Outstanding Citizens' Program Announced

In an attempt to recognize the many contributions made by citizens in the Shallowater area, the Shallowater Lions Club will begin honoring an outstanding citizen or citizens each month. The Shallowater Lions Club is asking for citizens assistance in nominating worthwhile individuals to receive this honor.

The Lions Club realizes that most people worthy of receiving this honor will be too modest to give this information about themselves, so they are asking friends and families to make the nominations and complete the information on nomination forms provided and distributed in various businesses throughout the city. The forms will be available in businesses soon. Final plans to kick off the campaign are awaiting approval by the City Council.

In an attempt to make this a memorable occasion for those honored, an open house will be held each month honoring the outstanding citizen or citizens for that month. Contributions will be accepted by the Lions Club and the contributions will be used to purchase, plant and maintain trees which will be planted along the streets of Shallowater and in other public places in the city. The trees will not be placed on privately owned property. Beside each tree will be a plaque bearing the name of the person being honored and the month and year it was planted.

It is not necessary to make a contribution in order to nominate someone, officials pointed out,

but contributions are encouraged in order to fund the program. When contributions are made, checks should be made payable to the Shallowater Lions Club-Outstanding Citizen Fund. The Lions Club will determine the kind of tree to be planted, but requests for specific trees will be honored whenever possible. The Lions will also determine the location of trees to be planted.

Since the Lions Club first undertook this project, numerous other groups in Shallowater, including church and social organizations, have volunteered their support and effort.

In addition to adding to the beauty of the community, the Lions Club, businesses, interested citizens, and church and social organizations, believe this campaign is a way the citizens who have done so much for the social, economic and spiritual growth of Shallowater will receive recognition that is tangible and the trees will be around as a memorial for years to come.

Services Read Wednesday Afternoon for Accident Victim Ronald N. Teague

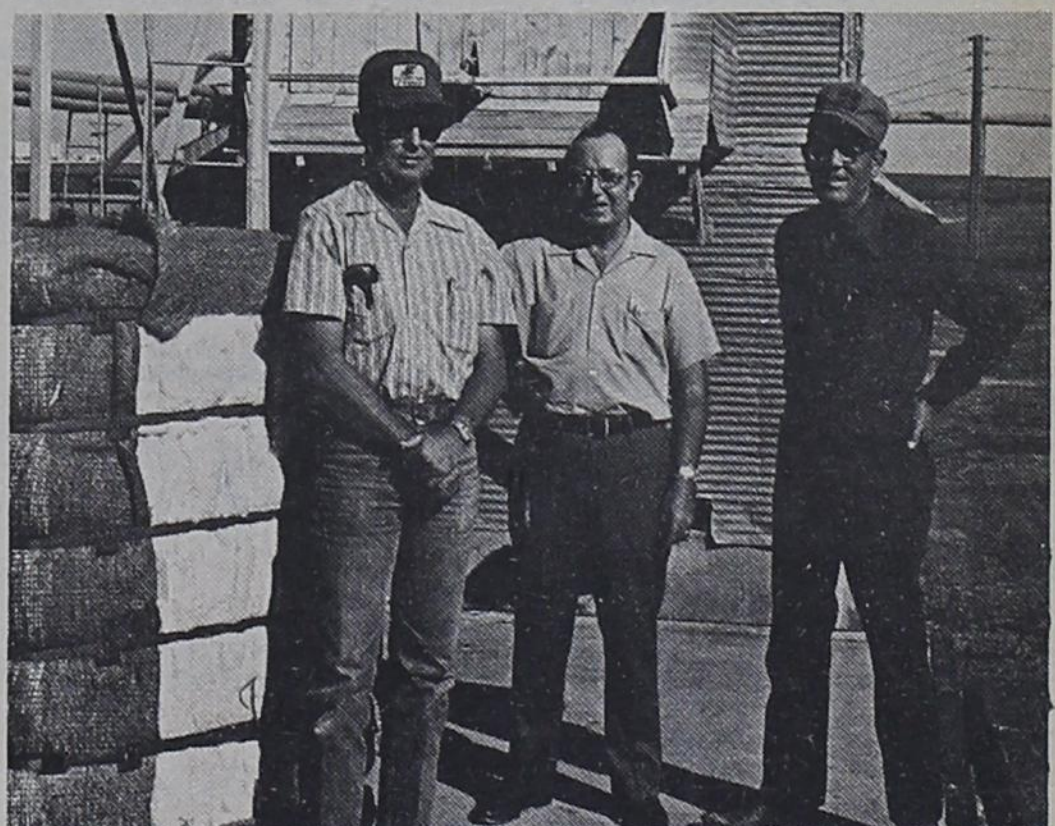
Services were held Wednesday at First Baptist Church in Shallowater for Ronald Teague who died Monday when his plane became tangled in electrical power lines and crashed.

