TELLS OF TRIP TO EUROPE

Mr. and Mrs. John Adamson and Mrs. Gordon Bain have returned from a three weeks trip abroad. They met a group led by Rev. Johnnie Williams of Earth and joined an international tour in New York which landed in Amsterdam's Kennedy Airport. After a sightseeing tour through the canals of Amsterdam, they traveled through Holland to West Germany—through Cologne to the famous cathedral there, which is the largest Gothic edifice in the world—then to Bonn, seat of government and birthplace of Beethoven. Near Koblenz they embarked on a Rhine steamer for a cruise down the fabled river, and through the Rhine Gorge with its breathtaking cliffs on which perch beautiful old castles and up whose sides grape vineyards climb.

After the narrow streets of the old wine town of Rudisheim, they proceeded to Worms, seat of the German Reformation, and to Heidelberg with its famous university and mighty castle looming over the city. Eight German kings have been buried at Seyer, near the Black Forest Region with its beautiful Lake Titisee.

Crossing into Switzerland, after viewing Rhine Falls, a photographer's paradise, they reach Zurich where the Reformation began in Switzerland. Spending two nights at Engleberg, an international ski resort near Lucern, they left the snow-covered alps and Lake Lucern, passed through the principality of Liechtenstein, and crossed the Arlberg Pass to Innsbruck, Austria, former site of the Winter Olympics.

Through Brenner Pass they reached Venice, Italy, where canals serve as thoroughfares, then to Michelangelo's Florence, and fabulous Rome—where the buildings which have withstood the test of time took them back to the time of Christ. Highlights of Rome were Vatican City with its Sistine Chapel, the Roman Forum, Basilica of St. Paul, and Tivoli with its fountains and grottoes. A drive along the Mediterranean led to Pisa with its Leaning Tower, the Po River Valley, with its groves of olive trees, led to Carrara, Italy's city which exports marble.

After deVinci's Milan, they climbed the summit of the Alps again to the meeting place of Switzerland, Italy and France. They marveled at the longest tunnel in the world (over seven miles) which led through Mont Blanc to Geneva, Switzerland. Leaving Lake Geneva, and passing near the birthplace of Pasteur, the bus traveled through the rolling plains of Central France with its picturesque villages and lush vineyards.

A day's excursion of Paris included Champs Elysee, Arc de Triomphe, Eiffel Tower, the Louvre and Notre Dame Cathedral. The route from Paris led north to Lille and Antwerp, Belgium—then to London with its Trafalgar Square, Buckingham Palace, Windsor Castle, Changing of the Guard, Piccadilly Circus, Hyde Park, Houses of Parliament and Westminster Abby.

While waiting for the Royal Dutch Airlines to fly them back to the States, everyone began to realize why Europe is called the "Old World" and America the "New World." There is a great contrast between the old and the new.

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT General Election Nov. 3, 1970 NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (HJR15)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Section 51-b, Subsection (a), Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "(a) The State Building Commission is created and succeeds to the powers and duties heretofore vested in the agency of the same name by this Constitution and to the powers and duties the Legislature has vested or may vest in the Commission. Its membership shall consist of three Texas citizens appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate. The term of each member shall be six years except in the first appointments to the Commission the Governor shall appoint one member for two

years, one for four years, one for six years, and thereafter one member biennially. The Governor shall biennially designate one member as Chairman. Vacancies in the Commission shall be filled by appointment by the Governor for the unexpired term. The provisions of this paragraph shall be self-enacting." Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment reconstituting the State Building Commission as a three-member appointive commission."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (HJR30) General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Subsections (5), (6), (7), (8), (9), (11), (12), and (13), Section 1-a, Article V, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "(5) The Commission may hold its meetings, hearings and other proceedings at such times and places as it shall determine but shall meet at Austin at least once each year. It shall annually select one of its members as Chairman. A quorum shall consist of five (5) members. Proceedings shall be by majority vote of those present, except that recommendations for retirement, censure, or removal of any person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section shall be by affirmative vote of at least five (5) members. "(6) A. Any Justice or Judge of the Appellate Courts and District and Criminal District Courts, any County Judge, and any Judge of a County Court at Law, a Court of Domestic Relations, a Juvenile Court, a Probate Court, or a Corporation or Municipal Court, and any Justice of the Peace, and any Judge or presiding officer of any special court created by the Legislature as provided in Section 1, Article V, of this Constitution, may, subject to the other provisions hereof, be removed from office for willful or persistent conduct, which is clearly inconsistent with the proper performance of his said duties or casts public discredit upon the judiciary or administration of justice; or any person holding such office may be censured, in lieu of removal from office, under procedures provided for by the Legislature. "B. Any person holding an office named in Paragraph A of this subsection who is eligible for retirement benefits under the laws of this state providing for judicial retirement may be involuntarily retired, and any person holding an office named in that paragraph who is not eligible for retirement benefits under such laws may be removed from office, for disability seriously interfering with the perform-

