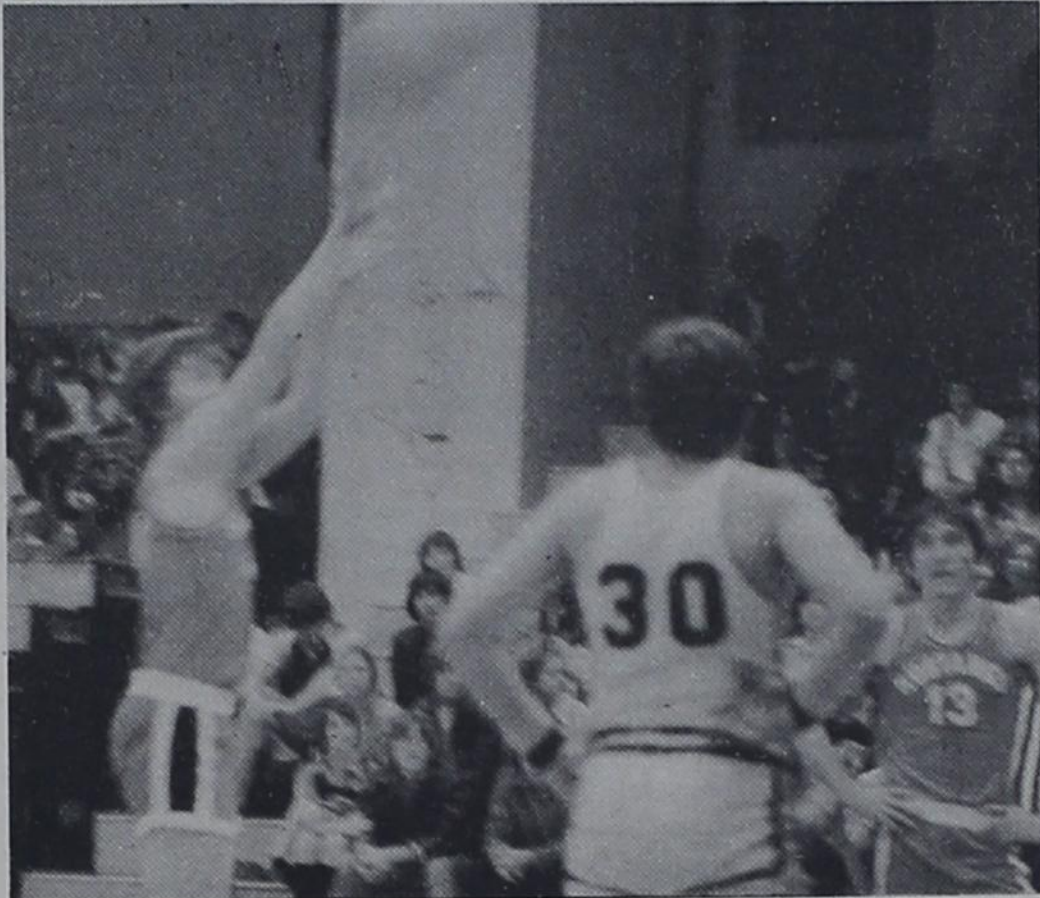
The annual blue and gold banquet will be held at the end of this month.

The Mustangs came out the second half determined to win and by the middle of the third quarter grabbed the lead and never fell behind again. It was a very aggressive ballgame with Shallowater making key defensive plays and the offense opening up and bombarding the basket.

