



City and School Elections Set for April 2

Absentee balloting in the upcoming city and school elections to be held on Saturday, April 2, began Monday, March 14th through Wednesday, March 29th. Voters who plan to be out of town on election day are urged to cast their absentee ballot, prior to the deadline.

It is the duty of every citizen in the community to voice their opinion in choosing their candidate on the ballot by casting

their vote for the man they think will operate both the city and school business affairs to the best of their ability while serving the community.

In the city election the mayor's position and two councilman's spots are to be selected with Doyle Mosbey and Rickey White running unopposed for the position of city councilmen.

The mayor's race will be the only position with interest to the

voters with three men running for the mayor's seat on the ballot.

David Monteith, 18 year old senior at Shallowater High School, 48 year old W.C. "Bell" Boone, owner and operator of Boone Signs and Joe Cox, 50 year old Chief of Operations for the Southern Division of the Canadian River Municipal Authority, all vying for the mayor's position. This is the first time for Monteith or Boone to seek public

office while Cox is completing a two year term as councilman for the city. Present mayor, Jack DuLaney chose not to run for re-election, having served a two year term as mayor and as councilman prior to that.

On the Shallowater Independent School District board election, incumbents Jay Stanton and Butch Pair are both running unopposed on the ballots. Resumes of all the candidates follows:

Doyle Mosbey

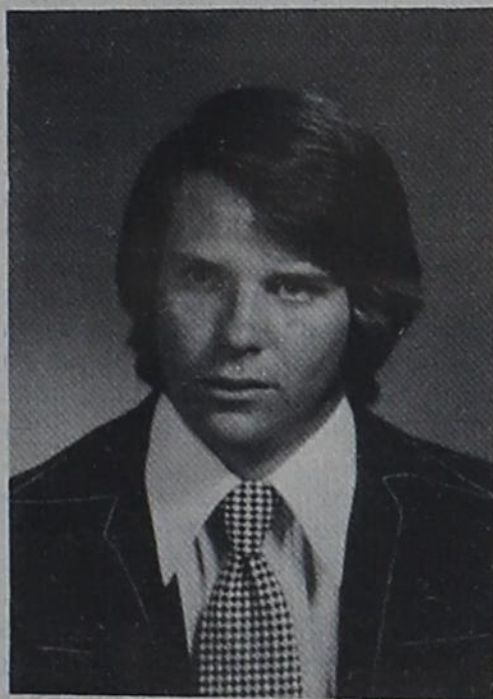
A resident of Shallowater since Sept. 1959, Doyle Mosbey is completing his first two year term as councilman and is running unopposed for his position.

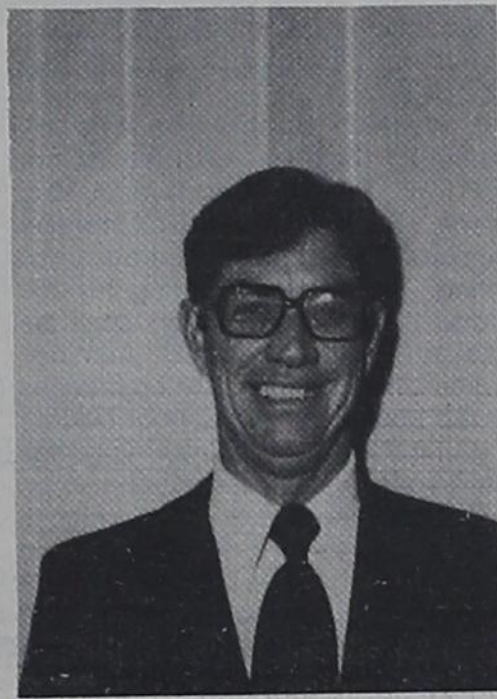

Absentee voting begins Monday, March 14, 1977, through Tuesday, March 29, the school

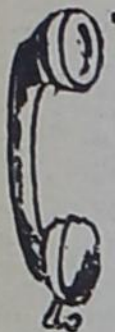

The polls at the above designated polling places shall on election day be open from 7:00 o'clock a.m. to 7:00 o'clock p.m.

