



# Plains Cotton Harvest Off to Fast Start



Vernon Goodwin is quoted this week in the Gaines County News FYI Column as saying that "he thinks there is a good chance that Gaines County will produce more cotton this year than any other county in Texas". The October forecast estimated Gaines production at 262,000 bales. This was 16,000 bales less than the Lubbock County estimate. "By the time the cotton is ginned and counted, Gaines might beat Lubbock in production this year," according to Goodwin.

An Arts and Crafts Fair is scheduled in Tahoka for Saturday, November 17th, and Sunday the 18th. Hours will be 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. on Saturday and 1 to 6 p.m. Sunday. 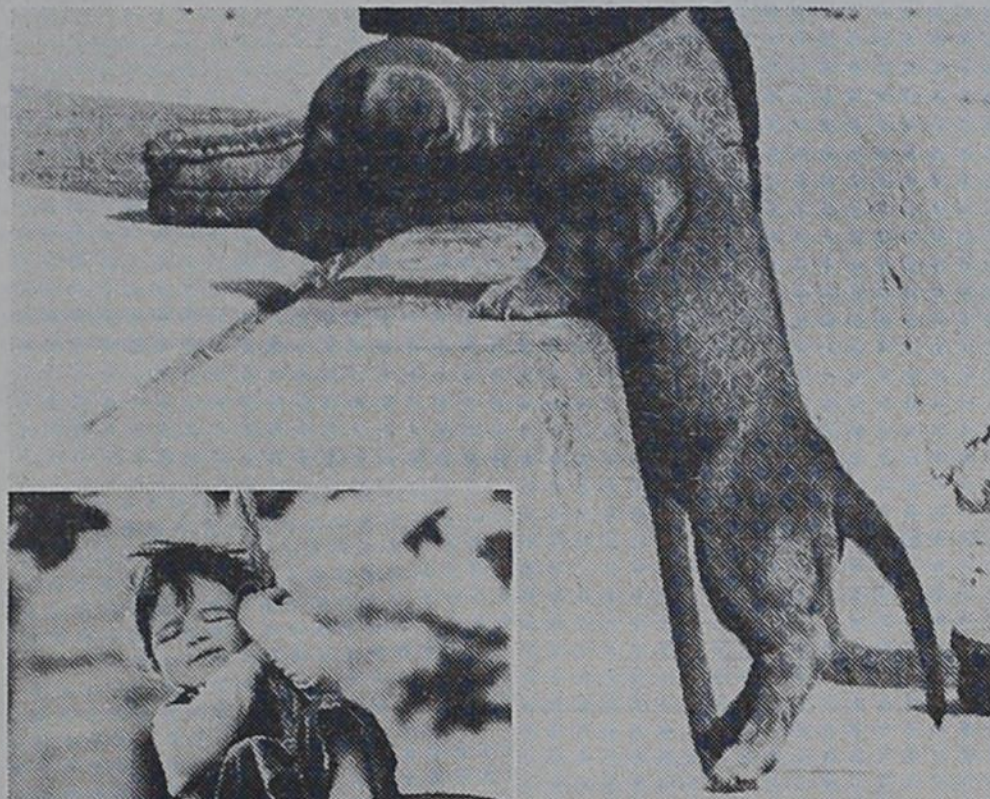

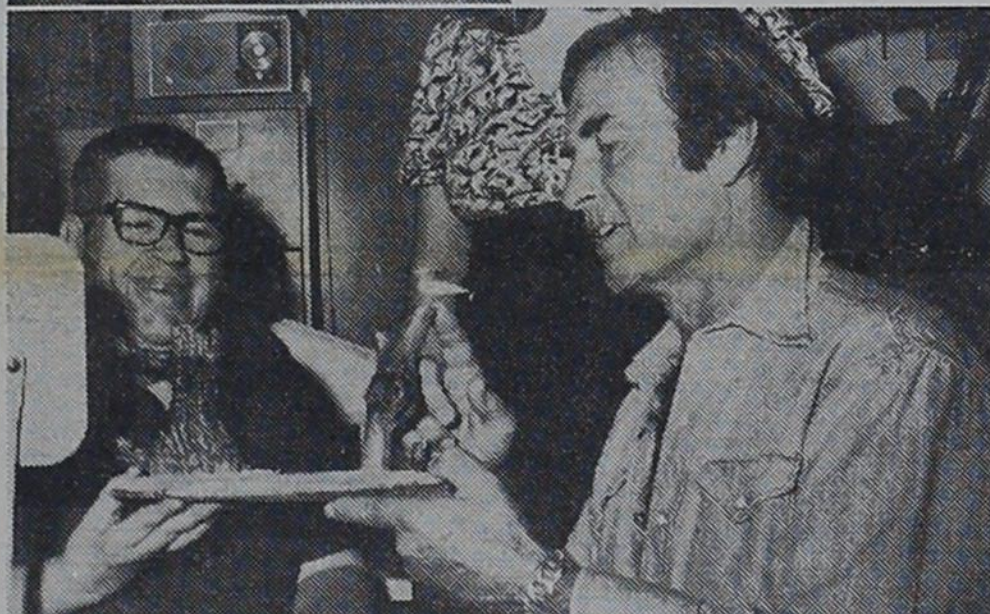

## Tech Stuns The Awesome SMU Mustangs "Knit Know-How" Program Set

Awesome was the word for the SMU Mustangs, before they met "Knit Know-How" Program Set