The regular season ended with an overall 28-8 record and a 7-1 district record. Leading scorer for the Mustangs Tuesday night was Jon Gates with 27 points. 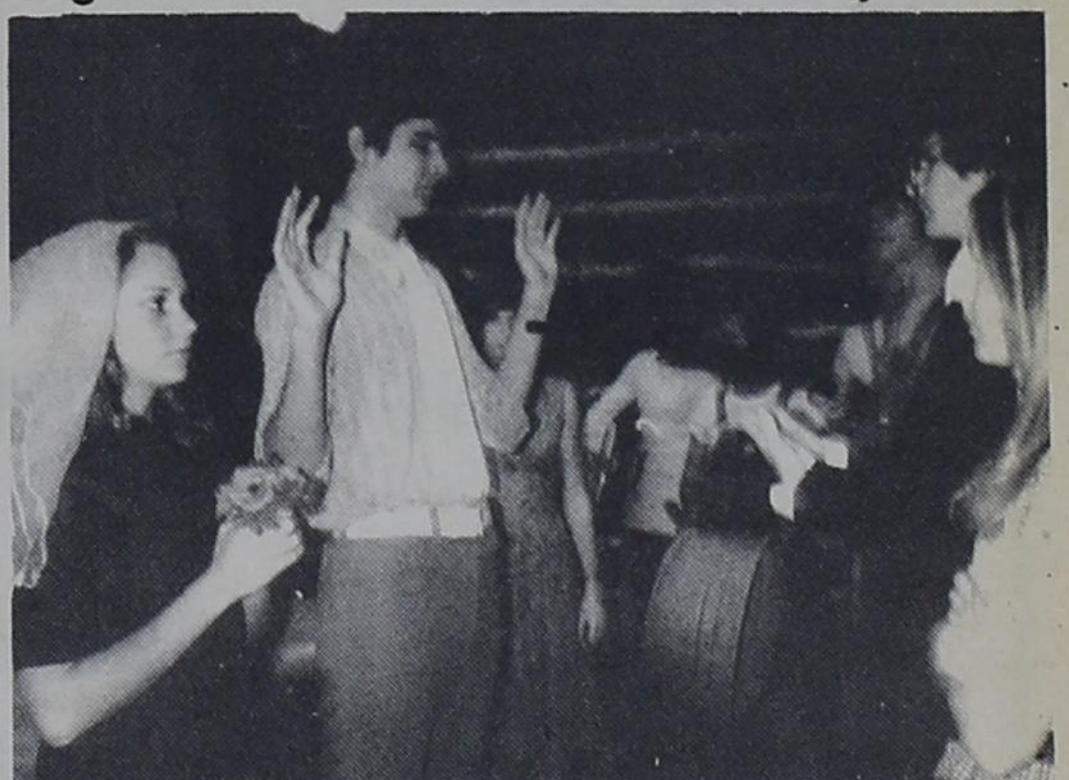

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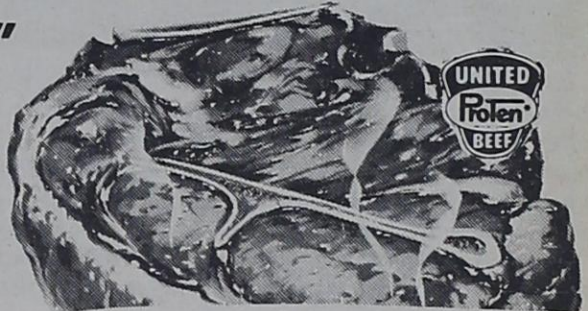

For possibly the first time this season, Texas Tech Saturday night against Rice showed the killer instinct that has been dormant. The Red Raiders surged in front and continued to pour it on the Owls. It was a welcome awakening.

It could well signal the emergence as a solid contender, for up to the Rice game the Raiders' play was not as consistent as expected. Against the Owls, Tech exploded.

A&M still is the team to beat and the Raiders must play the Aggies in College Station. The game against Rice holds out hope that the Raiders can climb that mountain when it arrives.

There was more balanced scoring against Rice and the Raiders controlled the boards. The shooting was strong and Tech obviously played a strong defensive game. With three straight victories, the Raiders may well be driving to the crown that escaped them last season.

Tech has had a rough schedule, meeting the two top teams and a couple of strong challengers in their first four games, three of which were on the road.

Now they are home for three of their next four, including Tuesday night's game against SMU. After that the schedule is balanced—away, at home, away, at home. The road games are A&M and Baylor, with Texas and TCU here.

Arkansas breathed life into the conference on its double overtime triumph over the Aggies. It wasn't easy and the Aggies proved that they are an outstanding team by battling back from defeat on the road to come close to winning.

An Aggie victory might well have shut down the pennant battle. They would have been hard to catch had they won. As it is, every team has at least one loss and the race once again is open to the strongest.

Although the home team once again this year has the edge, the edge isn't overwhelming. Home team had won 15 times and lost nine through last Saturday. That's 50 percent and not as strong as in previous years.

Tech and the Aggies lead in winning on the road, where championships are won. Each has won three of four. Arkansas has won two out of three.

