Valley Splits Games With Opponents Last Week

In Tuesday night's games last week between Silverton and Hedley, the varsity teams split games in the girls contests, but the boys won handily.

The Lady Patriots lost 47-57 to the Owlettes.

In the first period, Silverton dropped in 15 points to the Lady Patriots' eight. At halftime, Valley had led the scoring 13-9, and the third quarter scoring was tied 15 all. In the final round, the Owlettes dropped in 16 points to the Lady Patriots' 11, to win the game.

In this game, Hendrix sported 24 big points for honors, with Brittain adding eight and Dowd six.

The varsity boys had no trouble with the Owls, winning 89 to 38. In the first period, the Patriots hit 25 points while the Owls were ringing up only 10. In the second quarter, the Patriots outscored the Owls 25-6, and the third period saw more of the same, with the Patriots adding 14 to 10. The final quarter scoring was 25-15.

Will Williams was high scorer with 26 points. Tommy Williams added 20 and Shannon dropped in 14 points.

The Lady Patriots took a win over Hedley Friday night, 68-40. The first quarter saw Valley ahead 20-9, and at halftime, the scoring was tied at eight. The third quarter saw the Lady

Patriots lead the scoring by two, 16-14. In the final round, the Lady Patriots got busy and outscored their opponent 24-9.

Hendrix shot 20 points into the baskets, with Fulbright, Brittain and Smith all adding eight and Clay putting up 10 points.

The Patriots won 80-45 over the Hedley Owls. In the first round, Valley hit for 19-6. In the second frame, the Patriots led the scoring 28-9, in the third, 14-9, and in the final stanza, trailed in scoring 15-21.

Will Williams burned the baskets with 28 points. Tommy Williams added 20 and Saul nine for scoring honors.

Valley hosted a JV Tournament over the weekend, with Motley, Plainview, two teams from Childress, Tulia, Clarendon, Paducah and Valley entered.

The boys' first game Thursday was between the Patriots and Childress Freshmen. Valley outscored Childress 17-10 in the first period, 21-14 in the second, 10-9 in the third and trailed in scoring 10-16 in the fourth period. Final score was 58-49 in the Patriots' favor.

The Lady Patriots played the Childress JV in the first game. The first quarter ended with the Lady Patriots on the short end of the 6-10 score. The Lady Patriots reversed the scoring trend in the second quarter, outscoring Childress 8-2. The third period saw

more of the same, with the Lady Patriots leading with 15-4, and in the final round it was 11-6 in Valley's favor.

Friday, the girls played Clarendon and lost 35-31. The scoring by quarters was Valley 9-6, 9-12, 6-0 and 7-17.

The boys game was played with Paducah with Valley winning 61-54. By period, it was Valley 10-11, 22-13, 12-4 and 17-26.

Saturday the girls played for third place. By quarters, Valley was 7-4, 12-2, 6-2 and 10-2, defeating Motley County 35-10.

Johnson dropped in 10 points, Reyna and Smith eight each.

The Patriots won first place in the tournament. Their final game was with Childress JV. By quarters, Valley was 12-9, 8-5, 9-10 and 13-5, with Valley winning 42-29.

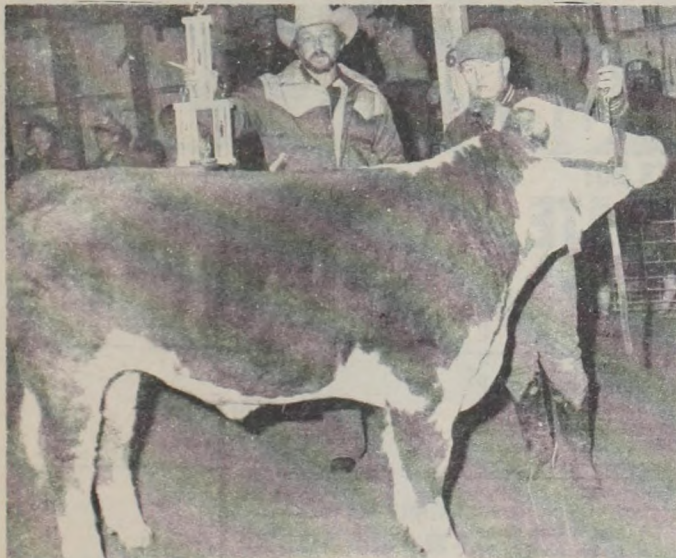
Saul scored 17 points, Phelps 11 and Martin eight.

The Superintendent's Corner

State Comptroller of Public Accounts Bob Bullock has just recently released a proposed plan for state aid to education in Texas. It seems that just about everyone with any clout or interest in financing education today is making himself known and his presence felt. Mr. Bullock's plan is no different except that it could be the most damaging to our area than all the others. The Comptroller's plan, if enacted, would essentially ruin many school districts and put them out of business.

The financial arrangements of the proposal are especially damaging to the Panhandle and West Texas area, and especially all the rural schools. Taking Senator Sarpalius' 31st Senatorial District as an example, more than 50% (46 schools) of the 89 school districts would receive less state money for school operation than they are currently receiving. According to Mr. Bullock's plan, as much as \$1 billion could be added to Texas education but it would be distributed according to the wealth of schools. That sounds fair but one must determine what the actual wealth of a school district is. That is a difficult undertaking.

The effect upon area schools is seen when such schools as Silvertown, Claude and Groom would receive less state aid than they are currently receiving. Virtually all the smaller school districts will receive less funds while the larger downstate urban schools will gain enormously. Valley wealth is somewhere beneath the lower 50 percent average and could gain a very modest amount, but not near the estimated increased cost for another year.

There is strong evidence that Bob Bullock will be a candidate for governor in the near future and he certainly knows how important the downstate urban vote is. Education and education financing does not need to become a political football.

It is the time of year when graduating seniors will be making final preparation for entering college, vocational schools or the world of work. The seniors will have an opportunity to visit, on the Valley campus, with representatives from Texas Tech, West Texas State, Wayland, Clarendon, Vernon TSTI. Additionally, recruiters from the various branches of the military will have opportunities to address the seniors. Seniors wanting to go to college, join the military or look at job opportunities need to prepare early. It's time now to think about entrance exams, money grants or loans. Mr. Jerry Bob Smith, the Valley School counselor, will assist all interested students in the important

decision-making time.

Former students—Kenney Chandler is enrolled at Texas Tech and plans to complete his degree in education this spring. Kenney plans a teaching career and has high interest in coaching. He will make a fine coach.

Kenney was a 1979 graduate of Valley.

Another graduate of Valley, Lana Fuston, is enrolled in the Texas Tech School of Nursing and hopes to graduate within a year. Lana is a 1981 graduate of Valley.

Still another graduate, Lee Proctor, is employed by KAMR TV (Channel 4) in Amarillo. Lee has pursued his interest in electronics and found a promising career in something he likes very much. If viewers will notice the credit names on the TV screen following newscasts and other local programing, they will see Lee's name listed. He just received a promotion. Lee is a 1977 graduate of Valley. We are proud of our graduates.

Formerly, junior high rules and regulations concerning

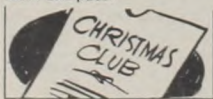
