## Valley Takes First Game Of Season

The Valley Patriots hosted the Claude football team Friday night and took a 53-0 win.

Brandon Smith returned the opening kickoff 80 yards for a touchdown. This began the play between the two teams.

Coach Adams said the team did its offensive damage in the air and on the ground.

Quarterback Kirk Saul completed 11 of 17 passes for 151 yards and four touchdowns.

Thomas Rodriguez scored a pair of touchdowns and rushed for 106 yards on four carries. Rodriguez' scores came on 11 and 59 yard totes.

Valley led 32-0 after one period of play, and extended the margin to 39-0 before halftime.

In the third quarter, Valley added a couple more scores, bringing the lead to 53-0 at the beginning of the last period of play.

Claude was able to take only 56 yards offensively and turned the ball over six times.

Statistically, Valley led 32-0 at the end of the first period, added seven points in the second quarter, scored 14 points in the third period, and finished with a scoreless fourth period.

Scoggins ran 56 yards for a TD (Scott Saul kick)

Valley had 13 first downs to Claude's six. Valley gained 232 yards rushing, while Claude had 40. In passing, Valley threw for 153 yards as compared with 16 for Claude. Valley gained a total of 383 yards while Claude gained 56. Valley completed 11 of 17 passes. There was only one punt for Valley, while the Mustangs punted seven times. The Patriots recovered three of the opponents' fumbles. They were penalized seven times for 153 yards, while Claude was penalized three times for 23 yards.

The Patriots host Happy Friday night with the game beginning at 8:00 p.m.

The Junior High goes to Happy tonight (Thursday), with kickoff time set at 6:00 o'clock.

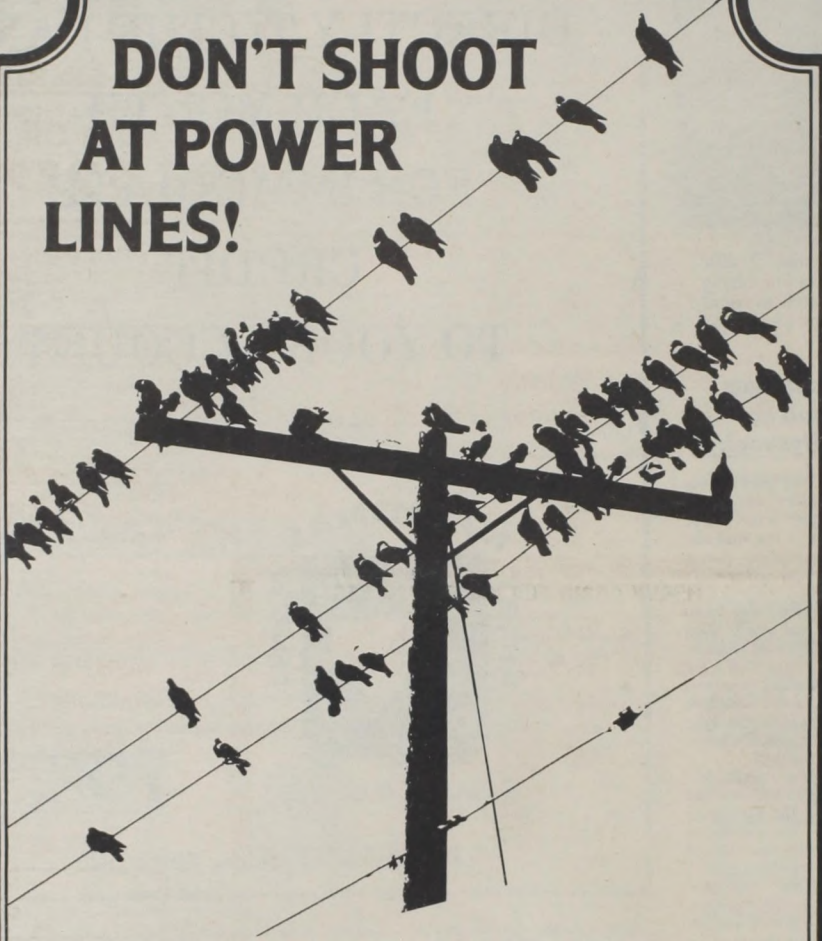

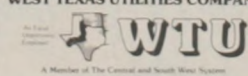

## Texas Musical Drama Has Largest Crowd In Twenty-One Years

Final tally of the Texas musical drama showed that 105,423 persons attended during the season from June 11 through August 23, this being the largest in the 21 years it has been in production.

This is a non-profit organization and is produced through the Texas Panhandle Heritage Foundation.

The surveys this year indicated that 28 percent of the audiences were from over 500 miles away with 40% traveling from 120 to 500 miles and 32% living within 120 miles of the amphitheatre. Mark Sumner, director of the Institute of Outdoor Drama in North Carolina, stated that each person who attends the theatre spends approximately \$75 a day (figure includes local

attendance). Since the average stay is 1 1/2 days, multiply \$112.50 x 105,400 to get \$11,857,500. Then multiply that figure by 3.5 (how many times the money turns over in the area) to get a total of \$41 million that was spent in the area during the summer.

Caprock Canyons State Park is a part of the Palo Duro Canyon and, in this editor's opinion, is more beautiful in a "rough" way. It has great potential, and it might behoove organizations in the area to begin promoting something like the "Texas" drama to bring to Caprock Canyons as a drawing card.

