Members of the Shallowater Band Boosters organization met Monday night at 6:30 for their regular monthly meeting in the band hall.

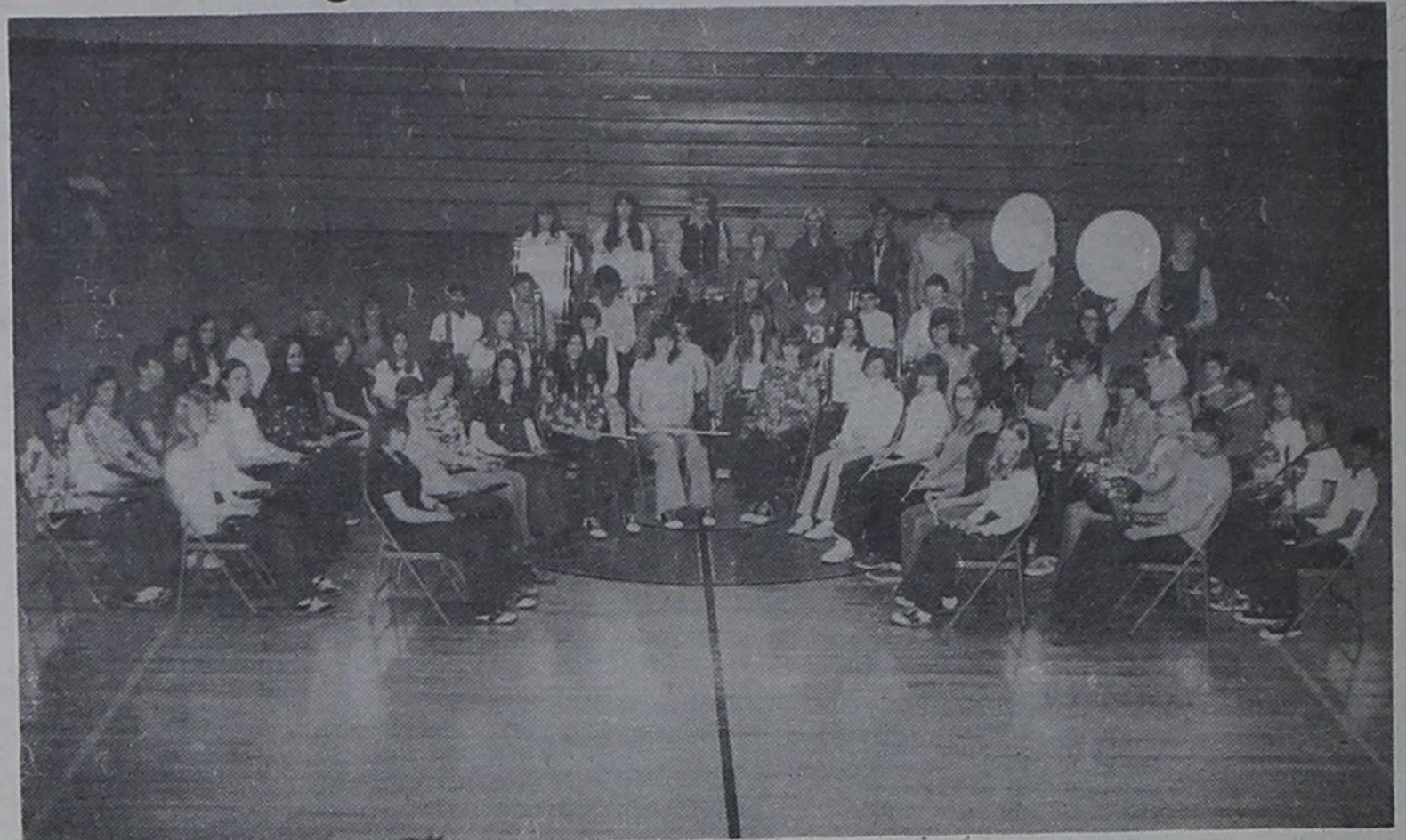

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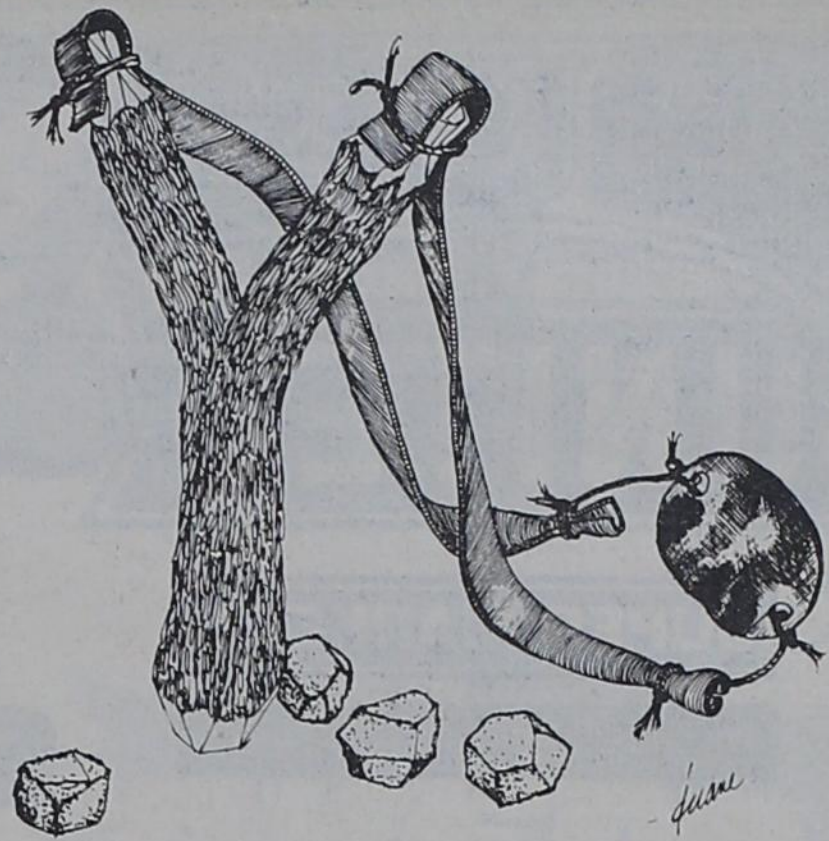
REMEMBERING...

SLINGSHOTS

Mischief and trouble go hand in hand with slingshots. We had just made ourselves new ones and of course we had to take them to the football game that night. There were no bleachers at the football field but someone had donated some old church pews for seats. Several men were sitting on the back of one of the pews with their feet down in the seat part watching the ball game. What made him do it, I'll never know, but as we were walking behind them one of our group pulled back on his slingshot and let fly at the widest posterior on the bench. The pellet found its mark. What happened next is impossible to describe. There was a wild thrashing of arms, then legs went up into the air and the bench, fans and all, crashed over backward. By the time the dust settled I had broken all records of the hundred yard dash.

Slingshots were made in different ways but I'll explain how we made ours. First, we found a good forked tree limb, a semetrical one with both smaller limbs of the same size and angle. The fork was cut and trimmed to shape. Some preferred