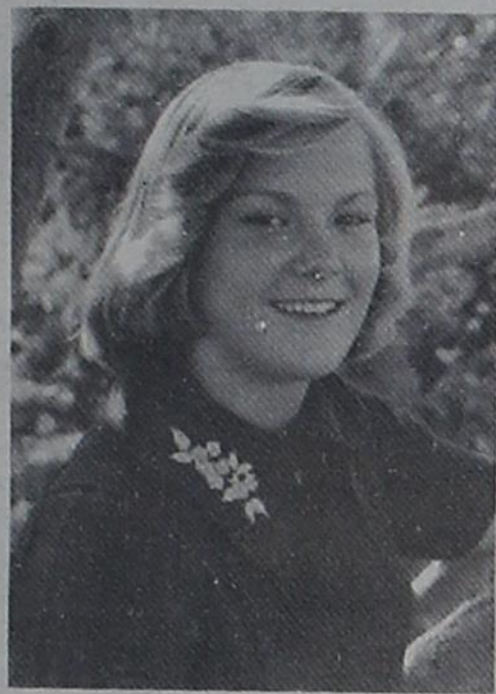
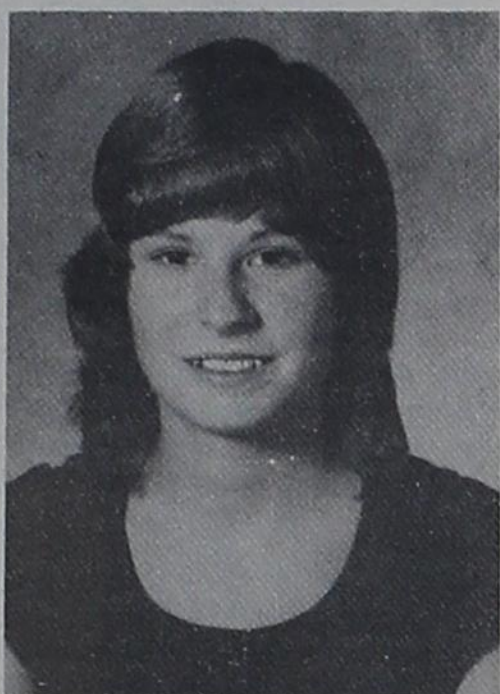


# Lions Club Harvest Festival Set Saturday

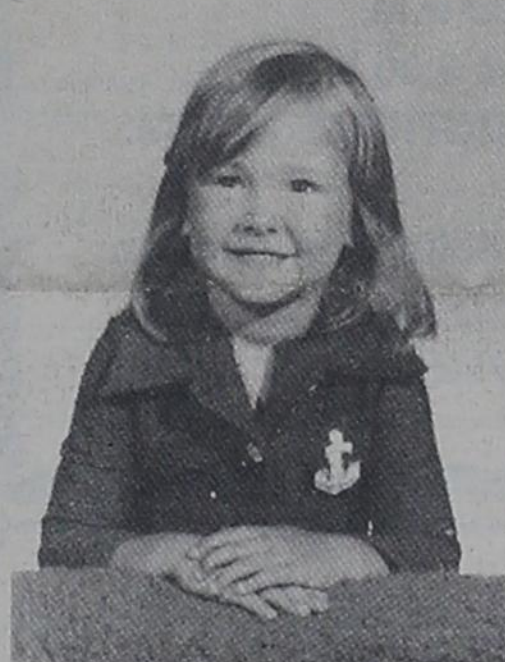

Reports due October 31 cover the July-August-September quarter. Forms for the reports were sent to all sales tax permit holders by Bullock's office in September.

"Late reports are usually nothing more than oversights but that doesn't keep them from being a problem anyhow", said Bullock.

