Turks vs. Silvertown Owls In Home Opening Game

The Turkey Turks take on the Silvertown Owls Friday night at Turkey in the first home game of the season. The Turks lost a 12-18 decision to the Happy Cowboys in the season opener last Friday night. Three touchdown jaunts by Charles House of the Happy Cowboys were barely enough for the Cowboys to edge the Turkey Turks at Happy last Friday night 18-12. The Turks recovered a Cowboy fumble on the Turkey 49 yard line in the first period of play, and from that point drove for a touchdown, with Turk fullback David Lane going 18 yards for the TD to give the Turks a 6-0

lead. The try for extra point was blocked. After an exchange of punts in the second period of play, the Cowboys owned the ball on their own 25 yard line and from there House burst over his own right tackle and raced 75 yards for a touchdown to tie the score at 6-6. Garcia's try for extra point was no good in the second quarter. House again broke loose on an 80 yard scoring jaunt to make the score 12-6 at halftime. The Turks drove to the Happy 25 yard line but were held and forced to give up the ball. A bit later, House scored again from 16 yards out to give the Cowboys an 18-6 margin.

In the fourth period of play the Turks marched 44 yards for their second score, with Rod Settiff scoring on a keeper from the one yard line and pulling the score to 18-12. The Turks threatened again before the game was over but could not score. The game was costly for the Turks, however, as quarterback Rod Settiff injured the thumb on his left hand in the second quarter of play. Rod played the entire game, but x-rays have disclosed that his thumb was broken at the base and is now in a cast. He will probably be out of action for three or four weeks. And during workouts this

week, it has been reported that Leroy Hamner, sophomore guard received an injury that may sideline him for several weeks, although the extent of his injury was not known at this writing. The Silvertown Turkey game is always a good one. Last year the Turks scared the feathers off the highly-favored Owls before the Owls came from behind to edge the Turks 28-20 in a thriller. Silvertown was shellacked 31-0 by White Deer. Area football fans are urged to attend Friday night's game and see a good one. The Turks and their coaches will sincerely appreciate your support.

First Grain Brought To Local Elevators

Bruce Price brought in the season's first grain to the elevator on Tuesday of this week, according to Manager Arville Settiff. In fact, Bruce, who farms the old Cap Wise farm at Gasoline, brought in two loads of grain Tuesday. The grain, which was grown on irrigated land, tested 14, and Mr. Settiff said it was good grain. He said that the wet weather had darkened the color of the grain a little but didn't hurt the quality.

Over at Turkey, Lynn Davis brought in the first grain more than a week ago.

That load of grain tested 13 and Mr. Settiff reported that it was good grain also.

There is a great deal of grain now ready to be harvested in the area, only waiting for the fields to dry up enough for the combines to be ready to roll.

Since the above report was written, more rains have fallen in the area. More than an inch of moisture was reported to have been received. This part of the Panhandle is now wetter than it has been in a long time having received a probable five inches or more of moisture in the past three weeks.

VERLON HAMILTON INJURED MONDAY IN AIRPLANE CRASH

Verlon D. Hamilton, 29, of Grapevine, son of Mr. and Mrs. Leroy Hamilton of Quitaque is believed to be recovering in satisfactory condition from injuries received late Monday afternoon in the crash of a single-engine plane near the Cedar Creek Landing at Lake Tawakoni near Greenville.

According to his father, Hamilton, piloting a single engine Cessna plane, was attempting to land on an oil surface road near the 2101 Bait Shop on F.M. 2101 when the left wing of the craft struck a utility pole. The plane was about 10 feet off the ground.

Verlon was attempting to land his plane after his brother Randall (Butch) Hamilton of Quitaque, flying a crop dusting plane, had signaled his brother that he was going to land because it

was getting dark. He instruments for night

Randall Hamilton was land his plane safely. his brother were returning from Monroe La. to Mongum Airfield between Fort Worth and Dallas. They had gone to Monroe earlier Monday to pick up the crop dusting craft.

"My intentions were for him to go on to the airfield," Butch Hamilton stated. When he saw his brother crash, Butch said he "ran as hard as I could to his plane. I found him pinned upside down in the plane."

Butch said he loosened the seat belt around his brother, but that it required the aid of an unidentified man to free him from the wreckage.

Verlon was carried to Greenville Surgical Hospital where he underwent treatment for a concussion, cuts and bruises. He was released from the hospital Wednesday.

Mr. and Mrs. Hamilton went to Greenville to be with their son. They returned home Thursday morning, and reported that they believed Verlon was going to be all right in a few days.

His airplane was described as a total loss.

PRUSSIC ACID IN

SORGHUMS MAY POISON LIVESTOCK

Recent rains over much of the area have brought on regrowth of sorghums, sudan grass, sudan, sorghum hybrids and Johnson grass that suffered from the dry weather this summer or that was recently harvested. And this situation may pose a threat to grazing livestock.

New growth on sorghums sometimes develops a high prussic acid content and becomes a hazard to grazing animals, says Briscoe County Agri. Agent Ken Cook. The same situation develops when the growth of these same sorghums is stopped by a freeze or frost. So, farmers are urged to keep an eye on their stock for the next few months if they are grazing any of the different sorghum types.

Prussic acid acts quickly in the digestive tract of an animal, explains Ken Cook. It can kill an animal within a very short time after the plant is eaten. Whether or not a poisoned animal can be saved depends on how soon a veterinarian can get to it.

