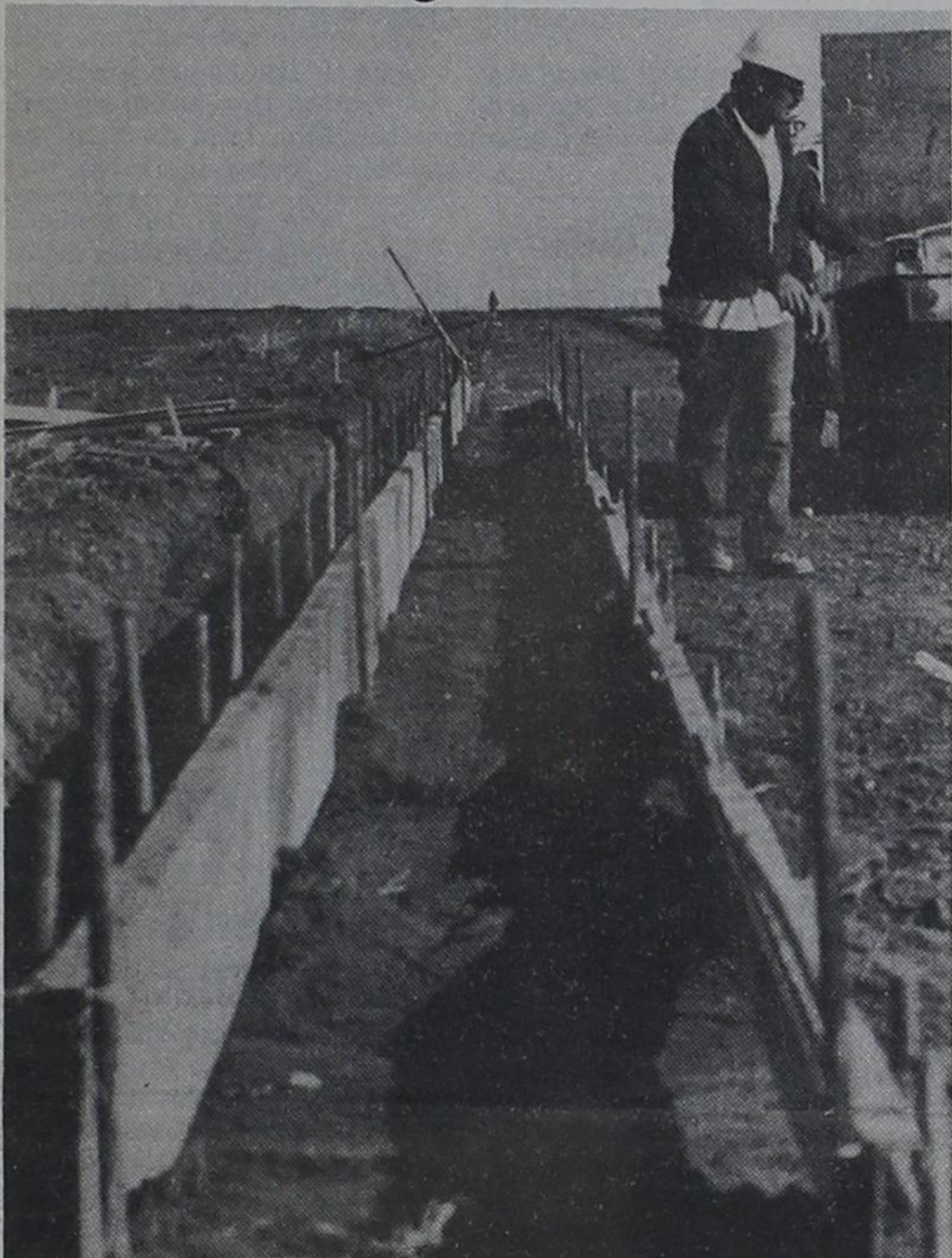


County Voters to Receive Registration Forms by Mail

Work to Begin Soon on New Subdivision

Pre-School, "Learning Tree" Opening in Shallowater

Plans to open a pre-school for children ages 2 to 6, are being made by Linda Haught, and will be located at 503 Avenue L.

Licensed for 25 children, date for enrolling will be Jan. 2 to 5 with classes starting on Jan. 5, 1976. The school will be open 5 days a week from 7 a.m. to 6 p.m.

