The Shallowater First United Methodist Church will host a four day Holy Spirit Conference beginning Sunday, September 15th at 7:00 p.m. The conference will feature three outstanding speakers in David du Plessis, World Pentecostal Leader; Dr. Edmund Robb, former nationally known evangelist and current minister of St. Luke United Methodist Church in Lubbock; and Ted Dotts, District Supt. of the Pampa District of the United Methodist Church.

According to Bro. Max Browning, pastor of the local church, the conference was called due to the rising widespread interest in the Holy Spirit. "There is probably no single issue in Christian Theology that has generated the interest, confusion, and controversy within the local church, like the doctrine of the Holy Spirit and the Spirit filled life", said Browning. "We are having the conference in order to help our people better understand the issues and make a more intelligent and less emotional response."



David du Plessis

Shortly after being ordained into the ministry in 1928, David duPlessis rose quickly to a position of leadership within the Pentecostal movement. He organized the second, third, and

ences. In 1951, du Plessis felt the call to begin presenting the doctrine of the Holy Spirit to virtually every major Protestant denomination. He is the only Pentecostal to ever serve as an official observer at the Vatican Council. He has participated in international assemblies of the World Council of Churches, Presbyterian World Alliance Convention, and International Missionary Council Meetings. He has lectured on Pentecostal issues at Yale, Union Theological Seminary, Perkins School of Theology, Evangelical Congregational School of Theology, as well as many other leading colleges and universities. He has also lectured at the Ecumenical Institute of United Presbyterian Church and the Ecumenical Institute of the World Council of Churches in Switzerland. He has preached in over 45 countries of the world.



Edmund Robb

A dynamic speaker, Dr. Robb is regarded as one of the outstanding preachers on United Methodism. He has led many citywide interdenominational crusades, has been the evangelist for some of the historic and largest camp meetings in the nation, held hundreds of local church evangelistic missions, and has preached in

13 thirtyminute programs produced by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service of the Texas A&M University System will begin Sept. 21, 1974.

Homeowners can save approximately 90 percent of the cost of repair and maintenance jobs by doing it themselves. 50 percent of all home service repair calls can be eliminated if homeowners use preventive maintenance. These public service programs are designed to present inexpensive and effective methods of caring for and maintaining your home.

The programs will be aired on Saturdays at 4:30 p.m. on Channel 13. Check your local listings for any change in the time schedule.

Included on these programs will be simple electric repairs, using low cost cleaners, repairing leaky faucets, toilet repairs and adjustments, caulking and weatherstripping, exterior painting, wall repairs, interior painting, care of wood finishes, care of carpets, care and maintenance of appliances, and how to make more storage space.

Soil-Water Research to Be Highlight at TAES Field Day

The upcoming Texas Agricultural Experiment Station field day marking 65 years of research on the High Plains will highlight soilwater studies as one of the major attractions.


Heading up the studies on soilwater relationships are Dr. Charles Wendt, soil physicist, and Dr. Otto Wilke, agricultural engineer. The men will interpret their efforts aimed at efficient irrigation practices and conservation of water during tour stops at their test sites.

Using a technique that involves measuring leaf sap pressure, the two men are studying how much stress a plant can undergo due to lack of water before its growth and yeild are adversely affected.

An automated irrigation system of cotton can also be viewed during the tour of soilwater research to turn a trickleirrigation system on and off, depending on the soil's water content. The system works on a principle of soil absorption of moisture, with a vacuum gauge preset to trigger the switching mechanism.

Field day goers, expected to number above 1,000, will be able to view many other research projects and discuss specific details with TAES researchers.

The meal she prepares most often when running behind is one she doesn't have a recipe for, but just fixes. I'm sure a lot of homemakers use this as a standin also, "Bologna Sandwiches".

But two favorites she can share with you are Brandied Fruit and Brandy Fruit Cake

"Brandied Fruit" Maraschino Cherries Chunk Pineapple Sliced Peaches

Drain one cup of fruit each week until all is in, always add one cup of sugar with fruit. After started, then start adding every two weeks with sugar. Never use anything except plastic or wooden spoon to stir.

Don't let fruit get lower than two cups, if giving a starter give two cups.

Don't seal, do not refrigerate. Serve over vanilla ice cream or plain cake.

