Ribbon Cutting Marks Whites Opening

Longhorns Just Too "Tuff" as Texas Tech **Drops Conference Opener at Austin 28-12**

An intercepted pass, a missed field goal, failure to complete a two-point play and the general toughness of Texas proved to be Texas Tech's downfall in Austin last Saturday night as the Longhorns rebounded from an opening game loss to Miami, 28-12.

The score isn't indicative of how close the Raiders played the defending conference champions. Texas jumped into a 14-0 lead before the big red express found the mark.

Texas came up with a formation it hadn't used since the glory days of the early 60s and it upset Tech's defense. Still, if a Joe Barnes pass to Lawrence Williams hadn't gone awry, it could have been the game of the 70s in the conference.

Texas used that interception deep in Tech territory to build a 7-0 lead and it was all uphill from there. The Raiders finally got going in the second half and Barnes found Williams in the end zone to cut the margin to 14-6.

Every Tech fan knew it would be 14-7, for Don Grimes hadn't missed in 56 tries during his college career. But miss he did and, when James Mosley scampered 21 yards on the first play of the final period, Tech had to go for two points.

It didn't come up roses as Barnes pass was short of its mark.

If the game had ended then, all would have been well. But Texas staged one of its typical ball control drives to widen the gap to 21-12, and the "gift" touchdown on the ensuing kickoff really had no bearing except on the final score.

So, it's out of the fat and into the frying pan as the Raiders go to

Stillwater, Okla., Saturday to take on awesome Oklahoma State. The Cowboys have rolled over three opponents, including Arkansas, with an impressive ground game.

"They're bigger than Texas," Coach Jim Carlen said Monday. "Are they better than Texas? I don't know, but I'd like to see that game. It would be some contest. They're deeper in talent than Texas. Their quarterback is better. Their halfbacks are faster. They have an experiences team, and don't forget, they play about 45 more more players each game."

Boy Scouts Announce Fall Recruiting Plans — Governor's Roundup Campaign

The annual fall membership campaign in the South Plains Council, Boy Scouts of America, began September 1 when 331 Scout troops and Cub Scout packs started enrolling new members.

Called Governor's Roundup, the Scout council expects to give an opportunit to 4500 boys to join the Boy Scouts of America, Jack Baker, council commissioner, said.

Governor Dolph Briscoe, Honorary Chairman of the Fall Roundup in the State of Texas, is giving his personal leadership by awarding an individual recruiter patch, which incorporates the Seal of Texas, to each boy that recruits a new member.

Special events scheduled for this fall include School Nights, Troop Rally Night, First Nighter, Uniform Day, camporees, and individual recruiting.

A boy may become a Scout when he is 11 years old or has completed the fifth grade or a Cub Scout when he is 8 years old or has completed the second grade, Baker said.

In addition to the boys who join existing packs and troops, Baker said, the Scout Plains Council's organization and extension committee expects to organize about 59 new packs and troops in the Council's 22 county area.

The Boy Scouts of America provides a program for boys and young adults that is designed to develop desirable qualities of character, to train in the responsibilities of participating citizenship, and to develop personal fitness, Baker said. Cub Scouting is a family and home centered program, and Scouting is designed to achieve the BSA objectives primarily through a vigorous outdoor program.

One game doesn't make a season and the Raiders still have a respectable 2-1 record. A victory over Oklahoma State would make the chart look that much better and the rest of the conference race still lies ahead. The Texas loss didn't end the season.

Certainly the Raiders have nothing to be ashamed of in that loss. They fought the favored Longhorns well and, had they been on the receiving end of some breaks, could have become winners.


City-County Library Slates Display on Middle Ages Here



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



F.H.A. Freshman Initiation Held






