Candidates must be qualified electors who have resided within the City of Shallowater for six (6) months preceding the election.



be picked up and put in the dog pound, where they will be kept for 72 hours before they are


destroyed. The owner may retrieve their pet, by paying an impounding fee of \$15.00. If they animal wears a tag, showing a current rabies vaccination. Otherwise, the impounding fee will be \$25 until the owner can show proof the dog has been vaccinated for rabies. Then the city will reimburse the owner up to \$10 of the rabies shot cost.

The warden will be allowed to pick up any dog running loose, on city streets, or on anyone else's property, at the request of the property owner. Or if the warden chases the dog from the street, or other property, to the owner's property. He will warn the owner of the dog that the animal would not be picked up this time, but if it is seen running loose the second time, it would be picked up and impounded and the owner would be in violation of City Ordinance #196 and would be responsible and subject to fine.