After last Saturday there were some interesting marks. For instance, Texas was the only team without a home victory, while A&M and Arkansas were the only teams not to lose at home.

When Texas beat Baylor in Waco, the Horns were the fourth team to win a game on the road. That's something that SMU, TCU, Baylor and Rice had not been able to do.

Arkansas has beaten all three other state schools at home, while Rice has lost all three games at home to state schools.

One night recently, following a home game, a booming voice was heard and it sounded familiar. It was Ed Mooney, former Tech linebacker, later with the Detroit Lions and now in the WFL, was talking.

We asked him what he thought about the future of the WFL?

"It looks good," he replied. "The new president has the money and he's going to put it on a businesslike basis. We won't have an operation like last year. I think the future looks real good."

The other night I asked Polk Robison what the situation was in regards to option seats in Jones Stadium. One of our clients has been curious and asked.

"There's another year to go on the options," Polk replied. "We're looking into the situation now. There's an ad hoc committee investigating and it will make a recommendation. The committee is made up of people not connected with the campus."

"The options may be extended for another period of years," Polk continued. "Right now, we don't know. If they decide to extend, then current option seat holders will have the first opportunity to retain those seats."

I observed that it was a little rough to pay for so long and then risk losing the seats if the holder didn't extend his option.

"It's just like renting a house," Polk replied. "That's all option seat holders are doing, they're renting the seats, not buying them."

The Roundup—After the Tech-A&M game, Gerald Myers made himself a good prophet. "Arkansas doesn't have the depth that A&M has, but I'd guess they'd split. They'll each win at home". . . After the Baylor game here Gerald remarked: "There's the team of the future—Baylor". . . Much was made of the trouble Tech has had beating Rice in Houston. The records show that, since SWC play, the Raiders have won 11, lost 5, including four of the last five before Saturday night. . . In fact, Tech won three of the first four against Rice in Houston. . . Is Jerry Payne going to letter for Tech? The way he "scores" on that KFYO commercial, he makes more points each day than the whole Tech team! . . . Congratulations to William Johnson on becoming a father—and a great game for his new son!

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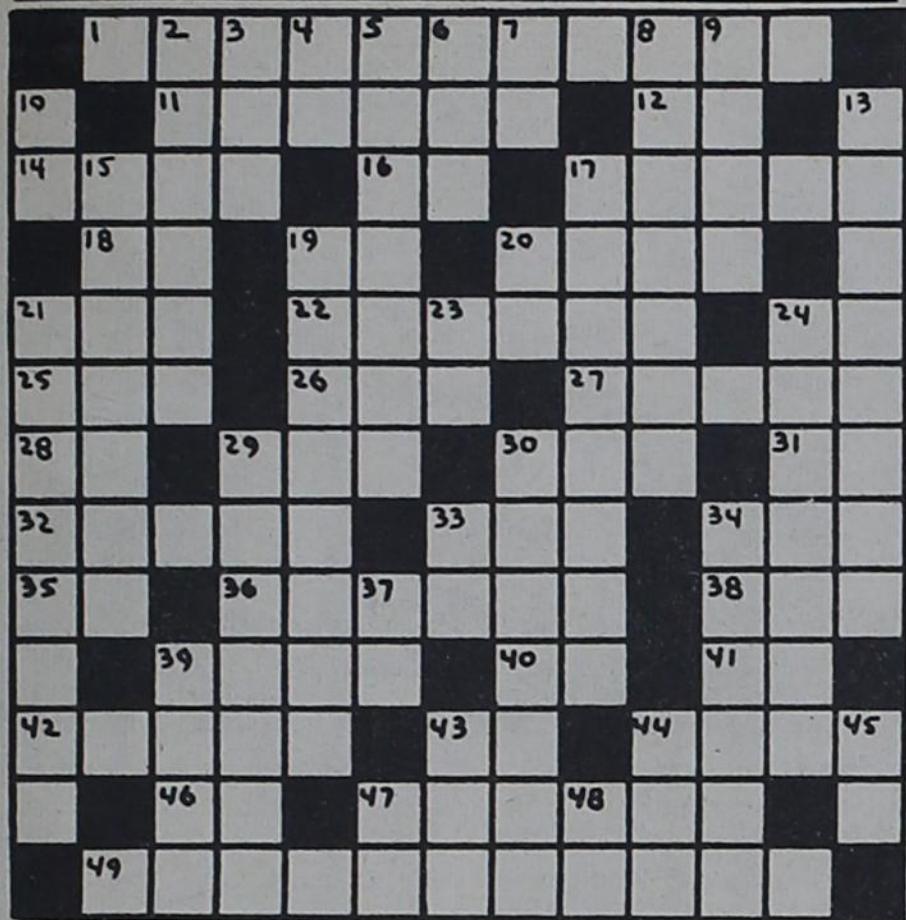