ance of his duties; which is, or is likely to become, permanent in nature. "(7) The Commission shall keep itself informed as fully as may be of circumstances relating to the misconduct or disability of particular persons holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section, receive complaints or reports, formal or informal, from any source in this behalf and make such preliminary investigations as it may determine. Its orders for the attendance or testimony of witnesses or for the production of documents at any hearing or investigation shall be enforceable by contempt proceedings in the District Court. "(8) After such investigation as it deems necessary, the Commission may in its discretion issue a private reprimand, or if the Commission determines that the situation merits such action, it may order a hearing to be held before it concerning the removal, or retirement, of a person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section, or it may in its discretion request the Supreme Court to appoint an active or retired District Judge or Justice of a Court of Civil Appeals as a Master to hear and take evidence in any such matter, and to report thereon to the Commission. If, after hearing, or after considering the report of a Master, the Commission finds good cause therefor, it shall issue an order of public censure or it shall recommend to the Supreme Court the removal, or retirement, as the case may be, of the person in question holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section and shall thereupon file with the Clerk of the Supreme Court the entire record before the Commission. "(9) The Supreme Court shall review the record of the proceedings on the law and facts and in its discretion may, for good cause shown, permit the introduction of additional evidence and shall order public censure, retirement or removal, as it finds just and proper, or wholly reject the

recommendation. Upon an order for involuntary retirement for disability or an order for removal, the office in question shall become vacant. The rights of an incumbent so retired to retirement benefits shall be the same as if his retirement had been voluntary." "(11) The Supreme Court shall by rule provide for the procedure before the Commission, Masters and the Supreme Court. Such rule shall afford to any person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section, against whom a proceeding is instituted to cause his retirement or removal, due process of law for the procedure before the Commission, Masters and the Supreme Court in the same manner that any person whose property rights are in jeopardy in an adjudicatory proceeding is entitled to due process of law, regardless of whether or not the interest of the person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section in remaining in active status is considered to be a right or a privilege. Due process shall include the right to notice, counsel, hearing, confrontation of his accusers, and all such other incidents of due process as are ordinarily available in proceedings whether or not misfeasance is charged, upon proof of which a penalty may be imposed. "(12) No person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section shall sit as a member of the Commission or Supreme Court in any proceeding involving his own retirement or removal. "(13) This Section 1-a is alternative to and cumulative of, the methods of removal of persons holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section provided elsewhere in this Constitution." Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment relating to the removal, retirement, or censure of Justices, Judges, and Justices of Peace under prescribed circumstances."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR15) General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 1-d, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 1-d. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm and forest lands, which shall be based upon the capability of such lands to support the raising of livestock and/or to produce farm and forest crops rather than upon the value of such lands and the crop growing thereon." Sec. 2. The foregoing con-

stitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the Legislature to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm and forest lands, which shall be based upon the capability of such lands to support the raising of livestock and/or to produce farm and forest crops."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (SJR32) General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 51, Article XVII, Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Section 51. The homestead, not in a town or city, shall consist of not more than two hundred acres of land, which may be in one or more parcels, with the improvements thereon; the homestead in a city, town or village, shall consist of lot, or lots, not to exceed in value Ten Thousand Dollars, at the time of their designation as the homestead, without reference to the value of any improvements thereon; provided, that the same shall be used for the purposes of a

home, or as a place to exercise the calling or business of the head of a family; provided also, that any temporary renting of the homestead shall not change the character of the same, when no other homestead has been acquired." Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment increasing the value of the homestead which is exempt from forced sale."

