Home Notes

Are you aware of the new Textile Labeling Law which will be-

come effective July 3, 1972? Clothing and fabrics manufactured after that date must have permanent labels stating how to care for the fabric, the fiber content of the fabric and any special performance features such as the amount of shrinkage. When you buy fabric for home sewing you will be given a label to sew into the fin-

ished garment. I believe we are going to find these labels most helpful in selecting and caring for our clothes. Be sure to look for the permanent labeling.

Have you begun your sewing for the Spring and Summer? I hope you have remembered to prevent potential problems by pre-treating before sewing. For example, pre-shrink zippers in warm water before sewing them in. (You may be surprised how much they shrink!) This will prevent the zipper puckering and pulling the finished garment. It is a good idea to pre-treat fabrics and notions in the manner in which you intend to care for the finished garment. For example, if you intend to launder a garment, put the fabric and notions into the washing machine and wash them as you will the finished garment. As you may have discovered, even some of the expensive knits shrink.

Here are some tips for sewing with knits:

1. Polyester or cotton-covered polyester core threads help eliminate seam puckering.
2. Ball-point sewing machine needles make for easier sewing on knit fabrics.
3. Lightweight, nonwoven, washable interfacing designed especially for polyester knits and wash-

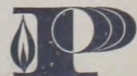

Farm Electrification Short Course To Be Held In Turkey

A Farm Electrification Short Course for adult farmers will be held May 8-11 under the sponsorship of the Turkey High School Vocational Agriculture Department, according to Mr. Loran Denton, superintendent, and Mr. Jay Eudy, teacher of vocational agriculture.

The Short Course is being sponsored by the Vocational Agriculture Department of Turkey High School.

Mr. Cleve Walkup, Farm Electrification Specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Agricultural Engineering at Texas A&M University, will do the instructing in the course. He is headquartered at Texas A&M University.

Mr. Walkup holds a B.S. degree in Industrial Education and a M.E. degree in Agricultural Education.

The Short Course at Turkey is scheduled to begin May 8 at 7:30 p.m. in the Vocational Agriculture Building. Other meetings in the series of four will be held May 9-10-11. During the dates the Short Course is in progress, Mr. Walkup will be available to assist farmers with individual problems and to provide on-the-farm instruction, according to Mr. Eudy.

Farmers interested in attending the Short Course should write or call the Superintendent of Schools, Mr. Loran Denton, or the teacher of Vocational Agriculture, Mr. Jay Eudy. An entry fee of \$3.00 will be charged. Farm Electrification Short Course certificates are to be presented to each farmer who attends all the training sessions.

Receives Plaque At Lions Meeting

Walter Graham of Happy, Texas, received a plaque from the Quitaque Lions Club Monday night May 1, in recognition of his conservation work on his farms in the Cap Rock Soil and Water Conservation District. Mr. Graham's most outstanding work was his efforts over many years to control the largest gully in the Panhandle. Graham has over 12 miles of terraces to hold water out of the gully. He and two neighbors formed a pooling agreement and installed an erosion control dam at the head of the gully that controls floodwater from over 1,500 acres. Last year he built a large pipe drop structure that stabilized the floor of the gully.

He also built an irrigation reservoir on Cottonwood Creek that can store 1,000 acre feet of water. This structure also controls flooding on Cottonwood Creek and has caused springs downstream to start flowing.

Mr. Graham received technical assistance from the Soil Conservation Service and cost-share assistance from the Great Plains Conservation Program.

Course can be adjusted to the wishes and interests of the farmers enrolled, but that he expects to cover such subjects as safety, how to properly choose wire sizes and install motor circuits, how to chose, protect, and ground electric motors, and how to calculate the cost of operating electrical equipment. Demonstrations will be given and class enrollees will have the opportunity to perform the skills demonstrated.

Short Courses in Farm Electrification, as well as in other areas, are now available to farmers throughout the state under the new cooperative program between the Texas Education Agency and Texas A&M University.

This cooperative program is designed to make the services of specialists available to conduct short courses under the supervision of public schools. Such a program will enable teachers of Vocational Agriculture to provide improved educational services to farm people.

Specialists are now available in the fields of beef cattle, farm electrification, farm welding, swine production, tractor maintenance, oxy-acetylene welding and pasture.

THE HUMAN HEART

The human heart is a large, hollow muscle that begins to form as soon as the embryo begins to develop. The walls that divide the heart into chambers are forming when the embryo is only six weeks old. At first the heart is a simple tube that soon begins to beat regularly, but it grows so fast that there is no room for it to become longer inside the embryo, then it doubles back on itself, twists around, and begins to look like the heart as we see it.

There are several different stages as the heart develops before a baby is born, then after birth there are several more. At birth the heart weighs 3/8 of an ounce, at nine years 31/3 ounces, and at 16 years of age it weighs seven ounces. An infant's heart beats about 120 times a minute; an adult's heart beats about 70 times a minute.