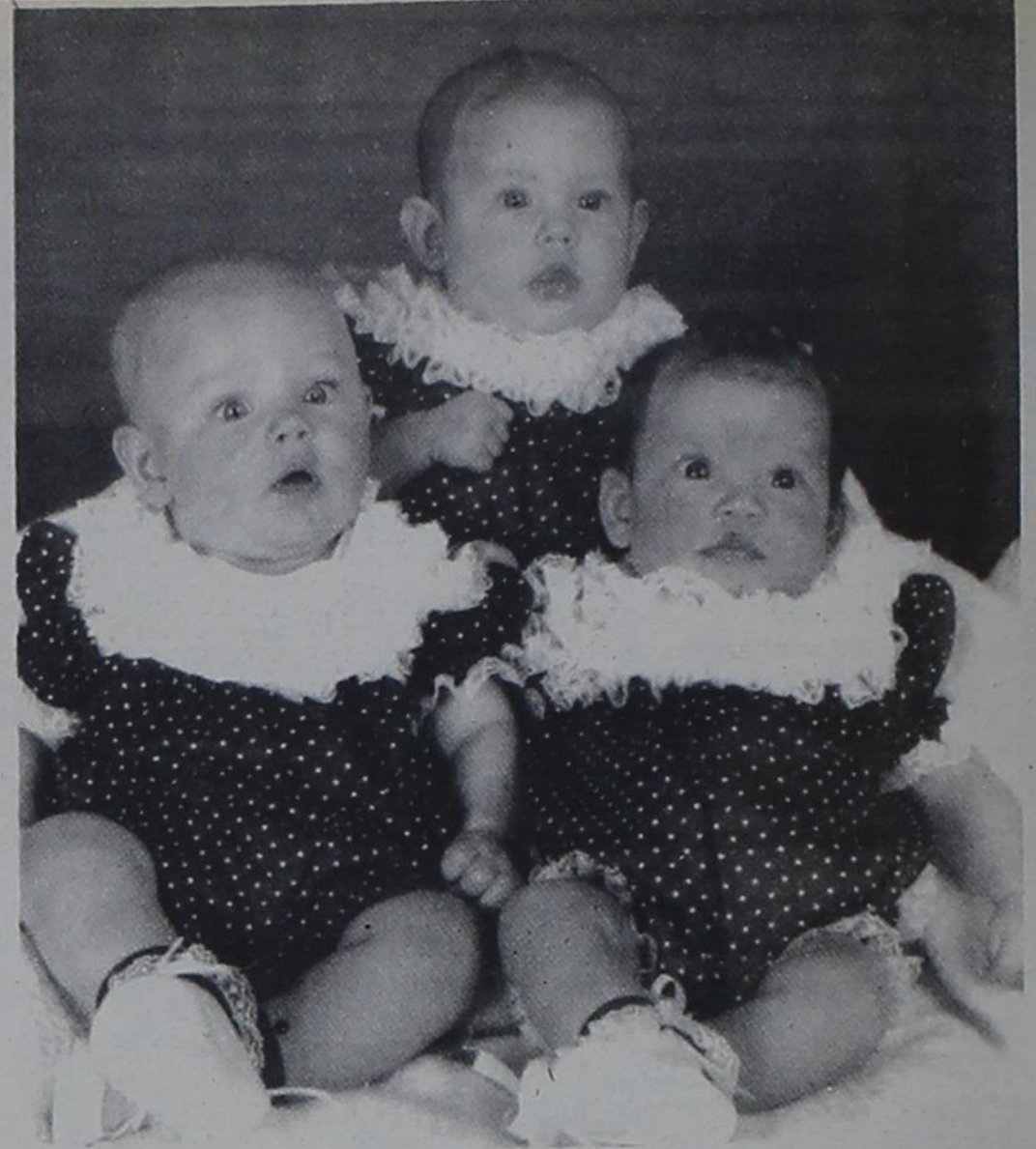
All proceeds from the festival will go to the projects sponsored and supported by the Shallowater Lions Club.

# Governor Proclaims Railroad Grade Crossing Safety Week

"Accidents at railroad grade crossings continue to claim many lives and result in significant property damage," said Governor Dolph Briscoe in proclaiming October 20-26 as Texas Railroad Grade Crossing Safety Week.

Statistics indicate that deaths due to collisions between automobiles and trains increased by 10 percent in 1974. The first half of 1975, however, the number of deaths has decreased by 22 percent compared to the same period last year.

The Texas Safety Association's Railroad Transportation Section, which represents most of the railroads of Texas, has long been active in this state-wide effort to reduce accidents at railroad grade crossings, and feels that the placement of the week comes at a critical time of the year. In the first half of 1974, deaths had decreased by 3 percent from the previous year. But by year's end, the comparative figure had turned instead to the aforementioned 10 percent increase. Therefore, Texas grade crossing safety efforts cannot rest on the laurels of the first half '75 22 percent decrease in the death count, but must increase their efforts to continue the drop.