Linda, who has a degree in nursing from Dimmit Nursing School, will be assisted in the school by social director, Sharon McDougal, who holds a degree in sociology from a college in California. Arts and science director will be Linda's mother, Mrs. Ruth Gorwitz and a grandmother of four children. Linda has had experience working with children in nursing homes and hospitals.

The children will be served a well balanced hot noon meal with snacks at 9:30 a.m. and 3 p.m. each day.

Approved and licensed by the State Health and Welfare Department and the Fire Marshall, the non-denominational, non-segregated school will have basic classes and the child will be able to acknowledge their ABC's, etc. when they begin first grade.

The children will be divided into age groups, having a home room and teacher. On Tuesdays tumbling will be taught and on Thursdays music will be taught by volunteer teachers from Texas Tech.

The school yard will be completely enclosed for the child's protection and there will be rest periods in the afternoon.

All national holidays will be observed by the school. Also included in the school plans will be outside science and projects relating to animals.

Work on a 10 acre 36 lot residential subdivision located on the east side of Shallowater, south of the high school football field, will begin by the end of December or beginning of January, Bill Stinson, of Stinson Incorporated, said Monday.

"We hope to start construction as soon as they finish the streets. What we're going to do is start the latter part of December or the first part of January," the realtor said.

Stinson said the homes will range in price from \$28,500 to \$35,000, and be "a minimum of 1300 square feet, all brick, with a two car garage attached. They'll be built conventionally and also under Federal Housing Administration and Veteran Administration loans."

"We're going to try to build some different plans and different elevations," Stinson explained.

The realtor said it would take about 90 days to build a home once actual construction starts. The original projection for the subdivision was to have the 36 homes built over a three year period.

But because the company is "starting to get calls from people who have just heard about it," the realtor said he thought the homes would be built in a year and one-half.

"With what Shallowater has to offer with the school system and lower taxes than Lubbock, we'll be able to pull in Texas Instrument people and Reese people," he said.

Last Tuesday afternoon, workmen began setting forms for the concrete gutter and curbs.

Incident Reported On US 84 Sunday

It lacked the drama of a showdown at high noon. But by the time it was over, rumors about Shallowater's first gunfight had begun to circulate.

Along about 1:45 a.m. December 14th, chief of police Don Rackler received a call to report to Loop 388 and U.S. 84 by the First State Bank. There he found two women, a mother and daughter, arguing alongside an automobile.

"It seems like the mother had the daughter's car and wouldn't give it back," Rackler said.

Apparently the mother, a resident of Lubbock, had asked the municipal police department if she could get the car, and was told that she could.

The mother was driving the car back towards Lubbock when the daughter caught up with her at the intersection by the Shallowater bank. Both ladies began to argue, and to threaten one another.

"We heard reportings of shootings, but we couldn't find that any shots had been fired. Actually, what it was, was a civil disturbance," Rackler said.

"Each one said the other one had a gun, but we couldn't find any. I don't even think there was a gun involved."

The chief of police told the women that it was a civil matter, and they would have to settle it accordingly.

Within the next week to 10 days, over 90,000 voter registration forms will be sent through the mail to Lubbock County registered voters, the county's tax assessor-collector said Friday.

Russell S. Hardin said his office was "going to have them in the mail before Christmas".

The permission to go ahead with the mail out had come earlier Friday morning after a three judge federal court in New Orleans ruled that voter re-registration by mail could only be made mandatory for voters who had changed addresses since they last registered.

The forms will be accompanied by a note written in English and Spanish advising voters that they are required to complete the forms only if they have moved to an address different than that listed

on their voter registration card.

The court ruling was the result of an injunction filed by the Mexican-American Legal Defense and Educational Fund and the American Civil Liberties Union challenging new state legislation which would have required all registered voters to complete the mailed forms, or be purged from voter registration files.

The injunction claimed the provision for purging voters was discriminatory against minorities.

The Thursday court ruling prevents the state from purging voters if they do not return the forms, as would have been required in the new state legislation.