4. Mrs. Mary Ruth Walker is hereby appointed Clerk for absentee voting, and Mrs. Peggy Coward and Mrs. Wana Beth Cook are hereby appointed Deputy Clerks for absentee voting.

The absentee voting for the above designated election shall be held at Shallowater I.S.D. Administration offices within the boundaries of the above named School District and said place of absentee voting shall remain open for at least eight hours on each day for absentee voting which is not a Saturday, a Sunday, or an official State holiday, beginning on the 20th day and continuing through the 4th day preceding the date of said election.

Said place of voting shall remain open between the hours of 9 a.m. and 3 p.m. on each day for said absentee voting. The above described place for absentee voting is also the absentee Clerk's mailing address to which ballot applications and ballots voted by mail shall be sent.

4-H Meeting Scheduled for April 15-17

The annual Texas 4-H Leader Forum will be held at the Texas 4-H Center, Lake Brownwood, on April 15 through 17, 1977. This fun-filled and information-packed event is planned by Texas' 4-H leaders and is sponsored by their 4-H Volunteer Leader's Association.

"All 4-H club and project adult leaders in Lubbock County are invited to register for this Leader Forum," Georgia Doherty, local County Extension Agent points out. "Forum participants from throughout the State will hear Dr. Eddie Amend, Assistant Director for the Wyoming Agricultural Extension Service, and Mr. Fred McClure, Student Body President from Texas A&M University, discuss several topics including 'Leading For What?' and 'The Obstacle Course,'" Miss Doherty adds.

Forum participants also will receive 4-H tips from a youth panel, films, displays, group sessions, and informal exchanged. "One of the recreation highlights will be a 'tacky costume' party on Friday evening," Miss Doherty notes.

Reese to Host Bowling Tourney

Reese Air Force Base will host an Open Handicap Bowling Tournament at the Reese Lanes on base on Saturday and Sunday, April 30 and May 1, 1977.

The event is open to all bowlers, both military and civilian in the Lubbock area.

How People Become Members Of The New Testament Church
The purpose of Baptism. Baptism is an essential part of man's obedience in order to effect the remission of sins. It is a part of the law of pardon which alien sinners must obey from the heart. Baptism is essential for salvation from sin.

(1) Jesus connects baptism with salvation (Mk. 16:16, 17). Notice "He That Believeth and Is Baptized Shall Be Saved." It does not say that he that believeth is saved and can be baptized later. Who is the HE that shall be saved? He that believeth AND IS baptized. That is what is taught in other places in the New Testament.

(2) Peter teaches baptism for the remission of sins (Acts 2:38). Remissions means forgiveness or pardon. Salvation is from sin. Men are saved when their sins are forgiven. Since baptism is FOR forgiveness of sins then men must be baptized to be forgiven. Baptism is a part of the law of pardon which must be obeyed from the heart.

Going On Vacation?

I hope all of you get a chance to get away and relax a little. Unfortunately, if we come home and find our house burglarized, our vacation can be quickly ruined. How about a few tips to prevent this from happening? You probably have thought of most of them, but maybe something new will appear. Keep this as a checklist of things to do before you leave home.

1. Insure all windows and doors are locked. Have someone else in the family doublecheck.
2. Cancel all newspapers and deliveries.
3. Have a close friend, neighbor or relative collect mail, cut grass and keep the yard neat.
4. Leave some drapes and curtains partially open or open to make the house look lived in. These can be changed frequently by a friend or relative.
5. Notify the police that you will be gone, when you are leaving and when you expect to return. What lights will be on, what cars around, and if anyone will be mowing grass, going inside, and about how often.
6. Keep some lights on, electric timers that turn lights on and off are of great value.
7. Have a neighbor park their car in your drive occasionally, to make it appear someone is home.
8. Have a neighbor report any strange people or events around your home.
9. You might have a friend or relative turn on a radio or television for a couple of hours every once in a while.
10. Don't do things that aren't normal, for instance a television on at four in the morning or a bedroom light that comes on at three in the morning, unless this is normal.