In his proclamation, signed October 2, Governor Briscoe went on to stress that public awareness and cooperation, teamed with improved engineering of automatic protection devices at public grade crossings, should assure continued progress in the reduction of death and injuries.

"It is hoped that all Texans will join the Texas Safety Association in their effort to prevent grade crossing accidents by observing railroad crossing signs, signals and markings," concluded the Governor.

# SPC to Present Saturday Night Jamborees Beginning Oct 25th

"South Plains Country Jamboree" will make Saturday nights something memorable to area folks for a long time to come.

Beginning Oct. 25, South Plains College will sponsor a monthly jamboree featuring performances by country and western groups from throughout the South Plains area along with the College's own country and western band, "South Plains Country."

"The best of talent in the whole South Plains area will be invited to

participate," said Nathan Tubb, academic dean at SPC who made the announcement. "We are hoping to make this a community affair," Dean Tubb added. "We hope the townspeople will want to participate."

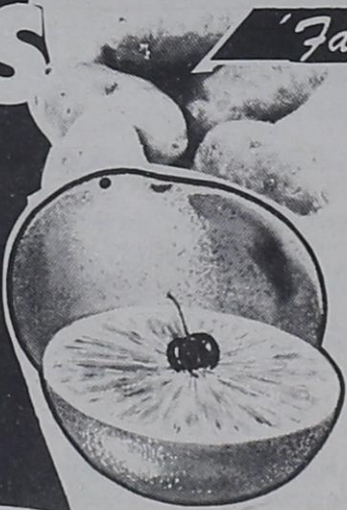

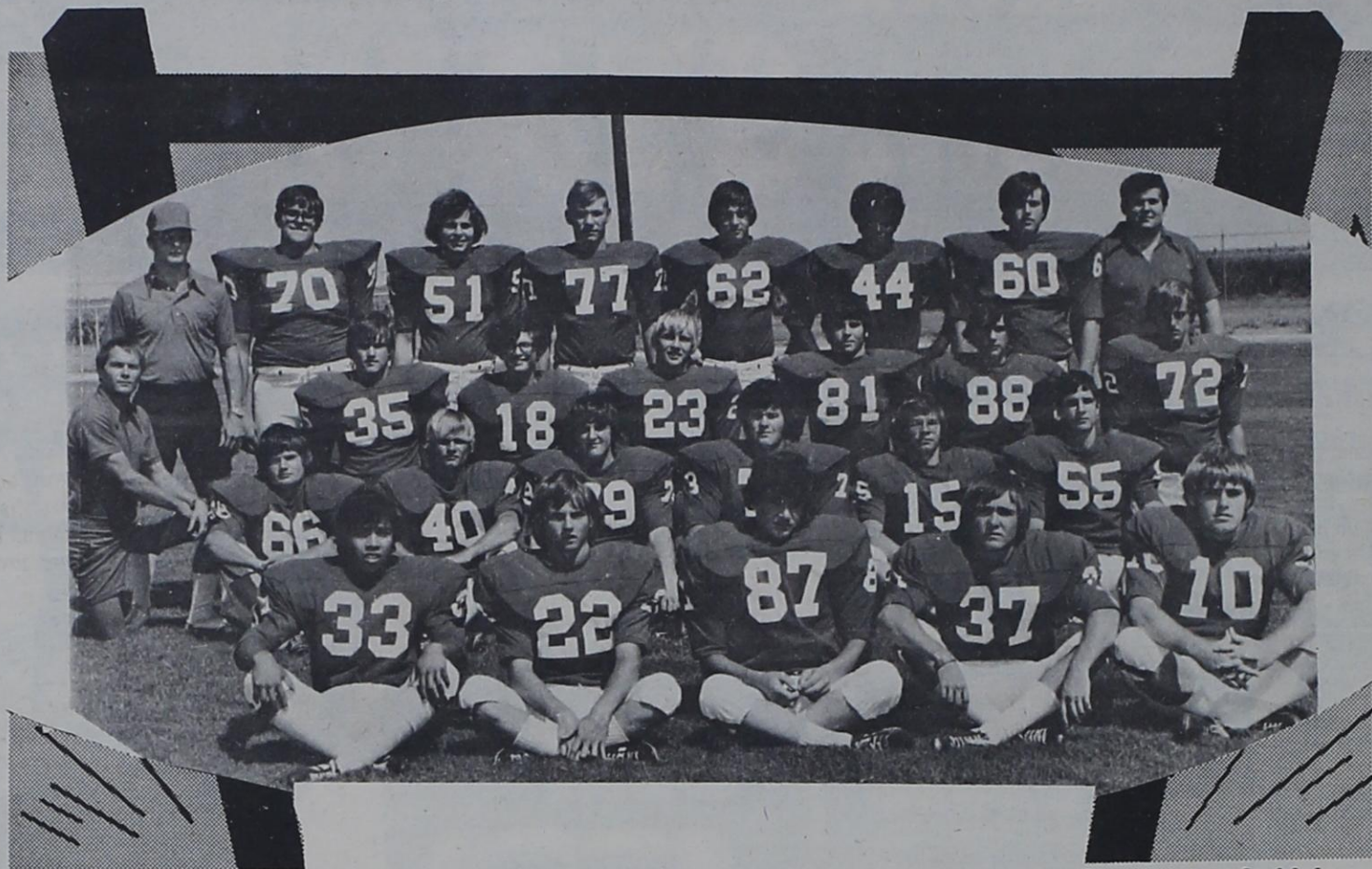

Steve Sloan slipped quietly into the Tech Media Room in the Rodeway Inn. It's doubtful that the handfull of writers gathering for his press conference after the Aggie game even knew he had come in. He fixed a sandwich, glanced around and finally was spotted.

Steve took a seat and, one by one, the others followed suit. He asked Ralph Carpenter for a set of game statistics, looked through them in silence. There was no expression on his face.

The coach slumped in his chair. He stared down. Once in a while there was a little shake of his head, followed by a thoughtful, brooding expression.

When the conference started, he paid tribute to the Aggies, opined that he thought the score really didn't show how close the teams were—and took the blame for not preparing the Raiders, including the turnovers, over which he had no control, of course.

I felt sorry for Steve Sloan. His first season was starting to crumble with three straight defeats, two of them by embarrassing margins and one, a bitter disappointment.

He showed it, both by demeanor and the way he slumped in his chair. You could almost read his mind. "Fundamentally, we're a good football team," he might have been thinking. "When are we going to put it all together and be a good football team?"

