Superman To Host National Driving Test Tuesday August 29 On CBS

Better known as "Superman," actor Christopher Reeve will host The Valvoline National Driving Test, a one-hour entertainment special that will utilize state-of-the-art camera technology to place viewers in the driver's seat while testing their knowledge of car safety and defensive driving on Tuesday, August 29, at 9 p.m. (CST), on CBS. The broadcast airs just before the long Labor Day weekend, a holiday typically marred by high numbers of traffic fatalities.

President of Texas Safety Association, George Gustafson says, "I strongly urge all Texans to tune in to the broadcast to sharpen their driving skills before the Labor Day weekend begins, especially those who have not taken the National Safety Council's Defensive Driving Course recently." Much of the content of the test booklet is taken directly from that course which Texas Safety Association and its agencies teach throughout the state. Other organizations which provided technical input include Mothers Against Drunk Driving, The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, and The

American Automobile Association. Reeve and his co-hosts, who will include Betty White, Randy Travis, Susan Sullivan, Perry King, Meredith Baxter Birney,

Dick Butkus, and Al Unser Jr., will ask viewers multiple choice and true/false questions about everyday traffic situations which confront motorists. A simulated

traffic situation, shot by specially-mounted cameras, will visually illustrate the question and test the viewer's reaction and memory. At the end of each question, Reeve will ask viewers to choose an

answer. Then, he will offer an explanation and give the correct answer and score.

The program is sponsored by Valvoline Oil Company and was developed with technical review from the National Safety Council. An official test booklet is available at no cost from retail outlets selling valvoline products, plus test sheets will be printed in both TV Guide and USA Today before the broadcast airs.

SOCIAL SECURITY NEWS

You can contact Social Security in a variety of ways. Choose whichever is most convenient to you. You can call, write, or visit. You can also make an appointment to file a claim.

Social Security recommends calling before coming to the office for a variety of reasons. You may be able to complete your business by telephone. If you do have to visit the office, you can find out what to bring with you when you come.

Before calling, you may want to have some information with you to help complete your call efficiently. You should have your social security number and, if you receive benefits or have medicare, your claim number. The claim number is shown on all correspondence and is on the Medicare card. A telephone number where you can be reached is also helpful.

The best times to call Social Security are Wednesdays, Thursdays, and Fridays. The first week of each month is a very busy time and many people try to contact

Social Security on Mondays. You may want to avoid these times.

Of course, you can contact social security at any time. If you have a question about a specific letter, or notice, you should have it with you when you call, or bring it with you if you come to the office in person.

If you are calling to report an event which will affect benefits, have the information ready. For example, to report a change of address, have the full new address, including zip code. To report a death, have the beneficiary's social security and claim numbers as well as the date of death and information about the surviving spouse if there is one.

Whether you call, or visit in person, social security employees will try to give you friendly, efficient service. A recent study shows that most people who contact the social security by telephone prefer to call if they have to contact us again.

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COMMUNITY SERVICE UPDATE

Disaster Relief

Within an hour after the crash of Flight 232 in Sioux City, Iowa, volunteers and employees of The Salvation Army pulled onto the field with their disaster canteens. These specially equipped vans served coffee, cold drinks, fruit and sandwiches to more than 2,000 rescuers, victims and investigators at the site. A shuttle service was established to take survivors and relatives to a nearby facility for emergency housing during the crisis. Trained Salvation Army personnel began counseling both relatives and those who miraculously survived the crash.

Since The Salvation Army began in 1865, it has provided emergency food, shelter, counseling and funds to victims of disasters such as fires, floods, hurricanes, tornadoes, airline crashes and train derailments. When a city official places a call to the Army's disaster hotline, it quickly moves into action. Motivated by Christian love, the Army quietly and diligently works on the scene until all victims, rescuers and equipment are gone.

This essential service is dependent on donations. The Salvation Army's role in disaster relief has been significant enough for the federal government to recognize it as a "major disaster assistance organization."