to remove all the bark but others left it on the handle part to give a better grip. Next, from an old innertube, strips were cut about a half inch wide and ten or twelve inches long (I made the mistake of getting a new one from Dad's work shop once, an act for which the consequences were not soon forgotten). These were attached to the handle with twine, the kind packages were wrapped with was good enough and Grandmother always had a ball of it tucked away somewhere. The pocket was made from an old leather shoe tongue. Holes were punched in each side of the pocket and twine was used to tie it to the two

rubber strips. Everyone had their favorite thing to shoot in the slingshot, that being whatever was in plentiful supply. Some popular things were pebbles, peach pits, china berries, acorns, marbles, and buckshot. With a little earnest practice, you could get pretty good at shooting the slingshot but even so there wasn't much that could be done with it that was constructive.

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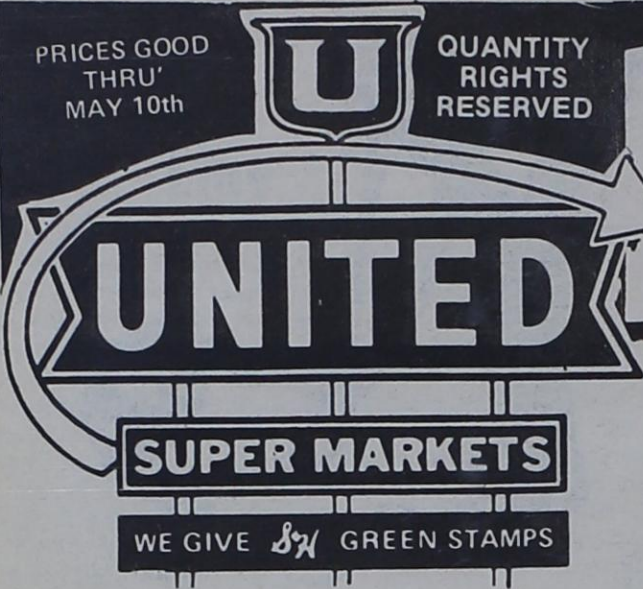


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Engagement Announced this Week

Spring training is over and now comes the wait of some five months before we know what Texas Tech really has. As usual, a spring game was inconclusive insofar as unity was concerned.

