The first bale of cotton for the 1989 growing season was ginned at Quitaque Gin Company October 5, 1989 with a 25.89 turn-out.

Leo Ortiz was the proud farmer of the 510 pound bale

that produced 880 pounds of seed with 1970 pounds of seed cotton. The cotton, grown south of Quitaque on land belonging to Laverne Skinner, was brought in September 29, 1989.

Commissioners Tend To Regular Business

The Briscoe County Commissioners Court met in regular session at the Courthouse in Silvertown, Monday morning, October 9, 1989. Commissioner Garvin presided over the meeting in lieu of the recently vacated County Judge seat.

A major concern of business to some Briscoe County citizens continued to be the proposed 1990 budget and possible tax increase. Commissioners reworked the budget, making the needed corrections, deleted the previous incorrect minutes, and made a gentlemen's agreement not to increase the tax rate, with a packed courtroom of citizens accompanied by attorney William Warnick.

The tax rate for Briscoe County will remain at the 1989 rate.

The commissioners recessed the regular session before noon, and reconvened after lunch for a lengthy executive session. They reviewed the applicants to fill the position of County Judge. Jimmy Ross resigned the elected office on September 28, 1989.

The Court has scheduled a special session for October 19, 1989, at which time members of the commissioners court will interview the applicants for office.

Persons bidding for the County Judge's bench are Jimmy Burson, Elgin Conner, Donnie Martin and John Frances.

Ferrels Receive Award

The following is a reprint from the October 5, 1989 edition of the Memphis Democrat

Billy and Fran Ferrel are among a select group of ranch families recognized for their outstanding conservation practices by the Texas Section, Society of Range Management

The Ferrels will represent the Panhandle in the annual State Society Awards program. They will be given the "Excellence in Grazing Management Award" in honor of ranch producers who effectively manage livestock and grass resources.

"These remarkable people demonstrate everyday that range conservation is an essential, yet cost effective, investment in healthy and sustainable agriculture. They lead the way in voluntary action to enhance the industry," says Larry Paul, Conservationist with SCS.

Award selection is based on conservation techniques, grazing techniques and individual initiative.

The Ferrels produce livestock on their ranch near Parnell. They incorporate rotation grazing, brush control, water development and fencing as a part of their ranch management program.

"Conservation pays financially and preserves our natural resources for the future. We try to ranch in harmony with nature to protect our soil and water resources. Careful management of these resources means utilizing every drop of rainfall and managing the soil to prevent water and wind erosion," says Ferrel.

State winners are selected from several nominees by agricultural conservation leaders in Texas. The Ferrels were to receive an award certificate and were to be honored at the statewide meeting in Wichita Falls on October 6, 1989.

After his football career, he opened an oil and mining business.

"Sachse" was well known around Quitaque and the area, and was a star athlete for Quitaque High School (football and basketball) 1933-35. He graduated from QHS in 1935.

Survivors include his wife, Helen, of Dallas; four daughters, Sandra Young, Susan Smith and Barbara Sachse, all of Dallas, and Linda Sachse of Plano; a brother,

Lake A Sachse of Childress; eight grandchildren; and one great-grandchild.

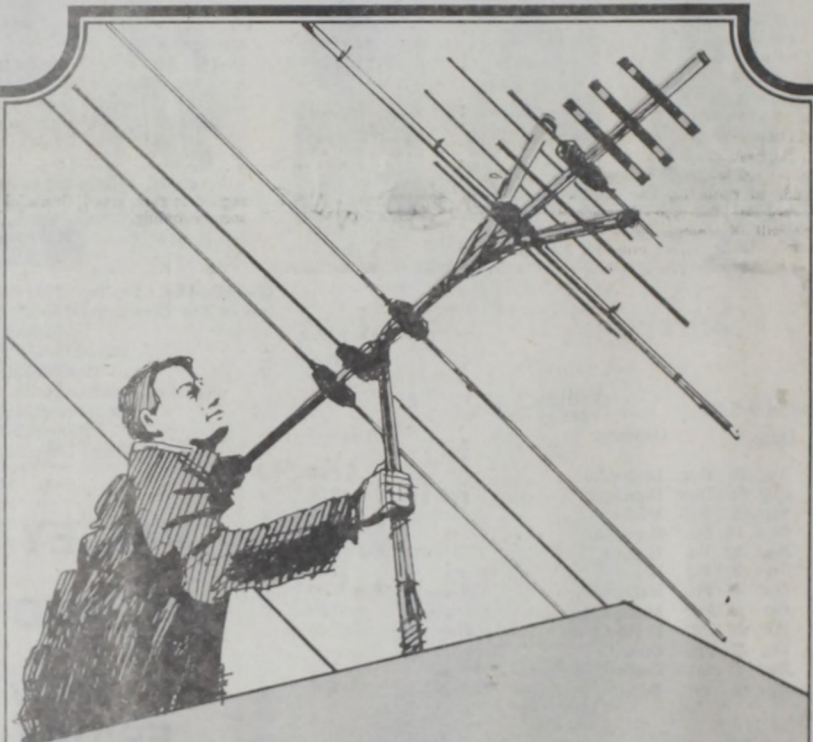

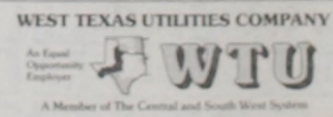

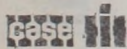