Rays of Hope

Who is the author of sickness? I will begin by saying that Christ is the healer and that Satan is the defiler. God is not the author of sickness and pain. In the Old Testament God revealed himself to His people in one of his covenant names as Jehovah-Rapha, "I am the Lord that healeth thee". (Ex. 15:26).

God's nature is against sickness and disease. Christ came to earth to show us the heart and nature of God. Jesus Christ was anointed with power to destroy the works of the devil. This is given in Acts 10:38. "How God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Ghost and with power: who went about doing good, and healing all that were oppressed of the devil; for God was with him."

We have a great story in Luke 13:10-17. This shows how Jesus destroyed the work of the devil when he healed a woman. She had been in pain for eighteen years. She evidently had arthritis or something of that nature, because her body was in a stationary position. Verse 11 states that she had a spirit (demon) of infirmity and this is why she could not lift herself up. Jesus healed the woman and in verse 16, he said that she should be loosed from Satan's bonds that had held her for eighteen years.

The Bible lists many sicknesses that were caused by demon spirits. We are fooling ourselves today if we think that our present

world has escaped the same evil. Any sickness that does not respond to medication or prayer is caused by an evil spirit. All sickness originated when sin entered our earth and all sickness today is not caused directly by specific evil spirits.

God created a beautiful garden for his created man to live in and enjoy. But man rebelled and went his own way. It was at this point that death, sin, sickness, hardship, suffering and misery entered into the world.

Many Christians believe that it is God that causes them to be sick because of a few verses given in the King James version that says "I will smite you" or "I will put upon you".

Dr. Robert Young, author of "Hints to Bible Interpretation", points out that in the original Hebrew, the verb is in the "permissive" instead of the "causative" sense. Actually it should have been translated something like this: "I will 'allow' you to be smitten...I will 'allow' these plagues to be brought upon you."

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God permits evil. There is a vast difference between commission and permission. If you want to jump off a building, God will allow you to do so. If you abuse your body and mind, God will allow you to fall prey to sickness.

The Bible states that the "devil walks around like a roaring Lion just waiting to devour someone." (If you don't want this to happen, read and do what's given in Eph. 6:11-18).

John 10:10 is the realistic nature of the devil. This shows that he is only interested in stealing, killing, and destroying. Sickness is a thief and a robber. See what sickness has done to many a young mother. It has robbed her of her health, beauty, and joy. It has robbed a husband of his wife and deprived children of their mother. It robs people of money that is needed for something constructive.

Sickness is not a blessing, it is a curse, a curse of the broken law (Deut. 28).

Sickness and disease is never the will of God for his children. He does not want a curse upon his people. He wants to bless them with health (1 John 3).

Christians have been redeemed from the curse of the law. Jesus has set us free (Ga. 3:13).

