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Family Almost Asphyxiated Here

Mr. and Mrs. James Kimbell, Mrs. Charles Wallace and three children of Lubbock, Connie Brunson of Silverton and Kelvin Kimbell, son of Mr. and Mrs. James Lynn Kimbell of Quitaque, were almost asphyxiated Saturday morning. Mrs. Kimbell arose to take something for her headache. Her daughter got up about the same time, around 5:30 in the morning, to get a bottle for her mouth-old baby. She started to the refrigerator and passed out. Her son, Randy, got up and he passed out. Mrs. Kimbell realized about then that something was wrong and she called Bill Griffin. He came and threw the doors open and began giving the family oxygen. All of them were pretty sick and weak, but Mrs. Wallace and Randy were the only ones who passed out. Several of the family vomited. Mrs. Kimbell reported Monday morning they were still weak but feeling better. She called Lubbock and Mrs. Wallace said the school nurse sent Randy home from school not feeling well.

The furnace and all gas openings were checked by the Pioneer Gas Co. employee and he found nothing amiss. He thought the wind was in the right direction and very strong and it might have forced the fumes back into the house instead of carrying them outside. Mrs. Kimbell said the house was not hot and there was no odor at all to let them think it was the gas.

Rep. Christian Appointed To Congressional Commission On VEE

AUSTIN—Dr. H. Q. Sibley, head of the Texas Animal Health Commission, has announced the nomination of Rep. Tom Christian of Claude to a Congressional Commission on Venezuelan Equine Encephalomyelitis (VEE).

Christian is one of fifteen Texas ranchers and veterinarians who have been asked to serve with a U. S. House of Representatives committee which will study the recent epidemic. Members of the House committee are expected to come to Texas sometime after the Congress reconvenes.

Request for such a commission came from the office of Undersecretary of Agriculture Ernest Saulman and is being handled in Texas by Dr. Ernest Cox. Dr. Cox is head of the Federal Animal Health Commission in Texas.

In discussing Christian's nomination, Sibley stated, "Rep. Christian has been on this VEE thing from the beginning, and he should be on this Commission."

Quitaque - Flomot Methodists Are Assigned Pastor

The Quitaque Pantherettes, who had been tabbed as the favorite to win district honors this year, stubbed their toes last Friday night at Lakeview and were upset 32-27, but then climbed right back into the picture Tuesday night here by taking a 49-42 win over the Hedley Owlettes in a hard-fought game. Tuesday night's games wound up the first round of the season with the Eaglettes still unbeaten in district competition and the Pantherettes next with only one loss.

The Panthers won their first district game of the season last Friday night in taking a 64-50 win over Lakeview. Dee Whittington, 17 points, sparked the Panther offense. Danny Payne was next with 15 points, Hoss Hamilton dropped in 14, David Johnston 12, Billy Cagle 4 and Alvin Ivory 2.

The Pantherettes' forwards just couldn't put any points on the board in dropping their first district loss. Mary Brunson led the scoring for Quitaque with 12 points and Cherri Brown was next with 8. Wanda Ramsey, Janie Hendrix and Debbie Farley each chalked up two points and Eva Cheatham, one.

Tuesday night the big Hedley Owls, who were frustrated by the Panthers last year in a bid for district honors, clobbered the smaller and inexperienced Panthers 92-42 and won the first half of district competition. Apparently there is no one in the district this year that can seriously challenge the Owls as they have won convincingly over everyone in the first round.

The Pantherettes looked much sharper in winning Tuesday's contest. The first half was close with the Pantherettes leading 9-7 at the end of the first period and 23-20 at halftime. The locals began to put it together in the third period, however, and managed to lead from 8 to 11 points the remainder of the way. In fact, free throw shooting by the Owlettes' Renee White, was the only thing that kept them in the contest. The Owlettes canned 18 free throws and missed only four while the Pantherettes dropped in 13 and missed 13.

Proclamation "3.76 in '76 Week"

Whereas, the Texas agricultural industry in all of its phases, continues to be our most important industry, and

Whereas, agriculture continues to have great growth potential in our State with the rewards from such growth accruing to the benefit of all Texans, and

Whereas, there is an urgent need for an active crusade to increase the public's knowledge, acceptance, and appreciation for the highly significant contribution which agriculture makes to the economy of our state and to the level of living enjoyed by its citizens, and

Whereas, it is recognized that all citizens of this great State have a vital stake and a legitimate self-interest in the general well-being of the farmers and ranchers who provide the great abundance and variety of food and fiber of highest quality which we all enjoy, and

Whereas, "3.76 in '76" is a well-conceived program designed by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, with the endorsement and active support of agricultural agencies, organizations, and individual leaders, to help the agricultural industry achieve its full potential through an intensification of efforts by producers, agribusinesses, and professional agriculturists to bring about an increase in income to farmers and ranchers of \$1 billion by the end of the crop year 1976, and

Whereas, "3.76 in '76" will narrow the gap between knowledge and practice through the coordinated application of improved production and marketing practices that have been proven to be sound and profitable, and

Whereas approximately \$10 million dollars of the \$1 billion goal has been achieved through the 1971 season,

Now therefore, I, Preston E. Smith, Governor of the State of Texas, do proclaim the week of January 17-23, 1972 as "3.76 in '76 Week" in Texas and call upon all citizens to join in this observance and to dedicate their efforts to the achievement of its stated objectives.

The current state-wide program to increase agricultural income in Texas to \$3.76 billion in 1976 is geared to help the agriculture industry—but what does it mean to the consumer?

"Consumers are concerned with an assurance of adequate food supply, and 3.76 in '76 is a program of growth," says Dr. W. E. Black, Extension economist-management specialist at Texas A&M University. He adds that the program is important because the increasing population must be fed on a decreasing amount of land used for agricultural production.

"Guidelines in the program are meant to increase production and improve quality," Dr. Black says of the project which seeks to increase cash receipts to agriculture by one billion dollars at the end of the 1976 crop year.

The increase in production and cash receipts will benefit the consumer as well as the producer.

Food prices will undoubtedly reflect an increased efficiency in production and marketing as costly practices in current use are improved or eliminated.

Technology in production and food preparation will be reflected in food prices, although cost of individual items will also be determined by the amount of preparation before purchase by the consumer. This would include special services such as pre-cooking and specialty packaging.

Farmers will gear their production to specific markets that are dictated by consumers' preferences. This in turn will provide consumers with higher quality foods in greater amounts at stable prices.