In many major cities, Salvation Army canteen vehicles operate at night when volunteers help serve meals to homeless people, runaways and prostitutes. You might also see these canteens at marathon events and parades, providing drinks and first aid to participants.

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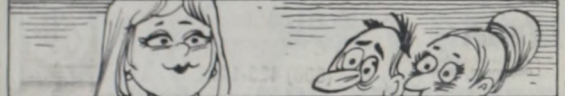

DPS Urges Drivers To Use Extreme Caution Around Schools And During Labor Day Weekend Traveling

The first few weeks of school are the most dangerous, according to Major Cawthon. "This time of year presents safety problems for both the school children and the driver," he explained. "Many youngsters are attending school for the first time and others might be going to a different school,

where they are unfamiliar with local traffic conditions. One problem seems to be that during the summer recess, some drivers have gotten out of the habit of being alert for both school zones and school buses."

Public Safety Officials are asking Texas drivers to begin

thinking now about the safety of our school children, as the beginning of a new school year starts up. By observing the speed limits in school zones, being alert for increased pedestrian traffic, and watching for school bus activity, we can make this a safe school year for all.

be returning to school, many aboard big yellow and black school buses. One of the most common sights on our roadways during the school year, these buses can carry from 71 to 83 seated students on any given trip each day.

"Yet as common as they are,

every year there seems to be an unfortunate rash of accidents caused by drivers who fail to follow safe driving practices for a stopped school bus," stated Major Vernon Cawthon, Regional Commander for the Texas Department of Public Safety.

State law requires drivers on the same roadway, as a school bus that is stopped to load or unload children, to also stop until the bus driver has turned off the flashing red lights. This rule applies unless the vehicle is separated from the bus by a divided highway with a median strip.

The Labor Day weekend is a sure sign of things to come. Among them is the fact that another summer is about to pass. It also represents the last three-day weekend before cooler weather for many Texans, which has both local and state police safety officials concerned.

"We anticipate a lot of Texas motorists will take advantage of an extra day off to make that one last summer trip before winter," stated Major Vernon Cawthon, Regional Commander for the Texas Department of Public Safety. "This means Texas drivers will be sharing the roadways with more vehicles, being driven more

miles than usual, by drivers who are probably more fatigued than usual," he added.

Even though safety officials remain optimistic that this can be a safer Labor Day holiday, they also realize that people will die needlessly on the state's highways

during this period. "The tragic part of our traffic fatality picture is the fact that most of these accidents are caused by driver error and definitely are preventable," Major Cawthon continued.

This underlines the importance of obeying all traffic laws. Studies

have shown that when a traffic law is violated, property damage, injury and even death will many times result.

Major Cawthon concluded by asking Texas drivers to do their part in making this a safe holiday by remaining alert, adjusting your speed to match the existing road conditions, avoid the use of alcohol and please, use your safety belt, no matter how short the trip.

Dear Parent or Guardian:

The Turkey - Quitaque ISD serves nutritious meals every school day. Students may buy lunch for 55¢ K-8th and breakfast for 35¢. Children from households that meet Federal Income guidelines are eligible for free meals or reduced-price meals at 30¢ for lunch and 30¢ for breakfast. To apply for free or reduced-price meals, complete the enclosed application, sign it and return it to the school.

FOOD STAMP / AFDC HOUSEHOLDS: If you currently receive Food Stamps or "Aid to Families with Dependent Children" for your child, you only have to list your child's name and food stamp or AFDC case number, print your name, and sign the application. Since you have already given income information to the welfare office, the school can confirm your eligibility.

