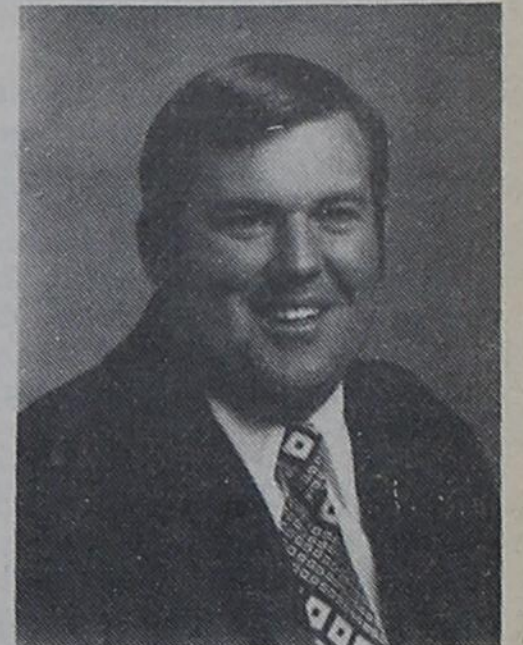


Shallowater Names Eddie Wolski Head Football Coach Monday

will begin about one week later.

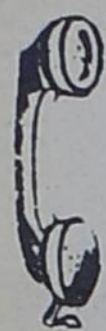
Any player from last year's program who has a uniform or other equipment is asked to turn it in as soon as possible.

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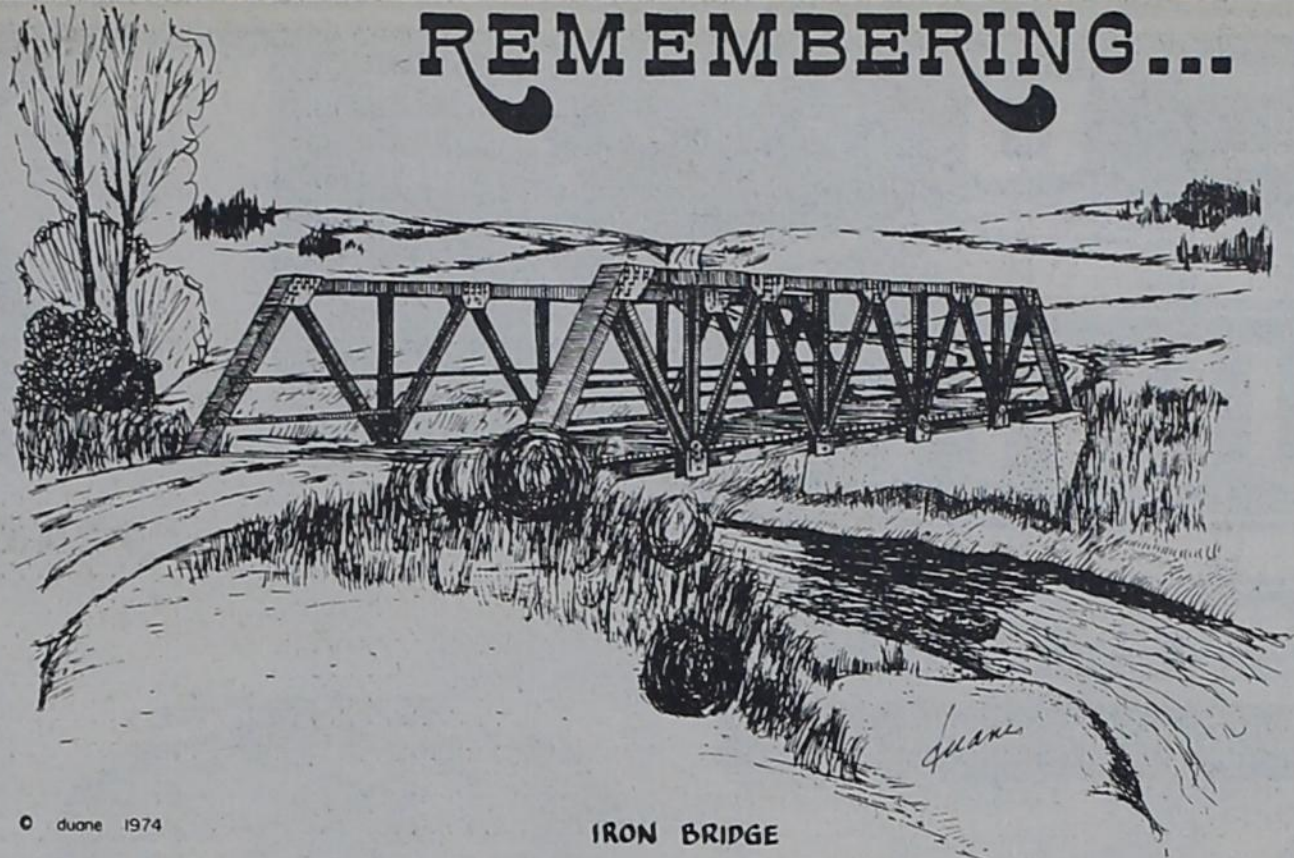
THE IRON BRIDGE