If you are a home sewer and need answers to questions about sewing on knits, you are invited to a lecture-demonstration sponsored by the Cooperative Extension Service of Lubbock County.

The program "Knit Know-How" will be presented by Cathy Collins, Educational Representative of Unique Zipper Distributing Service on Thursday, November 8th at 9:30 a.m. in South Plains Electric Cooperative Auditorium, 110 Amarillo Road.

Miss Collins' lecture will include a special section on the different types of knit fabrics available and how to choose the right patterns for them. She will illustrate her program with several knit garments including men's wear. Choosing notions for knits and the installation techniques for the invisible zipper will also be an important part of her program. She will be available to answer questions about sewing following her lecture.

Each person attending will receive a complete booklet on Unique invisible zippers and a special leaflet on knit sewing.

Texas Tech Saturday afternoon in the Homecoming game for the Red Raiders.

SMU was ranked the nation's second best ground gaining team. They had speed to burn. They were big and strong. They had only a 17-7 loss to top 10th ranked Missouri on the loss ledger.

But Tech had Joe Barnes, Larry Isaac, James Mosley, Andre Tillman and a defense that wouldn't quit. In fact, the Raiders took charge of the game from the opening kickoff and the final 31-14 score doesn't really tell how thoroughly the Raiders dominated the big visitors.

Isaac, the Lubbock Estacado freshman, scored twice while gaining 98 yards, and Tillman scored on a pass from Barnes, while shaking both Barnes and Isaac loose with telling blocks.

But Barnes was the offensive story. The Big Lake senior had his finest hour in a Raider uniform. He threw one touchdown pass, crunched over for another, ran for a career high total of 173 yards on 23 carries and broke Coach (and former quarterback) Tom Wilson's career total yardage mark with 3,029 yards, and four games to go. Wilson's career mark was 2,902 yards.

Tech, although unable to score in the first quarter, established its superiority on both offense and defense. The Raiders gained 128 yards rushing and held the

Cotton harvest activities are increasing daily and quality of the early harvested cotton has been excellent, according to Paul R. Dickson, in charge of the U.S.D.A. Cotton Classing Office in Lubbock.

Due to the great increase in harvest activities, the seasonal classing office at Lamesa opened for business on Thursday and the Brownfield and Levelland offices will begin operations on Monday.

The U.S.D.A. offices at Lubbock and Lamesa classified samples from 16,500 bales during the week ending Friday. This brought the total for the season to 21,900. At

this date last year, samples from only 1,000 bales of the 1972 crop had been classed.

Grades of this early harvested cotton were excellent. Middlings made up one-third of all cotton classed during the week at Lubbock and Strict Low Middlings made up 44 percent.

Staple varied widely according to the variety of cotton harvested. Staple lengths varied from 12/16" (26) up to 1-5/32" (37). Average staple length during the week was approximately one inch (32).

Micronaire readings were excellent. These readings indicate that most of the early harvested bales were fully mature. 87 percent of all cotton tested at Lubbock had micronaire readings in the premium range of 3.5 to 4.9, 8 percent was in the high micronaire of 5.0 to 5.2 and 4 percent was in the very high range of 5.3 and above.

The Agricultural Marketing Service of the U.S.D.A. reported active trading on the Lubbock market. Prices were \$40 to \$50 per bale lower than the previous week. Prices averaged 3400 to 3800 points over the loan at the end of the week.

Average prices paid for the most predominant qualities in the 3.5 to 4.9 premium micronaire range were: Middling (31) staple 30-56.65 cents per pound, Middling (31) staple 31-57.40, Middling (31) staple 32-58.40, Strict Low Middling (41) staple 30-55.70, Strict Low Middling (41) staple 31-56.25 and Strict Low Middling (41) staple 32-56.95.

"Well, coach, with only Rice, TCU, Baylor and Arkansas, the four weakest teams in the conference left, I guess you're on the downhill grade," one of the visiting sports writers said Saturday.

The remark came just after Texas Tech all but demolished SMU's vaunted offense, handed the visitors their first conference loss and put Tech in the best position for the league title if Texas slipped.

Jim Carlen almost choked on his soft drink. "After the next four games, we'll be on the downhill grade," he replied. "Right now, we have the Rice game coming up. And, you just check the record, we haven't exactly been brilliant against the Owls."