"Brandy Fruit Cake" 1 cup melted oleo 2 eggs, 3 cups flour 1/4 teasp. clover, 1 teasp. soda 13/4 cup sugar

1 cup chopped nuts

1/2 teasp. salt, 1/4 teasp. nutmeg Beat melted oleo and sugar. Beat two eggs and add dry ingredients. This will make a thick heavy batter. Add two cups drained fruit (I always put about 1/2 cup juice in mine) and nuts. Use tube pan or long pan, flour and grease well. Bake at 350 degrees for one hour or less. Will make a thick crust on top but moist on the inside.



The Southwest Conference press tour came to Lubbock a day early, on Saturday evening, and the visiting writers had a long weekend to kill. Before they left, Texas Tech was rated No. 14 in the UPI poll of coaches-and also-ran in the Associated Press.

Now, I'm not one to get all excited about pre-season polls, or even, much of the time, polls during the season. Almost everyone knows that, on any given Saturday, any one team can beat another.

The AP poll did indicate one thing; that is, if you expect to be rated in the top 10 by the AP, you'd better have five outstanding seasons in succession.

For instance, Tech was 11-1 last year and had a convincing victory over Tennessee in the Gator Bowl. Tennessee was rated in the top 20, Tech was not. In other words, the Raiders are not yet a household word, the Vols are. It takes time to get a reputation.

I agree with Jim Carlen that, in view of the inexperience in the offensive line, you have to take Tech's chances with a large grain of salt. It takes time for offenses to jell.

At the same time, the Raiders have some of the finest coaches in the business to develop the type of offensive line needed. In addition, Iowa State and New Mexico aren't exactly Alabama and Notre Dame. The two games should give the offense time to develop.

Make no mistake, the Texas game is the target, no matter what the rest of the schedule. If you don't beat the favorite, you aren't going to win. It's as simple as that.

Sure, there are seven other tough games and each is important, but you have to beat the favorite. After that it isn't downhill, but at least you know the situation. Now you're the favorite an the challenge is the thing. The good team responds.

****** I haven't seen the Raiders yet, expect to take in the scrimmage this Saturday, the last warmup before the season opens. The dress rehearsal

ought to tell a lot about the 1974 Raiders. The visiting writers were on the weary side Sunday night at the Red Raider Club dinner and there was, not surprisingly, little talk about the SWC. There was talk about the Cowboys and their Saturday night victory. Otherwise, the talk was general and the writers conversed about

other things. I found myself, during the course of the preprandial activities, talking with a former coach. He had been at the Tech scrimmage and he was impressed.

"I'm a nut on execution," he said, "and man, do they (Tech) execute! They impressed me. I thought that they looked awfully good. I don't care what anyone says, this is a great coaching staff. They do a great job and it shows up."

Two-a-days are behind the Raiders now and the polishing can begin. They'll have this week and next, with drills tapering off slightly as timing, the all important aspect is stressed.

Right now there's no more important game than Iowa State. To have a great season, you have to win the first game. It should be a good test, one that gives the Raiders a sound test. It also should boost Tech ont he way to what, generally, is believed will be a brilliant season.

The other day I noticed a story in the Abilene paper that said that three Texas players had quit the squad. That sort of thing is a little on the scary side for what it says between the lines.

Texas is not the type of factory that runs players off unless the head knocking is such that a few souls decide that the price of glory is not worth paying the admission charge. After all, you're almost sure of a bowl, even if you ride the bench at Texas.

My first thought was that Darrell must really be working the bejabbers out of his squad. Otherwise, why would anyone quit a conference champion and a team picked to win again.

A visiting writer laid the thought to rest. "One of the three came back," he said, "and I don't think Texas is working any harder than usual. There was no indication of it when we were there and no one seemd to think it was that tough."

There's general agreement that this could be the tightest, most exciting conference race in years. There are four teams you can consider capable of being in the top four-Texas, Arkansas, A&M and Tech. And the other four are rated above average as spoilers.






Have you noticed the huge pile of dirt on the east side of the high school building? This pile of dirt came from a massive excavation for a proposed parking lot. This project is being done by the 980th Division Company "B" of the Army Engineers. The reason for the seemingly delay is because these engineers are volunteers and only train once a month. They train the second weekend of each month.

Our superintendent, Mr. Hohertz was able to acquire the services of the Army Engineers for no payment. Mr. Hohertz estimates that the cost of the parking lot would be about \$16,000 if a construction company built it. The engineers are also building a road to connect Ave. M with the farm to market road north of the school building.