When I was growing up we lived near a creek (it would have been a stream but there was seldom any water in it). The meandering creek crossed an old dirt road at two places near our house. Big iron bridges, common to most parts of the country, were placed there to make crossing possible for the early-day automobiles.

This type of bridge was made of two big riveted iron trusses spanning from one creek bank to the other. Heavy wooden timbers attached to the trusses formed the roadway. They were narrow, allowing only one lane of traffic to cross at a time. The iron was always rusty because it was never painted, at least the ones I saw were never painted.

Designers of the bridges apparently knew only one way to situate their creations, that being directly across the creek, perpendicular to the stream bed. Therefore, if the stream

bed met the road at an angle, the bridge did too. The majority of the bridges were at some angle with the road, in fact, I don't remember a single one that was straight with the road. I'm sure that, at the time they were being built, this seemed like a great money saving idea but

one that proved to be a dangerous problem when automobiles started traveling at greater speeds. As trucks started carrying heavier and heavier loads many of the old landmarks crunched under the strain.

When paved roads came to rural sections of the country

the grand old bridges were done away with and few remain today. They served the purpose for which they were intended at a time when they were adequate to do the job but from the standpoint of safety, we're better off now that they're gone.

If you could turn the clock back 19 years, the Lubbock Hubbers were opening what proved to be the last season of professional baseball in the Hub City.

No one knew it at the time. Jay Haney had the franchise, and a working agreement with the Baltimore Orioles. The Lubbock team would be made up in Thomasville, Ga., where the Orioles had their principal minor league training camp.

A trio of Lubbock men—Haney, R.A. Austin and this writer—would board a chartered TNM&O bus to make the long trek. On the return, the bus would be filled with aspiring players. This would be the 1956 Hubbers.

The trip to Thomasville was far from uneventful. Indeed, in Jackson, Mississippi, there was doubt that we would reach the training camp the next day.

The main excitement was when the brakes failed on the bus and Austin, standing up and pumping, hollered over his shoulder "hey, fellas, we're going to take one with us!"

Austin's aim was unerring. He smashed into a car that hadn't pulled far enough into a crossover. To compound matters, the driver was a fireman. Now policemen and firemen have a way of standing up for each other. Thus, to the pokey went Austin.

To make a long and old story short, we escaped and arrived in Thomasville the next morning. Haney and I went to the training field. Austin allowed as to how he was going fishing.

About mid-morning, Austin showed up. What happened? "Well, I was all set. I was buying rod and reel, getting bait and tips on the best spots. Then some joker said I probably would find I had it all to myself. Seems that the rattlesnakes and water moccasins, warmed by the sun, were coming out.

"I decided I was just crazy about baseball!" Don't ask me who was on that 1956 team. In all honesty, I couldn't tell you. I do know that "Sugar" Ray Robinson, a pitcher, was on the club. Robinson was a black. The first black, I believe, to perform in Lubbock. And he was a good one.

And to show how times have changed, we stopped outside Abilene to eat. Everyone went in, even Robinson, after a lot of urging. We were seated, when the manager came up.

"Y'll can eat in here, but him" — pointing at Robinson — "will have to eat in the kitchen."

"This is the Lubbock baseball club," Haney replied. "Either we all eat here together or no one eats here."

With the Haney said "let's go" and everyone got up and walked out. It wouldn't happen today.

That summer I planned my vacation to be in Washington so that I could see the All-Star game. I got my credentials and arrived early enough to see the Senators play and have a talk with former Hubber Joe Valdivielso, then the hot short stop.

I went to the Player of the Decade lucheon, which honored Stan Musial, and at each place was the latest issue of the Sporting News. It was then that I learned the Hubbers had folded their tents after the July 4 doubleheader and gone South.

Considerably later, Haney told me that he wouldn't have made the move if I had been in town. That was flattering, but I doubted that it would have made any difference.

Haney was losing money, as had every owner following Paul Dean, and a wealthy Abilene man, owner of the Blue Sox, advised Haney that, if he moved to the Valley, the sale of beer alone would make up what he was losing here.

So, Jay left, Rosenthal Field remained dark and professional baseball in Lubbock, Texas, died. Some laughed with delight. Many others wept silently.