"When are we going to stop the costly turnovers? When are we going to be alert, to react? What do you have to do to have a winner?"

Steve, there's no magic formula for that. Keep your chin up. This is a trying season, but it's not the end of the world. Things will turn around, if not this year, next. The foundation, is being laid now. Your time will come. And West Texas fans aren't going to desert you. You're a winner and Tech will be, too.

For sheer irony, the 1975 Tech schedule could hardly have been more of a challenge to a new coach with a new system. For instance, Tech will this week face an undefeated team for the sixth time in as many starts.

Not only that, but four in a row have been rated in the top 20. That's a demanding schedule for any coach and squad, let alone a squad that is rebuilding, with a lot of inexperience. The enthusiasm is encouraging; only time will give the experience.

When the Cincinnati Reds rallied to beat Boston Sunday, they may well have insured a seven game series. This is being written Sunday and, of course, it might all end tonight.

I doubt it. The Red Sox are hustling. They're challenging the Reds. They're hitting well and they are running the bases. They've had two well pitched games. But Sunday's victory by the Reds alerted them that no game is won on the basis of seven and a half innings.

No one will ever know if the rain delay caused the Bosox loss. Bill Lee might have lost a slight edge. The delay may have given the Reds time to regroup. It rained, there was a delay, and the Reds won. "Ifs" don't count.

It's apparent though that these are two well matched clubs, that anything can happen. Both have power and yet, through two games, not a home run has been hit and doubles have not been too common. It's a great World Series.

Inevitably, Sloan was asked Saturday night to compare Texas and A&M. It's hardly a fair comparison because circumstances in the two games were not quite the same.

Still, his answer was a good one. He gave the edge to Texas on offense "by an inch" and about the same margin to A&M on defense.

"Turnovers and breaks could determine the outcome," he guessed.

Tech's game Saturday will be the next to the last non-conference affair, with only Utah State at Arkansas next week left. And last Saturday's 0-2 record hurt. Even if Tech and the Hogs both lose these games, the league will come out ahead—barely, 15-14.

After a glorious 7-2 start, the conference has posted a lacklustre 8-10 mark. Six of the losses have been to teams that were ranked in the top 20 at the time.