Animals that have been poisoned may stagger and act sleepy before suddenly dropping dead

Severe muscular twitching is sometimes seen. Labored breathing and frothing from a wide-open mouth are common symptoms. An animal may grind its teeth and turn its head into its flank. The breath usually has an almond-like odor and mucous membranes appear congested but not cyanotic and bluish. The blood is cherry red.

Death results from suffocation, since the poison prevents the exchange of oxygen from the blood to the tissue.

Forage containing the prussic acid can be fed safely if it is cut and allowed to cure completely in the field, or if it is put up as silage and not fed for several months. Mature plants with few suckers seldom grazed in late fall can be very dangerous. A good way to check grazing is to turn one or two low-quality animals into a suspect field and watch them for a day or two. Be sure water is available to them or the symptom may be delayed.

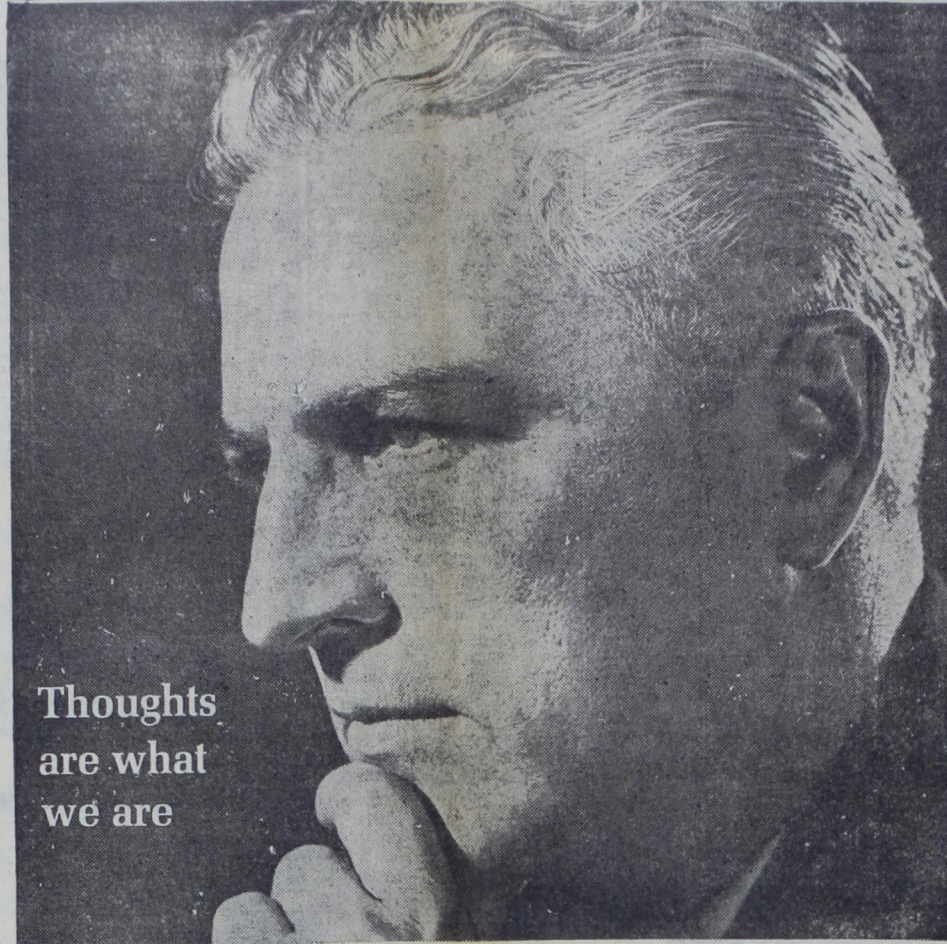

Army Worms Attacking Crops and Lawns

During the past several days armyworms have been reported on lawns and certain crops on the High Plains, reports Dr. Bill Clymer, Extension area entomologist headquartered at Lubbock.

Most of these reports have involved the fall armyworm or the true armyworm. These insects are similar in appearance and habits and attack small grains, grain sorghum, corn, grasses and other such crops.

There may be several generations each year with the larval stage lasting 10-25 days during which time the larvae reach a length of 1-1½ inches. When the larvae are full grown, they burrow into the soil and go through a pupal or rest period.

The adult female emerges usually within two weeks but this is dependent upon temperature. The adult generally flies some distance before laying eggs. Each adult female lays about a thousand eggs.

Full grown fall armyworm larvae vary in color from light tan to green to nearly black. They have three yellowish-white hair lines down the back from head to tail. On the side next to the yellow lines is a wider dark stripe splotched with red. A prominent white inverted "y" is on the front of the head.

Large numbers of fall armyworms can destroy entire fields or lawns, then often invade adjoining areas. Buildups are heaviest after cool, wet weather. However, when host plants are limited by dry weather, fall armyworms may be found in

large numbers in grain sorghum or small grain fields. Areas that have been irrigated or that are in a lush green growing condition are especially vulnerable to infestation.

Army worms receive their common name by their habit of moving in large numbers in search of more favorable feeding conditions. These larvae often can be seen crawling across turnrows and irrigation ditches.

A generation is possible this time of the year, but oncoming weather, especially in the northern counties, will reduce the chance for future adult development. Armyworms problems will disappear almost completely as we get into the late fall season.

Cultural control by shallow cultivation is effective when the larvae have become full grown and have entered the soil a few inches to pupate.

Insecticidal control of fall armyworms is accomplished most effectively when larvae are small. Several applications of insecticide may be required to control the larger larvae. For information on insecticides for controlling fall armyworms or other pests attacking sorghums or small grains, contact your County Extension Agent.

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
