Fire Guts House Trailer

When fire completely gutted the trailer home of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Oldham at 2:30 Saturday afternoon in Town Village, their only thought at the time was "we've lost everything we have, but our own lives. (Their pet dog "Freckles" lost her life in the fire.) Even in the darkest moments of the blaze, when the Shallowater Volunteer Fire Dept. members (who quickly answered the alarm) were battling the blaze, which went out of control in a matter of minutes, from an air conditioner short in the east end of the trailer, the Oldhams were asking themselves, "what will we do."

In a time of need, what better place is there to live than the Shallowater community where by nightfall Saturday night, neighbors and friends of the Oldhams, even strangers who had never met them, were beginning to spearhead a drive to help the Oldhams begin a new home.

Monday night at 7:30 a community wide pounding and love offering was held for Bill and Jane Oldham and their two children, 20 year old Elaine and 17 year old Danny, a senior in Shallowater Schools. Held at the Community Club House with around 200 persons in attendance besides the persons wo brought furniture, clothes and household items and placed them in a trailer, parked on the lot for that purpose. By the time everyone went home, the Oldham's were ready to start a new home, this time in a house, owned by Mr. and Mrs. G.W. Gates, Jr. at 12th St. and Texas Ave., with the first month's rent free, compliments of G.W. and Eloise.

Not only were the Gates angels in disguise, but the entire community, including Lubbock, even to the CBer's in Lubbock and the area, who spent Saturday night on their radios, asking for donations, which amounted to three van loads of clothing and food that was delivered to the Oldhams Sunday by the CB group.

Donations received at the Club House Monday night amounted to \$1,729 in money, all types of cooking utensils, canned foods (both bought and home canned) linens, homemade quilts and blankets, dishes, all types of clothing for the entire family, plus other items too numerous to mention, including furniture. Reese Air Force Base sent word they had a truckload of furniture and other items to be delivered.

The Oldhams have resided here for the past three years, moving here from Wichita Falls where Oldham was transferred here to Whites Warehouse, Inc. where he is transportation foreman. Jane, who was to have undergone major surgery Monday but postponed it, was taking a leave of absence from Shallowater Super Market where she has worked for 2½ years. Their daughter Elaine is employed at the textile plant in Littlefield.



Two new employees have begun work for the City of Shallowater in the Water-Sewer and Garbage Department, assisting Water Supt. A.F. Williamson.



Revocando Secciones 49-d and 49-d-1 del Artículo III de la Constitución de Tejas, S.J.R. 49 enmienda Sección 49-c del Artículo III de la Constitución de Tejas para disponer y autorizar \$400 millones adicionales de bonos para el desarrollo de agua en Tejas que se puede emitir a la aprobación de dos terceras partes de los miembros de cada cámara de la Legislatura para tales fines de desarrollo del agua que la Legislatura pueda prescribir.

La enmienda contiene prohibición específica contra el uso de fondos del estado para el desarrollo de recursos acuáticos del Rio Mississippi y también requiere que antes de que pueda encargarse de cualquier proyecto particular para el desarrollo de agua que requiere un gasto de mas de \$35 millones de producto de los bonos, debe de ser aprobado por resolución de la Legisla-

La fraseología de la enmienda propuesta tal como aparecerá en la

boleta es lo siguiente: "La enmienda constitucional autorizando un incremento de \$400 millónes de la cantidad de Bonos del Desarrollo de Agua en Tejas que podrán emitirse al ser aprobada por dos terceras partes de la legislatura; enmendando y consolidando disposiciones de Secciones 49-c, 49-d, y 49-d-1 del Artículo III de la Constitución de Tejas; y revocando Secciones 49-d y 49-d-1 del Artículo III de la Constitución de Tejas."

NUMERO DOS EN LA BOLETA (H.J.R. 99)

H.J.R. 99 propone una enmienda a la Constitución de Tejas para aumentar de \$100 millones hasta \$200 millones la cantidad principal agregada de bonos para el desarrollo de agua en Tejas que se puede emitir y que están en circulación por el Texas Water Development Board para proveer donaciones y préstamos para la mejoría de la calidad de agua como establecido por la Legislatura. 
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

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