The heart is a very busy pump linked by 100,000 miles of pipelines to all parts of your body. Those pipelines insure the continuous flow of oxygen-rich blood that your brain, lungs, kidneys and other vital organs need. This busy machine pumps five quarts of blood through its chambers every 60 seconds. It also does enough work in 1 hour to lift a 5-ton weight more than a foot off the ground.

WHAT CAUSES HEART ATTACK?

Heart attacks are the greatest single cause of death in the United States every day. They kill about 1400 persons and leave thousands of others crippled to some extent for the rest of their lives.

WHAT HAPPENS TO THE HEART?

Almost all heart attacks are caused by a clot of blood blocking a coronary artery that has become hardened and narrow because of arteriosclerosis. What causes this? There is probably no single cause, however, there are several factors involved: diet, smoking and hereditary traits!

Heart Association, Inc. America is a voluntary health agency, organized to fight diseases of the heart and blood vessels. It has 55 affiliates (and by the way, Texas is one) in the United States and Puerto Rico. About 1400 cities and county groups are associated with it through the state association, and now Quitaque is one of those 1400 cities.

This association gives aid to research scientists to help expand the knowledge of heart and circulatory disease, publish four journals for the medical profession, educational materials for the general public. This includes films, pamphlets, books and reports.

The American Heart Association gives financial support for its program from the general public through contributions made to the Heart Fund Association.

Dear Friends in Christ:

Please forgive us for being so long about writing. I keep waiting until I have plenty of time to write a nice, newsy letter—and so I just keep putting it off. Please don't mark us off your prayer list, for we are dependent upon your prayers. We like to receive letters, too.

We are all well. Our health is good and the children are all growing so rapidly. Gwen begins school in September. Gay is now in the fourth and Gill is in the sixth. Gwen is a regular tom-boy and always into trouble. Gill is growing into a helpful young man. And Gay is a really pretty little Miss.

We have also adopted a Malawian boy who will be 17 in April. He has been living with us for two years now. Guy is attending Texas Tech in Lubbock. He seems to be doing really well. We miss him so very much. How grateful we are for the many people who prayed for and encouraged him along the way while he is away from home.

The Lord is truly blessing the witness of the gospel in Malawi. Roy has turned all of his bush ministry over to Charles Middleton. He is now in charge of Urban Missions and Mass Communications. We have just broken ground for our Recording Studio. Roy will be producing radio programs for Malawi Broadcasting Corporation, making films and film strips to be used by our Malawian workers, and developing a cassette ministry. We have seven churches in the City of Blantyre to which he is assigned. It seems as though

we just take on more when we get someone to help us. We could certainly use another couple in the city to provide leadership for the Urban Churches. Then we could devote full time to Mass Communications. Please pray that God will call out someone to come and help us.

I direct the women's work in the city—visiting each woman's group at least once a month. Then, I teach scripture in two schools once a week. On Sunday I have a class of about 20 young people and university students in a Bible Class of the English Language Church. These young people are Asians, Malawians, Europeans, English, and Americans. I try to assist in week-day activities for this same group. On Sunday afternoon, these young people go to the different Chichewa Churches in the city for a Children's Bible Hour. A Kindergarten of 36 children and two trained Malawian teachers is in my care. I also am the bookkeeper

for the mission. For two years now I have been director of the Audio-Visual Center. We distribute and maintain films, filmstrips, flannel graph stories, pictures, cassette tapes, etc. which our workers all over Malawi can check out on a loan basis. We have a Malawian who services the machines, cleans films, files, and mails out materials requested. Right now I am working on the script for three filmstrips. A missionary photographer from Rhodesia will be here in May to take the pictures for it. We hope to have a dozen copies of each film ready for use in August.

I try to arrange my hours so I'm home when the children are not in school. The girls enjoy going with me to the women's meetings. We are very grateful for Bambo Bester, our cook and housekeeper. He has been with us for over four years now. He is an excellent housekeeper and cook. I couldn't cope without him because

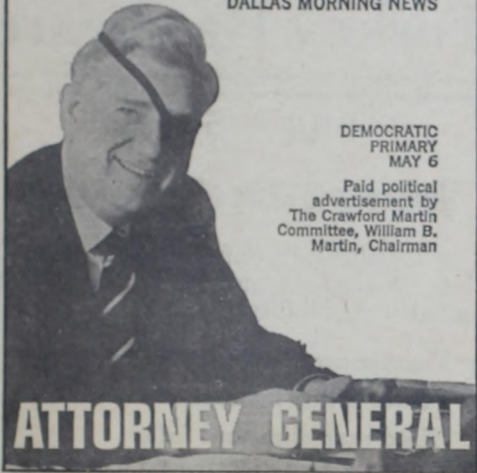
