Hall County ARB To Hold Property Owner Protest Hearings May 14th Through 16th

Property owners in the Hall County Appraisal District will have an opportunity from May 14 - 16 to protest proposed appraisals of their property for local taxes. The district's Appraisal Review Board (ARB) will begin hearing taxpayer protest on July 3rd.

After the ARB completes its hearings and approves final property appraisals, local governments will use these appraisals to set 2003 tax rates.

The ARB is a group of citizens who live in the appraisal district and are appointed by the district's board of directors. Their responsibilities and qualifications are outlined in the Texas Property Tax Code.

Property owners may protest to the ARB any of the following appraisal office actions:

- *The appraised or agricultural value of the property
 - * Unequal appraisal of the taxpayers property compared to other property in the district.
 - * Inclusion of the property on the appraisal records.
 - * Denial of agricultural use, open space, or timber productivity appraisal.
 - * Determination that agricultural or timber land has had a change of use and is subject to a rollback tax.
 - * Identification of the taxing unit or units in which the property is located.
 - *Determination that the taxpayer is the owner of the property
 - * Any other action of the appraisal office that adversely affects the property owner
- Marlin Felts, Chief Appraiser for the district, outlines the steps a property owner must take to file a protest. First, the property owner must file a written notice of protest that shows why the owner is protesting to the ARB. The taxpayer must file this notice by May 31 or within 30 days after the appraisal district mails the taxpayer a notice of appraised value, whichever is later.

Felts said that hearing will be held on Thursday July 3 and that the ARB expects to approve the final appraisal roll on July 22. State law requires the ARB to review and approve the appraisal records by July 20, or when not more than 5 percent of the total property value in the district remains under protest.

Those protesting their appraisal should not contact ARB members outside the hearing, the Chief Appraiser stressed. Each ARB member must sign an affidavit that he or she has had no contact about the protest with a property owner or the appraisal office staff before the hearing.

Taxpayer Information Booklet Available From Briscoe County Appraisal Office

Carlye Fleming, Chief Appraiser for the Briscoe County Appraisal District, offers property owners a 2003 pamphlet called "Texas Property Taxes: Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies & Responsibilities" to help them save on their property taxes.

Published by the State Comptroller's office in Austin, the "Remedies" pamphlet explains how the property tax system in Texas works and tells property owners about possible tax savings.

Mrs. Fleming noted that the pamphlet applies to property taxes collected by all types of taxing units: counties, cities, school districts and special districts (such as municipal utility, junior college and hospital districts).

"Homeowners may file for various property tax exemptions offered by taxing units on residence homesteads," Mrs. Fleming said. In Texas, a homestead is generally the house and yard used as the owner's principal residence. The pamphlet explains each exemption and how to apply for it.

For example, all homeowners who owned and lived in their homes on January 1 may file for a \$15,000 general exemption from their principal home's value for school taxes. In addition, certain disabled homeowners and those age 65 or older may qualify for an additional \$10,000 exemption from the value of their homes.

"A tax freeze, or ceiling, for school taxes is a benefit for homeowners once they become 65 years old," Mrs. Fleming said. "State law provides that homeowners who turn 65 may apply during the year, rather than waiting until the next January 1."

"An elderly homeowner's taxes that pay for public schools cannot increase above the total school tax amount on that home in

My name is Angela Clay and I am a cancer survivor. I was diagnosed with breast cancer in December, 2000. I was very shocked at the news of my diagnosis, because I had no family history, I was very healthy, and I was only 36 years old.

I quickly learned that cancer doesn't just affect those that are at high risk, it can affect anyone. My treatment included a mastectomy and 8 months of chemotherapy. Most of my treatment was done at M.D. Anderson Cancer Center in Houston.

This was a very rough time on my family and on myself. I was sick sometimes and having to be away from home was hard. God blessed me during this time in many ways.

He showed me what it was like to be on the other end of my profession, as a nurse. The side of the patient, which was something I had not had to really experience before. My husband and three children were wonderful through it all. During those many months of treatments and doctor appointments, my family and friends stood beside me. Through many good and bad times their support helped me see it through.