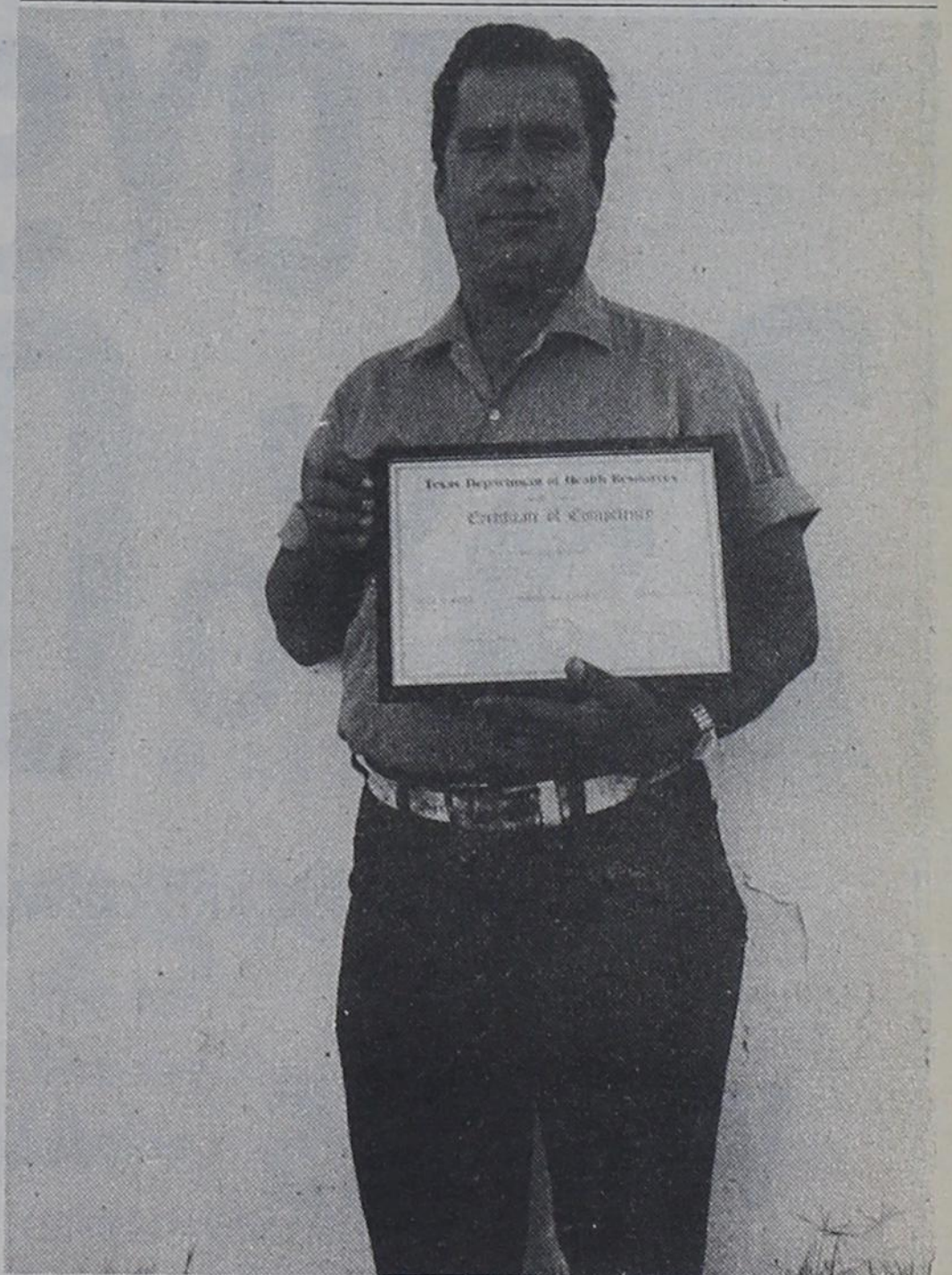
The original mail out under the new law would have taken place November 5, 1975, but had been held up until the Justice Department studied the state legislation to see if it conformed to the 1965 Voting Rights Act.

Hardin said there was "very little difference" between the new voter registration forms and the old ones. "The thing we're asking for is a social security number or birthday."

Currently, people are "still registered to vote on anything until March 1, 1976," Hardin explained.