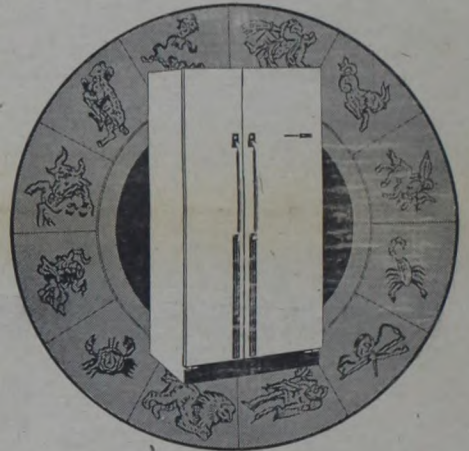

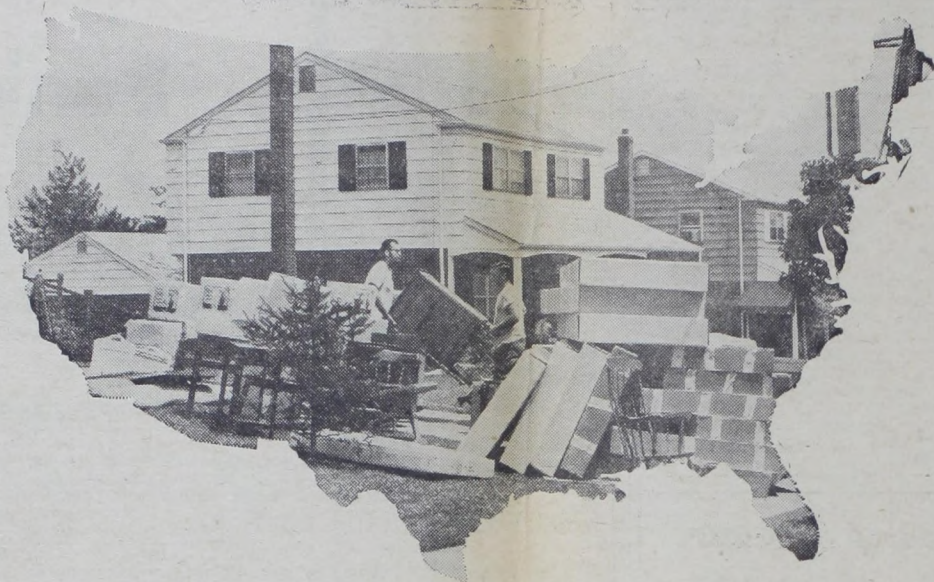

Shirttail Sermon

The following appeared in the Wall Street Journal several years ago:

"What America needs more than railway extension, and western irrigation, and a low tariff, and a bigger wheat crop, and a merchant marine and a navy, is a revival of piety the kind that Mother and Father used to have . . .

piety that counted it good business to stop for daily family prayers before breakfast, right in the middle of harvest; that quit work a half-hour earlier Wednesday night, so as to get the chores done and go to prayer-meeting; that borrowed money to pay the preacher's salary, and prayed fervently in secret for salvation of the rich man who looked with scorn on such unbusinesslike behavior. That's what we need now to clean this country of the filth of graft and of greed, petty and big; of worship of fine houses and big lands and high offices and grand social functions.

"What is this thing we are worshipping but a vain repetition of what decayed nations fell down and worshipped just before their light went out? Read the history of Rome in decay, and you'll find luxury there that could lay a big dollar over our little doughnut that looks so large to us. Great wealth never made a nation substantial nor honorable. There is nothing on earth that looks good that is so dangerous for a man or a nation to handle, as quick, easy, big money. If you do resist its deadly influence, the chances are it will get your son."

Beat cheese with remaining 1 cup sugar, eggs, salt and vanilla; turn into pan. Bake on low shelf at 350 degrees for 1 hour. Cool, then chill. Spread top with sour cream. Slice 1 nectarine and arrange in design over sour cream. Remove from pan and place on serving plate.

Bread and Butter Pickles

12 medium cucumbers
8 medium onions
2 green peppers
1/2 Cup salt
5 cups sugar (white)
5 cups vinegar (white)
2 teaspoons mustard seed
1 teaspoon celery seed
1/2 teaspoon cloves
1/2 teaspoon turmeric

Wash cucumbers. Do not peel. Slice paper thin. You will have approximately 16 cups. Slice and shred green peppers from which all seeds and pith have been removed. Slice onions. Pack vegetables in a large crock or bowl with salt sprinkled through and cover with ice. Weight vegetables down with heavy lid or plate and let stand for three hours.

Drain, rinse quickly, and drain again thoroughly. Too much water clinging to the vegetables will make the pickling syrup weak and you will have too much liquid. Make pickling syrup of white sugar and vinegar. Add spices and boil for five minutes.

Add vegetables and bring whole

mixture to simmering point, but do not allow to boil. Pack in clean, hot jars and cap at once.