With Baylor slipping badly in its first league game, the race points more and more to a triangle involving Arkansas, Texas and A&M. The favorite? You pays your money and you takes your choice. All three obviously have credentials.

Tech and TCU have been eliminated already. SMU should be 2-0 after this week. And the BIG game, once again, is Texas at Arkansas. A loss or tie for either might be disastrous.

Arkansas won't be the team that Oklahoma State whipped, but it must have been buoyed by the victory over the Bears. Texas comes off a disheartening loss to Oklahoma, a loss that Texas contributed to by an unusual, for Texas, series of turnovers.

The game is played in the hills, a word that all too often strikes terror into opposing teams. It should be another classic battle and a key to the final champion.

A prediction? I'd rather predict the Democratic nominee for President in 1976!

Gerald Myers hasn't inhabited the football press box much this fall, something unusual for him. He's usually there, a big grin and a soft word that it's too early to tell.

Evans was at the smoker Friday night before the A&M game and, if not radiating confidence, was relaxed and easy. He, for one, is looking forward to the battle this season.

Singing is one of the joyful things in FHA. The piano was played by Laura Walker and song leader Connie Boone led in group singing.

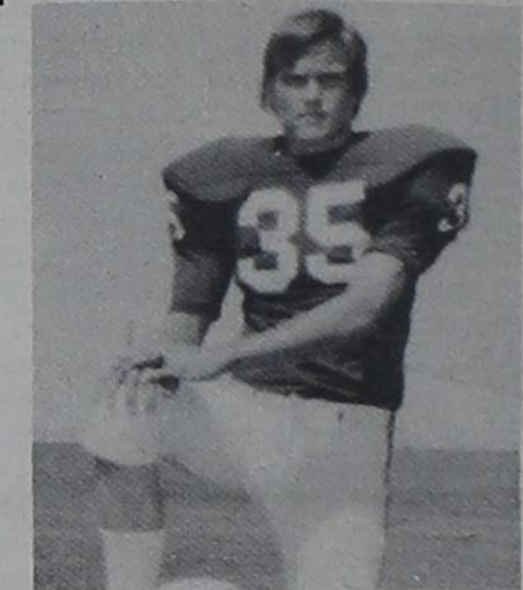
At the close of the ceremony Miss Gwen Avery and Miss Kelly Blackmon served refreshments to members and their guests.

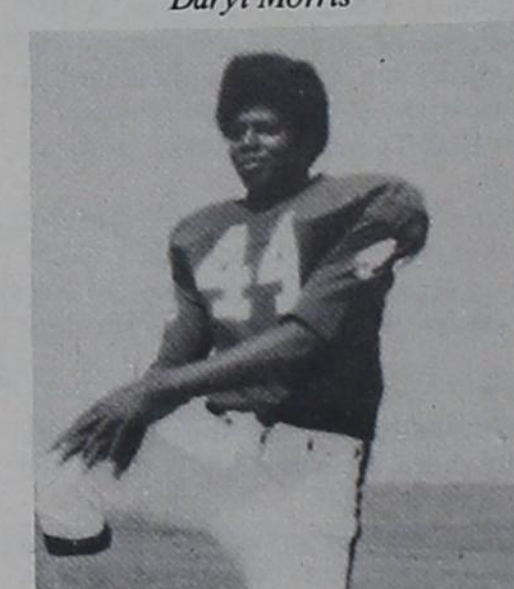

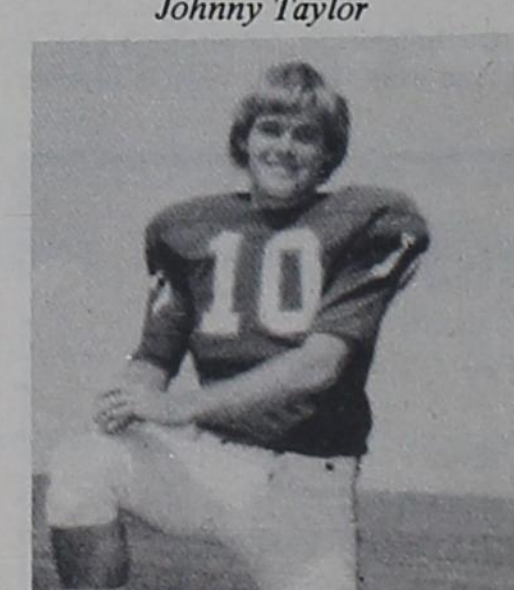
