment prior to its adoption, it shall not be valid because of its anticipatory nature.

"Sec. 4. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue a proclamation in keeping therewith for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

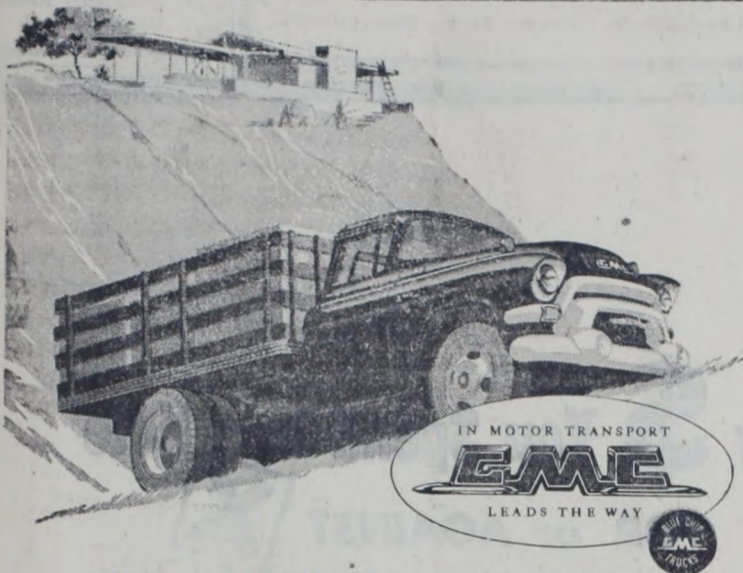

Turkey, also visited here Sunday. **7th of August For Last Watering Date**—By County Agent Ledbetter—Many Briscoe County farmers are finishing their watering for this year's cotton crop. Many that have been questioned by the County Agent are trying to finish this week. As it stands now Briscoe County farmers should make a very good crop on their irrigated acreage and will do fairly well on dry-land cotton. The middle of Aug-

ust is recommended by the Lubbock Experiment Station to finish watering irrigated cotton. This gives the cotton a chance to mature and be a good quality open cotton that will be ready to harvest immediately after frost, reported County Agent Ledbetter, Mr. Isaac Holmes of Abernathy, Hale County made this statement to the American Cotton Congress in Lubbock earlier this year. "Quote" I try to complete watering my cotton by the 7th of August as this permits me to have my cotton ready to harvest soon after the first frost. I start my cotton stripper as soon as the leaves will crumble. I usually get two or three grades better cotton by not watering late. For example, last year everybody thought my cotton was ruined. I thought it too, but I ginned 83 bales on 52.4 acres and actually had a higher turnout, better grades, and heavier yield than my neighbors that watered late." These are remarks that Mr. Holmes made recently at the National Cotton Congress. These are the thoughts of many Briscoe County farmers reported County Agent Ledbetter and the time is coming faster every year that more and more Briscoe County farmers will machine harvest stripper types of cotton. (Continued from Page 1) leaves. Leaves that are badly affected will drop off. Bolls that are affected will have a small greasy round spot on them that will discolor the lint.

Fields that have been in cotton year after year are the worst hit. Cotton that has been rotated with grain sorghum or any other type crop shows little damage from leaf spot. One field on the Bill Long farm that had little or no damage had been rotated with sorghum and Mr. Long reported that he did not plant cotton on the same ground over two years in a row. In many other fields this was evident. Fields that were rotated did not have the leaf spot that fields that had been in cotton year after year.

Agriculture Experiment Station this year is tolerant to leafspot. This new variety is superior to Stormmaster and on the Allen Kellum farm where it is being grown for the first time there is no visible damage from Bacterial Blight at this time. Mr.

"PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1956"

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 3 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Section 43a, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to authorize needed changes in and revision of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas; providing that this section shall not amend, alter, or repeal Section 63 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas as adopted November, 1954, or any enabling legislation passed pursuant thereto; providing for the necessary election form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 43a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 43a. In addition to the powers given the Legislature under Section 48, Article III, it shall have the right to levy taxes to establish a fund to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for persons employed in the public schools, colleges and universities supported wholly or partly by the State; provided that the amount contributed by the State to such fund each year shall be equal to the aggregate amount required by law to be paid into the fund by such employees, and shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid each such person by the State and/or school districts, and shall in no case (1) ever exceed the sum of Five Hundred Four Dollars (\$504.00) for any such person; and provided that no person shall be eligible for retirement who has not rendered ten years of creditable service in such employment, and in no case shall any person retire before either attaining the age fifty-five (55) or completing thirty (30) years of creditable service, but shall be entitled to refund of moneys paid into the fund.

"The Legislature may authorize all moneys coming into such fund to be invested in bonds or other evidences of indebtedness of the United States, or of this State, or any county, city, school district, or other municipal corporation or district as are now or hereafter may be permitted by law as investments for the Permanent University Fund or for the Permanent School Fund of this State; provided a sufficient sum shall be kept on hand to meet payments as they become due each year under such retirement plan, as may be provided by law; and provided that the recipients of such retirement fund shall not be eligible for any other State pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless such other State pension or retirement fund, contributed by the State, is released to the State of Texas as a donation to receiving such other pension aid; providing, however, that this section shall not amend, alter, or repeal Section 43 of Article III of the Constitution of Texas as adopted November, 1954, or any enabling legislation passed pursuant thereto."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words: "FOR the constitutional amendment empowering the Legislature to revise the existing Teacher Retirement System and to broaden the benefits to employees of public schools, colleges, and universities supported wholly or partly by the State, authorizing that the State's contributions for such purposes shall equal contributions by such employees and providing that they do not exceed six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid each such employee by the State or school district or the sum of Five Hundred Four Dollars (\$504.00) for each year for any such employee, regulating the eligibility of such employees for retirement benefits and prescribing the manner of investing money accruing to the retirement fund."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment empowering the Legislature to revise the existing Teacher Retirement System and to broaden the benefits to employees of public schools, colleges, and universities supported wholly or partly by the State, authorizing that the State's contributions for such purposes shall equal contributions by such employees and providing that they do not exceed six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid each such employee by the State or school district or the sum of Five Hundred Four Dollars (\$504.00) for each year for any such employee, regulating the eligibility of such employees for retirement benefits and prescribing the manner of investing money accruing to the retirement fund."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment, if it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the voters cast were in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective from the date of determination of such result and the Governor's proclamation thereof.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said special election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.