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11. Don't advertise your absence by newspaper or radio or talk about your planned absence in public.
12. You may want to secure valuables in a safety deposit box, with a friend or relative or other secure place.
13. Caution your children about telling their friends and others of your absence.
14. Participate in operation identification.
15. Leave if possible an emergency number or place where you can be contacted in case of fire or a breakin occurs, time will not be lost.

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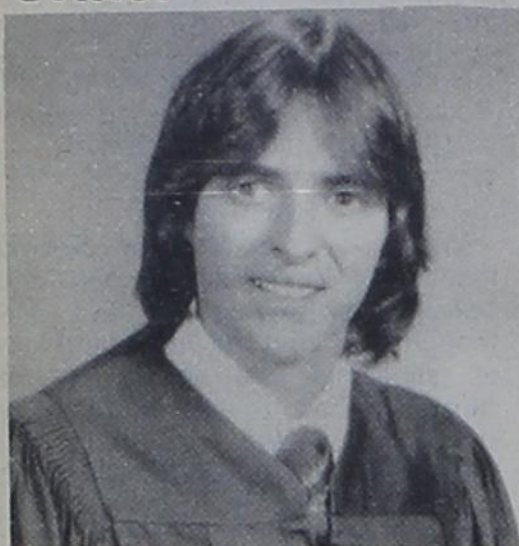

Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor:

I am writing this letter out of concern for my country these United States of America.

"Wake Up America"

We need to get back to the Bible and the "In God We Trust." I am just a small town gospel preacher in Shallowater, Tex. But I am very concerned about this thing called E.R.A. I am concerned for the families of this world. And the homes of this world. Our forefathers built this country with God's help. In God We Trust the very foundation of the constitution.

God should be the center point of our homes and lives, (but is he?) America let's seek the kingdom of God Matthew 6:33; Romans 8:31. Jesus is the hope of the world.

Here are some facts and biblical teachings concerning the E.R.A.

"Bible believing people of all walks of life, both male and female should be aware of the serious consequences which could result from the ratification of the Federal Equal Rights Amendment (E.R.A.) ... The force of this proposed Amendment to our Constitution, if adopted, would seriously affect the home, the foundation of society, and traditional values of womanhood and manhood, as well as the religious freedom of many churches and religious institutions ... I believe this would be a very tragic and far-reaching law which would turn our society into a mess as well as seriously hamper the Cause of Christ and the church and throw our traditional moral values out the window ... I do not oppose the idea of "equal pay for equal work" or the concept that a woman has a right to work in this society. Neither do others who are opposing the E.R.A. ... We believe in women's rights!!! The E.R.A., however, would take away many special rights and privileges already granted women in America. People better take another look at this thing!!! Trying to advance the cause of women by means of the E.R.A. is like trying to kill a fly with an axe. You destroy the furniture and the house in the process. Let us be careful and investigate all the ramifications of this proposed amendment. I am opposed to tearing down Biblical and traditional teachings about father and mother, husband and wives and the function of the home in our society!!! ... And I think most people are opposed to it, too ... The E.R.A. in its present form is well on its way to declaring male and female equal, that is to say the same or identical ... it allows no distinction of the sexes ... and thus fosters the unisex idea which is absolutely anti-scriptural and anti-God. God created and made a distinction between the sexes, Gen. 1:27. Remember the Old Testament warning that "the woman shall not wear that which pertaineth to a man, neither shall a man put on a woman's garment for all that do so are an abomination unto the Lord God, Deut. 22:5 ... God has always demanded a distinction between the sexes, even to the point of women having longer hair, and men having short hair, 1 Cor. 11:14, 15 ... While attempting to provide "equality for women" the amendment would in reality threaten to destroy the special rights and privileges already extended to women. The ERA could prove to be a springboard to many strange, immoral and distasteful practices ... Those who believe and follow the Bible cannot conscientiously support the E.R.A. ... The Bible teaches!!!