ALL OTHER HOUSEHOLDS: If your household income is at or below the level shown on the enclosed scale, your child is eligible for either free or reduced-price meals. To apply for meal benefits, you must provide the following information and sign the application: (1) list the names of everyone who lives in your household. Include parents, grandparents, all children, other relatives and unrelated people who live in your household. (2) list the social security number of each adult age 21 or older. If an adult does not have a social security number print "None". 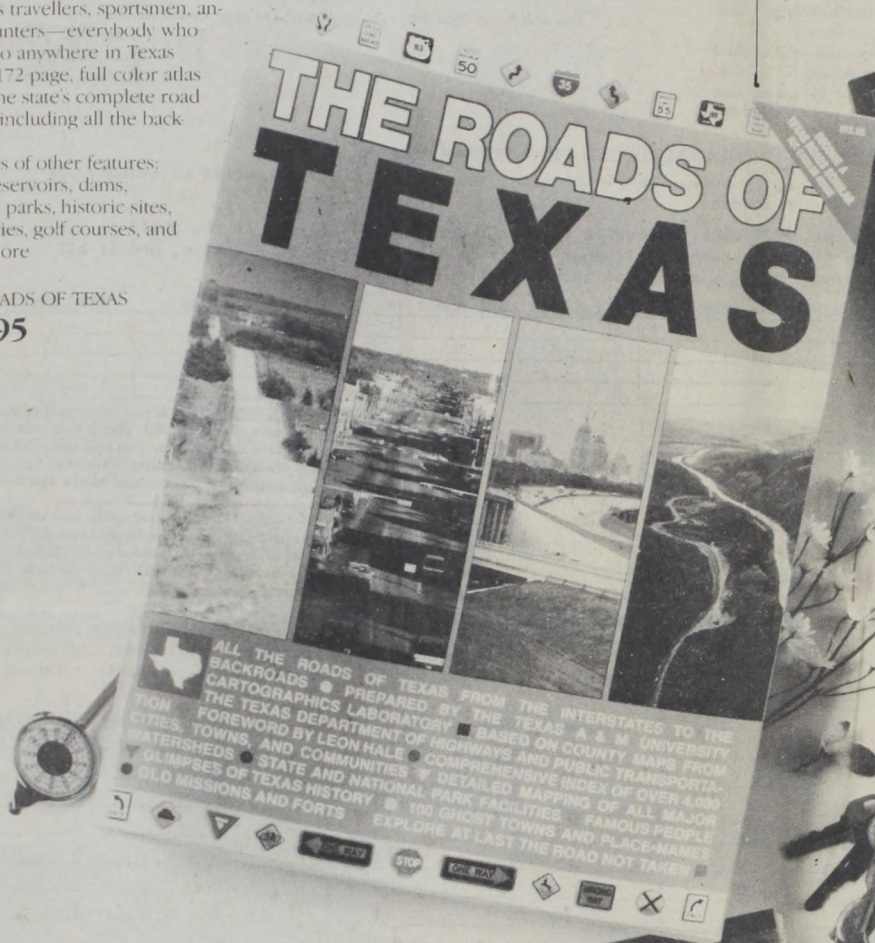

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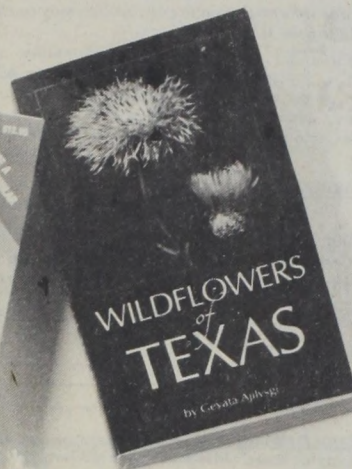
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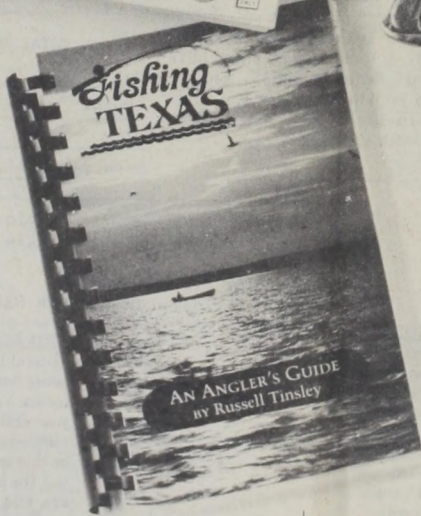
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