Another write mentioned bowls. "Bowls are for the news media," Carlen replied. "Right now all we're interested in is the Rice Bowl and that comes off Saturday."

Lest you think Carlen was being unduly apprehensive, here's what Tech has done against Rice the past three years:

1970—Tech won, 3;0; 1971—Rice won, 9;7; 1972—Tech won, 7-3. That's a total point advantage of 17 for Tech to 12 for Rice. Impressive, what? That's a total of two touchdowns and four field goals in three years, two TDs for Tech, none for Rice.

Carlen has been dreading the TCU game for weeks, because "they play like it was the Super Bowl against us, and TCU has won two of the three games. Tech has beaten Baylor all three games, but has lost all three games to Arkansas.

Joe Barnes, an outstanding quarterback, had the kind of day that gets All America recognition. He was brilliant. And just as brilliant when SMU shifted to stop him by pitching to Larry Isaac.

With all due respect, however, we question the defensive strategy of SMU. I asked Dave Smith if they had made any adjustments at the half and he said that they hadn't. SMU obviously concentrated on stopping Barnes the last half, then left Isaac untouched.

The Red Raider offense, picking up where it left off against Arizona, did a superb job. I doubt that big Louie Kelcher has touched Barnes yet, except maybe to shake hands and congratulate him. The SMU star was blocked thoroughly.

It was another team victory, with both offense and defense doing a great job. Carlen was concerned about three of the breakdowns, two passes and a long run. "The first time that has ever happened to one of my teams". But the fourth run was against reserves.

Carlen's press conference: "I thought Barnes, Isaac, Tillman, Furgerson had outstanding games on offense. Knaus and Beery had outstanding defensive games."

"The breakdowns concern me. One fumble was a bad snap, but the other two were just fumbles. They not only cost us points, but they gave SMU points. We'll work on that this week."

"When you talk of Rice, you have to consider who they played. Aside from one easy game, their other opponents were in the top 20. They've probably played as tough a schedule as anyone in the nation."

"Rice has a good receiving corps, two good running backs. Kramer, a freshman quarterback, is going to be a good one. Their offensive line is a lot like ours. Rice's defensive line is better than SMU's and their free safety is as good as anyone. Their middle guard is outstanding."

Carlen said that Quarterback Tommy Duniven isn't being red shirted, that he's dressed out for every game, but "we won't play him unless we have to." Some six players aren't suiting up because of injuries and obviously are being held out.

Monday Carlen started a series of "spring training" for reserves, with the B team, jayvees, etc., scrimmaging at both ends of the field, then against each other and then running Rice plays.

At least national ranking wasn't, for once, the kiss of death, a fact that Carlen mentioned in his post-game conference. In fact, he went into rankings in detail with the writers.

In his honest estimation, Tech belongs near, or at, the top of the second 10, and he thinks one or two top 10 teams don't belong that high. But he isn't going to quibble. Again, he refused to be drawn into any discussion of post season bowls about Tech.

Actually, post season bowls are starting to shape up. Notre Dame, Penn State, Alabama and either Ohio State or Michigan are sure bets to wind up in bowls. I'd almost predict that Penn State will be in the Cotton and Notre Dame in the Sugar, maybe against 'Bama.

If Tech keeps rolling, it could go to the Gator, probably, with both Liberty and Sun highly interested. And with a 10-1 record, Tech could be on the Sugar list.

It's early yet and a lot can happen, so speculation is just that at this point and doesn't mean much.

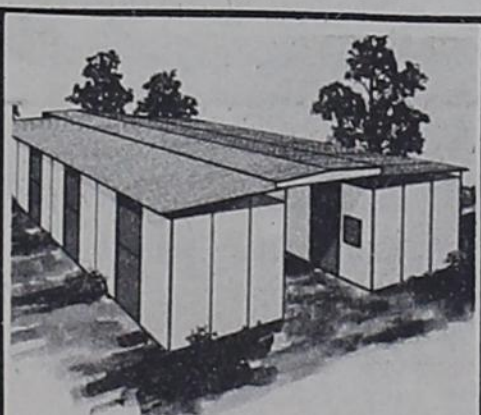

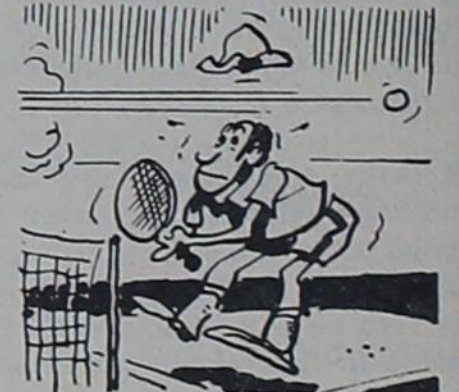
## Mrs. Dessie Redwine Honored on Birthday