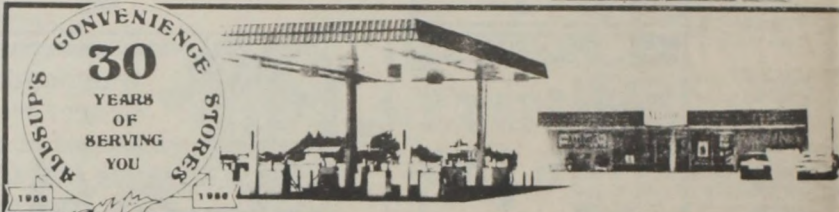

# Conservation Corner

Since the Conservation Reserve Program was announced back in the early spring, the Briscoe County Agricultural Offices have become beehives of activity. The ASCS office has been even busier than usual, taking bids and trying to keep up with CRP contracts. The Soil Conservation Service office has been busy writing contracts and helping producers plan how to plant their cropland back to grass. And the County Agent is getting more and more requests for soil samples.

To date, 55 Briscoe County farmers have put 16,906 acres of

cropland into the Conservation Reserve Program. This cropland will be planted to native grasses and will remain in grass for ten years. In exchange, the Department of Agriculture will pay approximately one-half of the cost of establishing the grass. This includes planting a cover crop, fertilizer, weed control, and planting the native grass seed. Producers will also be paid a yearly rent based on their accepted bid. Most Briscoe County participants have bid their land into the program for yearly rentals up to \$40.

Local farmers have had hundreds of questions concerning the Conservation Reserve Program. Hopefully, we have answered some of these in community-wide meetings held in Silverton and Quitaque. If not, please call the ASCS office or the Soil Conservation Service office in Silverton.

For the next few weeks we will use this space to help answer your questions on what you will have to do after you bid your land into the Conservation Reserve Program.

Next week, we will discuss the planting of a dead litter crop, why it is needed, how and when to plant it, and what crops make the best dead litter.

In the meantime, if you have questions, you can call or come by the Soil Conservation Service office in Silverton. (Phone 823-2320)

Clarendon EMS is extremely pleased to announce that two of its EMTs have been accepted for an upcoming Paramedic class. The closing date for comments on the proposed highly erodible land and wetland conservation provisions—commonly referred to as cross-compliance, sodbuster and swampbuster—of the Food Security Act of 1985 has been extended from August 26 to October 25, the U. S. Department of Agriculture has announced.

These provisions are designed to reduce soil loss due to wind and water erosion; protect the nation's long-term capability to produce food and fiber; reduce sedimentation and improve water quality; assist in preserving the nation's wetlands; and lessen the incentives to produce agricultural commodities on highly erodible farmland.

The comment period was extended because of the complex issues involved in implementation of the new provisions.

Comments should be sent to Director, Cotton, Grains and Rice Division, USDA/ASCS, P. O. Box 2415, Washington, D. C. 20013, and must be received on or before October 27 to be assured of consideration.

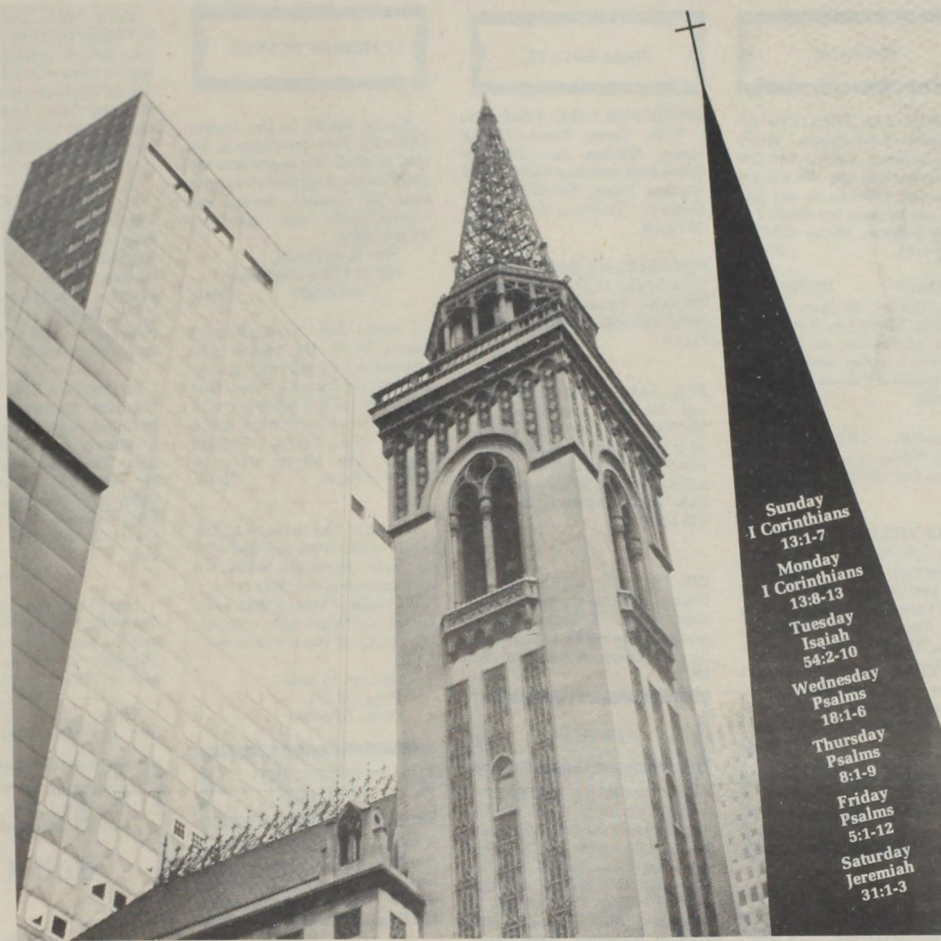

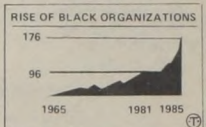