Baseball had written a glorious chapter in the Hub City. At a time when Lubbock barely nosed the 46,000 mark, the game attracted over 100,000 fans eight years in succession. The 1947 team, managed by sheriff candidate (1975) Jackie Sullivan, may well have been the greatest minor league team ever assembled.

Topping that club, of course, was Bill Serena, who went on to the Chicago Cubs. Almost without exception, the players went up to higher classification ball. Paul Hinrichs did a stint with the Yankees and Red Sox.

In those days there was no finer way to spend a summer night. The baseball might be wild and wacky, but it was good baseball, entertaining and exciting.

So, when Sullivan started up the WT-NM Baseball Assn., wild elephants couldn't have kept me away. Just the chance to sit and talk, or be around, so many of the players who brought such great pleasure to so many was a thrill.

I hope I don't grow so jaded that I lose my thrill at being around successful athletes, or men. After all, athletes are the men who are doing and achieving. Sports writers scribble about men's successes; others write about their failures—politics, society, business, world events, and so on.

When I started writing this column, I was going to say that it was about this time that the baseball season opened in Lubbock.

Rosenthal Field had been freshly painted in basic green, with orange for the Orioles. There was expectation in the air. It was a new season, new faces, new foes. The wind and sand of March had settled. Spring was in the air. Play ball!

I wonder if the ghosts ever rise on these warm spring nights and circle amid the mobile homes, now the extinct site of Rosenthal Field? They must find kindred spirits, like Grover Seitz, Pappy Stokes, Rooster Mills, Deck Woldt, Roy Parker, Harry Gilstrap (to insert a sports writer), Wilcy Moore, Joe Budny....the list could go on and on.

Major Leaguers? Very few ever made it, before or after the fact. But in their hearts, every one of them was.

And I, for one, miss it.

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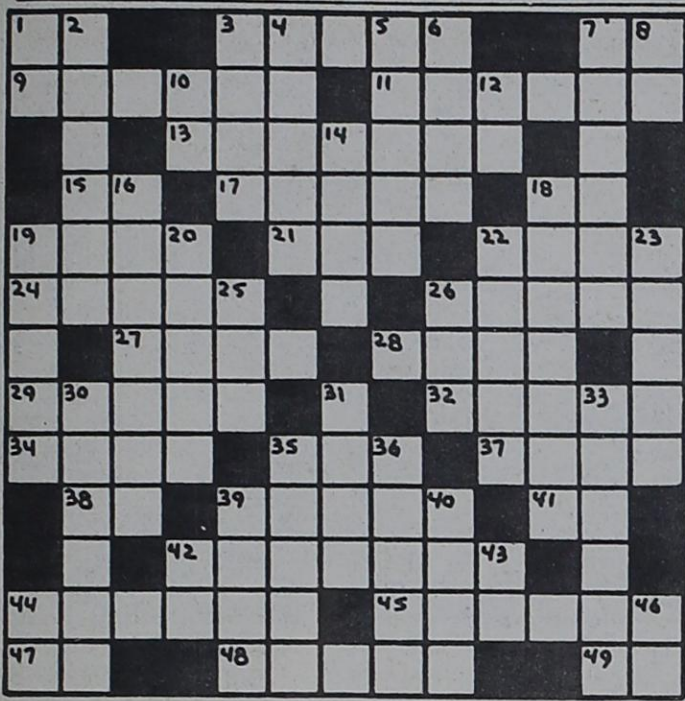

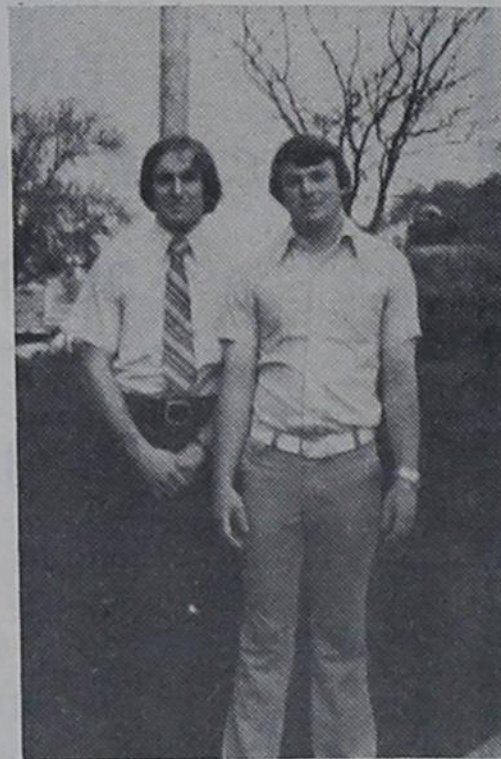
LCC Student Teacher