Voters who do not choose to complete the mail out forms "can still come to the tax office to

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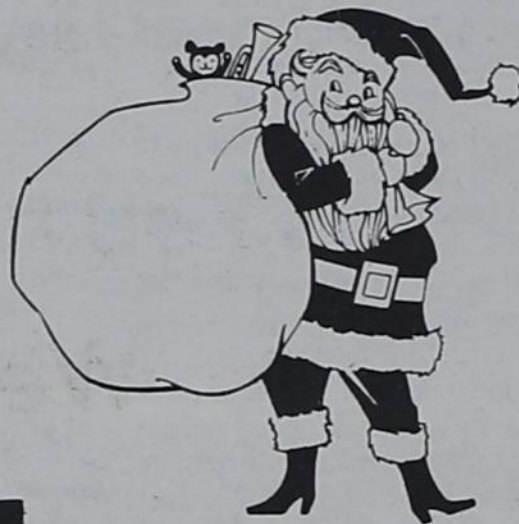
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SPORTS

Oklahoma State, despite its 3-3 record, has a better basketball team than that. The Cowboys, when they finally get it all put together, could make waves in the Big 8 Conference.

They made it uncomfortable for Texas Tech Saturday night. The Cowboys appeared to be on the verge of getting run out of the Coliseum when wham! Here they came. They came from eight points behind and into a four-point lead.

Fortunately, Gerald Myers saw a chink in the armor and Tech went into a zone. The Cowboys had good ball movement and attacked the zone well, but their shooting fell off. And Ronnie Daniel, who had 10 points in the first 11:12, was blanked.

Daniel came into the game touted as better than Chuckie Williams of K-State, and he made a believer of folks for a short while. He made you downright nervous.

Steve Dunn did a pretty good job on Daniel, but picked up a couple of fouls in less than four minutes and Daniel went to work. The 5-11 junior darted like a ping pong ball in a gale, penetrating the defense, driving the basket and putting up shots that touched only the bottom strands of the nets.

Then came the zone and Daniel was through. He didn't get another point, the Raiders took charge and the Cowboys didn't have enough firepower to overcome the Raider lead.

"I was afraid of this game," Myers said later. "We beat them up there last year and I was afraid that we wouldn't respect them enough. Yeah, and they had that loss to West Texas, too."

Gerald also knew that this was the last game before the Far West Classic, two weeks away, and "I didn't want to go into that tournament with a loss on my mind for two weeks."

I was curious why the Cowboys stayed in their zone defense late in the game when they were trailing by nine to 11 points. Gerald shrugged his shoulders.

"I don't know," he replied, "but I was glad to see it."

Why didn't Tech move outside and set up the open floor crip shot?

"You can get into trouble doing that and we were able to control the ball, eat up time," Gerald replied. "Shoot, they helped us by staying in the zone."

Rick Bullock, as usual, led the scoring parade, even though he played only 30 minutes. Bullock had 18 points in the first half, blocked three shots and was the top rebounder.

The big guy isn't selfish, though. He had a couple of assists and generally did a good job on 6-8 Dave Kragel. Lonnie Boeckman, the 7-3 center, was a different story. Boeckman has an easy touch and, when he gets some weight, could be an outstanding player.

It was a satisfying victory for the Raiders, who go into the Christmas break 4-1 and with momentum for the road ahead. After the West Coast games there's only North Carolina at home before the conference starts.

The only school that may have played a tougher schedule than Tech is SMU. And the Ponies, Arkansas and A&M, so far, indicate that they may be the chief challengers to Tech.

I, for one, was sort of sorry that the SWC decided against a national championship, although it's possible to see the problems that such an arrangement would provoke.

The SWC has a tie up with the Cotton Bowl, and other conferences have similar arrangements. A national championship game, after the bowls, would diminish interest in the bowl games. In fact, it might kill them.

At the same time, the Super Bowl in pro football has created enough interest to put the pressure on the colleges. Could A&M stop Ohio State? Could Arkansas whip Oklahoma? Would Alabama beat Michigan?

The question of who really is No. 1 is left unanswered every year. Must it continue? It would be great if it was possible to take the top 10 teams and have a playoff.

At the same time, this is college football, not the pros, and collegians are in school ostensibly to get an education. Football is just part of that education.

Nope, I'm inclined to go along with the present situation. Bowl games are an award for merit, usually with regional attraction for one of the teams. I'd prefer the bowls to a national playoff which, in the end, might mean nothing.