Since my diagnosis, I have become involved with a program sponsored by the American Cancer Society called Reach To Recovery, which is a support group for breast cancer patients. During my treatments I utilized the American Cancer Society's program that provides lodging for patients taking chemotherapy. I was able to use this on my many trips to Houston for treatment. This was so helpful at a time when finances were pretty tight.

The Relay For Life has always been an event that I thought was really great, but the last two years have been very special. Being able to walk the survivor lap is a joy for me and my family. Cancer doesn't just affect the a patient, it affects the family and friends of those who are diagnosed as well.

Almost everyone is affected today by cancer and the only way to help fight this dreaded disease is for research to keep searching for the cure. I hope that I live to see that happen. Right now I am just grateful to be a survivor.

Davis Honored For Outstanding Accomplishment

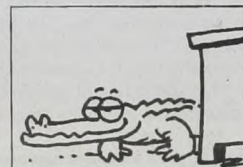

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Cooks Corner

I promise that this is the LAST week for 5 ingredient dishes, but I found a few more that I would like you to try. Bacon Cheeseburger Pasta is a snap to make and very filling, Ham and Cheese Mashed Potatoes is a great way to use up the last of the Easter ham, and you can also use leftover mashed potatoes. Horseradish Crab Dip is easy for entertaining or a family treat. Cookie Ice Cream Sandwiches use store-bought cookies to make it easy, and ice cream season is here.

BACON CHEESEBURGER PASTA
8 ounces uncooked tube or spiral pasta
1 pound ground beef
6 bacon strips, diced
1 can (10 3/4 oz.) condensed tomato soup, undiluted
1 cup (4 ounces) shredded cheddar cheese
Bar-B-Q sauce and prepared mustard, optional
Cook pasta according to package directions. Meanwhile, in a skillet, cook beef over medium heat until no longer pink; drain and set aside. In the same skillet, cook bacon until crisp; drain on paper towels. Discard dripping. Drain pasta; add to skillet. Add soup, beef and bacon; heat through. Sprinkle with cheese; cover and cook until cheese is melted. Serve with bar-b-q sauce and mustard if desired. Serves 4-6.

HAM AND CHEESE MASHED POTATOES
2 cups mashed potatoes
3/4 teaspoon garlic salt
1 cup fully cooked ham, diced
1 cup (4 oz.) shredded cheddar cheese
1/2 cup whipping cream, whipped
In a bowl, combine the potatoes and garlic salt. Spread into a greased 1-1/2 qt. baking dish. Sprinkle with ham. Fold cheese into whipping cream; spoon over ham. Bake, uncovered, at 450 for 15 minutes until golden brown. Serves 4-6.

HORSERADISH CRAB DIP
8 ounces cream cheese, softened
3 tablespoons picante sauce
1 or 2 tablespoons prepared horseradish
1 can (6 oz.) crabmeat, drained, flaked and cartilage removed
Celery sticks
In a mixing bowl, beat cream cheese, picante sauce and horseradish; mix well. Stir in the crab. Serve with celery. Makes 1-1/2 cups.

COOKIE ICE CREAM SANDWICHES
Peanut butter
12 store-bought oatmeal raisin cookies
1 pint ice cream, vanilla or flavor of your choice
Miniature chocolate chips
Spread peanut butter over the bottom of six cookies. Top with a scoop of ice cream. Top with another cookie; press down gently. Roll sides of ice cream sandwich in chocolate chips. Wrap individually in plastic wrap. Freeze until serving. Makes 6.