- I. The Bible teaches that a husband has certain specific responsibilities
 - (1) He is to be the head of the house, Eph. 5:23, Eph. 6:4; cf. Gen. 3:16
 - (2) He is to earn the living for the family, 1 Tim. 5:8
 - (3) He is to give honor to the wife as unto the weaker vessel, 1 Pet. 3:7.
 - (4) He is to love his wife even as himself, Eph. 5:25, 28.
 - (5) He is to help in the rearing of the children, Eph. 6:1ff

- II. The Bible teaches that wives, likewise, have certain duties and responsibilities before God ...
 - (1) She is to love her husband, Titus 2:4 ...
 - (2) She is to obey her husband and be in subjection to him, Titus 2:4, 5; Eph. 5:22, 24; 1 Peter 3:1ff, cf. Gen. 3:16
 - (3) She is to be a keeper at home, Titus 2:4, 5
 - (4) She is to guide the house, 1 Tim. 5:14
 - (5) She is to bear children, 1 Tim. 5:14
 - (6) She is to reverence her husband, Eph. 5:33
 - (7) She was created to help man, Gen. 2:18.
- III. The Bible teaches that God has decreed a system of love, respect, authority and subjection. Male and female were created to fulfill differing purposes and these are specified by the Creator!!!
 - (1) God views men and women as "one" or "equal" in Christ, Gal. 3:28
 - (2) However, we still have different roles and responsibilities given by God. In 1 Cor. 11:3, we are told that God is the Head of Christ and Christ is the head of man and man is the head of woman. Thus we have GOD/Christ/man/woman ...
 - (3) A woman is not to teach or usurp authority over a man, 1 Tim. 2:11, 12
 - (4) Women are to remain silent in the church assembly, 1 Cor. 14:34, 35
 - (5) This is not to imply that women have no place in the work of the church ... Timothy (a preacher) was taught by his mother and grandmother, 2 Tim. 1:5 ... Phoebe was a great servant of the church, Rom. 16:1 ... Jesus Christ was assisted by women in His work, Matt. 15:22ff, Luke 10:38ff ... the apostle Paul was thankful for the help of many women in his work, Phil. 4:3 ... There is much instruction in the Bible to insure that widows in the church are properly cared for, Acts 6:1ff and 1 Tim. 5.
 - (6) We do not mean to imply that women have no place in the business world ... Lydia was a business woman (a seller of purple), Acts 16:14 Dorcas used her talents in the church, Acts 9:36ff ... One of the ideal descriptions of a woman in the Bible is found in Proverbs 31:10ff ... here a woman is commended for her great faith and industry.
- IV. The Bible teaches that men have the responsibility of leadership in the church and men are to take the lead in public worship ... Christ chose men as apostles and yet he greatly honored women ... Men were the preachers ... John the Baptist, Paul, Timothy, Titus, etc. ... 2 Tim. 2:2 ... Men (who were married) were commanded to be elders (pastors) of the church, 1 Tim. 3:1, 2; Titus 1:6 ... Men were selected to serve as deacons of the church, 1 Tim. 3:12; Acts 6:3.
- V. The Bible teaches that homosexuality is a sin ... The problem of legalizing the homosexual in society is another great and very real danger of the ERA, and this should be opposed by Bible-believing Christians. The ERA, if applied literally and fully would allow no discrimination in the basis of sex and would thus permit homosexual persons to move freely in society with no law being able to forbid their activities. They could "marry" (and have recently in Boulder, Colorado) and adopt children with the full support of the courts!!! The Bible teaches that homosexuality is a sin, 1 Cor. 6:9f, 1 Cor. 5:9f; Gal. 5:19 and Rom. 1:26ff. Note ... When the scriptures use the term "fornication" ... this includes "homosexuals" ... because "fornication" is properly defined to mean "any unlawful sex act" ... and the Bible teaches that homosexuality is unlawful!!!
 - ... It is later than we think!!!