Shining through were some obvious bright spots, like the running of Billy Taylor, Rufus Myers, Jimmy Williams in particular and, on occasion, by Angel Berlingeri, David Murphy and Hoyt Glasscock. No one seems to have blinding speed, but they do have quickness.

Tommy Duniven may well have taken over as No. 1 at quarterback, although Rodney Allison had a strong game, while Greg Frazier looked like a strong No. 3.

Thus, when you put all the backs on one team, you have a pretty good field from which to choose. And each player knows that he has at least one good man breathing down his back. That never hurts attitude and effort.

As for the lines, some of the offensive blocking was crisp and sure. Sometimes it left a little to be desired. Overall, the line blocking showed promise and it was obvious that the veer is going to spring backs for good gains more often than in the past.

The veer leads to a two or three yard offense, with sudden holes clearing backs for 10 or more yards. In fact, about the time you think a team is contained, boom! 10 yards.

Defensively, the Raiders showed some pretty good talent, too, and Ecomet Burley is going to present problems for opposing teams. As usual, he was all over the field.

Burley has some good company, with linebackers showing strength from time to time. The center of both lines gave promise of being difficult for opponents and, once again, when the entire squad plays as a whole, the defense will look stronger.

Tech should have possibly the strongest defensive secondary in the conference. Saturday night the defensive backfield looked more than adequate and it could be sensational.

In fact, one of the most encouraging things was Curtis Jordan's speed. Jordan ripped off an 86-yard punt return and it's been awhile since Tech fans have seen that. He had a wall of blockers, but he also cut well and outlegged the defenders.

If there was anything disappointing it was in the passing game. Admittedly, the coaches have spent more time on establishing their techniques and fundamentals than on specifics, but the aerial attack was used too sparsely Saturday night.

There was little throwing the last half at all and 16 of 36 combined isn't overwhelming. Still, while some of the passing wasn't sharp, some of the receiving was pretty poor, too.

The passing will be worked on in the fall for, as J.T. King observed, with the veer, you have to throw to keep the linebackers honest, among other things, and make the running go.

You've probably noticed that, generally, the passing game is of the shorter yardage variety. In fact, the average pass per completion was between five and six yards.

It was, as spring games go, an interesting affair and lends hope that from the 40 sophomores, 32 juniors and 11 seniors, plus the injured who missed the game, Tech will be able to field a team that can compete with everyone else.

The enthusiasm was there and the execution, at times, was sharp. There is some depth. There are some exciting backs. There is some good size in the lines.

The Raiders obviously were in good physical condition and they probably will come back that way in the fall, when the drills will be demanding as polish is put on the offense and defense.

It's a pretty safe bet that the Raiders will be stronger than a year ago. They waste no time in finding out how good they'll be with Florida State in the opener. After that there's no time for thinking. But, all in all, it looks as though the 1975 Tech squad should give a good account of itself.

Much has been made, of late, concerning the dire straits in which colleges and universities find themselves anent financing of athletics. Some few schools have quit the programs.

"We just might be in better shape than any other school in the conference," J.T. King said Saturday night. "Oh, we have some problems, but not like so many others. Yes, we made money on basketball. All those seats are sold, even if they're not all full."

Jake agreed that the schools in the biggest trouble are SMU, TCU and Rice, with the Ponies in the biggest hole. Last year's title pulled Baylor out of deep depression.

As for future grid schedules, Jake said that Tech is about filled through 1986.

"We have home and home schedules with teams like Air Force, North Carolina, Southern Cal, Washington, Colorado and others, along with Arizona and New Mexico."