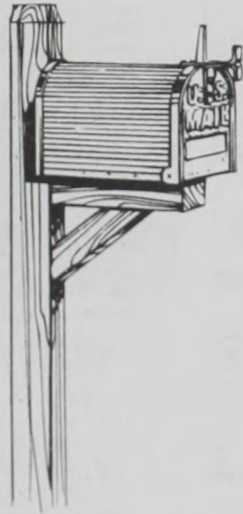

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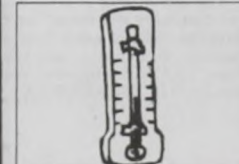

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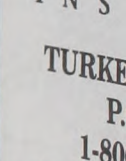

West Nile Virus Activity Could Pick Up Soon In West Texas

A Texas mosquito expert is anticipating another, and earlier, round of West Nile virus for this state.

West Nile encephalitis activity has already picked up in Louisiana with the virus reportedly being found in birds throughout the state and in the mosquito population around Baton Rouge, said Dr. Jim Olson, entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

"With that being an indication, we could be in for another year of West Nile virus activity," in Texas, Olson said.

"This is probably one of the earliest records of a mosquito borne virus becoming active in the South." Normally, activity begins in May or June, he said.

In 2002, the first year West Nile was reported in Texas, approximately 202 laboratory positive human cases and 13 deaths in the state were attributed to the virus, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

According to the CDC, West Nile virus is commonly found in Africa, West Asia and the Middle East. It is closely related to the St. Louis encephalitis virus, and it can infect humans, birds, mosquitoes, horses and some other mammals.

West Nile fever is usually a mild disease in people and is characterized by flu-like symptoms, it typically lasts only a few days and does not appear to cause any long term health effects, the CDC said.

Olson said West Nile virus is bird borne; to date more than 110 species of birds have been found to be infected with and have the ability to serve as the source of the virus.

"Mosquitoes feeding on infected birds become infected themselves and then pass that on to other birds," he said. "Or if, by chance, if they feed on horses and humans they could infect those."

State health officials are still encouraging horse and mule owners to vaccinate their animals. If the animals were vaccinated last year, a booster is recommended, Olson said.

"Consult your veterinarian and get them vaccinated now," he said. "There is a delay time form when the vaccination starts and when the horses will build a high enough immunity to be considered protected. That delay time can be up to six weeks."

PCG Makes Washington Rounds

A contingent of Texas cotton and corn producers made the rounds in Washington, DC earlier this week talking about the importance of keeping Farm Bill provisions intact and urging no changes in current payment limitation rules.

Producers representing the Corn Producers Association of Texas, Texas Cotton Producers, Plains Cotton Growers, and the National Cotton Council participated in the trip.

Comprising the PCG contingent were President Mark Williams of Farwell, Vice President Rickey Bearden of Plains and Executive Vice President Steve Verett.

In addition to the scheduled group meetings to reinforce the importance of protecting Farm Bill provisions, members of the groups also discussed a number of other important issues including trade.

The cotton contingent took the opportunity to express the industries extreme disappointment with the provisions of the recently completed Vietnam Textile Trade Agreement.

Topping the list of other objectives for the PCG group were consultations with the risk Management Agency regarding the 8 day deferred appraisal period for non-emerged crops. Several possible remedies to the issue have been discussed and work continues to find a workable solution.

PCG met with Ann Jorgensen director-External Affairs for USDA RMA, and Alan Ott, Confidential Assistant to RMA Administrator Ross J. Davidson, about the ongoing issue of deferred appraisals for non-emerged seed.

Several alternative solutions have been discussed to solve the situation created by the mandatory deferral period.

The crux of the problem is that producers who plant by the final planting date in their county are forced to wait a minimum of 23 days before the crop can be released to other uses.

For cotton imposing the full 23 day deferral period as implemented places the producer at risk of missing an opportunity to plant a produce a viable replacement crop.

In addition to the meetings with RMA officials Verett and the PCG officers also met with USDA Assistant Deputy Undersecretary John Johnson and Diane sharp, Director, Production, Emergency and Compliance division of the USDA Farm Service Agency.

Issues discussed included disaster program implementation issues, specifically the development of unharvested production factors and the implementation of the 95 percent benefit cap.

Top priorities for PCG in coming weeks on disaster includes working with Texas FSA State Committee during development of unharvested factor that will be used in disaster payment calculation.