Jackie Sullivan has announced his candidacy for sheriff, the best unkept secret for two years that I've heard. It should be interesting.

Jackie, an old friend, was a heckuva baseball player. He proved that he could run a baseball team and that is no mean feat, when you consider the assortment of individuals involved. That might not qualify him as a sheriff, but it's a pretty good endorsement.

A voter, who supports a candidate for a selfish interest, has no right to complain when the man represents other selfish interests.

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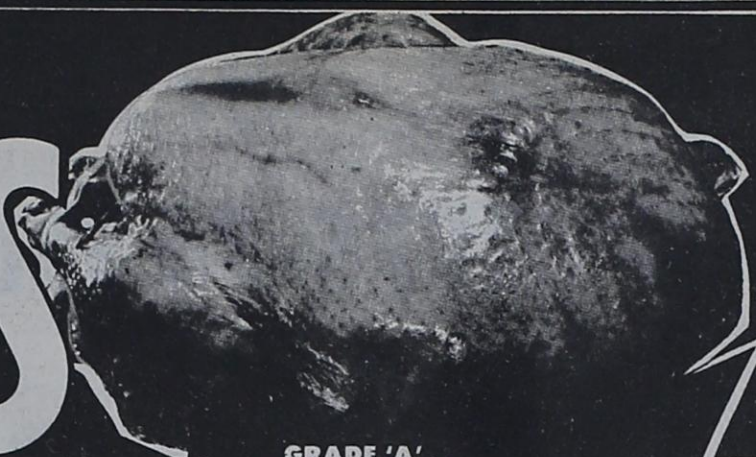

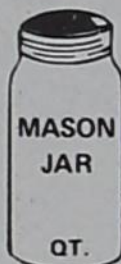

Shallowater Has Three

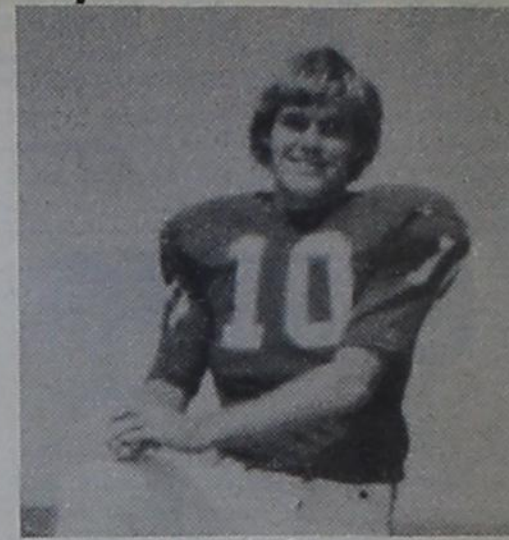
The results of the football All-District Team are in and they are as follows:

The Mustangs had three players make first team All-District, Johnny Taylor as a running back; Jay Truelock, defensive tackle; and Ray Jackson, defensive safety.

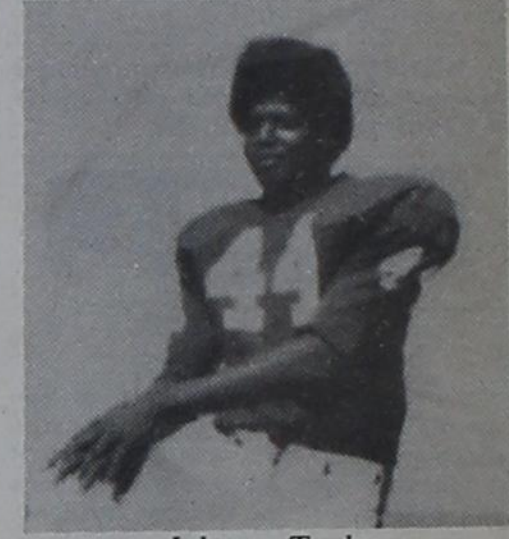

Honorable mentions for offensive All-District were Billy Dixon and Jay Truelock.