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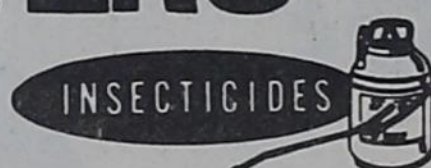
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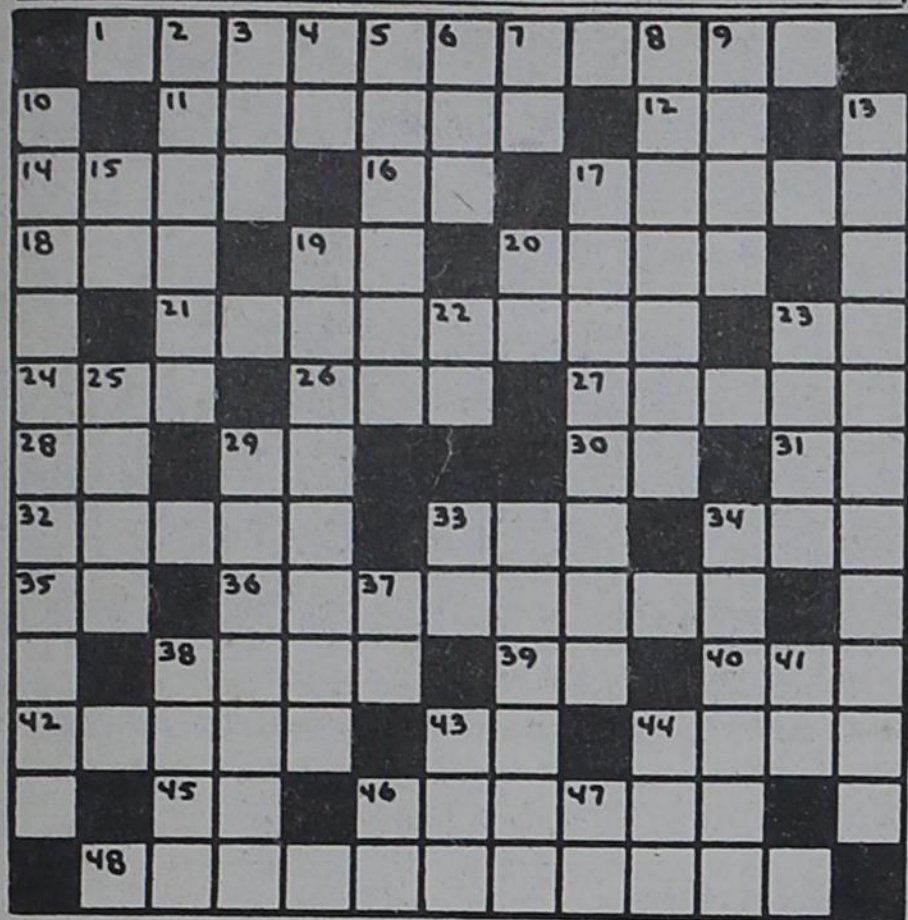

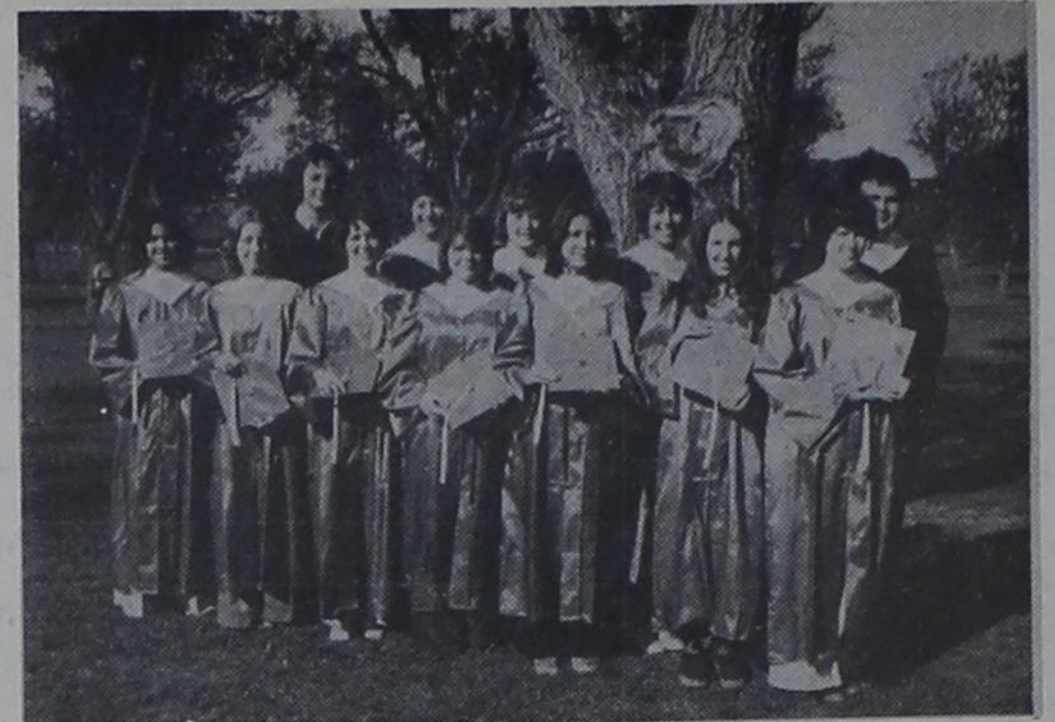