Cottonseed Assistance Sign-Up Underway

Officially, the application period for the program runs from May 2 through May 23, 2003 in order to be considered for payment.

All companies that ginned 2002 crop cotton are eligible for program payments. Payments are expected to be made in early June 2003.

The 2002 Cottonseed program provides some \$50 million to offset 2002 crop cottonseed price shortfalls.

Payment rates will be determined based on the number of applications and resulting tonnage of cottonseed for which assistance is requested. USDA estimates that payment rates for the 2002 program will be in the neighborhood of \$8.00 per ton, or about \$3.00 per bale.

Ginners who do not receive their application by May 5 should contact Gene Rosera, FSA Price Support division, at 202-720-8481.

Cotton Seed Payment Program

The final regulation for the 2002 crop cottonseed payment program was published in the Federal Register on April 25, 2003. The rule provides for the program to be administered in the same manner as prior cottonseed payments. The Agriculture Act of 2003 provides \$50 million for this program.

Cottonseed payments applications were mailed to gins on Monday, April 28th from the FSA/Price Support Division in Washington D.C. Applications are to be submitted by gins directly to PSD/WDC. FSA State and County offices will not be administering or taking applications for this program.

In applying for the payments, gins must agree to share payments with producers to the extent that the effect of low seed prices was borne by the producer. The estimated payment rate is \$8.00 per ton of seed or about \$3.00 per bale.

Final payments and rates will be determined after all applications have been received. The application period is May 2 to May 23, 2003. If all applications are received in a timely fashion, payments to ginners will occur in early June.

Season To Begin On High Note

Northern High Plains cotton producers have much to look forward to as the 2003 growing season begins.

The zone, which begins its third season of eradication this year, is in an enviable position, having seen progress in its first two years that most zones only saw after three years of effort, said Foundation Program Director, Charles Allen.

"When you look at the data, the progress in the Northern High Plains seems to put it about a year ahead of schedule," Allen said.

He stressed that continued cooperation by the zone's producers would be a key to finishing the job of eradication. "I wouldn't be surprised if we come to the end of this season in a position where we can ask the Commissioner of Agriculture for a declaration of functional eradication," Allen said. "That should be good news for just about everybody"

the first year that the hom exemption," Mrs. Fleming homeowner improves or adding a bedroom, etc. The law provides an exemption for homeowners. If the survivor at least 55 years old at the time he or she can keep the property, does not apply for other city.

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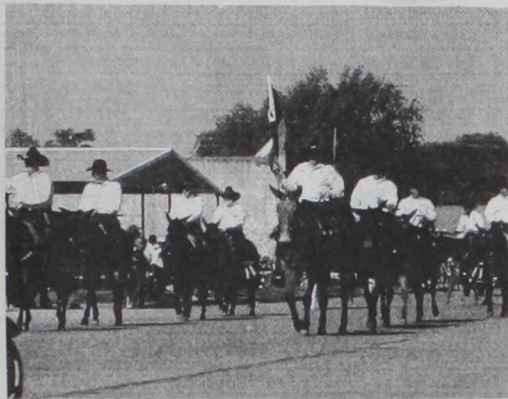
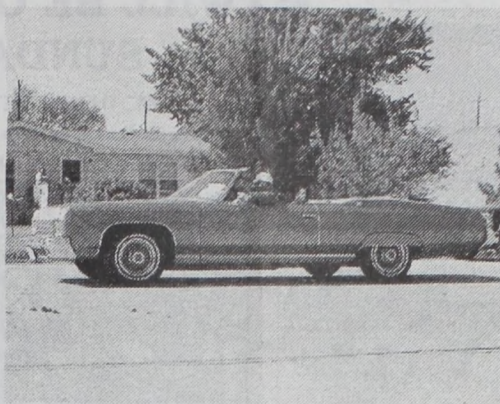
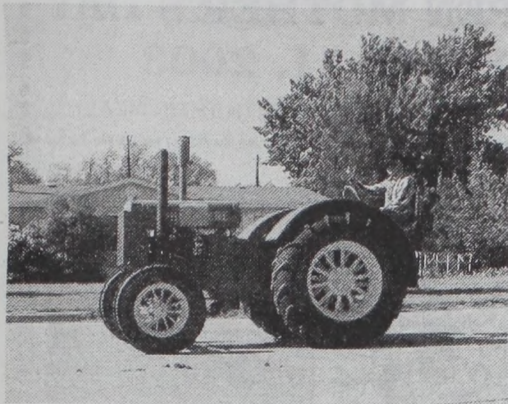