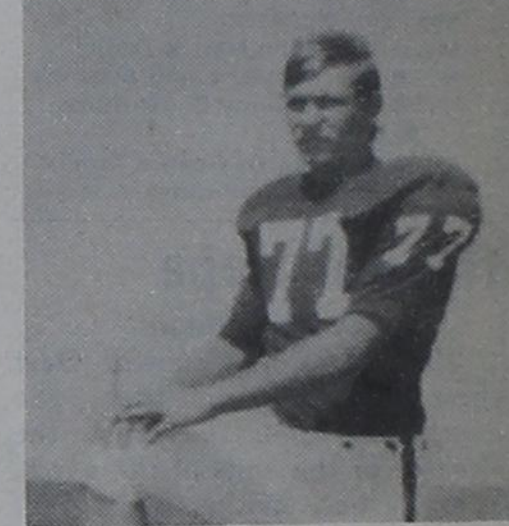
Coach Wolski expressed his pride in saying, "I'm very pleased for these boys. I believe they deserved this. We'll miss them next year."

Chris Hutchings was picked to be on the All-Tournament team and was presented with an individual trophy.

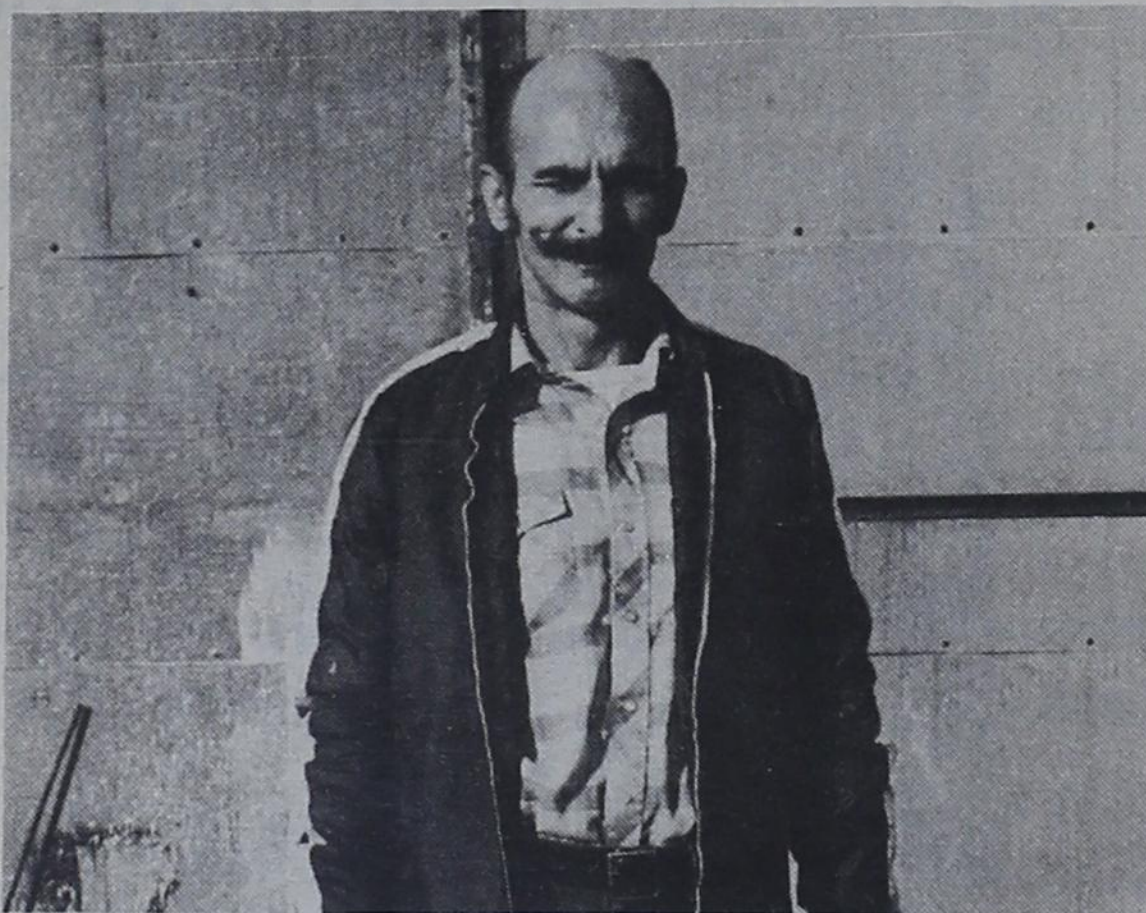
