## Quitaque Voters Okay City Sales Tax Issue

Quitaque residents voted for a 1% City Sales Tax by a margin of almost 7 to 1 in an election held on that issue Saturday before last. The vote total was 69 for and only 11 against the tax.

Revenue from the tax will reportedly be used mostly to maintain the city streets. City Secretary James Brunson says that much of the pavement within the city limits is in need of repair and there is no money in the city coffers for the repairs. It is hoped that some new paving might be effected in the not too distant future.

Quitaque has more paved streets than any other town of comparable size and more than many towns of much larger population here in this part of the world and city aldermen feel the sales tax will pay much of the costs for maintaining the pavement.

The sales tax will go into effect October 1, and then instead of collecting a 4% sales tax, local merchants will collect 5%, which will be sent to the state tax office, who will then refund one percent of the total to the City of Quitaque. Almost all of the larger towns have a city sales tax and now many of the small towns are passing the issue. Matador voted on the issue Tuesday of this week, and there are reports that other towns in the vicinity are considering the issue.

The accident occurred at 8:45 a.m. three-fourths of a mile west of Lockney. Investigating officials said a west-bound pickup driven by Hirman E. Bland, 60, of Haskell, made a left turn from U. S. 70 onto Farm Road 97 and was in collision with an eastbound pickup driven by Bolton.

Bland's vehicle then veered into a mail truck driven by R. C. Chapman of Childress. The mail truck had stopped at a stop sign on the farm road, officers said.

Bolton had been in critical condition in the intensive care unit in the hospital since the accident.

He was a former coach at high schools in Memphis, Wichita Falls and Dalhart and served as superintendent of Dalhart schools. He moved to Plainview in 1945.

He taught at Ash Elementary School and was principal at Central Elementary School. He also taught at Kress and Petersburg before he retired in 1962.

He was a World War I veteran. Survivors include his wife, Minnie; a daughter, Mrs. John Stowe of Abilene; a son, Blake V. Bolton, jr., of Vacaville, California; three brothers, Scott of Quitaque, Fox of Turkey and Park of Amarillo; a sister, Mrs. Ivan Montgomery of Dallas; and a grandchild.

**FARMERS HOME RURAL HOUSING ELIGIBILITY IS EXPANDED IN TEXAS**

Many additional families in Texas are now eligible for rural housing loans from the Farmers Home Administration, FHA State Director J. Lynn Futch announced today.

"In families where both husband and wife are employed," Futch explained, "the new policy permits half of the wife's gross income to be excluded in determining whether the total family income is within the maximum

limit for loan eligibility."

For example, the husband is the principal source of income with \$6,000. His wife earns \$4,000. His entire income, plus half of his wife's, or \$2,000, total \$8,000. This is within Texas' moderate income level of \$8,000 so the family may be eligible for a Farmers Home Administration loan.

James V. Smith, National Administrator of Farmers Home Administration emphasized that newly-eligible families must demonstrate that they otherwise merit FHA financing, and that credit is not available from regular commercial sources.

"The new policy will assist families in which the wife's income is needed to improve the standard of living. Note that if the wife is the principal breadwinner, the rule does not apply. This change will in no way affect our expanding service to low-income families," Mr. Smith said.

Loans may be made to families that will buy or build homes in open country or towns of up to 10,000 population, and who are not able to secure credit from regular commercial sources. Complete information is available from the

agency's 143 county offices located in county seat towns throughout Texas.