the first year that the homeowner receives the over 65 homeowner exemption," Mrs. Fleming continues. "But, it may increase if the homeowner improves or adds to the house, such as adding a patio or adding a bedroom, etc."

The law provides an additional school tax benefit for certain homeowners. If the surviving spouse of an over 65 homeowner is at least 55 years old at the time of the older spouse's death, then he or she can keep the school tax ceiling. The tax ceiling, however, does not apply to other taxing units, such as the county and city.

The Chief Appraiser pointed out that homeowners age 65 or older do not need to reapply for the exemption this year if they received the exemption and tax ceiling last year.

Only those who became 65 during 2003 and those who have never had the exemption and tax ceiling, such as the surviving spouse age 55 or older, must apply in 2003.

The taxpayer pamphlet also describes other exemptions available, such as those for disabled veterans and other disabled persons.

She said the "Remedies" pamphlet also contains information about protests to ensure that property values are fair and uniform.

Productivity appraisal is another type of tax relief available to agricultural or timber land owners.

"I urge all property owners in the Briscoe County Appraisal District to read the pamphlet and learn about the property tax system and all possible property tax relief," Mrs. Fleming said. "Remember, taxpayers must file exemption applications with the appraisal office by April 30 and any protests by May 31 of this year."

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Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these appeal procedures if you have a concern about:

- the market or special value place on your property
- the unequal appraisal of your property
- the inclusion of your property on the appraisal roll
- any exemptions that may apply to you
- the qualification for an agricultural or timber appraisal
- the taxable status of your property
- the local governments which should be taxing you property
- the ownership of property
- the change of use of land receiving special appraisal
- any action taken by the Chief Appraiser, appraisal district or appraisal review board that applies to and adversely affected you.

Information Review: A copy of the APPRAISAL REVIEW BOARD HEARING PROCEDURES, are available at the HALL COUNTY APPRAISAL DISTRICT. Contact any employee of the HALL COUNTY APPRAISAL DISTRICT.

Review by the Appraisal Review Board

If you can't resolve your problem informally with the county appraisal district (CAD) staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board (ARB).

The ARB is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the CAD to make the necessary changes to solve problems.

If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notice of the time, date and place of the hearing. If necessary, you may request a hearing in the evening, Saturday or Sunday. Prior to your hearing, you may ask to review the evidence the CAD will use to uphold their determination. The CAD may ask you for a copy of the evidence you plan to present. The hearing will be informal. You or a designated agent may appear in person to present evidence or you may send a notarized evidence for the ARB to review at your hearing. The CAD representative. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. The CAD has the burden of establishing the property's value by a preponderance of the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at 512 main, Hall County Courthouse, Second Floor, Memphis Texas 79245.

Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

Review By the District Court

After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order.

Tax Payment

If you appeal and your case is pending, you must pay the lesser of the amount of taxes due on the portion of the taxable value not in dispute or the amount of taxes due on the property under the order from which the appeal is taken.

Deadline for Filing Protest with the ARB*

Usual Deadline

On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.

Late protests are due the day before the appraisal review board approves records for the year. Contact your appraisal district for more information.

Special Deadlines

For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

For the ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1). The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

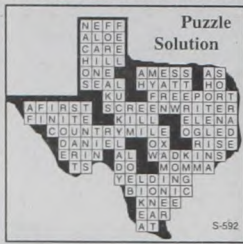