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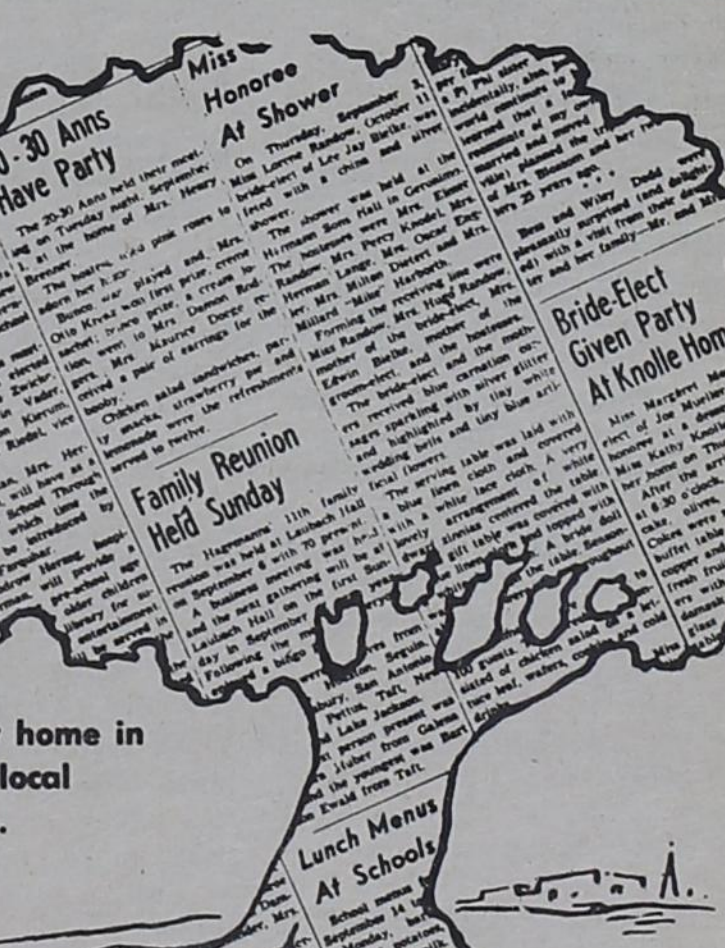

We wish Diana Perser the best of luck.

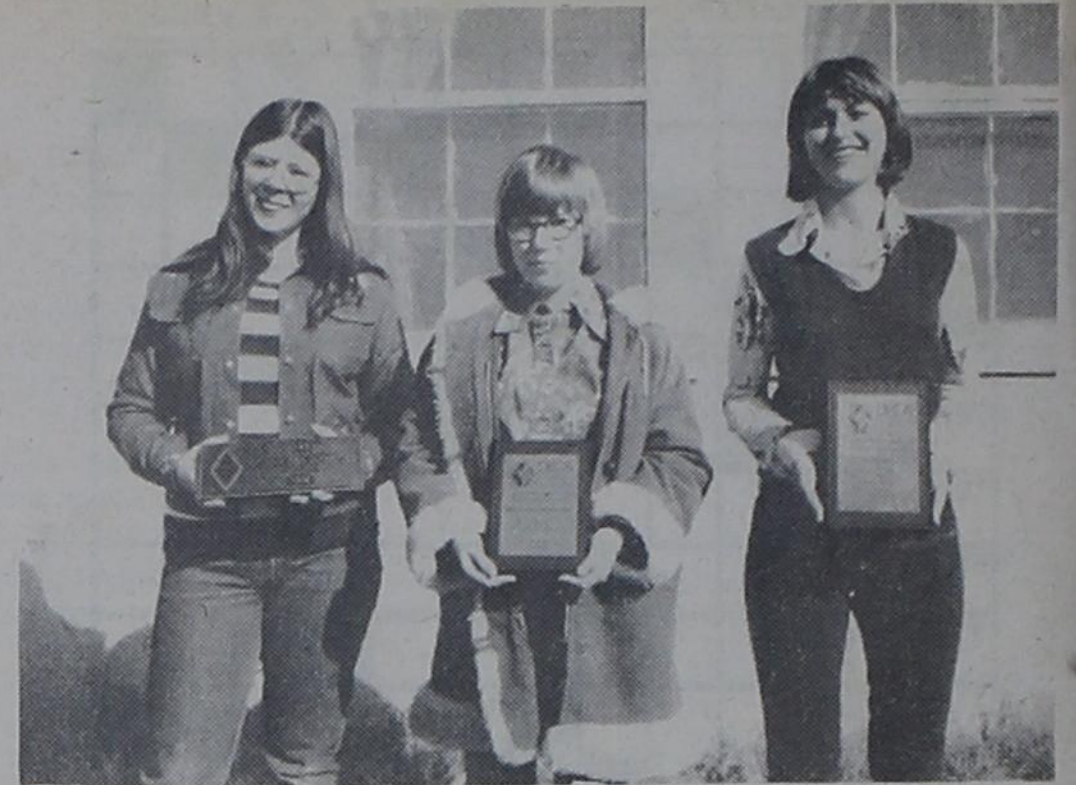
Herd Leads Us To Seasons End