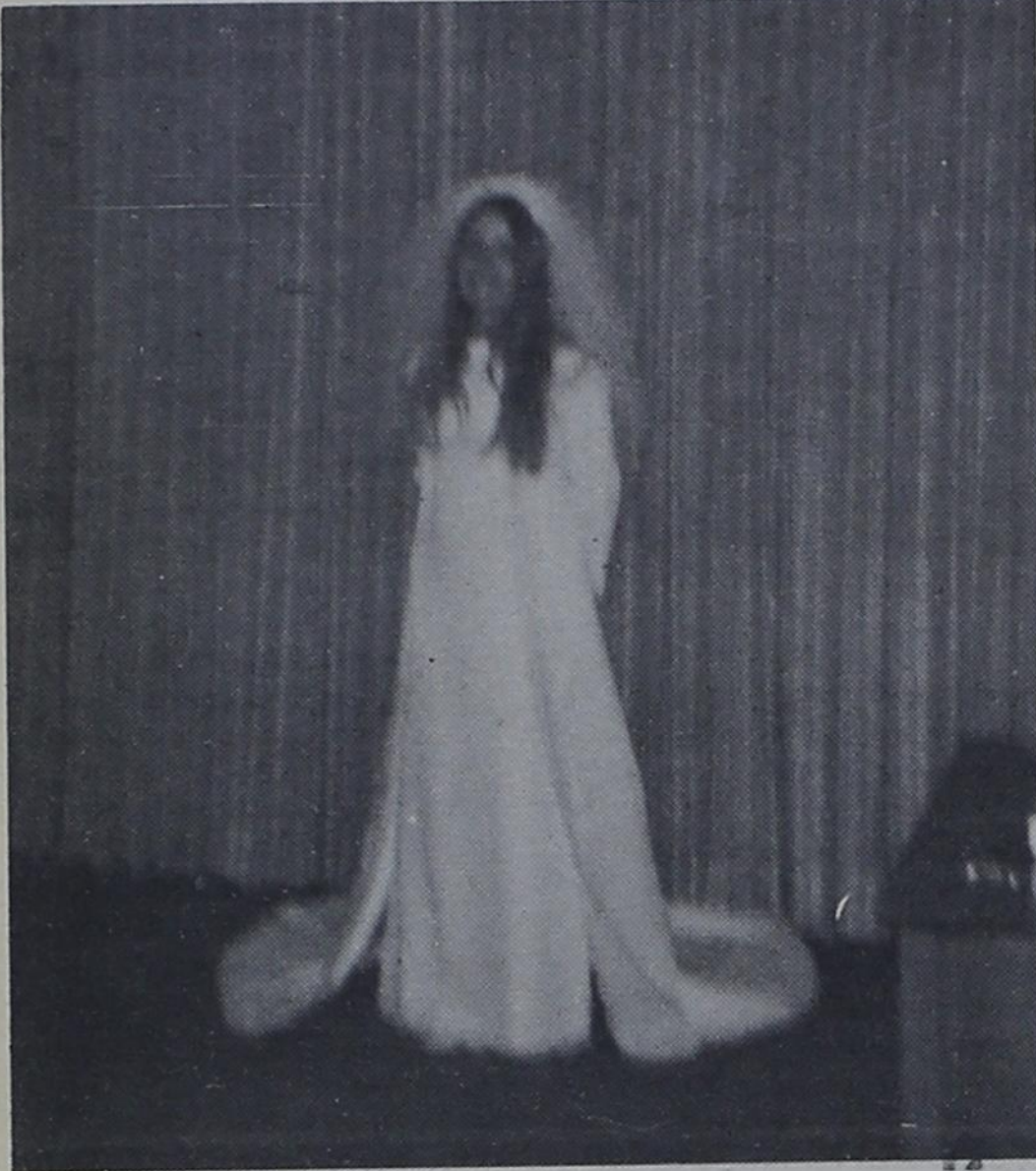

Juniors to have their best year yet at Shallowater High School. Since he is president of the class, he is one of the representatives for the

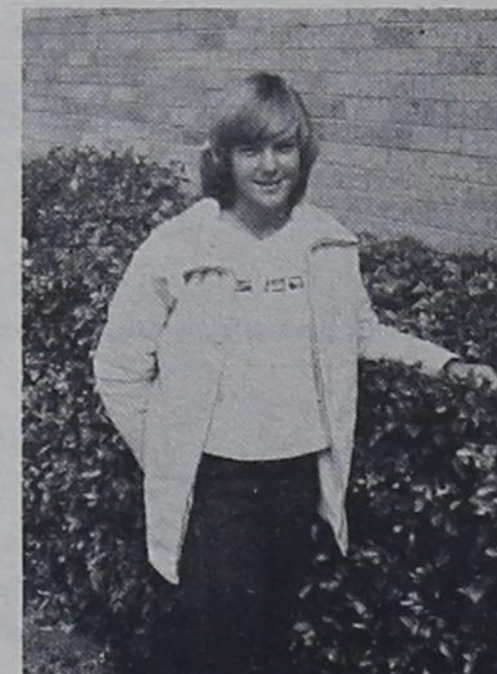
